1 2 3 4 5	Amending Title 51 (Military Affairs) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for the delivery of services and programs to veterans with cognitive mental disability and emotional trauma; and establishing the Office of Veterans' Mental Health Awareness.
6	The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
7	hereby enacts as follows:
8	Section 1. Title 51 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated
9	Statutes is amended by adding a chapter to read:

3	<u>§ 8401. Scope of chapter.</u>
4	This chapter relates to veterans' mental health awareness.
5	<u>§ 8402. Definitions.</u>
6	The following words and phrases when used in this chapter
7	shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
8	context clearly indicates otherwise:
9	"Health care provider." A person who helps in identifying,
10	preventing or treating illness and disability.
11	"Mental illness" or "disability." Any of the following:
12	(1) A physical or mental impairment that substantially
13	limits one or more of the major life activities of the
14	individual.
15	(2) A record of the type of impairment described in
16	paragraph (1).
17	(3) Being regarded as having the type of impairment
18	described in paragraph (1).
19	"Sexual and personal trauma." An event of human design that
20	threatens or inflicts harm.
21	"Trauma." Any lingering physical, emotional or psychological
22	symptom, including rape, physical assault, domestic battery and
23	stalking.
24	"Traumatic brain injury." A blow or jolt to the head or a
25	penetrating head injury that disrupts the function of the brain.
26	"Veterans health care partnership." An agreement between the
27	United States Department of Veterans Affairs and a health care
28	provider to assist in identifying veterans who need care due to
29	cognitive or sexual and personal trauma.
30	§ 8403. Declaration of policy.

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1 The following are declared as the legislative policies

2 <u>underlying this chapter:</u>

3	(1) Veterans and their beneficiaries should have access
4	to the full range of support services and programs, including
5	equal access to all support services and awareness programs
6	providing information to veterans and health care providers
7	regarding veterans' mental disabilities, mental illness,
8	sexual and personal trauma and available health care
9	providers. Information and services regarding veterans'
10	mental health issues shall include the full range of
11	instructional guides, but not be limited to signs, symptoms,
12	risk factors and benefits of early detection through
13	appropriate diagnostic testing and treatment options.
14	(2) Veterans and their beneficiaries have traditionally
15	been underserved. They have often been denied access to
16	individualized and specialized services available to them
17	because of misdiagnosis or symptoms that manifest later in a
18	veteran's life, such as services necessary to their health,
19	well-being, independence and advancement.
20	(3) Support services and awareness programs provided by
21	the Commonwealth to veterans and their families should be
22	provided in a manner that promotes independent living,
23	continued care with partnered health care providers and
24	assists in maintaining employment and support services for
25	people in their homes and communities.
26	(4) A department office is needed to advise and assist
27	the department and health care providers in developing
28	support services and programs for veterans and their families
29	<u>with trauma or disability.</u>
30	<u>§ 8404. Establishment.</u>

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1	<u>The Office of Veterans' Mental Health Awareness is</u>
2	established within the Department of Military and Veterans
3	<u>Affairs.</u>
4	<u>§ 8405. Powers and duties of office.</u>
5	The Office of Veterans' Mental Health Awareness shall have
6	the power and its duty shall be to:
7	(1) Conduct departmental policy analysis on specific
8	issues related to veterans' mental health and awareness.
9	(2) Act as a liaison to expand the availability of
10	programs and access to partnered health care providers.
11	(3) Develop policies to expand and improve outreach
12	services to all veterans and families in urban and rural
13	populations.
14	(4) Perform internal department staff training and,
15	whenever possible, the training of health care professionals
16	to ensure early identification and management of veteran
17	stress-related disorders, including combat-related disorders.
18	(5) Assist health care providers that are partnered with
19	the United States Department of Veterans Affairs on
20	educational training related to mental health and sexual and
21	<u>personal trauma of veterans.</u>
22	(6) Identify, in conjunction with the United States
23	Department of Veterans Affairs, and disseminate a
24	comprehensive disability examination which has a combat
25	veteran focus that may be adopted and utilized by health care
26	providers and identify unnecessary duplication of services
27	and future service needs.
28	(7) Serve as a clearinghouse for information regarding
29	veterans' mental health data, strategies and programs that
30	address veterans' health issues, including mental health,

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1	sexual and personal trauma, traumatic brain injury,
2	posttraumatic stress disorder and support services for family
3	members. The office shall also identify issues that impact
4	veterans' mental health, including substance abuse, domestic
5	violence, withdrawal from society and violence to oneself.
6	(8) Assist veterans who have trauma or disabilities and
7	their families to have access to adequate and coordinated
8	guality support services and programs.
9	(9) Develop policy initiatives to stimulate the support
10	services and programs that veterans with disabilities or
11	trauma and their families may utilize.
12	(10) Provide public service announcements and
13	advertisements regarding the symptoms and detection of
14	<u>veterans' disabilities.</u>
15	(11) Provide the necessary information described in this
16	section for distribution as the office deems appropriate and
17	provide health care providers, to the greatest extent
18	possible, the same information.
19	(12) Determine whether to require health care providers
20	to make medical information materials available to patients
21	<u>as appropriate.</u>
22	(13) Coordinate pilot projects and planning projects
23	that are related to veterans' health awareness and an
24	efficient delivery system for veterans' health care in this
25	Commonwealth.
26	(14) Provide technical assistance to counties, other
27	public entities and private entities seeking to obtain funds
28	for initiatives in veterans' health care, including
29	identification of sources of funding and assistance.
30	(15) Identify gaps in trauma services, programs and

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1	funding shortages and report the findings to the Governor and
2	the General Assembly.
3	<u>§ 8406. Partnerships.</u>
4	The department shall:
5	(1) Consult with appropriate health care professionals
6	and providers, veterans' service organizations and the State
7	<u>Veterans' Commission.</u>
8	(2) Provide information pertaining to existing
9	partnerships between health care providers and the Department
10	of Veterans' Affairs relating to veterans' mental health
11	awareness and health care.
12	(3) Encourage innovative programs and partnerships by
13	public and private entities that address veterans' mental
14	health awareness and health care.
15	(4) To the greatest extent possible, along with the
16	United States Department of Veterans Affairs, encourage and
17	develop partnerships with health care providers.
18	<u>§ 8407. Funding.</u>
19	The appropriation for administration of this chapter shall be
20	by a separate line item in the General Appropriation Act.
21	Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.

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
