AN ACT

Amending the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.343, No.176), entitled "An act relating to the finances of the State government; 2 providing for cancer control, prevention and research, for 3 ambulatory surgical center data collection, for the Joint Underwriting Association, for entertainment business 4 5 financial management firms, for private dam financial assurance and for reinstatement of item vetoes; providing for the settlement, assessment, collection, and lien of taxes, 8 bonus, and all other accounts due the Commonwealth, the 9 collection and recovery of fees and other money or property 10 due or belonging to the Commonwealth, or any agency thereof, 11 including escheated property and the proceeds of its sale, 12 the custody and disbursement or other disposition of funds 13 and securities belonging to or in the possession of the 14 Commonwealth, and the settlement of claims against the 15 Commonwealth, the resettlement of accounts and appeals to the 16 17 courts, refunds of moneys erroneously paid to the Commonwealth, auditing the accounts of the Commonwealth and 18 all agencies thereof, of all public officers collecting 19 20 moneys payable to the Commonwealth, or any agency thereof, 21 and all receipts of appropriations from the Commonwealth, authorizing the Commonwealth to issue tax anticipation notes 22 to defray current expenses, implementing the provisions of 23 section 7(a) of Article VIII of the Constitution of 24 Pennsylvania authorizing and restricting the incurring of 25 certain debt and imposing penalties; affecting every 26 27 department, board, commission, and officer of the State government, every political subdivision of the State, and 28 29 certain officers of such subdivisions, every person, association, and corporation required to pay, assess, or 30 collect taxes, or to make returns or reports under the laws 31

imposing taxes for State purposes, or to pay license fees or 1 other moneys to the Commonwealth, or any agency thereof, 2 every State depository and every debtor or creditor of the Commonwealth," providing for Collaborative Care Model and 3 4 Primary Care Behavioral Health Model Implementation Program; 5 6 and making an appropriation. 7 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: 8 9 Section 1. The act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.343, No.176), known 10 as The Fiscal Code, is amended by adding an article to read: 11 ARTICLE I-K 12 COLLABORATIVE CARE MODEL 13 AND PRIMARY CARE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH MODEL 14 IMPLEMENTATION PROGRAM 15 Section 101-K. Definitions. 16 The following words and phrases when used in this article 17 shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise: 18 19 "Collaborative care model." The evidence-based, integrated 20 behavioral health service delivery method described in 81 Fed. 21 Reg. 80230 (Nov. 15, 2016), which includes a formal 22 collaborative arrangement among a primary care team consisting of a primary care physician, a care manager and a psychiatric 23 24 consultant, and includes the following elements: 25 (1) Care directed by the primary care team. 26 (2) Structured care management. 27 (3) Regular assessments of clinical status using developmentally appropriate, validated tools. 28 29 (4) Modification of treatment as appropriate. 30 "Collaborative care technical assistance center." A health 31 care organization that can provide educational support and 32 technical assistance related to the collaborative care model or

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primary care behavioral health model in a specific region of

- 1 this Commonwealth. The term includes an academic medical center
- 2 located in this Commonwealth.
- 3 "Department." The Department of Human Services of the
- 4 Commonwealth.
- 5 <u>"Primary care behavioral health model." The evidence-based,</u>
- 6 <u>integrated behavioral health service delivery method which</u>
- 7 <u>includes MAY INCLUDE a licensed behavioral health professional</u>, <--
- 8 psychologist, PSYCHIATRIST, clinical social worker or counselor <--
- 9 <u>in the primary care team and the following elements:</u>
- 10 (1) Care directed by the primary care team.
- 11 (2) Structured care management.
- 12 (3) Regular assessments of clinical status using
- developmentally appropriate, validated tools.
- 14 <u>(4) Modification of treatment as appropriate.</u>
- 15 <u>Section 102-K. Primary care grants.</u>
- 16 (a) Grants. -- The department shall make grants to primary
- 17 care physicians and primary care practices to meet the initial
- 18 costs of establishing and delivering behavioral health
- 19 integration services through the collaborative care model or
- 20 primary care behavioral health model. Primary care physicians
- 21 and primary care practices may work with larger health systems
- 22 for the purposes of applying for and implementing grants under
- 23 this section.
- 24 (b) Use of grants. -- A primary care physician or primary care
- 25 practice that receives a grant under this section shall use
- 26 funds received through the grant:
- 27 (1) To hire staff.
- 28 (2) To identify and formalize contractual relationships
- 29 <u>with other health care practitioners, including practitioners</u>
- 30 who will function as psychiatric consultants and behavioral

