A RESOLUTION

- 1 Recognizing October 8, 2011, as "Indigenous Peoples Day" in
- 2 Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, The first contacts between Pennsylvania's indigenous
- 4 peoples and Europeans occurred in the 1630s; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Colonial and Iroquois cultures intersected in early
- 6 American history as our founding fathers interacted with
- 7 indigenous leaders and acknowledged certain indigenous
- 8 principles; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Indigenous government under the Great Law of Peace
- 10 of the Iroquois Confederacy influenced our developing system of
- 11 government, including the drafting and adoption of the
- 12 Constitution of the United States and other foundational
- 13 documents; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Indigenous peoples named many North American animals
- 15 and plants and thousands of other place names throughout our
- 16 Commonwealth; and

- 1 WHEREAS, More than 4,000 indigenous people currently live in
- 2 the City of Philadelphia, an area known to early Lenape settlers
- 3 as Coaquonnock, "the land of tall pines"; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Manayunk, Wissahickon and Passyunk and other place
- 5 names in greater Philadelphia reflect indigenous origin; and
- 6 WHEREAS, "Indigenous Peoples Day" notes the influences of
- 7 indigenous culture throughout our history; and
- 8 WHEREAS, "Indigenous Peoples Day" commemorates the
- 9 contributions and resilience of indigenous communities and
- 10 celebrates preservation of their unique cultural heritage and
- 11 ethnic identities; therefore be it
- 12 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize October
- 13 8, 2011, as "Indigenous Peoples Day" in Pennsylvania.
