- 1 Declaring December 1997 as "The Month of the Transistor" in 2 Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, On December 16, 1947, three scientists of Bell
- 4 Laboratories, Lucent Technologies, Nobel Prize winners John
- 5 Bardeen, Walter Brattain and William Shockley succeeded in
- 6 inventing the transistor; and
- WHEREAS, The transistor has given rise to a multi-billion
- 8 dollar microelectronics industry that today produces a dazzling
- 9 variety of products and services; and
- 10 WHEREAS, There is neither an industry nor an individual in
- 11 this or any other industrialized country that has not benefited
- 12 from the transistor; and
- 13 WHEREAS, The Microelectronics Group of Lucent Technologies

- 1 and its 8,000 employees in this Commonwealth continue this
- 2 tradition of innovation by manufacturing and developing other
- 3 communications products; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Lucent Technologies' Allentown facility is the
- 5 birthplace of the transistor by virtue of being the transistor's
- 6 first manufacturing site and celebrates its 50th anniversary in
- 7 1997; and
- 8 WHEREAS, This successful manufacturing effort has contributed
- 9 to the general economic well-being of the community; therefore
- 10 be it
- 11 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives declare December
- 12 1997 as "The Month of the Transistor" in Pennsylvania.
