MINUTES OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE  
MEETING, TUESDAY, MARCH 11, 1975

The meeting was called to order at 3:35 p.m. in Room 401 by Committee Chairman James J. A. Gallagher, there being a quorum on hand. (A copy of the attendance sheet is attached)

Mr. Gallagher noted that the purpose of the session was to present initial reactions and recommendations pertaining to the fiscal budget, presented to a joint session of the General Assembly by Governor Shapp earlier in the day.

The Chairman called upon Committee members to give serious consideration to possible recommendations which might be made to the Appropriations Committee relative to education financing. He urged that proposals concerning the education budget also be made known to the leadership in both party caucuses.

There was a general concensus that the Governor's budget portends a general belt-tightening, especially in the area of higher education. It was noted that various institutions apparently have attempted to generate pressure for additional funding. Mr. Gallagher cited an instance in which hundreds of students protested (by means of form letters) that there was not further funding for laboratory frogs—an expenditure of \$275. Concurrently, the school was advertising for administrative positions paying an annual salary of \$28,000.

Mr. Shane, Chairman of the Higher Education Subcommittee, said he has been warning school administrators—and others—of potential retrenchments in the area of professional personnel. He noted that payroll costs of the State colleges amount to approximately 85% of the yearly budget—leaving very little for other educational activities.

There was a general discussion of possible Committee efforts aimed at obtaining raw financial data pertaining to education projects in order to permit a reliable presentation during budget considerations by the Appropriations Committee.

Mr. DiCarlo presented a resolution that the Committee attempt to establish priorities and be prepared to examine every education expenditure to determine they are spent in the most advantageous manner. It was adopted unanimously by voice vote.

There being no further business to come before the Committee, the meeting was adjourned at 4:35 p.m.

**PERMISSION TO ADDRESS HOUSE**

Mr. DORR requested and obtained unanimous consent to address the House.

Mr. DORR. Mr. Speaker, the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has recognized the problems and difficulties faced by many of our senior citizens

and others of low income by adopting special tax provisions which apply to the Pennsylvania personal income tax.

It was the intention of the members of the General Assembly, in adopting such special tax provisions, to relieve as much of the burden resulting from a personal income tax as possible from the persons eligible for such relief.

The Department of Revenue, according to public statements of the Secretary of Revenue, is attempting to force the filing of tax returns by the persons eligible for this relief even where the person is not required to pay the state income tax.

This action on the part of the Department of Revenue will prevent the effectuation of much of the relief intended by the General Assembly, since it would require the persons to go not only to the time and trouble of the preparation of tax returns but also will require many of them to expend their meager funds to pay for the preparation of the relatively complex forms involved and, furthermore, will require the unnecessary expenditure of the taxpayers' money in order to process these "no tax" returns.

I have, therefore, prepared a resolution for introduction, wherein this House of Representatives reiterates what I believe to have been its intention—that persons who are not required to pay any income tax to the Commonwealth by reason of qualifying under the poverty exemption should also not be required to file a tax return. We also would urge the department to take appropriate action to relieve such persons from the onerous burden and cost of preparing and filing a return.

Mr. Speaker, I shall hold this resolution until tomorrow and then I shall place this resolution on the desk, and I should invite any members who would like to join me in this effort to aid our senior citizens and disadvantaged persons to add their names as cosponsors to the resolution.

**PERMISSION TO ADDRESS HOUSE**

Mr. DAVIES requested and obtained unanimous consent  
 to address the House.

Mr. DAVIES. Mr. Speaker, this is relative to a possible  
 elevation to the sanctity and happiness of the celebration  
 of St. Patrick's Day.

Not to add to the depression and austerity that pre-  
 vailed in this body last Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 over the  
 budget, I would note the following from the Historical Re-  
 view of Berks County, Spring Edition of 1975, page 56, an  
 article entitled, "A Yellow St. Patrick's Day." It seems  
 that by some strange and still unexplained natural phe-  
 nomena, a heavy snowfall on St. Patrick's Day of March  
 17, 1879, brought a yellow fallout of one-quarter of an  
 inch that covered the streets and buildings of the city.  
 It was also recorded in the fair cities of Allentown,  
 Bethlehem and Easton. There were analyses made that  
 varied from sulphur, pollen and organic matter, as stated  
 by experts. One expert blamed it on pine pollen from  
 New Jersey pine barrens.

Not to be a seer of optimism but to embellish the cele-  
 bration anticipated this day by people of Celtic lineage  
 and Gaelic origin, but to be forewarned is to be fore-  
 armed. There is an ancient Eastern superstition that  
 these natural phenomena do repeat themselves on a 97-  
 year cycle, which may mean that today it could happen  
 again. But just think how this strange yellow scum  
 could be a blessing of major proportion, particularly if  
 at this time it were combined with the blue of the sky  
 to become a vivid color of green?

