AN ACT

- 1 Providing for essential family caregivers in facilities during 2 disaster emergencies.
- 3 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 4 hereby enacts as follows:
- 5 Section 1. Short title.
- 6 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Essential
- 7 Family Caregiver Designation Act.
- 8 Section 2. Definitions.
- 9 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
- 10 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 11 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- "Communicable disease." As defined in section 2(c) of the
- 13 act of April 23, 1956 (1955 P.L.1510, No.500), known as the
- 14 Disease Prevention and Control Law of 1955.
- "Compassionate care situation." Any of the following:
- 16 (1) An end of life situation.
- 17 (2) A resident struggling with the change in environment

- 1 and lack of physical family support who was living with
- 2 family before being recently admitted to a facility.
- 3 (3) A resident who is grieving after a friend or family 4 member recently passed away.
- 5 (4) A resident who is experiencing weight loss or 6 dehydration and needs cueing and encouragement with eating or 7 drinking which was previously provided by a family member or 8 caregiver.
- 9 (5) A resident who is experiencing emotional distress,
 10 is seldom speaking or crying more frequently and who used to
 11 talk and interact with others.
- 12 "Essential family caregiver." As follows:
- 13 (1) Any of the following individuals who are at least 18
 14 years of age and who, prior to visitor restrictions, were
 15 regularly engaged with a resident at least once per week:
- 16 (i) An immediate family member.
- 17 (ii) A caregiver of the resident who is not employed
 18 by a facility.
- 19 (2) The term does not include an employee of a
 20 regulatory agency unless the employee is an immediate family
 21 member of the resident.
- 22 "Facility." Any of the following:
- 23 (1) A long-term care nursing facility as defined in 24 section 802.1 of the act of July 19, 1979 (P.L.130, No.48),
- 25 known as the Health Care Facilities Act.
- 26 (2) A hospice as defined in section 802.1 of the Health
 27 Care Facilities Act, if the hospice renders care in an
 28 inpatient setting.
- 29 (3) An assisted living residence as defined in section 30 1001 of the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), known as

- 1 the Human Services Code.
- 2 (4) A personal care home as defined in section 1001 of
- 3 the Human Services Code.
- 4 (5) An intermediate care facility for individuals with
- 5 an intellectual disability.
- 6 "Immediate family member." A spouse, child, stepchild,
- 7 parent, stepparent, grandparent, grandchild, brother,
- 8 stepbrother, sister, stepsister or like relative-in-law.
- 9 "Intermediate care facility for individuals with an
- 10 intellectual disability." The term shall have the same meaning
- 11 as the term "intermediate care facility for the mentally
- 12 retarded" in section 1905(d) of the Social Security Act (49
- 13 Stat. 620, 42 U.S.C. § 1396d(d)) on the effective date of this
- 14 definition.
- 15 "Secretary." The Secretary of Health or the Secretary of
- 16 Human Services of the Commonwealth.
- "State of disaster emergency." A state of disaster emergency
- 18 declared under 35 Pa.C.S. § 7301(c) (relating to general
- 19 authority of Governor) that is due to a communicable disease.
- 20 Section 3. Essential family caregiver.
- 21 (a) Designation. -- Notwithstanding any other provision of
- 22 law, during a state of disaster emergency declared as a result
- 23 of a communicable disease the secretary shall require a facility
- 24 to designate at least one essential family caregiver per
- 25 resident to provide companionship and assist with activities
- 26 requiring one-on-one direction, including compassionate care
- 27 situations. Only facilities that have the ability to follow
- 28 necessary precautions outlined by the Federal and State
- 29 Government may designate an essential family caregiver.
- 30 (b) Visitation.--Visitation by an essential family caregiver

- 1 may be conducted through different means based on a facility's
- 2 structure and the needs of the residents, such as use of
- 3 resident rooms, dedicated visitation spaces and the outdoors and
- 4 visitation in circumstances beyond compassionate care
- 5 situations. The following shall apply:
- 6 (1) Except for on-going use of virtual visits,
- 7 facilities may still restrict visitation by an essential
- 8 family caregiver due to any of the following:
- 9 (i) A communicable disease county positivity rate
- greater than the recommended threshold for visitation
- 11 according to the United States Department of Health and
- Human Services Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services
- or other similar measure for reporting the spread of a
- 14 communicable disease.
- 15 (ii) The facility's communicable disease status.
- 16 (iii) A resident's communicable disease status.
- 17 (iv) Visitor symptoms.
- 18 (2) Except as provided under paragraph (1), a facility
- may not restrict visitation by an essential family caregiver
- 20 without a reasonable clinical or safety cause.
- 21 (c) Essential family caregiver requirements. -- The decision
- 22 to designate an essential family caregiver may be individualized
- 23 and integrated with resident-centered care planning. A visit
- 24 shall be held outdoors whenever practicable. For inside visits,
- 25 the following shall apply:
- 26 (1) Designation shall be by the facility executive
- director or equivalent position or designee, in consultation
- with the resident and the resident's representative, and only
- upon agreement by the resident and their representative.
- 30 (2) A schedule and the amount of time allowed in a

- facility by an essential family caregiver shall be agreed to prior to an essential family caregiver entering a facility
- and may not exceed more than two hours per day.
- 4 (3) Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
 5 visitation shall be contingent upon the facility having no
 6 new communicable disease cases in the last 14 days. No
 7 facility may conduct visitation during the time period the
 8 facility is conducting outbreak testing.
 - (4) All who enter the facility must be screened for signs and symptoms of the communicable disease and the denial of entry of those with signs or symptoms must occur.
 - (5) Compliance with any necessary Federal or State
 Government precautions designed to reduce the spread of a
 communicable disease, including:
- 15 (i) Proper hand hygiene.
- 16 (ii) The wearing of a face covering or mask covering
 17 both the mouth and nose.
- 18 (iii) Physical distancing.
- 19 (6) An essential family caregiver shall provide care and
 20 support similar in nature as provided prior to the A <-21 proclamation of disaster emergency issued by the Governor on <-22 March 6, 2020, published at 50 Pa.B. 1644 (March 21, 2020),
 23 and any renewal of the state of disaster emergency, AS A <-24 RESULT OF A COMMUNICABLE DISEASE.
- 25 (7) An essential family caregiver shall adhere to any conditions specified by the facility.
- 27 (8) Restriction or revocation of essential family
 28 caregiver status shall be at the sole discretion of the
 29 facility executive director or equivalent position or
 30 designee.

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- 1 Section 4. Construction.
- 2 Nothing in this act shall be construed to supersede Federal
- 3 authority or guidance regarding long-term care facilities or to
- 4 prevent the secretary from taking necessary actions to render
- 5 the Commonwealth eligible for Federal funds or reimbursement
- 6 services provided in long-term care facilities.
- 7 Section 5. Effective date.
- 8 This act shall take effect immediately.
