SUMMARY:

House Bill 1574 amends the Antihazing Law. It would take effect in 60 days.

ANALYSIS:

This legislation makes two changes to the Antihazing Law. Under current law, the offense of hazing is limited to hazing against a student at a college or university as a condition for initiation or admission into an organization affiliated with that college or university. House Bill 1574 would expand the offense to include hazing done to any person as a condition for initiation or admission into any organization.

Under current law, institutions of higher education must adopt written antihazing policies and rules for their enforcement. House Bill 1574 would expand that requirement to any public or private secondary school providing instruction in grades 7 through 12 or any combination of those grades. In addition, each secondary school must provide a written copy of the antihazing policy, along with its rules, penalties and program of enforcement, to all athletic coaches involved with the school, and also make the policy available on its public website.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Enactment of this legislation to expand the scope of the offense of hazing could lead to more convictions for hazing, which is a misdemeanor of the third degree, punishable by up to one year in prison and a fine of up to \$2,500. However, according to data from the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing, in 2014, the most recent year available, there were no criminal convictions for hazing. Therefore, the fiscal impact from the enactment of this legislation is expected to be minimal.
