AN ACT

1 2 3 4	Establishing standards for managing concussions and head injuries to student athletes; assigning duties to the Department of Health and the Department of Education; and imposing penalties.
5	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
6	hereby enacts as follows:
7	Section 1. Short title.
8	This act shall be known and may be cited as the Safety in
9	Youth Sports Act.
10	Section 2. Definitions.
11	The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
12	have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
13	context clearly indicates otherwise:
14	"Athletic activity." All of the following:
15	(1) Interscholastic athletics.
16	(2) An athletic contest or competition, other than
17	interscholastic athletics, that is sponsored by or associated
18	with a school entity, including cheerleading, club-sponsored
19	sports activities and sports activities sponsored by school-

1 affiliated organizations.

2 (3) Noncompetitive cheerleading that is sponsored by or3 associated with a school entity.

4 (4) Practices, interschool practices and scrimmages for
5 all of the activities listed under paragraphs (1), (2) and
6 (3).

7 "Interscholastic athletics." As defined in section 1602-A of 8 the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public 9 School Code of 1949.

10 "School entity." As defined in section 1602-A of the act of 11 March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code 12 of 1949.

13 Section 3. Concussions and head injuries.

14 Educational materials. -- The Department of Health and the (a) 15 Department of Education shall develop and post on their Internet 16 websites guidelines and other relevant materials to inform and educate students participating in or desiring to participate in 17 an athletic activity, their parents and their coaches, about the 18 19 nature and risk of concussion and head injury, including the 20 risks associated with continuing to play or practice after a concussion or head injury. In developing the guidelines and 21 materials, the departments shall utilize existing materials 22 23 developed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. A 24 student participating in or desiring to participate in an 25 athletic activity and the student's parent or guardian shall 26 each school year, prior to participation by the student in an athletic activity, sign and return to the student's school an 27 28 acknowledgment of receipt and review of a concussion and head 29 injury information sheet developed under this subsection. Informational meeting.--A school entity may hold an 30 (b)

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informational meeting prior to the start of each athletic season 1 2 for all ages of competitors regarding concussions and other head 3 injuries, the importance of proper concussion management and how neurocognitive testing can aid in the evaluation, management and 4 recovery process. In addition to students, parents, coaches and 5 other school officials, informational meetings may include 6 7 physicians, neuropsychologists, athletic trainers and physical therapists. 8

(c) Removal from play.--A student who, as determined by a 9 10 licensed or certified health care practitioner whose scope of practice includes the management and evaluation of concussions, 11 12 coach from the student's team, game official or other official 13 designated by the student's school entity, exhibits signs or 14 symptoms of a concussion or head injury while participating in 15 an athletic activity shall be removed by the coach from 16 participation at that time. The student shall not return to participation until the student is evaluated and cleared for 17 return to participation in writing by a licensed or certified 18 19 health care practitioner whose scope of practice includes the 20 management and evaluation of concussions.

(d) Training course.--Once every three years, a coach shall complete a concussion management certification training course offered by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the National Federation of State High School Associations or another provider approved by the Department of Health. A coach shall not coach an athletic activity until the coach completes the training course required under this subsection.

(e) Penalties.--The governing body of a school entity shall
establish the following minimum penalties for a coach found in
violation of the requirements under subsection (c), which

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1 penalties shall take effect two years following the effective 2 date of this section:

3 (1) For a first violation, suspension from coaching any4 athletic activity for the remainder of the season.

5 (2) For a second violation, suspension from coaching any 6 athletic activity for the remainder of the season and for the 7 next season.

8 (3) For a third violation, permanent suspension from
9 coaching any athletic activity.

10 (f) Other youth athletic activities.--The sponsors of youth 11 athletic activities not specifically addressed by this act are 12 encouraged to follow the guidance set forth in this act.

(g) Construction.--Nothing in this act shall be construed to abridge or limit any rights provided under a collective bargaining agreement or any rights provided under the act of July 23, 1970 (P.L.563, No.195), known as the Public Employe Relations Act.

(h) Civil liability.--Nothing in this act shall be construed
to create, establish-or expand, EXPAND, REDUCE, CONTRACT OR
ELIMINATE any civil liability on the part of any school entity
or school employee, including any independent contractor or
employee of an independent contractor.

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23 Section 4. Effective date.

24 This act shall take effect in 60 days.

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
