FINAL PASSAGE BILL CONSIDERED

Agreeable to order,

The House proceeded to the consideration on final passage of **HB 2003, PN 3282**, entitled:

An Act amending the "Public School Code of 1949," approved March 10, 1949 (P. L. 30, No. 14), providing for handicapped student programs in excess of one hundred eighty days, and for the voluntary recitation of prayer in public schools.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, I have marked on my calendar that there are a number of amendments to be offered.

The SPEAKER. The Chair has no notice on his calendar as to amendments to HB 2003.

Mr. IRVIS. There are amendments, and I beg the Chair's pardon. It is not the fault of the Chair; it is my fault. My calendar was marked "amend George" and I took it to be Margaret George, but Bud George also has an amendment, and Mr. Pievsky has an amendment, so if you would pass it over temporarily, Mr. Speaker, I would appreciate it.

BILL PASSED OVER TEMPORARILY

The SPEAKER. Without objection, HB 2003 will be passed over temporarily. The Chair hears none.

**RECONSIDERATION OF VOTE
ON HB 1019**

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I move that the vote by which HB 1019, PN 2712, was passed on April 30, 1980, be reconsidered.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority whip. Mr. S. E. HAYES. Mr. Speaker, I second the motion.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Taddonio.

Mr. TADDONIO. Mr. Speaker, I think it is regrettable that we have to stand here today reconsidering this bill which was passed by a very large margin last week largely through the efforts of the staff of our regulatory agency, the Public Utility Commission.

This bill is not new; it has been around this legislature for approximately 9 months. It has been extensively debated in committee. In fact, we considered it in the Consumer Affairs Committee on a number of different occasions. I personally have met with the staff of the PUC on a number of occasions. I have met with the commissioners, with Chairman Goode, also with Chairman Shanaman about this specific subject. We have gone over this thing at length. Unfortunately, it seems as if, since the PUC opposed this, the day after it passed, they came up with some new set of figures which they blasted in the newspapers across the Commonwealth, and I say these are completely new figures which we never saw before. Because of this, they have set a cloud on this whole thing, and, unfortunately, we are standing here today to reconsider this thing. You know, it is interesting; I have figures here, given to me by the Consumer Advocate, which show the exact opposite. But now we are in this situation where we have the staff of that agency over there coming here, doing our work, telling us what to do. I think that is a shame. It is regrettable.

I reluctantly support this motion because I think it is in the best interests that we clear the thing up once and for all, but I do think that we have been had by the staff of the PUC, mainly because they object to this legislation, and they are going to use any kind of tactic like this to prevent its passage. I think we should be on the alert for things like this, and just because we have philosophical differences on a bill, there is no need to hide information or to come up with stuff at the last minute. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question recurs,

**AMENDED HOUSE BILL RETURNED
FOR CONCURRENCE CONSIDERED**

An Act amending the "Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement Law," approved February 1, 1974 (P. L. 34, No. 15), providing that a person receiving a retirement allowance be a member of the Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement Board and further providing for the actuarial soundness of the fund, for excess interest, for payment of administrative funds from excess interest earnings, for member's excess investment account, for excess investment earnings, for joining the fund, for municipal liability, for credit for other governmental service, for contributions, for return to service and for computation of benefits.

The SPEAKER. The Chair welcomes to the hall of the House Mr. Ted Mullin, who is a guest of the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Gray.

RESOLUTIONS CONTINUED

Mr. J. L. WRIGHT called up HR 199, PN 3249, entitled:

Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency investigate the use of the National Weather Service reporting system for broadcasting emergency alert information.

On the question,
Will the House adopt the resolution?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Hoeffel.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Democratic members of the Three Mile Island committee, I was wondering if you would extend some latitude to me so that I could make some general comments about the whole package that Mr. Wright is asking us to vote on today.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, the gentleman probably should know that we are not intending to run HR 308 and HR 309 on page, I think, 16.

