## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Commemorating the 101st anniversary of the minimum wage law.
- WHEREAS, On June 4, 1912, Massachusetts passed the country's
- 3 first minimum wage law, at first applying only to women and
- 4 children, and soon after industry-specific wage boards were
- 5 created to determine respective minimum wages; and
- 6 WHEREAS, In 1914, a Massachusetts wage board organized for
- 7 the state's brush industry established a minimum wage of 16¢ per
- 8 hour; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Between 1912 and 1923, 15 other states, including
- 10 the District of Columbia, followed Massachusetts' lead in
- 11 establishing minimum wage laws; and
- 12 WHEREAS, In 1923, the United States Supreme Court in Adkins
- 13 v. Children's Hospital struck down the District of Columbia's
- 14 minimum wage law on the basis that it violated the right of
- 15 contract under the due process clause of the Fifth Amendment;
- 16 and
- 17 WHEREAS, In 1933, during the height of the Great Depression,

- 1 United States Labor Secretary Frances Perkins advocated for a
- 2 national minimum wage, and President Franklin D. Roosevelt made
- 3 the minimum wage a key platform of his 1936 re-election bid,
- 4 promising to constitutionally protect American workers; and
- 5 WHEREAS, In 1938, the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act passed
- 6 with a 25¢ per hour wage floor; and
- 7 WHEREAS, In 1941, the United States Supreme Court in United
- 8 States v. F.W. Darby Lumber Co. upheld the Federal Fair Labor
- 9 Standards Act on a 9-0 decision; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Justice Harlan Stone stated that the
- 11 constitutionality of minimum wages "is no longer open to
- 12 discussion"; therefore be it
- RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives commemorate the
- 14 101st anniversary of the first-in-the-nation minimum wage law.
