## A RESOLUTION

- Directing the Joint State Government Commission, in consultation 1 with the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, to conduct a 2 comprehensive study on the potential of fantasy sports as a 3 gambling product in this Commonwealth and to make a report of 5 its findings and recommendations. 6 WHEREAS, The Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act of 2006 (UIGEA) (Public Law 109-347, 31 U.S.C. § 5361 et seq.) is a 7 8 Federal law that regulates online gambling, specifically prohibiting wagers and bets made on the Internet through wire
- promibiting mayorb and beeb made on the internet through wire
- 10 and other fund transfers that are not expressly provided under
- 11 any other Federal or state law; and
- 12 WHEREAS, While UIGEA does not change or authorize the
- 13 legality of any specific gambling activity permitted or
- 14 prohibited under other Federal or state laws, it does provide
- 15 specific exemptions to its financial transaction prohibitions,
- 16 including an exemption relating to fantasy sports contests that
- 17 meet certain criteria; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The exemption of certain fantasy sports contests
- 19 under UIGEA's definition of bet or wager relating to Internet

- 1 financial transactions has opened the door to varying
- 2 interpretations of the legality of daily fantasy sports and a
- 3 misconception that fantasy sports are legally authorized by
- 4 UIGEA; and
- 5 WHEREAS, This misconception has led to the proliferation of
- 6 fantasy sports contests, primarily daily fantasy sports contests
- 7 played through Internet websites across the country; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The Fantasy Sports Trade Association estimates that
- 9 57 million people play fantasy sports and bet an average of \$465
- 10 a year on fantasy sports contests in the United States; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Since UIGEA did not specifically legalize fantasy
- 12 sports as a gambling activity under Federal law, the legality
- 13 and regulation of fantasy sports, primarily daily fantasy sports
- 14 contests through Internet websites, has been left to the states;
- 15 and
- 16 WHEREAS, Currently, there has been little consensus among the
- 17 states regarding the legality of fantasy sports betting, with
- 18 some states ruling the activity to be illegal sports betting,
- 19 while others have concluded that regulating the industry as a
- 20 gambling product is the appropriate solution; therefore be it
- 21 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives direct the Joint
- 22 State Government Commission, in consultation with the
- 23 Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, to conduct a comprehensive
- 24 study on the potential of fantasy sports as a gambling product
- 25 in this Commonwealth; and be it further
- 26 RESOLVED, That the Joint State Government Commission, in
- 27 conjunction with the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, within
- 28 90 days of the adoption of this resolution, issue to the
- 29 chairperson and minority chairperson of the Gaming Oversight
- 30 Committee of the House of Representatives a report of its

- 1 findings and recommendations which includes, at a minimum, the
- 2 following:

- 3 (1) A definition of "fantasy sports."
- 4 (2) The structure of the different fantasy sports
  5 formats and the underlying activities that may be appropriate
  6 for oversight.
- 7 (3) Fantasy sports entities, including the roles and
  8 relationships of ancillary fantasy sports businesses,
  9 including host Internet sites, collegiate and professional
  10 sports organizations and persons with a controlling interest
  11 in fantasy sports entities, to the best of the commission's
  12 ability based on available information.
  - (4) How regulation of fantasy sports would be accomplished under the State's current statutory and regulatory construct.
  - (5) If regulating and licensing fantasy sports in this Commonwealth would violate current Federal law.
- 18 (6) The potential impact of authorizing and regulating
  19 fantasy sports contests on compulsive and problem gambling in
  20 this Commonwealth.
- 21 (7) The best practices to ensure the protection of 22 minors from participating in fantasy sports contests.
- 23 (8) Measures to ensure reasonable consumer protections.
- 24 (9) Safeguards to prevent financial criminal activity.
- 25 (10) Safeguards and mechanisms to ensure the reporting
  26 of gambling winnings and facilitate the collection of
  27 applicable Federal and State taxes in compliance with Federal
  28 and State law.
- 29 (11) Recommendations for legislative action including 30 the potential of fantasy sports as a gambling product in this

- 1 Commonwealth.
- 2 (12) Any other information related to the conduct,
- 3 operation and potential regulation of the different formats
- 4 of fantasy sports contests as the commission, in consultation
- 5 with the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, may deem
- 6 appropriate.