Mr. HOFFFEL. That would be HR 208 and HR 209?

Mr. RYAN. I am sorry, HR 208 and HR 209. Other than that, it would be my intention that all of the TMI resolutions run, and the gentleman is suggesting that he can make a general statement at this time on all those resolutions other than HR 208 and HR 209 and then we can just run the package? Is that generally what you are saying?

Mr. HOFFFEL. That is what I am saying, Mr. Speaker. I would like to make one statement, and in fact, I was going to exclude from my statement my comments on HR 208 and HR 209 anyway.

Mr. RYAN. All right. I have no objection. I am all in favor of it, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Hoeffel, has asked unanimous consent to make a brief statement on the entire package of resolutions before us. The Chair hears no objection, and the gentleman may proceed.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Mr. Speaker, as an individual legislator and as a member of the Three Mile Island committee, I can find no objection to voting on these particular resolutions today. Certainly no particular point in the package would cause me to cast any votes in the negative. I personally intend to vote in favor of these resolutions, with the exception of HR 208 and HR 209 which, I guess, we will be taking up at a later time. But on behalf of the Three Mile Island committee, at least the Democratic members, and on behalf of myself as someone who is interested in nuclear power and the future of it in Pennsylvania, I am disappointed by the package that we have in front of us. You will find my name, Mr. Speaker, as a cosponsor of these particular bills, but I just do not feel that they go far enough, and I wanted just to make a few general comments about the disappointment that many of us feel in that the end result of the Three Mile Island committee has been a package of resolutions that we do not feel is strong enough or firm enough or really is using the power of this General Assembly to shape the events that affect all of our constituents.

I could list some specific objections to these resolutions. For example, some of the recommendations that are included in this package have already been implemented. HR 200, for example, encourages the Department of Agriculture to conduct emergency planning to care for household pets and domestic farm animals in the event of a nuclear accident. Well, the Department of Agriculture has already done that planning, and we have that in a letter from the secretary of the department. HR 204 will urge PEMA - Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency - and the Department of Environmental Resources to install radiation monitoring devices around nuclear sites in the Commonwealth. Well, the department has already done that pursuant to action that this General Assembly took to appropriate the money to buy those monitoring devices. Those two resolutions I find not to be terribly crucial at this time.

But more frustrating, Mr. Speaker, are some of the other resolutions that are recommending action and urging action that we ought to be mandating as a General Assembly. For example, HR 201 urges state officials to train state and local personnel in emergency reactions. Well, there is no need for us to urge state officials to do this. We could mandate it as a General Assembly, and we should. HR 202 urges the PUC to assess utilities to cover the cost of emergency training. We do not have to urge the PUC to assess the utilities. We could do it by state statutes, and many of us feel we ought to. HR 207 urges the creation of state nuclear plant inspectors. We do not have to urge the creation of that, Mr. Speaker. We ought to mandate it by state law. HR 206 urges the Governor and the Department of Banking to establish a records system to protect the permanent records of the department in case of a nuclear accident. Again we should mandate that the department does that. HR 212 urges the Department of Education to plan for educational programs on nuclear power. Well, I just do

not think we should be urging or recommending or encouraging. We ought to be mandating.

These are areas, Mr. Speaker, where there is no conflict between state and Federal prerogatives. None of these items that I have just gone over infringe upon any of the rights of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and do not enter into that tension that we are in now between Federal prerogatives and state prerogatives. What we are doing in these resolutions is failing to live up to the mandates that we ought to be imposing as a matter of course as a General Assembly. Instead of telling our Department of Agriculture to do something, we are urging them in these resolutions, and I think it is a great mistake to take this very passive role on what is a very important issue for Pennsylvania.

