AN ACT

- Amending the act of April 9, 1929 (P.L.177, No.175), entitled "An act providing for and reorganizing the conduct of the 2 executive and administrative work of the Commonwealth by the 3 Executive Department thereof and the administrative departments, boards, commissions, and officers thereof, 5 including the boards of trustees of State Normal Schools, or 6 Teachers Colleges; abolishing, creating, reorganizing or authorizing the reorganization of certain administrative 7 8 departments, boards, and commissions; defining the powers and 9 duties of the Governor and other executive and administrative 10 officers, and of the several administrative departments, 11 boards, commissions, and officers; fixing the salaries of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and certain other executive 12 13 and administrative officers; providing for the appointment of 14 15 certain administrative officers, and of all deputies and other assistants and employes in certain departments, boards, 16 and commissions; providing for judicial administration; and prescribing the manner in which the number and compensation 17 18 of the deputies and all other assistants and employes of 19 certain departments, boards and commissions shall be 20 determined," in Independent Fiscal Office, further providing 21 for definitions and for duties of office and providing for 22 23 poverty impact analysis. 24 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 25 hereby enacts as follows: 26 Section 1. Section 602-B of the act of April 9, 1929
- 27 (P.L.177, No.175), known as The Administrative Code of 1929, is
- amended by adding definitions to read: 28

2	The following words and phrases when used in this article

6	"Poverty impact analysis." An analysis of:
7	(1) A proposed budget that includes:
8	(i) A projected ratio equal to the amount of
9	appropriations in the proposed budget that will benefit
_0	individuals and families below the poverty threshold over
1	the total amount of appropriations in the proposed
_2	budget.
_3	(ii) A projection of the number of individual and
4	<pre>family incomes that may:</pre>
.5	(A) decrease below the poverty threshold if the
6	proposed budget is enacted; or
_7	(B) increase above the poverty threshold if the
8 ـ	proposed budget is enacted.
9	(iii) A projection as to how the proposed budget
20	improves or reduces access to basic human services,
21	including health care, housing and education.
22	(2) An enacted budget that includes:
23	(i) A projected ratio equal to the amount of
24	appropriations in the proposed budget that will benefit
25	individuals and families below the poverty threshold over
26	the total amount of appropriations in the proposed
27	<pre>budget.</pre>
28	(ii) A projection of the number of individual and
29	<pre>family incomes that may:</pre>
30	(A) decrease below the poverty threshold if the

1	proposed budget is enacted; or
2	(B) increase above the poverty threshold if the
3	proposed budget is enacted.
4	(iii) A projection as to how the proposed budget
5	improves or reduces access to basic human services,
6	including health care, housing and education.
7	(3) Any bill, amendment or joint resolution to determine
8	the impact, if any, the proposed bill, amendment or joint
9	resolution may have on the poverty and deep poverty rate of
10	this Commonwealth. The poverty impact statement shall be
11	impartial, simple and understandable.
12	"Poverty threshold." Household income level below 200% of
13	the Federal poverty level.

20	(4.1) Conduct a poverty impact analysis authorized under

23	Section 3. The act is amended by adding a section to read:
24	Section 616-B. Poverty impact analysis.
25	(a) Analysis required The office shall conduct a poverty
26	impact analysis of the following:
27	(1) The Governor's proposed General Fund budget, which
28	shall be completed by May 1 of each year.
29	(2) The enacted General Fund budget of the fiscal year,
30	which shall be completed within 90 days after the enactment

- of the General Fund budget.
- 2 (3) Any bill, amendment or joint resolution on written
- 3 request of an individual listed under section 615-B(a).
- 4 (b) Second consideration prohibited.--Except as otherwise
- 5 provided in subsection (d)(1), no bill for which a poverty
- 6 <u>impact analysis has been requested under subsection (a)(3) may</u>
- 7 be given second consideration by the chamber of the General
- 8 Assembly whose member made the request until the office has
- 9 <u>attached the poverty impact analysis.</u>
- 10 (c) Amendment. -- Except as otherwise provided in subsection
- 11 (d)(2), neither an amendment for which a poverty impact analysis
- 12 has been requested under subsection (a) (3) nor the bill to which
- 13 the amendment is offered shall be considered by the chamber of
- 14 the General Assembly whose member made the request until the
- 15 office has attached a poverty impact analysis.
- 16 (d) Failure to attach. -- The following shall apply:
- 17 (1) If the office fails to attach a poverty impact
- 18 analysis to a bill within 10 legislative days after a request
- for a statement has been submitted to the office, the bill
- 20 may be further considered in the same manner as if the
- 21 analysis were attached to the bill.
- 22 (2) If the office fails to attach a poverty impact
- analysis to an amendment within 10 legislative days after a
- reguest for a statement has been submitted to the office, the
- 25 bill and the amendment may be considered in the same manner
- as if the analysis were attached to the amendment.
- 27 Section 4. This act shall take effect in 60 days.
