7	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
8	hereby enacts as follows:
9	Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
10	as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding an
11	article to read:
12	ARTICLE XVII C <
13	DYSLEXIA SCREENING PILOT PROGRAM
14	Section 1701 C. Short title of article.
15	This article shall be known and may be cited as the Dyslexia
16	<u>Screening Pilot Program Law.</u>
17	<u>Section 1702 C. Definitions.</u>
18	The following words and phrases when used in this article

1	shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
2	context clearly indicates otherwise:
3	"Department." The Department of Education of the
4	Commonwealth.
5	"Dyslexia." A specific learning disorder that is
6	neurological in origin and that is characterized by unexpected
7	difficulties with accurate or fluent word recognition and by
8	poor spelling and decoding abilities not consistent with the
9	person's intelligence, motivation and sensory capabilities,
10	which difficulties typically result from a deficit in the
11	phonological component of language.
12	"Pilot program." The Dyslexia Screening Pilot Program
13	established under this article.
14	"Secretary." The Secretary of Education of the Commonwealth.
15	<u>Section 1703 C. Establishment.</u>
16	(a) Pilot program. The department shall establish a
17	Dyslexia Screening Pilot Program to provide evidence based early
18	screening and evidence based intervention services for children
19	with risk factors for dyslexia, such as low phonemic awareness.
20	(b) School districts. The department shall select at least
21	three school districts to participate in the pilot program. To
22	be considered for the pilot program, a school district shall
23	submit a proposal to the department that identifies an evidence
24	based method of screening children for low phonemic awareness
25	and other evidence-based risk factors for dyslexia, provides for
26	the enrollment of children identified as having evidence based
27	risk factors for dyslexia in a reading program staffed by
28	teachers trained in evidence based intervention programs, for
29	example, multisensory structured language programs, and includes
30	<u>a methodology for evaluating the effects of the reading program</u>

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1	on the children's identified risk factors.
2	(c) Program operation. The pilot program shall operate for
3	three full school years, beginning with the school year that
4	begins at least six months after the effective date of this
5	article.
6	(d) Evaluation. The goal of the pilot program shall be to
7	evaluate the effectiveness of evidence based early reading
8	assistance programs for children with risk factors for dyslexia
9	and to evaluate whether those programs can reduce future special
10	<u>education costs.</u>
11	Section 1704-C. Departmental responsibilities.
12	(a) Funds. The department shall apply for Federal, private
13	and other non-State funds and shall use available State funds
14	appropriated by the General Assembly for the pilot program.
15	(b) ConsultationThe department shall consult with the
16	International Dyslexia Association, or any other nationally
17	recognized organization that specializes in and has expertise in
18	the scientific basis of dyslexia and its treatments, in
19	establishing and operating the pilot program.
20	(c) ReportNot later than December 31 of the third school-
21	year in which the pilot program is operating, the secretary
22	shall submit a report to the General Assembly containing the
23	secretary's evaluation of the pilot program and legislative
24	recommendations whether to continue, expand or make changes to
25	the pilot program.
26	(d) Guidelines and procedures The department shall
27	establish guidelines and procedures for the pilot program not
28	later than three months after the effective date of this
29	article.
30	Section 1705-C. School district responsibilities.

