A RESOLUTION

- Expressing the sense of the Senate in regard to the regulatory review of the State Board of Education final-form regulation #006-326, amending 22 Pa. Code Chapter 4.
- 4 WHEREAS, The amendment of the Chapter 4 regulations, as
- 5 contained in the State Board of Education final-form regulation
- 6 #006-326, amending 22 Pa. Code Ch. 4 (relating to academic
- 7 standards and assessment), changes the utilization of the
- 8 standardized Keystone Exams from calculating a percentage of a
- 9 student's final grade for a course to a high-stakes requirement
- 10 for the student's graduation where the student must pass certain
- 11 Keystone Exams to graduate; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The final-form regulations also require that
- 13 supplemental instruction be offered to students who do not
- 14 demonstrate proficiency on a Keystone Exam or a local assessment
- 15 exam; and
- 16 WHEREAS, Over the past seven months, the Department of
- 17 Education has refused to release the scores of the recent

- 1 administration of the current Keystone Exams, despite repeated
- 2 requests from State legislators; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Disclosure of nonidentifiable student scores for the
- 4 current Keystone Exams would provide guidance to school
- 5 districts on the total projected number of students who would
- 6 require supplemental instruction to demonstrate proficiency on
- 7 the Keystone Exams; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The final-form regulation's continued requirement
- 9 for supplemental instruction will result in significant
- 10 additional costs for school districts to assist students in
- 11 achieving proficiency in the State academic standards; and
- 12 WHEREAS, The State Board of Education in its final-form
- 13 regulation contends that the changes proposed in the regulations
- 14 in regard to supplemental instruction and the administration of
- 15 the Keystone Exams will not incur additional costs to school
- 16 districts; and
- WHEREAS, Since school year 2010-2011, total classroom funding
- 18 for public education in this Commonwealth has been slashed by
- 19 more than \$2.6 billion over the three preceding school years
- 20 during the current administration, an average annual reduction
- 21 of 10.66% over those school years; and
- 22 WHEREAS, School districts in response to these annual
- 23 reductions in total classroom funding have implemented drastic
- 24 cost-cutting measures and other reductions in expenses,
- 25 including reducing or discontinuing summer school and after-
- 26 school tutoring, and in some instances furloughing instructional
- 27 personnel; and
- 28 WHEREAS, The financial constraints necessitated by the
- 29 reductions in total classroom funding imposed during this
- 30 administration significantly reduce the ability of school

- 1 districts to provide necessary and mandatory supplemental
- 2 instruction to students who may require such assistance; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Students who do not receive the necessary
- 4 supplemental instruction to enable those students to demonstrate
- 5 proficiency on the Keystone Exams will not graduate unless they
- 6 complete an alternative project-based assessment or if they
- 7 cannot complete the project-based assessment, they are included
- 8 under a graduation waiver granted by a chief school
- 9 administrator; therefore be it
- 10 RESOLVED, That for all of the above reasons, it is the sense
- 11 of the Senate that the changes contained in the final-form
- 12 regulation #006-326, as proposed by the State Board of Education
- 13 regarding the use of Keystone Exams as a graduation requirement
- 14 and the continued requirement for supplemental instruction are
- 15 not in the public interest, especially for students and
- 16 taxpayers in this Commonwealth; and be it further
- 17 RESOLVED, That the Senate strongly urge the Independent
- 18 Regulatory Review Commission to disapprove the State Board of
- 19 Education final-form regulation #006-326, amending 22 Pa. Code
- 20 Chapter 4.
