A RESOLUTION

1 2 3 4	Directing the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to study the financial and administrative effectiveness of the statutory provisions requiring autism spectrum disorders insurance coverage.
5	WHEREAS, Autism spectrum disorders are complex
6	neurobehavioral disorders that develop in early childhood and
7	include impairments in social interaction, developmental
8	language and communication skills and rigid, repetitive
9	behaviors; and
10	WHEREAS, Although there is no cure for autism spectrum
11	disorders, early diagnosis and appropriate support as a child
12	can lead to an improved adult outcome; and
13	WHEREAS, Nationally, about 1 in 88 American children are
14	living with autism spectrum disorders; and
15	WHEREAS, Statewide, approximately 55,000 Pennsylvanians are
16	living with autism spectrum disorders; and
17	WHEREAS, The number of adults living with autism spectrum

1 disorders is expected to increase dramatically over the next few 2 years as adolescents age into adulthood; and

3 WHEREAS, Autism spectrum disorders have become an urgent 4 public health concern that is more common than previously 5 thought; therefore be it

6 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the 7 Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to conduct a 8 comprehensive study of the act of July 9, 2008 (P.L.885, No.62), 9 providing for autism spectrum disorders insurance coverage, to 10 determine how the duties set forth in the act are being 11 implemented; and be it further 12 RESOLVED, That the committee report its findings and

13 recommendations to the House of Representatives no later than 14 November 30, 2016.
