A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing January 11, 2018, as "National Human Trafficking Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.
- 3 WHEREAS, This Commonwealth has a tradition of advancing
- 4 fundamental human rights; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Human trafficking, including early or forced
- 6 marriage, commercial sexual exploitation, forced labor, peonage,
- 7 involuntary servitude and slavery, must be eliminated; and
- 8 WHEREAS, To combat human trafficking in this Commonwealth and
- 9 globally, Pennsylvania residents in conjunction with State and
- 10 local governments must be aware of the realities of human
- 11 trafficking and be dedicated to stopping this contemporary
- 12 manifestation of slavery; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Efforts must be made to actively oppose all
- 14 individuals, groups, organizations and nations who support,
- 15 advance or commit acts of human trafficking; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Victims of human trafficking need support to escape
- 2 and recover from the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual
- 3 trauma associated with their victimization; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Human traffickers use physical and psychological
- 5 techniques to control their victims, including violence, threats
- 6 of violence against the victim or the victim's family, isolation
- 7 from the public, isolation from the victim's family and
- 8 religious or ethnic communities, language and cultural barriers,
- 9 shame, control of the victim's possessions, confiscation of
- 10 passports and other identification documents and threats of
- 11 arrest, deportation or imprisonment if the victim attempts to
- 12 reach out for assistance or leave; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Although laws have been enacted in the United States
- 14 to prosecute human traffickers and to aid victims of human
- 15 trafficking, awareness of the issues surrounding human
- 16 trafficking by those people most likely to come into contact
- 17 with victims is essential for effective enforcement because the
- 18 techniques that traffickers use to keep their victims enslaved
- 19 severely limit self-reporting; and
- 20 WHEREAS, The effort by individuals, businesses, organizations
- 21 and governing bodies to promote the observance of "National
- 22 Human Trafficking Awareness Day" on January 11 of each year
- 23 represents one of the many examples of the ongoing commitment to
- 24 raise awareness and actively oppose human trafficking; therefore
- 25 be it
- 26 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize January
- 27 11, 2018, as "National Human Trafficking Awareness Day" in
- 28 Pennsylvania; and be it further
- 29 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives support the goals
- 30 and ideals of "National Human Trafficking Awareness Day" and all

- 1 other efforts to raise awareness of human trafficking and
- 2 opposition to human trafficking.
