## A RESOLUTION

1 2	Honoring the 224th birthday of the United States Constitutional Bill of Rights on December 15, 2015.
3	WHEREAS, The first ten amendments to the Constitution of the
4	United States are collectively known as the Bill of Rights; and
5	WHEREAS, The Bill of Rights became effective as amendments to
6	the Constitution of the United States on December 15, 1791; and
7	WHEREAS, The Bill of Rights protects the rights of people and
8	limits the powers of government; and
9	WHEREAS, The Bill of Rights reads as follows:
10	1. Congress shall make no law respecting an
11	establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise
12	thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press;
13	or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to

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petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the
 security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and
 bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

5 3. No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in 6 any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of 7 war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

8 4. The right of the people to be secure in their 9 persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable 10 searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants 11 shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or 12 affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be 13 searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

14 5. No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or 15 otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or 16 indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the 17 land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual 18 service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person 19 be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy 20 of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case 21 to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, 22 liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall 23 private property be taken for public use, without just 24 compensation.

6. In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses

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against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining
 witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel
 for his defense.

7. In Suits at common law, where the value in
controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial
by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury,
shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United
States, than according to the rules of the common law.

9 8. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive
10 fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

9. The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain
 rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others
 retained by the people.

14 10. The powers not delegated to the United States by the 15 Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are 16 reserved to the States respectively, or to the people; 17 and

18 WHEREAS, It is appropriate to honor the freedoms provided to 19 the people by the Bill of Rights; therefore be it 20 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives honor and 21 recognize the 224th birthday of the United States Constitutional 22 Bill of Rights on December 15, 2015.

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
