A RESOLUTION

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8 9	Directing the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to investigate the Department of General Services strategic sourcing initiative for State and local government procurement; to accurately measure actual savings and costs of strategic sourcing; to review alternative plans examined by the department; to examine the department's development and implementation of strategic sourcing, especially with regard to the impact on Pennsylvania small business; and to analyze procurement spending data.
LO	WHEREAS, The people of this Commonwealth deserve the highest
L1	quality programs to enhance education, protect public health and
L2	safety and foster economic development; and
L3	WHEREAS, State officials have a responsibility to ensure that
L 4	State tax dollars allocated to these programs are being utilized
L5	efficiently; and
L6	WHEREAS, Government procurement practices offer significant
L7	opportunities to reduce costs and improve the efficiency of
L8	government operations; and
L9	WHEREAS, The Senate believes that improving government

procurement can produce significant benefits for Pennsylvania's

- 1 citizens and communities and that more competition, not less, is
- 2 the most effective manner to reduce cost for goods and services;
- 3 and
- 4 WHEREAS, Small businesses employ more than one-half of
- 5 Pennsylvania's work force and account for nearly 80% of all new
- 6 jobs created; and
- 7 WHEREAS, The Commonwealth has a responsibility to create an
- 8 environment in the State where small businesses can grow and
- 9 thrive; and
- 10 WHEREAS, The Department of General Services reported that it
- 11 had incomplete procurement data when it began implementing its
- 12 strategic sourcing initiative and admittedly failed to measure
- 13 the impact of strategic sourcing on Pennsylvania's small
- 14 businesses; and
- 15 WHEREAS, The Senate is concerned that the true impact of both
- 16 the savings and costs of strategic sourcing cannot be fully and
- 17 accurately measured without more complete data; therefore be it
- 18 RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Legislative Budget and
- 19 Finance Committee to investigate the Department of General
- 20 Services strategic sourcing initiative for State and local
- 21 government procurement to analyze procurement spending data to
- 22 accurately measure actual savings and costs of strategic
- 23 sourcing; and be it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Legislative Budget and
- 25 Finance Committee to review all other alternative cost-saving
- 26 methods in addition to strategic sourcing examined by the
- 27 department; and be it further
- 28 RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Legislative Budget and
- 29 Finance Committee to investigate the department's development
- 30 and implementation of strategic sourcing, especially with regard

- 1 to the impact on Pennsylvania small business; and be it further
- 2 RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Legislative Budget and
- 3 Finance Committee to collect data about State procurement prior
- 4 to the State's implementation of strategic sourcing, including,
- 5 but not limited to, determining the number of small businesses
- 6 and women-owned and minority-owned businesses currently serving
- 7 as prime contractors, the dollar value of these contracts and
- 8 the number of these firms serving as subcontractors; and be it
- 9 further
- 10 RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Legislative Budget and
- 11 Finance Committee to collect data about contracts awarded as of
- 12 April 1, 2004, through the new strategic sourcing process,
- 13 including, but not limited to, the number of strategic-sourced
- 14 contracts awarded to small businesses, women-owned and minority-
- 15 owned businesses, the number of subcontracts delivered to small
- 16 businesses and women-owned and minority-owned businesses and the
- 17 dollar amounts delivered to these subcontractors; and be it
- 18 further
- 19 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 20 hold hearings, take testimony and make its investigations at
- 21 such places as it deems necessary in this Commonwealth and have
- 22 the power to administer oaths and affirmations to witnesses
- 23 appearing before it; and be it further
- 24 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee
- 25 issue a report of its findings and recommendations to the Senate
- 26 no later than July 1, 2004.