A copy of the article mentioned above is attached to

Mr. DAVIES presented the following article for the  
 Legislative Journal:

**A Yellow St. Patrick's Day**

Reading had a yellow, not a green St. Patrick's  
 Day on March 17, 1879. It came with a heavy  
 rain and different experts had different opinions  
 of what the downfall consisted. Some said sul-  
 phur, some said brimstone, some said pine pollen.  
 Others made tests the results of which never  
 seem to have been reported.

The fall out was a quarter inch thick over  
 streets and pavements. It was sandy and gummy  
 to the touch and those who tried to burn it re-  
 ported that it also smelled like sulphur. It coated  
 pavements and gutters for several days.

The odd sediment fell not only in Reading and  
 parts of Berks but in Allentown, Bethlehem and  
 Easton. There it came during a snow storm. It  
 was found under the snow the next morning.

Dr. J. W. Landis, N. 9th street, scraped up some  
 of the material and made two chemical analyses.  
 He pronounced it sulphur. Dr. Stanley Smith and  
 Dr. Schoenfeld, of the Reading Academy of Na-  
 tural Sciences, declared it was "organic matter."  
 Dr. John Stevens said it was pollen. Tests also  
 were made by P. M. Ziegler, city chemist, and  
 Hiram Hollenbach of Spring Garden Street. The  
 results of their tests were not revealed.

The Eagle reported the next day that when the  
 substance was examined under 100 power enlarge-  
 ment, it had the appearance of starch; that when  
 magnification was increased to 200 power, it ap-  
 peared to be "underdeveloped spores of the pine

order." When rubbed between the fingers, the report said, it became gummy.

In addition to the Eagle of March 18, the strange occurrence is recorded in the large personal ledger of Frank B. Shalters, editor of the Times at that time. This personal record of years from 1850 to 1890 is in private hands. Shalters said that "learned professors" in Allentown and Bethlehem declared it was "pollen most likely pine swept west from the New Jersey pine forests." On the other hand, the Eagle says the storm came from the northwest.

No record has been found to indicate any serious investigation ever was made to determine definitely the source of the strange fall. Could it have ash from some distant volcano carried high into the skies where it could have traveled for long distances? Such incidents have been recorded. Could it have been from an early dust storm over the prairies, such as was seen in the dry period of the 1930's?

We'll never know what brought on that yellow St. Patrick's Day in 1879.

The ecology pollution that gave Berks County a yellow St. Patrick's Day almost a century ago was recorded in his ledger by Frank Shalters, editor of the Times, under the heading "Storms."

Wayne E. Homan, author of "Heritage in Berks" and "Where Are They Now" series which appear regularly in the Reading Eagle, has contributed to the Review for more than 15 years.

March 17, 1879. To-day a storm passed over Reading which left a deposit resembling sulphur, depth of ¼ inch. The gutters and water courses were coated yellow for several days. The savants were much exercised as to what it was. It is very probable that it was pollen from pine trees, and carried here on the storm from the forests of New Jersey. So think the Bethlehem (Pa) College professors.

### STATEMENT BY MAJORITY LEADER

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, I consider this week to be a crucial week for our new system. I have already been approached by a number of members either saying, what did you do with our bill or I do not want that bill to move, or I have amendments, et cetera.

I want to reiterate: We cannot play the game under the same rules as we used to. Please do not come to me at the last minute asking that a bill be held for amendment or any other purpose. Every bill that is on this calendar has appeared before as a tabled bill. If you have an objection to it, an amendment to it, the time to let me know

so I can voice that objection for you to the Rules Committee is before it is taken from the table and placed on the calendar for a vote. Once we place bills or resolutions on the calendar for a vote, it is my intention that we vote them unless the House overrules that intention.

Secondly, the Rules Committee will meet at 12 noon tomorrow. The purpose of the meeting will be to put before the Rules Committee on its agenda any bill or resolution which you as a member desire to have voted on this week. If you have been asleep and have not given it to us beforehand, that will be your last opportunity. You will have to give that to me today or tomorrow morning for the agenda so we can bring it up in the Rules Committee so that it may be reported from the table. If you have any bill or resolution that you wish voted on before the next voting session—and that is 3 weeks away. We shall be off next week, the week following, and the week after that is a committee-meeting week. So not until the passage of 4 weeks from today shall we be voting again. So if you have a bill or a resolution that you feel must be voted prior to that date, you will please notify me today or before 12 noon tomorrow so that we can put it on the agenda of the Rules Committee, with the possibility of putting it on the calendar.

I am advised by the Speaker that we cannot, under the rules, vote resolutions first. I had hoped to call up resolutions tomorrow for the first vote in order to give you a chance to get in your seats. But we revised the rules, and the order of business says we must take final-passage bills first, then third-consideration, then second-, et cetera. So I caution you, you had better be in your seat on time tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock—I think that is correct, is it not, Mr. Speaker? It is 1 o'clock—because we shall be calling up for a vote important final-passage and third-consideration bills. Remember, do not come running to us asking to put your bill up for a vote. We cannot do it unless it passes through the Rules Committee, and the last meeting of the Rules Committee this week will be tomorrow at 12 noon.
