A RESOLUTION

1 2	Recognizing the month of April 2017 as "Child Identity Theft Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
3	WHEREAS, According to the United States Postal Inspection
4	Service, identity theft is America's fastest growing crime; and
5	WHEREAS, According to the United States Postal Inspection
6	Service, 9.9 million Americans were victims of identity theft in
7	2011; and
8	WHEREAS, According to the United States Postal Inspection
9	Service, losses incurred by Americans victimized by identity
10	theft totaled approximately \$5 billion in 2011; and
11	WHEREAS, According to a study conducted by ID Analytics, more
12	than 140,000 children are victims of identity theft annually in
13	the United States; and
14	WHEREAS, The Federal Trade Commission testified before the
15	Congress of the United States that child identity theft is

especially pernicious because the theft may not be detected 1 until the child becomes an adult and seeks employment or applies 2 for a student or car loan; and 3 4 WHEREAS, According to the Federal Trade Commission, an identity thief may steal a child's personal identifying 5 information to get a job, government benefits, medical care, 6 7 utilities, car loans or a mortgage; and WHEREAS, According to the Federal Trade Commission, misuse of 8 Social Security numbers can occur in cases where the victim is 9 10 as young as 14 years of age; therefore be it RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the 11 month of April 2017 as "Child Identity Theft Awareness Month" in 12 13 Pennsylvania.
