AN ACT

Amending Title 75 (Vehicles) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for a speed limit of 65 miles per hour on rural interstate highways and on a certain portion of the Pennsylvania Turnpike; and further providing for speed timing devices.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Sections 3362 , $3368(c)$ and $6110(a)$ of Title 75 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes are amended to read: § 3362. Maximum speed limits.
(a) General rule.--Except when a special hazard exists that requires lower speed for compliance with section 3361 (relating to driving vehicle at safe speed), the limits specified in this [subsection] section or established under this subchapter shall be maximum lawful speeds and no person shall drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of the following maximum limits:
(1) 35 miles per hour in any urban district.
(2) 55 miles per hour in other locations.
(3) Any other maximum speed limit established under this subchapter.
(a.1) Limit on certain highways.--Notwithstanding subsection (a), the speed limit, for passenger cars only, on rural interstate highways and the east-west portion of the
Pennsylvania Turnpike bearing intexstate highwy designation <-
OUTSIDE OF AN URBANIZED AREA OF 50,000 POPULATION OR MORE shall <-
be 65 miles per hour.
(b) Posting of speed limit.--No maximum speed limit established under subsection (a) (1) or (3) shall be effective unless posted on fixed or variable official traffic-control devices erected in accordance with regulations adopted by the department which regulations shall require posting at the beginning and end of each speed zone and at intervals not greater than one-half mile.
(c) Penalty.--Any person violating this section is guilty of a summary offense and shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine of $\$ 35$. Any person exceeding the maximum speed limit by more than five miles per hour shall pay an additional fine of \$2 per mile for each mile in excess of five miles per hour over the maximum speed limit.
(d) Rural interstate highways.--The department shall determine what constitutes a rural interstate highway. The determination shall be based on the population of the area in which the highway is located and on the number of motor vehicles which use the highway's access and exit ramps AS SPECIFIED IN 23 U.S.C. § 154. A section of an interstate highway may be designated as rural and, ON THE APPROVAL OF THE DEPARTMENT THAT THE HIGHWAY MEETS MINIMUM DESIGN CRITERIA AND SAFETY STANDARDS, the speed limit of that section may be set at 65 miles per hour,
even though another portion of that highway, because it is
located in an area of dense population and heavy vehiculax
aness is not designated as rural and the speed
limit on that section is 55 miles per hour.
§ 3368. Speed timing devices.

(c) Mechanical, electrical and electronic devices
authorized.--
(1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the rate of speed of any vehicle may be timed on any highway by a police officer using a mechanical or electrical speed timing device.
(2) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (3), electronic devices such as radio-microwave devices (commonly referred to as electronic speed meters or radar) may be used only by members of the Pennsylvania State Police.
(3) Electronic devices which calculate speed by measuring elapsed time between measured road surface points by using two sensors and devices which measure and calculate the average speed of a vehicle between any two points may be used by any police officer.
(4) No person may be convicted upon evidence obtained through the use of devices authorized by paragraphs (2) and (3) unless the speed recorded is $\ddagger$ six or more miles per hour in excess of the legal speed limit OR TWO OR MORE MILES PER HOUR IN EXCESS OF THE LEGAL SPEED LIMIT IN AN AREA WHERE THE MAXIMUM SPEED LIMIT IS 65 MILES PER HOUR. Furthermore, no person may be convicted upon evidence obtained through the use of devices authorized by paragraph (3) in an area where the legal speed limit is less than 55 miles per hour if the
speed recorded is less than ten miles per hour in excess of the legal speed limit. This paragraph shall not apply to evidence obtained through the use of devices authorized by paragraph (3) within a school zone.

§ 6110. Regulation of traffic on Pennsylvania Turnpike.
(a) General rule.--The provisions of this title apply upon any turnpike or highway under the supervision and control of the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission unless specifically modified by rules and regulations promulgated by the commission which shall become effective only upon publication in accordance with law. A copy of the rules and regulations, so long as they are effective, shall be posted at all entrances to the turnpike or highway for the inspection of persons using the turnpike or highway. This section does not authorize the establishment of a maximum speed limit greater than 55 miles per hour on any portion of the Pennsylvania Turnpike not bearing an intexstate <hat designation OUTSIDE OF AN URBANIZED AREA OF 50,000 POPULATION OR MORE. ANY MAXIMUM SPEED LIMIT GREATER THAN 55 MILES PER HOUR IS SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL OF THE COMMISSION THAT THE PORTION OF THE TURNPIKE WHERE THE GREATER SPEED LIMIT WILL BE IN EFFECT MEETS MINIMUM DESIGN CRITERIA AND SAFETY STANDARDS. * * *

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
