## A RESOLUTION

- Recognizing the 50th anniversary of the June 26, 1964, dynamite explosion in Marshalls Creek, Middle Smithfield Township, 1

- Monroe County, that claimed the lives of three Marshalls 3
- Creek Fire Company firefighters.
- 5 WHEREAS, On June 26, 1964, a tractor trailer carrying the
- oxidizing ingredient in fertilizer, partially gelatin dynamite 6
- and blasting caps, caught on fire along Route 209 in Marshalls 7
- Creek, Middle Smithfield Township, Monroe County; and 8
- WHEREAS, Members of the Marshalls Creek Fire Company 9
- responded to a call for fire assistance at the site; and 10
- WHEREAS, As they attempted to extinguish the blaze, the 11
- trailer exploded, killing volunteer firefighters Francis Earl 12
- Miller, Leonard Mosier and Edward Hines; and 13
- WHEREAS, The explosion also took the lives of three other 14
- 15 people and injured ten other individuals; and
- WHEREAS, There was also property damage to three fire trucks, 16
- a hotel, a reptile farm and the Middle Smithfield Elementary 17
- 18 School; and

- 1 WHEREAS, This incident and others led to enactment of the
- 2 Transportation Safety Act of 1974 (Public Law 93-633, 88 Stat.
- 3 2156) which law, among other things, requires placards to be
- 4 visible on trailers carrying certain hazardous materials; and
- 5 WHEREAS, The relevant provisions of the Federal law are
- 6 contained at 49 U.S.C. Ch. 51 (relating to transportation of
- 7 hazardous material); and
- 8 WHEREAS, The Commonwealth is deeply enriched by the
- 9 dedication, protection and assumption of personal risk that
- 10 volunteer firefighters give to our communities; therefore be it
- 11 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the
- 12 50th anniversary of the June 26, 1964, dynamite explosion in
- 13 Marshalls Creek, Middle Smithfield Township, Monroe County, that
- 14 claimed the lives of three Marshalls Creek Fire Company
- 15 firefighters.
