House Bill 1671 amends Act 407 of 1963 (pertaining to the keeping of county records) by increasing the membership on the County Records Committee from fifteen to sixteen by adding a clerk of orphans' court.

Act 407 of 1963 created a statewide County Records Committee. The Committee is responsible for setting the procedures and conditions governing the disposal of any records filed in any office of county government. The Committee now consists of fifteen members appointed by the Governor for a four-year term.