- 1 health care managers in providing behavioral health
- 2 integration services through the collaborative care model or
- 3 primary care behavioral health model.
- 4 (3) To purchase or upgrade software and other resources
- 5 <u>needed to appropriately provide behavioral health integration</u>
- 6 services through the collaborative care model or primary care
- behavioral health model, including resources needed to
- 8 <u>establish a patient registry and implement measurement-based</u>
- 9 <u>care.</u>
- 10 (4) For other purposes that the department may determine
- 11 <u>to be necessary.</u>
- 12 (c) Priority. -- In making grants under this section, the
- 13 department shall give priority to primary care physicians and
- 14 primary care practices:
- 15 (1) that are in rural areas; or
- 16 (2) that are in a county in which the suicide or
- 17 overdose death rate is higher than the national average
- suicide or overdose death rate, according to the averages
- 19 recorded and maintained by the Centers for Disease Control
- and Prevention.
- 21 Section 103-K. Technical assistance grants.
- 22 (a) Regions. -- The department shall divide the Commonwealth
- 23 into the following six regions:
- 24 (1) Northeast.
- 25 (2) Southeast.
- 26 (3) North central.
- 27 (4) South central.
- 28 (5) Northwest.
- 29 <u>(6) Southwest.</u>
- 30 (b) Grants.--The department shall solicit proposals from and

- 1 enter into a grant agreement with at least one eligible
- 2 <u>collaborative care technical assistance center applicant from</u>
- 3 each region under subsection (a) to provide technical assistance
- 4 to primary care physicians and primary care practices on
- 5 providing behavioral health integration services through the
- 6 <u>collaborative care model or primary care behavioral health</u>
- 7 model.
- 8 (c) Technical assistance described. -- An entity that receives
- 9 <u>a grant under subsection (b), in a region described in</u>
- 10 subsection (a), shall provide technical assistance to primary
- 11 care physicians and primary care practices within that region
- 12 that will assist primary care physicians and primary care
- 13 practices with the following:
- 14 (1) Developing financial models and budgets for program
- 15 <u>launch and sustainability based on practice size.</u>
- 16 (2) Developing staffing models for essential staff
- 17 <u>roles, including care managers, licensed behavioral health</u>
- 18 professionals, psychologists and consulting psychiatrists.
- 19 (3) Providing information technology expertise to assist
- with building the model requirements into electronic health
- 21 records, including assistance with care manager tools,
- 22 patient registry, ongoing patient monitoring and patient
- 23 records.
- 24 (4) Training support for all key staff and operational
- 25 <u>consultation to develop practice workflows.</u>
- 26 (5) Establishing methods to ensure the sharing of best
- 27 <u>practices and operational knowledge among primary care</u>
- 28 physicians and primary care practices that provide behavioral
- 29 health integration services through the collaborative care
- 30 model or primary care behavioral health model.

- 1 (6) Accurately and appropriately coding and billing
- 2 insurers for collaborative care model and primary care
- 3 behavioral health model services.
- 4 (7) For other purposes that the department may determine
- 5 <u>to be necessary.</u>
- 6 (d) Promotion required. -- A collaborative care technical
- 7 <u>assistance center that receives a grant under subsection (b), in</u>
- 8 <u>a region described in subsection (a), shall promote to primary</u>
- 9 care physicians and primary care practices within the
- 10 collaborative care technical assistance center's region the
- 11 opportunity for primary care physicians and primary care
- 12 practices to apply for and receive the grants available under
- 13 <u>section 102-K.</u>
- 14 <u>Section 104-K. Eligibility.</u>
- 15 (a) Eliqible applicant. -- In order to be deemed an eliqible
- 16 applicant, a collaborative care technical assistance center must
- 17 provide information on how it would meet the quidelines under
- 18 section 103-K when submitting an application to the department.
- 19 (b) Exception. -- If there are no applications submitted to
- 20 the department by a potential collaborative care technical
- 21 assistance center under section 103-K, in one or more regions
- 22 <u>described under section 103-K(a)</u>, or the department determines
- 23 that none of the applications for a particular region indicate
- 24 that any applicant is fully capable of providing the technical
- 25 assistance described in section 103-K(c), the department may
- 26 award a grant to an applicant from outside that region, provided
- 27 that the applicant must describe how it will adequately provide
- 28 the technical assistance in the region.
- 29 Section 2. From the money received by the Commonwealth from
- 30 the Federal Government under the American Rescue Plan Act of

- 1 2021 (Public Law 117-2, 135 Stat. 4), the sum of \$20,000,000 is
- 2 appropriated to the Department of Human Services for the
- 3 following:
- 4 (1) The sum of \$14,000,000 for grants under section 102-
- 5 K.
- 6 (2) The sum of \$6,000,000 for grants under section 103-
- 7 K.
- 8 Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
