## AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An 1 act relating to the public school system, including certain 2 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial 3 schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the 4 laws relating thereto," in preliminary provisions, further 5 providing for Keystone Exams. 6 7 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: 8 9 Section 1. Section 121 of the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, added June 30, 10 11 2012 (P.L.684, No.82), is amended to read: 12 Section 121. Keystone Exams. -- (a) Subject to annual appropriation, not later than the 2020-2021 school year, the 13 14 Department of Education shall develop and implement Keystone 15 Exams in the following subjects: algebra I, literature, biology, English composition, algebra II, geometry, United States 16 history, chemistry, civics and government and world history. The 17 State Board of Education shall promulgate regulations, subject 18

1 to the act of June 25, 1982 (P.L.633, No.181), known as the 2 "Regulatory Review Act," necessary to implement this section. (b) Notwithstanding section 2604-B(b)(2)(v), 22 Pa. Code 3 4.24 (relating to high school graduation requirements), 4.51 4 (relating to State assessment system) or 4.51c (relating to 5 project-based assessment) or any statute or regulation to the 6 7 contrary, a moratorium on the use of the Keystone Exam as a 8 graduation requirement or as a benchmark for the need for 9 participation in a project-based assessment to satisfy the 10 requirement is established on the effective date of this subsection for the General Assembly to have the opportunity to: 11 12 (1) review the progress of the Basic Education Funding 13 Commission with developing a basic education funding formula; 14 (2) review any funding formula that is based on the recommendations of the Basic Education Funding Commission; and 15 16 (3) enact a funding formula that is based on the 17 recommendations of the Basic Education Funding Commission. (c) (1) Upon the enactment and disbursement of money 18 19 through the funding formula under subsection (b) based on the recommendation of the Basic Education Funding Commission, the 20 Legislative Budget and Finance Committee shall conduct a study 21 each year after the budget for the fiscal year of July 1 to June 22 23 30 is enacted to determine whether the funding provided for each 24 student under the funding formula is adequate to meet the department's and the State Board of Education's established 25 26 minimum level of student performance on a Keystone Exam as a graduation requirement or as a benchmark for the need for 27 28 participation in a project-based assessment to satisfy the 29 requirement. (2) The Legislative Budget and Finance Committee shall 30

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1	submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the
2	General Assembly, the Governor and the department within six (6)
3	months after the enactment of the budget.
4	(d) (1) The General Assembly shall review the report to
5	make a determination by concurrent resolution on the adequacy of
6	funding within six (6) months after the receipt of the report
7	and shall submit its findings to the Governor and the
8	department.
9	(2) In the event the General Assembly finds, in a concurrent
10	resolution, that the funds disbursed for education are adequate
11	for each student to meet the minimum level of performance
12	established, then the Education Committee of the Senate and the
13	Education Committee of the House of Representatives shall each
14	conduct independent meetings, hearings and review of the report
15	the department submitted pursuant to subsection (f)(2), as well
16	as the methodology of the Keystone Exam and project-based
17	assessments and any other methodology or approaches to
18	assessments that have evolved as deemed necessary to determine
19	strengths and weaknesses in providing a fair and accurate
20	assessment of academic performance for students, schools, school
21	districts and educators.
22	(e) The Education Committee of the Senate and the Education
23	Committee of the House of Representatives shall each prepare a
24	report of all findings and recommendations of the use of the
25	assessments that have evolved and submit reports to the
26	Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate, the Majority
27	Leader of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the Senate, the
28	chairman and minority chairman of the Appropriations Committee
29	of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the
30	Majority Leader of the House of Representatives, the Minority
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1	Leader of the House of Representatives and the chairman and	
2	minority chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the House	
3	of Representatives within two (2) years.	
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	(f) (1) The department is responsible for continually	
5	reviewing and ascertaining approaches for accountability and the	
6	different methodologies of measuring accountability so that the	
7	department is prepared to make recommendations and report on the	
8	different methodologies in existence at the time it is	
9	determined that the funding is adequate for each student to	
10	satisfy the graduation requirement.	
11	(2) The department shall prepare a report of its findings	
12	and recommendations on accountability and methodologies and	
13	submit the report to the Governor, the President pro tempore of	
14	the Senate, the Majority Leader of the Senate, the Minority	
15	Leader of the Senate, the chairman and minority chairman of the	
16	Appropriations Committee of the Senate and the chairman and	
17	minority chairman of the Education Committee of the Senate, the	
18	Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Majority Leader of	
19	the House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the House	
20	of Representatives, the chairman and minority chairman of the	
21	Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives and the	
22	chairman and minority chairman of the Education Committee of the	
23	House of Representatives within sixty (60) days of the findings	
24	of the General Assembly in subsection (d)(1) that the funds	
25	disbursed for education are adequate for each student to meet	
26	the minimum level of performance established.	
27	(g) For purposes of this section, "department" shall mean	
28	the Department of Education of the Commonwealth.	
29	(h) The moratorium established in subsection (b) shall	
30	expire one (1) year after the reports by the Education Committee	
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- 1 of the Senate and the Education Committee of the House of
- 2 <u>Representatives are submitted pursuant to subsection (e).</u>
- 3 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
