AN ACT

1 2 3	Amending Title 38 (Holidays and Observances) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for holidays and observances.

11	This chapter recognizes the contributions of veterans of the
12	United States Armed Forces from this Commonwealth in major
13	conflicts since the Vietnam War.
14	<u>§ 1302. Persian Gulf War Veterans Day.</u>
15	(a) Legislative findings and declarationsThe General
16	Assembly finds and declares as follows:
17	<u>(1) On August 2, 1990, Saddam Hussein ordered Iraqi</u>
18	troops to invade and occupy the sovereign nation of Kuwait.
19	(2) The United States led an international coalition
20	<u>demanding Saddam Hussein to withdraw Iraqi forces from Kuwait</u>
21	<u>by January 15, 1991.</u>
22	(3) After Iraq failed to meet the deadline, passed by
23	the United Nations Security Council, President George H. W.
24	Bush on January 16, 1991, ordered United States Armed Forces <
25	to begin "Operation Desert Storm."
26	(4) On January 17, 750,000 coalition forces from 36
27	nations, including 540,000 United States Armed Forces, began
28	the battle to liberate Kuwait from occupation.
29	(5) After an intensive air campaign, coalition forces
30	liberated Kuwait City on February 28, 1991.

1	(6) On March 6, after negotiating a cease-fire,
2	President Bush announced the end of combat operations.
3	(7) By the end of the conflict, 200 United States Armed
4	Forces members were killed, including 29 from this
5	Commonwealth.
6	(8) The bravery of United States Armed Forces and their
7	allies should be recognized for the liberation of Kuwait and
8	restoration of Kuwait's sovereignty as an independent nation.
9	(b) DesignationMarch 6 of each year is designated as
10	"Persian Gulf War Veterans Day."
11	(c) ProclamationThe Governor shall issue annually a
12	proclamation encouraging all public schools and educational
13	institutions to observe "Persian Gulf War Veterans Day" and to
14	conduct exercises recognizing the contributions of all those
15	involved in the Persian Gulf War and remembering the sacrifices
16	they made for their country. The proclamation may not mandate a
17	public school or educational institution to participate in the
18	observance.
19	<u>§ 1303. Global War on Terrorism Veterans Day.</u>
20	(a) Legislative findings and declarationsThe General
21	Assembly finds and declares as follows:
22	(1) The campaign in Afghanistan, which is America's <
23	longest conflict, began in 2001 and continues to this day.
24	AMERICA'S CONFLICT IN AFGHANISTAN BEGAN IN 2001 AND BECAME <
25	OUR COUNTRY'S LONGEST MILITARY CONFLICT.
26	(2) Following the terrorist attacks on September 11,
27	2001, the United States demanded that the Taliban regime stop
28	harboring Al Qaeda, the terrorist organization responsible
29	for the 9/11 attacks, and hand over the Al Qaeda leader Osama
30	<u>bin Laden.</u>

1	(3) President George W. Bush ordered United States Armed
2	Forces to begin "Operation Enduring Freedom" (OEF) to combat
3	terrorism in Afghanistan and confront Al Qaeda.
4	(4) United States Armed Forces first entered Afghanistan
5	and began combat operations on October 7, 2001.
6	(5) On May 2, 2011, Osama bin Laden was killed during
7	the fighting after President Barack Obama ordered Navy SEALs
8	<u>to raid Osama bin Laden's compound.</u>
9	(6) On December 31, 2014, the United States and the
10	North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) combat operations
11	in Afghanistan officially ended.
12	(7) Since the beginning of Operation Enduring Freedom,
13	over 830,000 Americans, including 18,000 from this
14	Commonwealth, have served in Afghanistan.
15	(8) More than 2,000 members of the United States Armed
16	Forces, including 98 from this Commonwealth, were killed in
17	<u>action in Afghanistan since combat began.</u>
18	(9) More than 19,000 members of the United States Armed
19	Forces were wounded in service to their country during
20	Operation Enduring Freedom.
21	(10) When Operation Enduring Freedom ended, the United
22	States began a new phase of the campaign, named Operation
23	Freedom's Sentinel (OFS).
24	(11) United States Armed Forces remain in the country to
25	participate in a coalition mission to train, advise and
26	assist Afghan National Defense and Security Forces and to
27	conduct counterterrorism operations against the remnants of
28	<u>Al Qaeda.</u>
29	(12) During Operation Freedom's Sentinel more than 70
30	Americans have lost their lives and another 453 have been