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1	(a) Responsibilities. Under the pilot program, each
2	participating school district, through early childhood reading
3	instruction and reading assistance programs, shall screen
4	<u>children upon school entry in kindergarten through second grade</u>
5	for indications of dyslexia, provide appropriate evidence based
6	reading intervention services for those children suspected of
7	having dyslexia and administer assessments, approved by the
8	department, to ascertain whether the intervention services
9	improve those students' reading and learning.
10	(b) Notification. When a child is suspected of having
11	dyslexia, the participating school district shall notify the
12	child's parent or guardian that the child, as part of the pilot
13	program, is eligible to receive reading intervention services to
14	measure the effectiveness of early reading assistance programs.
15	The participating school district shall require the parent or
16	guardian to indicate in writing that the parent or guardian
17	voluntarily and knowingly consents to the child's participation
18	in the pilot program. Each participating school district shall
19	provide to the parents of children suspected of having dyslexia
20	information about dyslexia and recommended evidence based
21	treatments.
22	(c) ReportEach participating school district shall
23	annually report to the department data and information about the
24	operation of the pilot program, in the manner prescribed by the
25	<u>department.</u>
26	ARTICLE XVII-C <
27	DYSLEXIA AND EARLY LITERACY INTERVENTION PILOT PROGRAM
28	SECTION 1701-C. SHORT TITLE OF ARTICLE.
29	THIS ARTICLE SHALL BE KNOWN AND MAY BE CITED AS THE DYSLEXIA
30	AND EARLY LITERACY INTERVENTION PILOT PROGRAM LAW.

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1 <u>SECTION 1702-C.</u> DEFINITIONS.

2	THE FOLLOWING WORDS AND PHRASES WHEN USED IN THIS ARTICLE
3	SHALL HAVE THE MEANINGS GIVEN TO THEM IN THIS SECTION UNLESS THE
4	CONTEXT CLEARLY INDICATES OTHERWISE:
5	"DEPARTMENT." THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION OF THE
6	COMMONWEALTH.
7	"DYSLEXIA." A CONDITION THAT IS CHARACTERIZED BY DIFFICULTY
8	WITH ACCURATE OR FLUENT WORD RECOGNITION AND BY POOR SPELLING
9	AND DECODING ABILITIES, WHICH CHARACTERISTICS TYPICALLY RESULT
10	FROM A DEFICIT IN ONE OR MORE PROCESSES RELATED TO THE
11	PHONOLOGICAL COMPONENT OF LANGUAGE, THAT IS OFTEN UNEXPECTED IN
12	RELATION TO OTHER COGNITIVE ABILITIES AND THE PROVISION OF
13	EFFECTIVE CLASSROOM INSTRUCTION AND THAT MAY RESULT IN PROBLEMS
14	IN READING COMPREHENSION AND REDUCED READING EXPERIENCE THAT MAY
15	IMPEDE THE GROWTH OF VOCABULARY AND BACKGROUND KNOWLEDGE. THE
16	TERM SHALL APPLY ONLY FOR PURPOSES OF THE PILOT PROGRAM.
17	"INTENSIVE INTERVENTION." EXPLICIT, MULTISENSORY, SYNTHETIC
18	PHONICS INSTRUCTION AND A STRUCTURED LANGUAGE PROGRAM DELIVERED
19	WITH FIDELITY BY A TRAINED INTERVENTIONIST. THE TERM SHALL APPLY
20	ONLY FOR PURPOSES OF THE PILOT PROGRAM.
21	"PILOT PROGRAM." THE DYSLEXIA AND EARLY LITERACY
22	INTERVENTION PILOT PROGRAM ESTABLISHED UNDER THIS ARTICLE.
23	SECTION 1703-C. ESTABLISHMENT.
24	(A) PILOT PROGRAMTHE DEPARTMENT SHALL ESTABLISH A
25	DYSLEXIA AND EARLY LITERACY INTERVENTION PILOT PROGRAM TO
26	PROVIDE EVIDENCE-BASED EARLY SCREENING AND MULTITIER SUPPORT
27	SYSTEMS, USING EVIDENCE-BASED INTERVENTION SERVICES FOR STUDENTS
28	WITH POTENTIAL RISK FACTORS FOR EARLY READING DEFICIENCIES AND
29	DYSLEXIA, SUCH AS LOW PHONEMIC AWARENESS, LOW LETTER AND SYMBOL
30	NAMING AND INABILITY TO REMEMBER SEQUENCES.

