A RESOLUTION

Directing the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to study 1 2 and to issue a report on the status of and any disparities found in dental care for Pennsylvanians with disabilities. 3 WHEREAS, Dental care is vitally important for each of us, 4 5 affecting overall health, employability and social inclusion; 6 and 7 WHEREAS, Many individuals, including the unemployed, those of 8 low income, the uninsured and the elderly, have great difficulty 9 finding and seeing a dentist and paying for dental care, and 10 those who have disabilities have greater difficulties still because of the very nature of dental offices, many of which are 11 12 not accessible to people with physical disabilities; and 13 WHEREAS, Beyond structural inaccessibility, many individuals 14 with disabilities are insured through Medicaid and there is a 15 chronic and serious shortage of dentists and dental care professionals available to Medicaid patients; and 16 17 WHEREAS, Dental patients with disabilities may present to the

dental health professional other challenges that the dentist is
unwilling or unskilled to undertake, including positive
behavioral supports, the need for anesthesia and the concomitant
need for specialized anesthesia application; and

5 WHEREAS, Lack of dental care is a recognized indicator of 6 greater likelihood of chronic illnesses and poor health 7 outcomes; and

8 WHEREAS, Dental care and preventive dental health are far 9 less expensive to deliver than is care resulting from the lack 10 of oral health care and the chronic and serious conditions that 11 are left untreated; and

12 WHEREAS, The breadth and depth of the problem of lack of 13 access to dental care must be fully understood before systemic 14 changes are made in the way health care professionals are 15 recruited and incentivized to serve persons with disabilities 16 and other underserved communities; therefore be it

17 RESOLVED, That the Senate direct the Legislative Budget and 18 Finance Committee to conduct a study of the disparities that 19 exist in accessing and receiving dental care among persons with 20 disabilities in this Commonwealth and to issue a report; and be 21 it further

RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee 22 23 determine the need for and availability of dental providers for 24 children and adults 21 years of age and older with disabilities, 25 county by county, throughout the State; and be it further 26 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee examine availability of dental services for children and adults 27 28 with disabilities in community-based care and specialized care, 29 including the availability of accessible offices and equipment, 30 the opportunity for dentists to perform deep sedation and

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1 anesthesia, conscious sedation and nitrous oxide for individuals 2 with disabilities, which services accept Medicaid and which 3 counties need additional dental care and specialty support; and 4 be it further

5 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee study its findings and make recommendations as to what will 6 7 preserve the quality dental services already in place and what 8 mechanisms, including the feasibility of increasing Medicaid dental care payments; liberalizing and modifying dental loan 9 repayment programs for service in underserved areas and for this 10 underserved population; requiring private insurers to pay for 11 <---12 anesthesia services for dental patients who are persons with 13 disabilities who need such service; and work force initiatives 14 to responsibly expand the scopes of practice of carefully 15 supervised dental public health hygienists PUBLIC HEALTH DENTAL <--HYGIENE PRACTITIONERS will incentivize more dental practitioners 16 17 to open their practices to persons with disabilities; and be it 18 further

19 RESOLVED, That the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee 20 compile a report based on its findings and recommendations and 21 submit the report to the Senate as soon as possible, but not 22 later than November 30, 2014.

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
