12	hereby enacts as follows:
13	Section 1. The act of May 1, 1933 (P.L.216, No.76), known as

- 6 (b Upon completion and distribution of the brochure created
- 7 under subsection (a), all dental offices within this
- 8 Commonwealth shall notify and make available the brochure.
- 9 (c) A form shall be signed by the patient indicating that
- 10 the patient education brochure was made available to the
- 11 patient. The form shall be similar to a sample form designed by
- 12 <u>the Department of Health.</u>
- 13 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
