## A RESOLUTION

- Designating October 22, 2015, as "Lights on Afterschool Day" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, More than 28 million children in the United States
- 4 have parents who work outside the home and over 15 million
- 5 children are left unsupervised after the school bell rings; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Almost 1.3 million children who are 6 to 17 years of
- 7 age in Pennsylvania have both parents in the work force or, in
- 8 single parent families, the sole parent in the work force; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Eighteen percent of the Commonwealth's school-age
- 10 children, responsible for taking care of themselves outside
- 11 school, spend an average of 8.99 hours per week unsupervised
- 12 after school; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Out-of-school hours represent the single biggest
- 14 block of time for children and youth and a key time during the
- 15 development of children into adolescents and adolescents into
- 16 adults; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Afterschool programs provide safe, challenging,

- 1 engaging and fun learning experiences to help children and youth
- 2 develop academic, cultural, emotional, physical and social
- 3 skills; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Afterschool programs support working families by
- 5 ensuring that their children are safe and productive during out-
- 6 of-school hours; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Afterschool programs offer a fun and supportive
- 8 educational environment for Science, Technology, Engineering and
- 9 Mathematics (STEM) that help foster this Commonwealth's economic
- 10 competitiveness; and
- 11 WHEREAS, A recent national survey reported that 52% of
- 12 parents cite cost as a barrier to enrolling their children in
- 13 afterschool programs; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Research illustrates that high-quality programming
- 15 improves student achievement, reduces crime by and against
- 16 children and youth and promotes positive social development; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Afterschool programs build stronger communities by
- 18 involving parents, business leaders and student and adult
- 19 volunteers in the lives of our young people, thereby promoting
- 20 positive relationships among children, youth, families and
- 21 adults; and
- 22 WHEREAS, 811,954 children in Pennsylvania would participate
- 23 in an afterschool program if one were available to them; and
- 24 WHEREAS, "Lights on Afterschool," in its 16th year of
- 25 national celebration of afterschool programs, promotes the
- 26 critical importance of quality afterschool programs in the lives
- 27 of children, their families and their communities; therefore be
- 28 it
- 29 RESOLVED, That the Senate designate October 22, 2015, as
- 30 "Lights on Afterschool Day" in Pennsylvania.