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1	(B) PROGRAM OPERATIONTHE PILOT PROGRAM SHALL OPERATE FOR
2	THREE FULL SCHOOL YEARS, BEGINNING WITH THE SCHOOL YEAR THAT
3	BEGINS AT LEAST SIX MONTHS AFTER THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS
4	ARTICLE.
5	(C) ELIGIBILITYTHE DEPARTMENT SHALL SELECT AT LEAST THREE
6	SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO PARTICIPATE IN THE PILOT PROGRAM. TO BE
7	ELIGIBLE FOR THE PILOT PROGRAM:
8	(1) A SCHOOL DISTRICT MUST ENROLL 3,000 TO 15,000
9	STUDENTS AND PROVIDE FULL-DAY KINDERGARTEN.
10	(2) THREE MONTHS AFTER THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS
11	SECTION, THE SCHOOL DISTRICT MUST SUBMIT A PROPOSAL TO THE
12	DEPARTMENT THAT IDENTIFIES HOW IT WILL MEET THE GUIDELINES OF
13	THE PILOT PROGRAM'S:
14	(I) EVIDENCE-BASED CORE READING PROGRAM;
15	(II) EVIDENCE-BASED METHOD OF SCREENING ALL
16	KINDERGARTEN STUDENTS;
17	(III) EVIDENCE-BASED INTERVENTION PROGRAMS; AND
18	(IV) A METHODOLOGY FOR EVALUATING THE EFFECTS OF THE
19	PROGRAM ON THE STUDENTS' IDENTIFIED RISK FACTORS.
20	SECTION 1704-C. DEPARTMENT RESPONSIBILITIES.
21	(A) FUNDSTHE DEPARTMENT SHALL APPLY FOR FEDERAL, PRIVATE
22	AND OTHER NON-STATE FUNDS AND SHALL USE AVAILABLE STATE FUNDS
23	APPROPRIATED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FOR THE PILOT PROGRAM.
24	(B) CONSULTATION THE DEPARTMENT SHALL CONSULT WITH THE
25	INTERNATIONAL DYSLEXIA ASSOCIATION, OR ANY OTHER RECOGNIZED
26	ORGANIZATION THAT SPECIALIZES IN AND HAS EXPERTISE WITH THE
27	SCIENTIFIC BASIS OF DYSLEXIA AND ITS INTERVENTION, IN
28	ESTABLISHING, OPERATING AND EVALUATING THE PILOT PROGRAM.
29	(C) GUIDELINES AND PROCEDURES NO LATER THAN THREE MONTHS
30	AFTER THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ARTICLE, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL
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ESTABLISH GUIDELINES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE PILOT PROGRAM THAT 1 2 SHALL INCLUDE: 3 (1) EVIDENCE-BASED CORE READING PROGRAMS THAT INCORPORATE SYSTEMATIC PHONEMIC INSTRUCTION AND DEVELOP BASIC 4 5 READING SKILLS FOR ALL STUDENTS IN THE PILOT PROGRAM TO USE. 6 (2) AN EVIDENCE-BASED SCREENING FOR LOW PHONEMIC 7 AWARENESS AND OTHER EVIDENCE-BASED RISK FACTORS FOR EARLY 8 READING DEFICIENCIES AND DYSLEXIA. THE SCREENING SHALL BE 9 GIVEN TO ALL KINDERGARTEN STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE SCHOOL DISTRICT THREE TIMES PER SCHOOL YEAR. THE FIRST SCREENING 10 SHALL BE AT THE BEGINNING OF THE SCHOOL YEAR, THE SECOND 11 SCREENING DURING THE MIDDLE OF THE SCHOOL YEAR AND THE THIRD 12 13 SCREENING IN THE FINAL OUARTER OF THE SCHOOL YEAR. (3) INTERVENTION MEASURES, INCLUDING MULTISENSORY 14 STRUCTURED LANGUAGE PROGRAMS FOR STUDENTS SCORING BELOW THE 15 16 BENCHMARK THAT PROVIDE TIMELY TARGETED INSTRUCTION AND STRATEGIC RETEACHING AND INTENSIVE INTERVENTION IN IDENTIFIED 17 18 AREAS. (4) DIAGNOSTIC ASSESSMENTS FOR STUDENTS SCORING BELOW 19 THE BENCHMARK THAT ARE NATIONALLY STANDARDIZED, NORM-20 REFERENCED SCREENING ASSESSMENTS OF PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS, 21 22 ALPHABETIC KNOWLEDGE, CONCEPT OF WORD AND GRAPHEME PHONEME 23 CORRESPONDENCE. THE SCREENING SHALL BE DEMONSTRATED TO HAVE 24 PREDICTIVE VALIDITY AND CLASSIFICATION ACCURACY. 25 SECTION 1705-C. SCHOOL DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES. 26 (A) NOTIFICATION. --27 (1) WHEN A STUDENT IS SUSPECTED OF HAVING AN EARLY 28 READING DEFICIENCY OR DYSLEXIA, THE PARTICIPATING SCHOOL 29 DISTRICT SHALL NOTIFY THE STUDENT'S PARENT OR GUARDIAN THAT

