SUMMARY:

House Bill 507, Printer's Number 1033 requires health care providers to obtain specific informed consent from the patient before performing certain procedures.

ANALYSIS:

The bill amends the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error (Mcare) Act to create a new Section 504.1 concerning informed consent. Health care providers, when involved in professional instruction or clinical training, must obtain specific informed consent (both verbal and written), before performing a pelvic examination, a rectal examination, or a prostate examination while the patent is anesthetized or unconscious in a facility that provides health care services.

Exceptions apply if the exam is within the scope of care ordered for the patient, or in an emergency.

A health care provider shall be liable for violations of the new section. If a student overseen by a health care provider in a training program violates the specific informed consent provisions, the supervisory health care provider shall be liable under the informed consent liability provisions of the Mcare Act. The university, educational institution, or other training program that hosts the training programs shall be liable for \$1,000 for each violation, and a patient may be able to recover other damages from the educational provider.

A health care provider can delegate the task of obtaining specific informed consent to a qualified medical practitioner but cannot delegate it to a student.

The bill takes effect in 60 days.

FISCAL IMPACT:

This legislation would have no fiscal impact to the commonwealth. Liability for violations of the act would fall on the provider or the educational institution.

In cases where the commonwealth provides medical care to patients under its care, such as state correctional institutions, veterans homes, or DHS facilities, the procedures involving anesthesia that require specific informed consent under the bill would likely not occur at the state facility and instead would be performed at a separate medical facility. Providers who are employees of the commonwealth are unlikely to be in situations covered by the bill.
