AN ACT

Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An 1 act relating to the public school system, including certain 2 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial 3 schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," in terms and courses of study, 5 further providing for alcohol, chemical and tobacco abuse 6 7 program. 8 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: Section 1. Section 1547 of the act of March 10, 1949 10 11 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, 12 amended November 6, 2017 (P.L.1142, No.55), is amended to read: 13 Section 1547. Alcohol, Chemical and Tobacco Abuse Program .--14 Beginning with school year 1991-1992 and each year thereafter, each public school student shall receive mandatory 15 16 instruction in alcohol, chemical and tobacco abuse in every year 17 in every grade from kindergarten through grade twelve. The 18 instruction shall be integrated within the health course of study required in accordance with the State Board of Education 19

regulations. In grades where health is offered, instruction may

- 1 also be integrated into other appropriate courses of study. In
- 2 grades where health is not offered, instruction shall be
- 3 integrated into an appropriate curriculum requirement as listed
- 4 in 22 Pa. Code §§ 4.21 (relating to elementary education:
- 5 primary and intermediate levels), 4.22 (relating to middle level
- 6 education) and 4.23 (relating to high school education).
- 7 (1) This instruction:
- 8 (i) Shall be age appropriate.
- 9 (ii) Shall be sequential in method of study.
- 10 (iii) Shall discourage the use of alcohol, tobacco and
- 11 controlled substances.
- 12 (iv) Shall communicate that the use of illicit drugs and the
- 13 improper use of legally obtained drugs is wrong.
- 14 (v) Shall be evidence-based and reviewed and updated
- 15 <u>annually to reflect current research.</u>
- 16 (2) [School districts may utilize any appropriate public or
- 17 private materials, personnel and other resources in developing
- 18 and implementing this program of instruction. The Department of
- 19 Health and the Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs, jointly,
- 20 shall make available information about appropriate curriculum
- 21 materials upon request of a school district. In developing its
- 22 alcohol, chemical and tobacco abuse instructional program, each
- 23 school district shall consult with the single county authority
- 24 designated by the Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs to
- 25 provide drug and alcohol services in the school district's
- 26 area.] The Department of Education, the Department of Health,
- 27 the Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs and the commission,
- 28 <u>in consultation with the center, shall compile a list of</u>
- 29 <u>evidence-based alcohol, chemical and tobacco abuse instructional</u>
- 30 programs, including opioid abuse prevention programs as required

- 1 under subsection (a.1), from which a school district may choose
- 2 a program to use in the district's elementary, middle and high
- 3 school education curricula.
- 4 (3) Each school district shall participate in the
- 5 Pennsylvania Youth Survey and utilize the results from the
- 6 <u>survey to help determine which evidence-based programs best</u>
- 7 address the needs of the students in the district.
- 8 (4) The commission and center shall, in cooperation with the
- 9 Department of Education, communicate to all school districts how
- 10 the commission and center may be resources to school districts
- 11 <u>in helping to implement evidence-based programs.</u>
- 12 (a.1) Beginning with the 2018-2019 school year, for students
- 13 in grades [six] three through twelve, the instruction required
- 14 under subsection (a) shall include instruction related to the
- 15 prevention of opioid abuse, with an emphasis on the prescription
- 16 drug epidemic and the connection between prescription opioid
- 17 abuse and addiction to other drugs, including heroin. This
- 18 instruction shall be a stand-alone unit in the program and
- 19 reflect the most recent evidence-based standards and practices.
- 20 Not later than the beginning of the 2018-2019 school year, the
- 21 Department of Education, the Department of Health [and], the
- 22 Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs and the commission, in
- 23 <u>consultation with the center</u>, shall develop jointly a model
- 24 curriculum for this purpose and each department, the commission
- 25 and the center shall post the model curriculum on [its] their
- 26 publicly accessible Internet [website] websites. The model
- 27 curriculum developed under this subsection shall be revised when
- 28 necessary to ensure that the model curriculum provides the most
- 29 current information. In providing the instruction required under
- 30 this subsection, a school district may, but shall not be

