HOUSE BILL No. 2489 Session of 2002

INTRODUCED BY FLEAGLE, APRIL 8, 2002

AS AMENDED ON THIRD CONSIDERATION, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, APRIL 30, 2002

AN ACT

To provide from the General Fund for the expenses of the 1 2 Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the 3 Commonwealth, the public debt and for the public schools for the fiscal year July 1, 2002, to June 30, 2003, for certain 4 5 institutions and organizations, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year 7 ending June 30, 2002; to provide appropriations from the 8 State Lottery Fund, the Energy Conservation and Assistance 9 Fund, the Hazardous Material Response Fund, The State Stores Fund, the Milk Marketing Fund, the Home Investment Trust 10 Fund, the Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund, the 11 Tuition Payment Fund, the Banking Department Fund, the 12 13 Firearm Records Check Fund and the Ben Franklin Technology 14 Development Authority Fund to the Executive Department; to provide appropriations from the Judicial Computer System 15 Augmentation Account to the Judicial Department for the 16 17 fiscal year July 1, 2002, to June 30, 2003; to provide appropriations from the Motor License Fund for the fiscal 18 19 year July 1, 2002, to June 30, 2003, for the proper operation 20 of the several departments of the Commonwealth and the 21 Pennsylvania State Police authorized to spend Motor License 22 Fund moneys; to provide for the appropriation of Federal funds to the Executive Department of the Commonwealth and for 23 24 the establishment of restricted receipt accounts for the 25 fiscal year July 1, 2002, to June 30, 2003, and for the payment of bills remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal 26 27 year ending June 30, 2002.

- 16 Section 101. Short title.--This act shall be known and may
- 17 be cited as the General Appropriation Act of 2002.
- 18 Section 102. Definitions. -- The following words and phrases
- 19 when used in this act shall have the meanings given to them in
- 20 this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 21 "Employees." Includes all directors, superintendents, bureau
- 22 or division chiefs, assistant directors, assistant
- 23 superintendents, assistant chiefs, experts, scientists,
- 24 engineers, surveyors, draftsmen, accountants, secretaries,
- 25 auditors, inspectors, examiners, analysts, statisticians,
- 26 marshals, clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, messengers and
- 27 other assistants in any department, board or commission.
- 28 "Expenses" and "maintenance." Includes all printing, binding
- 29 and stationery, food and forage, materials and supplies,
- 30 traveling expenses, training, motor vehicle supplies and

- 1 repairs, freight, express and cartage, postage, telephones and
- 2 telegraph rentals and toll charges, newspaper advertising and
- 3 notices, public advertising by or through any medium, fuel,
- 4 light, heat, power and water, minor construction and renovation,
- 5 repairs or reconstruction of equipment, buildings and
- 6 facilities, rent of real estate and equipment, premiums on
- 7 workers' compensation, insurance premiums on policies of
- 8 liability insurance, insurance premiums on medical payment
- 9 insurance and surety bonds for volunteer workers, premiums on
- 10 employee group life insurance and employee and retired employee
- 11 group hospital and medical insurance, payment of Commonwealth
- 12 share of Social Security taxes and unemployment compensation
- 13 costs for State employees, the purchase of replacement or
- 14 additional equipment and machinery and all other incidental
- 15 costs and expenses, including payment to the Department of
- 16 General Services of mileage and other charges for the use of
- 17 automobiles and rental payments for permanently assigned
- 18 automobiles and of expenses or costs of services incurred
- 19 through the Purchasing Fund. The term "expenses" also shall
- 20 include the medical costs for the treatment of inmates of State
- 21 institutions when the inmate must be transferred to an outside
- 22 hospital: Provided, That in no case shall the State institution
- 23 pay more for patient care than that provided under the State
- 24 medical assistance program.

- 5 of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act,
- 6 necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and
- 7 activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the
- 8 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills
- 9 incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year
- 10 ending June 30, 2002.
- 11 (d) Judicial Computer System Augmentation Account. -- The

- 14 restricted receipt account established within the General Fund,
- 15 known as the Judicial Computer System Augmentation Account, to
- 16 the Judicial Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of
- 17 salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expenses, for
- 18 the payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the
- 19 purchase or rental of goods and services and for the payment of
- 20 any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary
- 21 for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities
- 22 and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year
- 23 beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred
- 24 and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June
- 25 30, 2002.
- 26 (e) Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund. -- The
- 27 following sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may
- 28 be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the
- 29 Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund to the several
- 30 hereinafter named agencies of the Executive Department of the

- 1 Commonwealth for the payment of fees for contractual services
- 2 rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods and services and
- 3 for the payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by
- 4 this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties,
- 5 functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set
- 6 forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, and for the
- 7 payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of
- 8 the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002.
- 9 (f) The State Stores Fund.--The following sums set forth in
- 10 this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby
- 11 specifically appropriated from The State Stores Fund to the
- 12 hereinafter named agency of the Executive Department of the
- 13 Commonwealth for the payment of salaries, wages or other

- 16 contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of
- 17 goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as

- 4 (h) Aviation Restricted Revenue Account. -- The following

- 7 Motor License Fund to the hereinafter named agencies of the
- 8 Executive Department for the purposes set forth herein for the
- 9 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2002, and for the payment of bills
- 10 incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year
- 11 ending June 30, 2002.
- 12 (i) Hazardous Material Response Fund.--The following sums
- 13 set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary,
- 14 are hereby specifically appropriated from the Hazardous Material
- 15 Response Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the
- 16 Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the payment of fees
- 17 for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of
- 18 goods and services and for the payment of any other expenses, as
- 19 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct
- 20 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes
- 21 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
- 22 2002, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid
- 23 at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2002.
- 24 (j) Milk Marketing Fund.--The following sums set forth in

- 2 provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct
- 3 of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes
- 4 hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1,

- 5 Section 1902. Compliance with other law before funds
- 6 available. -- No appropriation made by this act to any department,

- 10 April 9, 1929 (P.L.177, No.175), known as The Administrative
- 11 Code of 1929.
- 12 Section 1903. Contracts prerequisite to encumbering or
- 13 committing funds. -- (A) Funds available to agencies, boards,
- 14 departments, commissions, or other governmental entities under
- 15 this act for the procurement of supplies, services or
- 16 construction shall not be available for payment of, or to be
- 17 committed to or encumbered for payment of, any such procurement
- 18 unless and until the agency, board, department or other

- 12 anticipated procurement needs at the beginning of each fiscal

- 23 of any products of the soil, meats, livestock, timber or other

- 26 (D) THE FUND SHALL RECEIVE AND CONSIST OF THE FOLLOWING:
- 27 (1) THE NET STATE SHARE OF ALL MONEYS RECEIVED FROM DRUG
- 28 REBATE AGREEMENTS WITH PHARMACEUTICAL MANUFACTURERS PURSUANT
- 29 TO TITLE XIX OF THE SOCIAL SECURITY ACT.
- 30 (2) ALL FEDERAL MATCHING FUNDS RECEIVED BY THE

- 9 SECTION 1913. PRISON PRIVATIZATION PROHIBITED. -- COMMONWEALTH

- 17 Section 2001. Effective date. -- This act shall take effect
