Co-sponsorship: Sonny Hill Resolution

In the near future, I intend to introduce a resolution recognizing the tremendous impact and trailblazing accomplishments of Mr. William Randolph "Sonny" Hill, appreciating the significant contributions he has made to the lives of tens of thousands of Delaware Valley youth, and designating March 21, 2011 as William Randolph "Sonny" Hill Day in Pennsylvania.

Sonny Hill was born and raised in Philadelphia. He graduated from Northeast High School and later attended college before joining the semi-professional Eastern Basketball League - a league where many gifted African-American basketball players were welcomed. In 1960, he enlisted the assistance of fellow Philadelphia athletes Guy Rodgers, Ray Scott, Hal Lear, and Wilt Chamberlain to establish the Charles Baker Memorial Basketball League – an off-season confederation of professional basketball players who converge on Philadelphia from all over the country to display their talent and skill set.

In 1968, Sonny Hill was inspired to found the Sonny Hill Community Involvement League during a time when Philadelphia was plagued by turbulent gang warfare and hundreds of youth succumbed to the violent streets. The league served as a safe haven for Delaware Valley youth and continues to breed great athletes while offering them refuge from the pervasive urban street culture. Additionally, the league closely tracks the academic progress of its players, provides tutorial services & career counseling, and boasts a college admission rate of 85% amongst its players. Sonny Hill was honored by the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame with the 2008 Mannie Jackson Human Spirit Award – an award designated to honor those who have incorporated basketball into their effort to contribute to the greater good of society. Breaking down barriers on and off the basketball court, Sonny Hill was CBS's first African-American commentator for NBA games. Today, Sonny Hill hosts his own radio show every Sunday on WIP AM Sport Radio and serves as executive advisor to the Philadelphia 76ers.
