## A RESOLUTION

1 2	Designating May 15 through June 15, 2015, as "Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
3	WHEREAS, An estimated 3 in every 1,000 children between 6 and
4	17 years of age in the United States are diagnosed with Tourette
5	Syndrome, a neurobiological, genetic condition which has no
6	cure; and
7	WHEREAS, Tourette Syndrome is a lifelong developmental
8	disability that begins before a child reaches 18 years of age
9	and affects children and adults of all races and ethnicities;
10	and
11	WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette Syndrome are affected by
12	tics, which are involuntary, rapid, sudden movements or
13	vocalizations that occur repeatedly; and
14	WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette Syndrome face periodic
15	changes in the nature and severity of their tics, as these
16	symptoms wax and wane and change without forewarning; and
17	WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette Syndrome frequently have

co-occurring conditions that further complicate their care and 1 2 diagnosis, including attention deficit disorder, attention 3 deficit hyperactivity disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder, mood disorders, learning disabilities, handwriting difficulties, 4 executive function disorder and sensory processing disorder; and 5 6 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette Syndrome are frequently 7 misunderstood by their families, educators, the community and 8 even by medical professionals due to their ever-changing symptoms which at times seem controllable; and 9 10 WHEREAS, Tourette Syndrome has historically been misinterpreted and considered to be a condition of emotional 11 12 disturbance instead of chemical biology; and WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette Syndrome are often teased 13 14 and not accepted by their peers and the general public; and 15 WHEREAS, Children with Tourette Syndrome are often 16 disciplined for manifestations of their disability by educators who fail to understand the child's inability to control his or 17 her tics and that the child may be delayed in his or her 18 19 maturity and emotional responses; and 20 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette Syndrome face discrimination from educators, friends, family, employers, 21 coworkers and the judicial system while dealing with their 22 23 unpredictable disorder and uncertain future; and 24 WHEREAS, Employers are required under the Americans with 25 Disabilities Act to disregard disability in hiring or promotions 26 and to make accommodations to support employees with Tourette Syndrome so the employees can be successful in the workplace and 27 28 not be forced to file for disability; and 29 WHEREAS, Individuals with Tourette Syndrome are often very 30 intelligent and capable of great contributions to society when

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1 given the proper supports; and

2 WHEREAS, Employers can benefit from that success, however, 3 many employers often neglect to hire, promote and make these accommodations for individuals with Tourette Syndrome; and 4 5 WHEREAS, The Pennsylvania Tourette Syndrome Alliance, Inc., promotes awareness and provides support and advocacy for 6 7 individuals with Tourette Syndrome in this Commonwealth; and 8 WHEREAS, Understanding this disorder will help guarantee hope for acceptance and a better future for people with Tourette 9 10 Syndrome; therefore be it

11 RESOLVED, That the Senate designate May 15 through June 15, 12 2015, as "Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania in 13 recognition of the needs of individuals with Tourette Syndrome; 14 and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Senate urge all residents to support the need for awareness and education regarding Tourette Syndrome in order to assist those individuals and families who deal with this neurobiological syndrome every day of their lives.

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