- 1 required to, use the model curriculum.
- 2 (b) Each school district [is hereby authorized to] under
- 3 quidelines established by the Department of Education,
- 4 Department of Health and Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs
- 5 shall develop and offer outreach programs relating to alcohol,
- 6 chemical and tobacco abuse, including opioid abuse, for parents
- 7 <u>or legal quardians</u> of students enrolled in the public schools.
- 8 [If a school district does develop such programs, they] <u>Such</u>
- 9 programs shall be developed in consultation with the single
- 10 county authority designated by the Department of Drug and
- 11 Alcohol Programs to provide drug and alcohol services in the
- 12 school district's area. Such programs <u>may include educating</u>
- 13 parents and quardians on recognizing warning signs of substance
- 14 <u>abuse and providing available resources and</u> shall be offered <u>at</u>
- 15 times convenient to the parents and quardians of the district on
- 16 <u>school premises</u>, or in other suitable facilities, at no cost to
- 17 parents and quardians.
- 18 (c) The Secretary of Education, in consultation with the
- 19 Secretary of Health [and], the Secretary of Drug and Alcohol
- 20 Programs, the executive director of the commission and the
- 21 director of the center, shall develop curriculum quidelines
- 22 which are evidence-based for instruction on alcohol, chemical
- 23 and tobacco abuse and the laws governing their use and misuse.
- 24 These guidelines shall encourage the inclusion of the following
- 25 elements where appropriate in the instruction:
- 26 (1) Detailed factual information regarding the
- 27 physiological, psychological, sociological and legal aspects of
- 28 substance abuse.
- 29 (2) Detailed information regarding the availability of help
- 30 and assistance for students and their families with alcohol,

- 1 chemical and tobacco dependency problems.
- 2 (3) The goals of quality education as set forth in 22 Pa.
- 3 Code (relating to education).
- 4 (4) Skills needed to evaluate advertisements for and media
- 5 portrayals of alcohol, chemical and tobacco products.
- 6 (5) Detailed instruction on the need for and the role of
- 7 lawful authority and law-abiding behavior, including interaction
- 8 with members of the legal and justice community.
- 9 (d) The following apply:
- 10 (1) Beginning with the 1991-1992 school year and each year
- 11 thereafter, the Secretary of Education, in consultation with the
- 12 Secretary of Health [and] the Secretary of Drug and Alcohol
- 13 Programs, the executive director of the commission and the
- 14 <u>director of the center</u>, shall make available, to all school
- 15 districts and intermediate units, in-service training programs
- 16 based upon the instruction requirements established in
- 17 subsection (a) and the curriculum guidelines established in
- 18 subsection (c). The programs shall provide preparation for the
- 19 teaching of mandated instruction in alcohol, chemical and
- 20 tobacco abuse. The in-service programs may utilize the single
- 21 county authorities designated by the Department of Drug and
- 22 Alcohol Programs or such other institutions, agencies or persons
- 23 as the Secretary of Education or the Secretary of Health deems
- 24 appropriate.
- 25 (2) Beginning with the 2018-2019 school year, the Department
- of Education, the Department of Health [and], the Department of
- 27 Drug and Alcohol Programs and the commission, in consultation
- 28 with the center, shall develop jointly and shall make available
- 29 to all school districts and nonpublic schools in-service
- 30 training programs based upon the instruction requirements

