AN ACT

1 Providing for reimbursements to municipalities for expenses  
2 incurred in assisting State correctional personnel in  
3 attempting to ensure the safety of residents of areas  
4 surrounding the prison and to recapture escaped prisoners.

5 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania  
6 hereby enacts as follows:

7 Section 1. Short title.

8 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Community  
9 Services Responder Reimbursement Act.

10 Section 2. Legislative findings and declarations.

11 (a) Findings.--The General Assembly finds as follows:

12 (1) From time to time, the Commonwealth experiences  
13 escapes from or other disruptions at its correctional  
14 institutions.

15 (2) Personnel from surrounding communities are required  
16 to provide assistance to State correctional personnel to

1 ensure the safety of residents of surrounding areas and to  
2 assist in the timely recapture of prisoners.

3 (3) Municipalities can no longer realistically afford or  
4 be expected to provide assistance to State correctional  
5 personnel at a financial loss.

6 (b) Declaration.--The General Assembly declares as follows:  
7 It is imperative to establish for our municipalities a mechanism  
8 and process whereby they can be reimbursed financially for  
9 reasonable expenses related to responding to escapes and  
10 attempted escapes, emergency situations and other incidents and  
11 events at State correctional institutions.

#### 12 Section 3. Definitions.

13 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall  
14 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the  
15 context clearly indicates otherwise:

16 "Department." The Department of Corrections of the  
17 Commonwealth.

18 "Municipal emergency services department." A police or fire  
19 department, ambulance service or rescue squad established,  
20 operated and funded by a municipality.

21 "Municipality." A county, city, borough, incorporated town  
22 or township.

23 "State correctional institution." A correctional facility,  
24 jail or prison owned or operated by the Department of  
25 Corrections.

#### 26 Section 4. Commonwealth reimbursement required.

27 In the event a municipal emergency services department  
28 responds to an escape, attempted escape, emergency situation,  
29 incident or other event, at a State correctional institution,  
30 the Commonwealth shall reimburse the municipality for the full

1 cost of personnel, equipment, materials and other costs  
2 associated with the response.

3 Section 5. Reimbursement procedures.

4 (a) Documentation.--Each municipality which has a municipal  
5 services department that responds to an incident or event at a  
6 State correctional institution shall separately document the  
7 personnel, equipment, materials and other costs associated with  
8 the response. The documentation shall be filed with the  
9 department on application forms supplied by the department.

10 (b) Reimbursement.--The department shall reimburse the  
11 municipality within 60 days of receipt of the municipality's  
12 application.

13 (c) Disputed costs.--In the event of a dispute between the  
14 department and a municipality over the amount of reimbursement  
15 applied for by a municipality, the disputed costs shall be  
16 forwarded to the Board of Finance and Revenue for review and  
17 decision. Decisions of the board may be appealed to the  
18 Commonwealth Court.

19 Section 6. Retroactivity.

20 This act shall be retroactive to July 1, 1999.

21 Section 7. Effective date.

22 This act shall take effect immediately.