30 THE STUDENT, AS PART OF THE PILOT PROGRAM, IS ELIGIBLE TO

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1	RECEIVE READING INTERVENTION SERVICES TO MEASURE THE
2	EFFECTIVENESS OF EARLY READING ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS. THE
3	PARTICIPATING SCHOOL DISTRICT SHALL REQUIRE THE PARENT OR
4	GUARDIAN TO INDICATE IN WRITING THAT THE PARENT OR GUARDIAN
5	VOLUNTARILY AND KNOWINGLY CONSENTS TO THE STUDENT'S CONTINUED
6	PARTICIPATION IN THE PILOT PROGRAM. EACH PARTICIPATING SCHOOL
7	DISTRICT SHALL PROVIDE TO THE PARENT OR GUARDIAN OF THE
8	STUDENT SUSPECTED OF HAVING AN EARLY READING DEFICIENCY OR
9	DYSLEXIA, INFORMATION ABOUT EARLY READING DEFICIENCIES AND
10	DYSLEXIA AND RECOMMENDED EVIDENCE-BASED RESOURCES AND
11	INTERVENTIONS.
12	(2) PARTICIPATION IN THE PILOT PROGRAM, SCREENING OR
13	INTERVENTION ASSISTANCE DOES NOT PRECLUDE A PARENT OR
14	GUARDIAN FROM REQUESTING AN EVALUATION FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION
15	AT ANY TIME, INCLUDING PRIOR TO OR DURING THE COURSE OF EARLY
16	INTERVENTION ASSISTANCE.
17	(B) EVALUATION
18	(1) EACH PARTICIPATING SCHOOL DISTRICT SHALL ANNUALLY
19	REPORT TO THE DEPARTMENT DATA AND INFORMATION ABOUT THE
20	OPERATION OF THE PILOT PROGRAM, IN THE MANNER PRESCRIBED BY
21	THE DEPARTMENT.
22	(2) THE DEPARTMENT SHALL CONTRACT WITH A NATIONALLY
23	RECOGNIZED EDUCATIONAL EVALUATION INSTITUTION OR ORGANIZATION
24	TO PROVIDE AN EVALUATION OF THE PILOT PROGRAM TO REVIEW THE
25	EFFECTIVENESS OF EVIDENCE-BASED EARLY READING ASSISTANCE
26	PROGRAMS FOR STUDENTS WITH RISK FACTORS FOR EARLY READING
27	DEFICIENCIES AND DYSLEXIA AND TO DETERMINE IF THE PROGRAMS
28	REDUCE SPECIAL EDUCATION COSTS. THE EVALUATION SHALL BE
29	PUBLISHED ON THE DEPARTMENT'S PUBLICLY ACCESSIBLE INTERNET
30	WEBSITE.

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