- 1 established under subsection (a.1) and the model curriculum
- 2 developed under subsection (a.1). The in-service training
- 3 programs developed under this subsection shall be revised when
- 4 necessary to ensure that the in-service training programs
- 5 provide the most current information.
- 6 (e) The following apply:
- 7 (1) Beginning with the 1991-1992 school year, each school
- 8 district shall provide, as part of its in-service training,
- 9 programs on alcohol, drugs, tobacco and dangerous controlled
- 10 substances for all instructors whose teaching responsibilities
- 11 include courses of study in which mandated instruction
- 12 concerning alcohol, chemical and tobacco abuse is integrated. To
- 13 comply with this requirement, a school district may utilize the
- 14 programs made available by the Department of Education or use
- 15 other alternative programs.
- 16 (2) Beginning with the 2018-2019 school year and every three
- 17 (3) years thereafter, each school district shall provide, as
- 18 part of its in-service training, programs based upon the
- 19 instruction requirements established under subsection (a.1) for
- 20 all instructors whose teaching responsibilities include courses
- 21 of study in which such mandated instruction is integrated. To
- 22 comply with this requirement, a school district may utilize the
- 23 in-service training programs made available under subsection (d)
- 24 (2).
- 25 (f) The governing board of each intermediate unit in which a
- 26 nonpublic school is located shall have the authority and the
- 27 duty to loan to all students attending nonpublic schools within
- 28 the intermediate unit all educational materials developed by the
- 29 Department of Education, the Department of Health [or], the
- 30 Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs, the commission or the

- 1 <u>center</u>, pursuant to this act for the instruction of public
- 2 school students on the nature and effects of drugs, alcohol,
- 3 tobacco and dangerous controlled substances. Local school boards
- 4 need not expend funds which are not provided by either the
- 5 Federal or State Government for drug education programs for the
- 6 use or loan of these materials. A nonpublic school may utilize
- 7 the in-service training programs made available by the
- 8 Department of Education through the intermediate unit.
- 9 (g) On or before June 1, 1991, the Secretary of Education
- 10 shall recommend to the General Assembly a plan to require and
- 11 assist each school district to establish and maintain a program
- 12 to provide appropriate counseling and support services to
- 13 students who experience problems related to the use of drugs,
- 14 alcohol and dangerous controlled substances.
- 15 (g.1) Beginning in the 2018-2019 school year, and each
- 16 school year thereafter, professional educators who complete in-
- 17 service training under this section may apply such in-service
- 18 training toward their continuing professional education
- 19 requirements under section 1205.2.
- 20 (h.1) By September 1, 2020, and by September 1 of every
- 21 fifth year thereafter, the Department of Education, in
- 22 consultation with the Department of Health [and] the Department
- 23 of Drug and Alcohol Programs, the commission and the center,
- 24 shall report to the General Assembly concerning the preceding
- 25 school year activities of the Department of Education, the
- 26 Department of Health [and], the Department of Drug and Alcohol
- 27 Programs, the commission and the center, pertaining to the
- 28 provisions of this section. The report shall include:
- 29 (1) A description of efforts by the Department of Education,
- 30 the Department of Health [and], the Department of Drug and

- 1 Alcohol Programs, the commission and the center to assist school
- 2 districts in providing the instruction required under
- 3 subsections (a) and (a.1), including efforts to develop and post
- 4 the model curriculum required under subsection (a.1) and to
- 5 develop and make available the in-service training programs
- 6 required under subsection (d)(2).
- 7 (2) An evaluation of the effectiveness of the instruction
- 8 required under subsections (a) and (a.1) and of curriculum
- 9 materials and in-service training programs developed by the
- 10 Department of Education, the Department of Health [and], the
- 11 Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs, the commission and the
- 12 <u>center</u> under this section in reducing the use of alcohol,
- 13 tobacco and other drugs, including prescription opioids, by
- 14 students.
- 15 (i) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules and
- 16 regulations necessary for the implementation of this section.
- 17 (j) As used in this section, the following words and phrases_
- 18 shall have the meanings given to them in this subsection unless
- 19 the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- 20 "Center." An entity that works in consultation with and
- 21 receives financial assistance from the commission to support the
- 22 <u>dissemination</u>, <u>quality implementation</u>, <u>sustainability and impact</u>
- 23 assessment of a menu of proven crime prevention and intervention
- 24 programs and to conduct original translational research to
- 25 advance the science and practice of evidence-based crime
- 26 prevention.
- 27 <u>"Commission." The Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and</u>
- 28 Delinquency.
- 29 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
