## AN ACT

- Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), entitled "An
- act relating to the public school system, including certain 2 provisions applicable as well to private and parochial
- schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the

- laws relating thereto," in charter schools, providing for study of charter school academic and financial practices.

- 7 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- hereby enacts as follows: 8
- 9 Section 1. The act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known
- as the Public School Code of 1949, is amended by adding a 10
- 11 section to read:
- 12 Section 1704-A. Study of Charter School Academic and
- Financial Practices. -- (a) The State Board of Education shall 13
- 14 conduct a comprehensive study outlining the best academic and
- 15 financial practices of high-performing charter schools currently
- 16 operating in this Commonwealth and the unsuccessful academic and
- financial practices of low-performing charter schools currently 17
- or previously operating in this Commonwealth. The study shall 18
- include a detailed assessment of the following: 19

- 1 (1) High-performing charter schools that have a proven
- 2 <u>success record of providing improved opportunities to teachers</u>,
- 3 parents, students and community members for establishing and
- 4 maintaining schools that operate independently from existing
- 5 school district structure, including how the schools
- 6 <u>accomplished the following:</u>
- 7 (i) improved student learning, including student growth
- 8 measures;
- 9 (ii) increased learning opportunities for all students,
- 10 <u>including students with disabilities;</u>
- 11 (iii) used different and innovative teaching methods;
- 12 (iv) identified new professional opportunities for teachers;
- 13 (v) expanded choices that improve the types of educational
- 14 opportunities that are available within the public school
- 15 system; and
- 16 (vi) met or exceeded measurable academic standards.
- 17 (2) Low-performing charter schools that continue to operate
- 18 or have closed and the lessons that can be learned from the
- 19 schools' academic or financial failures, including any fraud,
- 20 waste and mismanagement that occurred.
- 21 (b) The State Board of Education, in conducting the study,
- 22 <u>shall give consideration to an examination of the factors</u>
- 23 associated with high-performing and low-performing charter
- 24 schools, such as:
- 25 (1) the demographics of the students that the schools
- 26 educate;
- 27 (2) the schools' records of operating with integrity and any
- 28 conflicts of interest; and
- 29 (3) governance structure and local creation and oversight.
- 30 (c) The State Board of Education, based on the comprehensive

- 1 assessment of high-performing and low-performing charter schools
- 2 conducted, shall identify policies, regulations and legislative
- 3 changes needed to improve the academic and learning success of
- 4 <u>charter school students.</u>
- 5 (d) No later than twelve (12) months after the effective
- 6 date of this section, the State Board of Education shall issue a
- 7 report of its findings and recommendations to the General
- 8 <u>Assembly.</u>
- 9 <u>(e) As used in this section:</u>
- 10 "High-performing charter school" includes, at a minimum, a
- 11 charter school that achieved an SPP score of eighty (80) or
- 12 <u>higher in any year.</u>
- "Low-performing charter school" includes a charter school\_
- 14 that obtained an SPP score of sixty (60) or lower in any year or
- 15 has closed due to fraud, waste or mismanagement.
- 16 Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
