## A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Honoring the City of York.
WHEREAS, In 1747, at the request of William Penn's family, a tract of land west of the Susquehanna and adjoining the Codorus River was surveyed, and a town with wide, straight streets and large, open public squares was planned; and

WHEREAS, The town was named Yorktowne, after York, England, and the white rose was adopted as its symbol. Streets were given English names such as King, Queen, George and Princess; and

WHEREAS, York was the first capital of the United States, serving as the seat of government for the Continental Congress which was convened in York from September 30, 1777, to June 28, 1778. York was officially recognized in the Congressional Record as the location of the adoption of the Articles of Confederation, forerunner to the Constitution; and

WHEREAS, York was incorporated as a borough on September 24, 1787; and

WHEREAS, York was incorporated as a city on January 11, 1887,
with D.K. Noell as the first mayor; and
WHEREAS, York has grown and prospered during the past 200 years and continues today as a thriving and flourishing community; and

WHEREAS, York has produced many illustrious citizens, including Colonel James Smith, signer of the Declaration of Independence, who have contributed to community, state and country; therefore be it

RESOLVED (the Senate concurring), That the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania honor the City of York on the occasion of its 200th anniversary of incorporation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the mayor of the City and to members of York City Council.
