The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. BUTERA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I should like to offer some brief remarks regarding House bill No. 189 just for the purpose of clarifying the record, which I think has been distorted by certain aspects of the public press.

The budget, for the benefit of the members, that was passed last June provided, among other things, a \$900,000 appropriation for that part of the chief clerk's office referred to as Legislative Printing and Expenses. This fund, for the benefit of new members, is the kind of fund which is all-inclusive as to paying for things, notably printing, but also for any number of other expenses, legitimate expenses, of the House.

When that budget was passed, of course, like every other budget, it was an estimation. The estimation was wrong, due to the following reasons:

Out of this particular fund during the past 6 months, we have noticed an increased cost of approximately 20 percent in printing. In other words, the printing expense was 20 percent higher than we had anticipated, either through increased costs or increased verbiage on the floor of this House.

There were repairs made to the committee chairmen's offices of Agriculture, Business and Commerce, Professional Licensure, Military and Veterans Affairs, Local Government, Urban Affairs, Conservation, State Government, and Game and Fisheries.

The hall in the basement, on the House side where the cafeteria is located, was thoroughly renovated. The entire hall actually was renovated, and half was paid for by the Senate and half was paid for by the House.

New equipment was installed in the mail room. New IBM Mag Card typewriters were purchased for both the majority and the minority. A new duplicating department was created for the minority. A new AM printing machine, which has been used exclusively for the printing of envelopes, was installed. We did this because we found that printing our own envelopes and buying them in bulk unprinted would save us countless thousands of dollars over the long term. So we bought the machine so we could print our own envelopes.

A new Xerox machine was put in the basement, together with a 50-bin collator; new carpeting was installed in both the basement and on the fifth floor for both the minority and the majority; and, finally, we now have to pay for any maps and other brochures which heretofore were paid for by the departments from which we received them, as we send them out to our constituents.

Now those expenditures, over and above what we had anticipated, have caused the present chief clerk to again estimate that he will need a substantial number of dollars in order to complete this fiscal year in the operation of the chief clerk's office. There is nothing unusual about that. Two years ago we had to do the same thing because as we estimated, we were going to need \$550,000, and that sum was voted without any controversy.

The reason this kind of a thing is not controversial from this standpoint, from our standpoint, is that there are only certain things which can be purchased by the chief clerk from this and any other fund which he has. Therefore, by your chief clerk, or our chief clerk, really—he represents all of us—estimating that he needs an additional \$550,000 or \$575,000 to complete the year in this particular area raises no questions in our mind. We know he does not have enough money because of unusual expenditures which were made for the benefit of this House; not for the majority party and not for the minority party, but rather for the benefit of the House and to meet the needs of this House. So when the suggestion was made to us, there was no objection from us that the money was not needed, and so on. We did not go through that type of debate.

If we had wanted to—and I think I should point this out—we could have shown that in the other 10 accounts in the chief clerk's office and under his jurisdiction, each of them, except for this one account, contained, as of January 1, half or more than half of the full-year appropriation.

It appears as though—and this is not unusual—the chief clerk, come June 30, will have a substantial num-

ber of dollars to lapse because there have been overappropriations in several of the chief clerk's accounts. It also appears that the amount of lapse will far exceed the additional request which the chief clerk has made in this particular fund. In other words, what we are doing, or what we have done, in approving the chief clerk's request, is to transfer money from certain accounts into the printing and expense accounts, and still we will probably net out with a surplus come June 30.

Now, unfortunately, newsmen, when they look at things such as this, do not ever look in depth before they print their first story. Oftentimes their second or third story is quite accurate, and the misleading commentary which has appeared throughout the Commonwealth is unfortunate. We regret it, but I just feel a need to correct the record today.

Now I am going to offer for the record a list of all of the voucher transmittals, which are public information, that have been issued by the chief clerk of this House from July 1, 1974 through December 31, 1974. These vouchers, for the benefit of those who have never gotten into the chief clerk operation, are the means by which vendors of the chief clerk are paid. Any of you who would like to have a copy and do not want to wait for the Journal to be printed, if you would contact my office, I will have copies made. It is a fairly thick list. It involves no payments to any employes; it involves payments only to vendors for such things as printing, telephone, renovation, carpet, equipment, et cetera. It is all very easy to understand. And if those people who are so suspicious would just do a little bit of work in depth on something like this, we would not have these misleading stories which are obviously very embarrassing to certain individuals connected with the House of Representatives. So any of you who want a copy of this list of vouchers, please contact me. I have two or three extra copies in my office and I will make more copies as are requested.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to close by offering these several voucher transmittals for the record.

Mr. O'CONNELL. Mr. Speaker, apparently at the Appropriations Committee meeting when House bill No. 189 was discussed, there was an inquiry made of you that went something like, why do we need the money, or where does this money go, or justify the need for the additional appropriation. Is that true?