2	(13) On March 19, 2003, President George W. Bush
3	announced the beginning of combat operations in Iraq after
4	Saddam Hussein failed to meet the demands of the United
5	<u>States.</u>
6	(14) "Operation Iraqi Freedom" lasted for more than
7	seven years, reducing the influence of insurgents, stopping
8	sectarian violence, assisting in training the Iraq Security
9	Forces and promoting the development of Iraq's constitution
10	and elections.
11	(15) Major United States combat operations ended on
12	September 1, 2010. American troops remained in the country to
13	advise Iraqi Security Forces as part of "Operation New Dawn"
14	until the withdrawal on December 15, 2011.
15	(16) More than 4,000 members of the United States Armed
16	Forces lost their lives during "Operation Iraqi Freedom" and
17	"Operation New Dawn," including 197 from this Commonwealth,
18	and more than 32,000 were wounded.
19	(17) With the rise of the terrorist group known as the
20	Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS), the United States
21	created a new combined joint task force in 2014, dubbed
22	"Operation Inherent Resolve."
23	(18) March 23, 2019, marked the end of ISIS controlling
24	any physical territory IN SYRIA AND IRAQ. <
25	(19) United States Armed Forces under "Operation
26	Inherent Resolve" continue to work by, with and through local
27	partners to defeat the final ISIS force and stabilize the
28	region.
29	(20) The fight against ISIS under "Operation Inherent
30	Resolve" has claimed more than 80 American lives, with

2	(21) United States military personnel have served
3	domestically securing key infrastructure and support overseas
4	operation.
5	(22) Since September 11, 2001, members of the United
6	States military have served on nearly every continent
7	fighting international terrorism.
8	(b) DesignationOctober 7 of each year is designated as
9	"Global War on Terrorism Veterans Day."
10	(c) ProclamationThe Governor shall issue annually a
11	proclamation encouraging all public schools and educational
12	<u>institutions to observe "Global War on Terrorism Veterans Day"</u>
13	and to conduct exercises recognizing the contributions of all
14	those involved in the Global War on Terrorism and remembering
15	the sacrifices they made for their country. The proclamation may
16	not mandate a public school or educational institution to
17	participate in the observance.

18	AND PROPERTY, DETECT AND PREVENT CRIMES, UPHOLD THE LAW AND
19	ENSURE JUSTICE.
20	(8) TENS OF THOUSANDS OF FIREFIGHTERS, INCLUDING
21	APPROXIMATELY 50,000 VOLUNTEERS AND 10,000 CAREER
22	FIREFIGHTERS, PROVIDE FIRE SUPPRESSION, EMS, SEARCH AND
23	RESCUE, HAZARDOUS MATERIALS RESPONSE, TERRORISM RESPONSE AND

30	PROTECT OUR COMMUNITIES, AS WITNESSED IN THE AFTERMATH OF THE

1	TERRORIST ATTACKS OF SEPTEMBER 11, 2001, AND OF THE NATURAL
2	DESTRUCTION CAUSED BY HURRICANES KATRINA, IRENE AND SANDY.
3	THEY ARE CALLED EVERY DAY TO PROTECT INDIVIDUALS AND PROPERTY
4	IN CITIES AND TOWNS ACROSS THIS COMMONWEALTH.
5	(11) MANY LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS DIE IN THE LINE OF
6	DUTY IN THE UNITED STATES EACH YEAR, INCLUDING NINE KILLED IN
7	2020 IN PENNSYLVANIA ALONE.
8	(12) MORE THAN 100 FIREFIGHTERS ARE KILLED IN THE LINE
9	OF DUTY ACROSS THE UNITED STATES EACH YEAR AND THOUSANDS MORE
10	ARE INJURED.
11	(13) EMS ANSWERS MORE THAN 20 MILLION PATIENT CALLS
12	EVERY YEAR, AND MANY MEDICS ARE INJURED ON THE JOB, HAVE BEEN
13	ASSAULTED BY PATIENTS OR HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO INFECTIOUS
14	DISEASES.
15	(14) EMS PERSONNEL IN THE UNITED STATES HAVE A FATALITY
16	RATE OF MORE THAN TWICE THE NATIONAL AVERAGE FOR ALL OTHER
17	WORKERS.
18	(15) THOUSANDS OF FIRST RESPONDERS HAVE MADE THE
19	ULTIMATE SACRIFICE.
20	(16) THESE MEN AND WOMEN, BY THEIR DEDICATED
21	PROFESSIONALISM, HAVE EARNED OUR GRATITUDE AND RESPECT.
22	(B) FIRST RESPONDERS DAY THE FOLLOWING APPLY:
23	(1) SEPTEMBER 27 OF EACH YEAR IS DESIGNATED AS "FIRST
24	RESPONDERS DAY."
25	(2) THE GOVERNOR SHALL ISSUE ANNUALLY A PROCLAMATION
26	CALLING UPON ALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS
27	TO OBSERVE "FIRST RESPONDERS DAY" AND TO CONDUCT EXERCISES
28	RECOGNIZING THE CONTRIBUTIONS AND REMEMBERING THE SACRIFICES
29	THAT FIRST RESPONDERS HAVE MADE.
