## AN ACT

- 1 Providing for Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices 2 recommendations for influenza vaccination in children.
- 3 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 4 hereby enacts as follows:
- 5 Section 1. Short title.
- 6 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Immunization
- 7 Practices Act.
- 8 Section 2. Recommendations for influenza vaccination in
- 9 children.
- 10 (a) Duties.--In order to improve the Commonwealth's
- 11 childhood immunization rates for influenza and comply with the
- 12 recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization
- 13 Practices of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for
- 14 influenza vaccination, the Department of Health shall do all of
- 15 the following:
- 16 (1) Review and enhance current immunization activities
- to focus on vaccination of all children ages six months to 18

- 1 years of age who are recommended for an influenza vaccination 2 by the Advisory Committee for Immunization Practices.
- 3 Increase immunization awareness about injectable and needle-free delivery methods by publishing on the 4 5 department's Internet website information about the benefits 6 of annual immunization against influenza for all children 7 recommended by the Advisory Committee for Immunization 8 Practices.
- (3) Work with appropriate State agencies and licensed child-care facilities to ensure that the information on the benefits of annual immunization against influenza for children ages six months to 18 years of age is annually 13 distributed to parents in August before influenza season begins.
  - Work with health care professionals and public (4)health organizations to develop plans for expanding outreach and opportunities to achieve the Advisory Committee for Immunization Practices recommended target vaccination of all children aged six months to 18 years of age.
- 20 Examine the use of schools and alternative venues to 21 administer influenza vaccine to children in a timely manner.
- 22 (b) Programs. -- The department may offer school-based
- 23 influenza vaccine programs. To the extent that influenza
- 24 vaccinations are available, the department shall offer both
- 25 injectable and needle-free delivery methods.
- 26 (c) Report. -- The department shall annually, on or before May
- 27 1, submit a written report on all school-based vaccination
- 28 programs administered or funded by the department. Its findings
- 29 and recommendations shall be submitted to the chairman and
- 30 minority chairman of the Public Health and Welfare Committee of

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- 1 the Senate and the chairman and minority chairman of the Health
- 2 Committee and the Children and Youth Committee of the House of
- 3 Representatives. The report shall include an assessment of all
- 4 of the following:
- 5 (1) the benefits of establishing school-based influenza
- 6 vaccination programs for the purpose of achieving the
- 7 Advisory Committee for Immunization Practices recommendation
- 8 for annual influenza vaccination of all children aged six
- 9 months to 18 years of age;
- 10 (2) the rate of participation for students offered both
- shots and needle-free vaccine delivery methods;
- 12 (3) the school and community influenza infection rates
- following the school-based influenza vaccination program;
- 14 (4) the school-based influenza vaccination program's
- impact on student absenteeism rates; and
- 16 (5) the cost of establishing school-based vaccination
- 17 programs for influenza vaccination across this Commonwealth.
- 18 Section 3. Effective date.
- 19 This act shall take effect in 60 days.