Mr. O'CONNELL. Was a Mr. Warner of the AP present at that time?

Mr. WOJDAK. I understand he was present.

Mr. Speaker, may I make a few comments in regard to the situation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. O'CONNELL. First of all, I would like to indicate to the ladies and gentlemen of this House that we took an awful lambasting in the northeastern regions as a result of this particular story. The headlines went something like, \$650,000 is missing, and it was alluded to in this particular story that perhaps somebody had absconded with this money.

This disturbed me and gave me a lot of distress over the weekend, and I took the time then to contact the editors and newscasters in this regard. But the point that I would like to make here is that I sincerely hope—and he is not in the hall of this House right now—Mr. Warner would take the time to print the justification for this and to record the minority leader's comments, because as far as I am concerned, that kind of reporting is unjust, unfair, and uncalled for, and I have no appreciation for it. I think it would have behooved him to go just a little bit further in investigating this matter before these kinds of stories were released.

Constantly they are lambasting the legislature for being irresponsible, and I would like the record to show that as far as I am concerned, this was a totally irresponsible act on the part of Mr. Warner.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Columbia, Mr. Shelhamer.

Mr. SHELHAMER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I sat here and listened with interest to the remarks of the minority leader as he spoke about the deficiency appropriation that we have just passed here in the House.

I am concerned about the deficiency appropriations.

They seem to be justified. But I am even more concerned about the future operation of this House. I am Mr. Richardson.

concerned because we never seem to have learned the lesson that we have got to run this House in a business-like fashion.

I heard him read over many of the issues that money was spent for. He mentioned the matter of the new carpeting; he mentioned the matter of the improvements in the basement; he mentioned the matter of the improvements in the members' offices, all of which, I am sure, the members of this House would approve.

But the thing that bothers me is this: There did not seem to be any preemption that we needed this stuff when we made up the budget. We seem to be on a trend here in this House that whoever is in power spends the money that is there and then he comes back to the members and says, give us a deficiency appropriation to bail us out of this problem.

I would hope that whatever has happened in the past, at least in the future, we will have learned some lesson from this sort of thing. And if we are paying as much attention to the operation of this House as we should, we will know when the members' offices need to be renovated; we will know when the basement needs new carpet, and those things will be properly budgeted.

Those are the things that distress me when we continually get ourselves in these kinds of problems. I hope we can benefit from these kinds of mistakes.

SENATE BILL No. 30 RECOMMITTED

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Mullen.

Mr. M. P. MULLEN. Mr. Speaker, rather than do anything else on this bill, I am going to make a motion to recommit the bill to the State Government Committee, where it should have gone in the first place. It went to the Rules Committee.

My motion is to recommit Senate bill No. 30 to the State Government Committee.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, I oppose the motion to recommit.

I would ask that this bill be kept on the calendar, available today for the debate on the various amendments. The bill is an important bill. It ought not to be swept aside by recommittal. I ask for a negative vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northampton, Mr. Ruggiero.

Mr. RUGGIERO. Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the motion to recommit. This is done on the basis of a telephone call that I received this afternoon from a county commissioner in my county who said, what are you fellows doing up there in Harrisburg? You are going to change the law regarding these nominating petitions, which are now just about ready to be circulated.

I think that this is the wrong time to do it. And I can assure you that if we do not recommit this bill, next week all of these registration commissions throughout this state are going to be telling all of these candidates for all of these various offices, we do not know the answers to your questions, but we do know that your legislators last week passed a bill and changed it and we do not even know what it is. That is why I think we ought to recommit this bill.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Caputo.

Mr. CAPUTO. Mr. Speaker, the majority leader has asked that we oppose the motion to recommit so that we can discuss and debate the various amendments that are to be offered.

In view of one amendment that is coming down which will not affect the county of Mr. Ruggiero or his county

municipalities throughout the state, I think that we can only make a judgment on this bill after that amendment has been submitted. Of course, if the bill is tabled, we will not have a chance to even talk about that amendment.

I do not see that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, its citizens or this House can be in any way ill-advised or be any worse off if we have the chance to argue or debate some of the amendments that will be offered. I ask for a "no" vote on the motion.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Wojdak.

Mr. WOJDAK. Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose the motion to recommit. I agree with the prior comments that have been made. I think the bill does deserve a total airing in this House. There are some very serious problems that we face in Philadelphia, and they are problems that I think should be spoken to today in an attempt to solve some of those problems. I think we should proceed and debate the bill. I would ask for a negative vote on the motion to recommit.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Tayoun.

Mr. TAYOUN. Mr. Speaker, I am well aware of the problems Philadelphia faces in the upcoming election. These were discussed in the Philadelphia caucus, and I feel strongly that this would simply be an exercise in futility to amend legislation that no one really is ready for.
