A RESOLUTION

1 2	Designating September 22, 2021, as "Falls Prevention Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.
3	WHEREAS, Individuals who are 65 years of age or older are the
4	fastest growing segment of the population in the United States;
5	and
6	WHEREAS, The number of older adults in the United States will
7	increase from approximately 52 million in 2018 to an estimated
8	95 million by 2060; and
9	WHEREAS, Approximately 30% of older adults in the United
10	States fall each year, with each five-year increment in age
11	increasing the risk of falls; and
12	WHEREAS, Falls are the leading cause of both fatal and
13	nonfatal injuries among older adults; and
14	WHEREAS, In 2015, the total direct medical cost of fall-
15	related injuries for older adults, was approximately \$50
16	billion, adjusted for inflation; and
17	WHEREAS, In 2017, more than 31,000 older adults died from
18	injuries related to unintentional falls, and the death rate from

1 falls of older adults in the United States is expected to 2 continue to sharply rise to more than 100,000 per year by 2030; 3 and

WHEREAS, In 2018, approximately 3 million older adults were treated in hospital emergency departments for fall-related injuries, and nearly 870,000 of those older adults were subsequently hospitalized; and

8 WHEREAS, The annual cost of fall injuries will surpass \$100 9 billion by 2030; and

10 WHEREAS, Evidence-based programs reduce falls by utilizing 11 cost-effective strategies, such as exercise programs to improve 12 balance and strength, medication management, vision improvement, 13 reduction of home hazards and fall prevention education; 14 therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate designate September 22, 2021, as "Falls Prevention Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania to raise awareness and encourage the prevention of falls among older adults; and be it further

19 RESOLVED, That the Senate recognize there are proven, cost-20 effective falls prevention programs and policies; and be it 21 further

22 RESOLVED, That the Senate commend the Pennsylvania State 23 Falls Free Coalition and the falls prevention coalitions in 43 24 states and the District of Columbia for their efforts to work 25 together to increase education and awareness about preventing 26 falls among older adults; and be it further

27 RESOLVED, That the Senate encourage businesses, individuals,
28 Federal, State and local governments, the public health
29 community and health care providers to work together to raise
30 awareness of falls in an effort to reduce the incidence of falls

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1 among older adults in the United States; and be it further 2 RESOLVED, That the Senate recognize the Centers for Disease 3 Control and Prevention for its work developing and evaluating interventions for all members of health care teams to make falls 4 prevention a routine part of clinical care; and be it further 5 RESOLVED, That the Senate recognize the Administration for 6 7 Community Living for its work to promote access to evidence-8 based programs and services in communities across Pennsylvania; 9 and be it further

10 RESOLVED, That the Senate encourage the Department of Health 11 and Department of Aging to continue providing significant 12 leadership in reducing injuries and related health care costs by 13 collaborating with organizations and individuals to reduce falls 14 among older adults, and to encourage experts in the field of 15 falls prevention to share their best practices so that their 16 success can be replicated by others.
