A RESOLUTION

- 1 Designating the week of October 18 through 24, 1998, as 2 "Character Counts Week" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, The present and future well-being of our society
- 4 requires an involved caring citizenry with good character; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Concerns about the character training of children
- 6 have taken on a new sense of urgency as violence, substance
- 7 abuse, unplanned pregnancy, hopelessness and suicide among young
- 8 people threaten the physical and psychological well-being of our
- 9 families and nation; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Children need strong and constructive guidance from
- 11 their families and their communities, including schools, youth
- 12 organizations, religious institutions and civic groups; and
- 13 WHEREAS, The character of a nation is only as strong as the
- 14 character of its individual citizens; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The public good is advanced when young people are
- 16 taught that good character counts in personal relationships, in

- 1 school and in the workplace; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Scholars and educators agree that people do not
- 3 automatically develop good character and, therefore,
- 4 conscientious efforts must be made by families and communities
- 5 to help young people develop the essential traits and
- 6 characteristics that comprise good character; and
- WHEREAS, Character development is, first and foremost, an
- 8 obligation of families, and the efforts of religious
- 9 institutions, schools and youth, civic and human service
- 10 organizations also play a very important role in supporting
- 11 family efforts by fostering and promoting good character; and
- 12 WHEREAS, In July 1992 the Aspen Declaration was written by an
- 13 eminent group of educators, youth leaders and ethics scholars
- 14 for the purpose of articulating a coherent framework for
- 15 character education appropriate to a diverse and pluralistic
- 16 society; and
- 17 WHEREAS, The Aspen Declaration states that effective
- 18 character education is based on core ethical values rooted in
- 19 democratic society; and
- 20 WHEREAS, These six core ethical values, trustworthiness,
- 21 respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship,
- 22 transcend cultural, religious and socioeconomic differences; and
- 23 WHEREAS, The Aspen Declaration states that the character and
- 24 conduct of our youth reflect the character and conduct of
- 25 society; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Every adult has the responsibility to promote the
- 27 development of good character; and
- WHEREAS, The House of Representatives encourage all
- 29 Pennsylvanians to model and teach these core ethical values in
- 30 an ongoing commitment to promote character development among the

- 1 youth of our State; and
- 2 WHEREAS, The House of Representatives encourage individuals
- 3 and organizations, especially schools and youth organizations,
- 4 to integrate the six core ethical values into programs serving
- 5 children; therefore be it
- 6 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives designate the
- 7 week of October 18 through 24, 1998, as "Character Counts Week"
- 8 in Pennsylvania.
