INTRODUCED BY MR. McCLATCHY, MAY 10, 1979.

AS AMENDED ON SECOND CONSIDERATION, IN SENATE, JUNE 5, 1979.

An Act

amending the act of July 1, 1978 (No. 56A), entitled "An act appropriating the Federal augmentation to the Executive and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth and establishing restricted receipts accounts for the fiscal period July 1, 1978 to June 30, 1979 and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal period ending June 30, 1978," changing and adding appropriations.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Sections 2 and 3, subsections (a) of sections 4, 5 and 6, act of July 1, 1978 (No. 56A), known as the "Federal Augmentation Appropriation Act of 1978," amended September 27, 1978 (No. 61A), are amended by changing and adding items to read:

Section 2. The following sums, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Federal augmentation funds to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth for the payment of the expenses of implementing and carrying out the programs stated herein for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1978 and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal period ending June 30, 1978.

I. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

To the Governor

(b) Office of Administration

The following Federal augmentation amounts, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriat-

ed to supplement the sum of \$3,061,000 appropriated from Commonwealth revenues for administration:
