AN ACT

Amending the act of April 14, 1972 (P.L.233, No.64), entitled "An act relating to the manufacture, sale and possession of 2 controlled substances, other drugs, devices and cosmetics; 3 conferring powers on the courts and the secretary and Department of Health, and a newly created Pennsylvania Drug, Device and Cosmetic Board; establishing schedules of controlled substances; providing penalties; requiring registration of persons engaged in the drug trade and for the 7 8 revocation or suspension of certain licenses and 9 registrations; and repealing an act," providing for 10 dispensing of fentanyl. 11 12 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 13 hereby enacts as follows: 14 Section 1. The act of April 14, 1972 (P.L.233, No.64), known 15 as The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, is 16 amended by adding a section to read: 17 Section 4.1. Dispensing of Fentanyl. -- (a) Fentanyl and fentanyl derivatives, as used in section 4(1)(ii)23, shall only 18 19 be dispensed: 20 (1) To a patient who is being treated on an in-patient basis 21 or remains in observation status, or during a surgery that takes

place in a health care facility as defined in section 103 of the

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- 1 act of July 19, 1979 (P.L.130, No.48), known as the "Health Care
- 2 Facilities Act."
- 3 (2) For use in palliative or hospice care.
- 4 (3) For use in the management of pain associated with
- 5 cancer.
- 6 (4) For use in the management of chronic pain not associated
- 7 with cancer. In order for this paragraph to apply, the
- 8 prescriber must:
- 9 <u>(i) Document the chronic medical condition in the</u>
- 10 individual's medical record maintained by the prescriber.
- 11 (ii) State the reason why another medication is not
- 12 appropriate to address the chronic medical condition.
- 13 <u>(5) To a patient whose treatment is associated with a</u>
- 14 medical emergency as documented in the individual's medical
- 15 record.
- 16 (b) In instances where, in the professional medical judgment
- 17 of the prescriber, fentanyl is required to stabilize an
- 18 <u>individual's acute medical condition, the prescriber may</u>
- 19 prescribe no more than a seven-day supply of fentanyl. In order
- 20 for this subsection to apply, the prescriber must:
- 21 (1) document the acute medical condition in the individual's
- 22 medical record with the prescriber; and
- 23 (2) state the reason why another medication is not
- 24 appropriate to address the acute medical condition.
- 25 (c) The department, in consultation with the Pennsylvania
- 26 State Police, shall issue an annual report to the General
- 27 Assembly. The report shall contain the following:
- 28 (1) Information on the number of overdoses related to
- 29 fentanyl and the number of overdoses where fentanyl and opioids
- 30 were present.

- 1 (2) Any reduction in the dispensing of fentanyl.
- 2 (d) This section shall expire two years after the effective
- 3 date of this section.
- 4 (e) As used in this section, the term "prescriber" shall
- 5 have the meaning given to it in section 3 of the act of October_
- 6 <u>27, 2014 (P.L.2911, No.191), known as the "Achieving Better Care</u>
- 7 by Monitoring All Prescriptions Program (ABC-MAP) Act."
- 8 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
