Re: Resolution to recognize December 1, 2011 as "World AIDS Day"

Date: November 15, 2011

In the near future, I will introduce a resolution recognizing December 1, 2011 as "World AIDS Day."

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports that nearly 1.2 million people in the United States are living with HIV and 20% of those people are unaware of their infection. What is even more startling is that 32% of all HIV patients nationwide are diagnosed with AIDS within one year of being diagnosed with HIV. Given these compelling statistics, I strongly believe that recognizing "World AIDS Day" in Pennsylvania is pertinent in order to increase public awareness of this deadly pandemic.

Pennsylvania is ranked 7th highest in the U.S. in cumulative reported AIDS cases. The Department of Health reports that the overall number of persons in Pennsylvania living with AIDS has been consistently rising, with the 35-44 year age group accounting for the highest percentage at 37% of all cases in 2007. DOH also estimated that 29% of HIV/AIDS patients had unmet need for HIV primary medical care in 2008. However, the overall number of AIDS-related deaths in Pennsylvania has been declining through 2007. This trend is most likely due to improvements in AIDS survival.

"World AIDS Day" has been commemorated by many communities around the world since 1988. The 2011 World AIDS Day theme is "Getting to Zero," which signifies the global effort underway to reduce to zero the number of new HIV infections, the number of AIDS related deaths, and discrimination towards individuals living with HIV or AIDS. Please join me in recognizing December 1, 2011 as "World AIDS Day" in Pennsylvania.
