AN ACT

1 Providing for the licensing of professional home inspectors;
2 granting powers to and imposing duties on the Secretary of
3 Labor and Industry; and providing a civil penalty.

4 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
5 hereby enacts as follows:

6 Section 1. Short title.

7 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Professional
8 Home Inspector Licensure Act.

9 Section 2. Definitions.

10 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
11 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
12 context clearly indicates otherwise:

13 "Associate home inspector." A person who is employed by a
14 licensed professional home inspector to conduct inspections of
15 residential homes or buildings on behalf of the professional
16 home inspector.

17 "Professional home inspector." A person who, for
18 compensation, engages in the business of inspecting residential

1 homes or buildings for buyers or others.

2 "Secretary." The Secretary of Labor and Industry of the
3 Commonwealth.

4 Section 3. Professional home inspector to be licensed.

5 (a) System established.--The secretary shall establish a
6 system for the licensure of professional home inspectors.

7 (b) License requirement.--No person may engage in the
8 business of home inspections, either part time or full time, or
9 in any other manner act as a professional home inspector or
10 associate home inspector unless the person is licensed by the
11 secretary.

12 (c) Application.--A professional home inspector or associate
13 home inspector shall be licensed by the secretary upon
14 submission of an application and payment of a reasonable
15 application fee sufficient to cover the cost of implementing the
16 provisions of this act. The fee shall be prescribed by the
17 secretary.

18 (d) Renewals.--The secretary may require biennial renewal of
19 application for licensure and may stagger the renewal dates and
20 adjust the application fees accordingly.

21 Section 4. Application for professional home inspector license.

22 (a) License criteria.--The secretary shall establish the
23 criteria for the granting of a license. The applicant for a
24 professional home inspector's license shall, as a condition
25 precedent to obtaining a license, take a licensing examination
26 as prescribed by the secretary, and score a passing grade. Prior
27 to taking the examination:

28 (1) the applicant shall:

29 (i) be at least 21 years of age;

30 (ii) be a high school graduate or produce proof

satisfactory to the secretary of an education equivalent thereto; and

(2) the applicant shall:

(i) have been engaged as a licensed associate home inspector for at least two years and have completed 250 fee-paid inspections; or

(ii) possess educational or experience qualifications which the secretary deems to be the equivalent of the qualifications listed in subparagraph (i). If this subparagraph is used as the basis for licensing, an equivalency examination shall be administered by the secretary and a passing grade shall be required.

(b) Written application.--An application for a license as a professional home inspector shall be made in writing, to the secretary, upon a form provided for the purpose by the secretary, and shall contain such information concerning the applicant as the secretary shall require.

(c) Place of business.--The application shall state the place of business for which the license is desired.

(d) Time for submission.--The application must be received by the secretary within three years of the date upon which the applicant took the examination.

Section 5. Application for associate home inspector license.

(a) Examination required.--Each applicant shall, as a condition precedent to obtaining a license, take the associate home inspector's license examination and score a passing grade. Prior to taking the examination, the applicant shall be at least 21 years of age.

(b) Written application.--An application for a license as an

1 associate home inspector shall be made in writing, to the
2 secretary, upon a form provided for the purpose by the
3 secretary, and shall contain such information concerning the
4 applicant as the secretary shall require.

5 (c) Sworn statement.--The applicant shall submit a sworn
6 statement by the professional home inspector with whom he
7 desires to be affiliated certifying that the professional home
8 inspector will actively supervise and train the applicant.

9 (d) Time for submission.--The application must be received
10 by the secretary within three years of the date upon which the
11 applicant took the examination.

12 Section 6. Exception.

13 (a) Eligibility for professional home inspector's license.--
14 A person who has engaged in the business of home inspections for
15 a minimum of one year prior to the effective date of this act
16 and has conducted at least 250 fee-paid inspections, and who
17 successfully completes the written examination to be
18 administered by the secretary, shall be eligible to apply for a
19 professional home inspector's license.

20 (b) Exemption.--A person eligible for licensing under
21 subsection (a) shall be exempt from the provisions of this act
22 relating to associate home inspectors.

23 (c) Duration of exception.--This section shall remain in
24 effect for a period of three years after the effective date of
25 this act.

26 Section 7. Secretary to investigate.

27 The secretary shall, on his initiative or in response to
28 complaints, investigate on a continuous basis allegations of
29 violations of this act and gather evidence of violations of this
30 act or any regulation adopted under this act.

1 Section 8. Grounds for fines or revocations.

2 The secretary may fine or refuse to grant or may suspend or
3 revoke a license of a professional home inspector for any of the
4 following acts or omissions related to the conduct of the
5 business of inspecting residential homes or buildings:

6 (1) Making or authorizing any material statement,
7 written or oral, which is known to be untrue or misleading.

8 (2) Failing to carry appropriate general liability and
9 professional liability insurance policies providing coverage
10 for negligent acts.

11 (3) Expressing an opinion not based on practical
12 experience and honest conviction.

13 (4) Acting in bad faith toward a client.

14 (5) Disclosing any information concerning the results of
15 an inspection without first obtaining the approval of the
16 client for whom the inspection was performed.

17 (6) Accepting compensation, monetary or otherwise, from
18 more than one interested party for the same service without
19 first obtaining the consent of all interested parties.

20 (7) Accepting or offering commissions or allowances,
21 directly or indirectly, from other parties dealing with his
22 client in connection with work for which the professional
23 home inspector is responsible.

24 (8) Failing to promptly disclose to a client any
25 interest in a business that may affect the client.

26 (9) Allowing an interest in a business other than home
27 inspection to affect the quality or result of an inspection.

28 (10) Using a home inspection as a vehicle to obtain
29 additional work in another field.

30 (11) Attempting to appraise or express an opinion

concerning the market value of any property under inspection.

(12) Engaging in a pattern of conduct which includes any of the acts or omissions prohibited in this section or any other unconscionable or fraudulent commercial practice prohibited by the secretary pursuant to regulations promulgated under this act.

Section 9. Notice to be given.

Upon refusal to grant a license or upon suspension or revocation of a license issued to a professional home inspector, the secretary shall notify the professional home inspector, in writing, by certified mail. The person shall be given a hearing by a review board if, within 60 days after receipt of notice, he files with the secretary a written request for a hearing.

Section 10. Review board.

The review board for the hearings provided for in section 9 shall be convened and appointed by the secretary when necessary and shall consist of one professional home inspector, one lay person and the secretary. Appointments to the review board shall be rotated to prevent any indication of permanent appointment.

Section 11. Civil penalties.

The secretary may impose upon a professional home inspector who violates this act a civil penalty of not more than \$2,000 for the first offense and not more than \$5,000 for the second and each subsequent offense. The civil penalty shall be issued for and recovered by and in the name of the secretary and shall be collected and enforced by summary proceedings.

Section 12. Rules and regulations.

The secretary shall promulgate rules and regulations to administer and enforce this act.

Section 13. Effective date.

1 This act shall take effect in 90 days.