I would like to point out that the Democratic members of the TMI committee introduced HB 2373—and notice I said “bill,” Mr. Speaker; it is not a resolution but a bill—that would do many of the things that are included in the resolutions we are voting on today. Unfortunately, that bill remains in committee. It would assess the utilities a certain amount of money to pay for emergency planning. It would conduct some of those emergency training programs that are urged in the Wright resolutions. Well, again many of the members of the TMI committee and particularly our Democratic chairman, Mr. O’Brien, felt that we ought to be mandating this in state law.

So the general statement that I have is that I am disappointed that the package of resolutions before us is so unwilling to confront this issue and to give this General Assembly an opportunity to state very clearly the direction we want our state government going in this question of the future of nuclear power in Pennsylvania. There are no teeth at all in these resolutions, and I think the best we are going to do in this is simply gum the bureaucrats to death. We are not imposing anything on them, and I think it is a great mistake. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, briefly in response to the gentleman from Montgomery, I would call to his attention—and I am sure that he has observed this—that the entire series, almost without exception—I think there are one or two exceptions—of resolutions were amended in the Rules Committee. The Rules Committee inserted amendments that would provide that the various recipients of the resolutions specifically report back to the chairman of the Three Mile Island committee within a period of 30 days on the status of the recommendations contained in the resolutions.

It was the feeling of the Rules Committee or at least this speaker that the area of expertise required to react to the subject of the resolutions is such that perhaps they are better able to address these issues than is the General Assembly as a whole. If, however, at the end of the 30 days they should report back that they have taken no action or that they are making no movements in accordance with the resolution, I think then at that time the chairman of the Three Mile Island committee and, of course, any of its

members are better armed to introduce specific legislation. That is just an observation, Mr. Speaker, that I think should be added to your own observations.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Hoeffel.

Mr. HOEFFEL. I do not want to prolong this discussion. I would like to point out to the majority leader what he well knows, that the TMI committee had some 21 meetings last summer and last fall in which we talked to all of these executive department heads, the Secretaries of Banking and Agriculture and Education and so on and so forth. We had ample opportunity to urge them to do things, and, in fact, they have done some of these things contained in the Wright package because we did urge them, as a select committee of the House, to conduct these kinds of things. But the time for urging and the time for encouragement, in my view, is over, and I think we are missing an opportunity to say very clearly where we want to go in our own state government.

Again, this is not confronting the problems we have with the NRC and everything else. This is simply addressing the state bureaucracy that should do what we tell it to do, and we are just letting the buck slide right by us. It is not stopping with us; it is not stopping with the Governor; it is sliding right by. I think it is a very wasted opportunity for us to say what we think should be done as the result of very lengthy hearings, 21 hearings. We have had all the time in the world to ask the secretaries of the departments for reaction and to encourage them to report back. The time for that is long gone, and I think we are really missing the boat here today.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, again in brief response, it seems to me that the response we should make to the banking implications of a TMI episode, to the agricultural implications of a TMI episode, these are things that really require, for a change, the expertise of the bureaucracy. I think it is very farreaching. For us to introduce legislation at this time to cover matters that really can be done administratively by the respective bureaus, I believe, is a mistake.

I concur in your resolution, Mr. Speaker. You signed that resolution. I simply added the amendment to say, give us a report within 30 days, unlike most resolutions that pass this House. I would say in 99 out of 100 resolutions that pass this House, there is no request for a response from the recipient of the resolution. In this case, though, we made amendments to provide that we want to hear from you; do not circularize in a circular wastepaper basket this resolution; we want to hear from you within 30 days to find out what, if any, reaction you have to our resolution. I think that would then build the case to allow us to introduce legislation that would be more specific.

I was not on that committee. I really only amended a resolution that you cosponsored, Mr. Speaker, together with the other members of the committee. I did not realize that it perhaps might become politicized when it got on the floor. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Berks, Mr. Davies.

Mr. DAVIES. Mr. Speaker, I just want to ask the majority leader one or two questions of interrogation in reference to the resolutions.

The SPEAKER. Will the majority leader, Mr. Ryan, stand for interrogation? The gentleman indicates that he will. Mr. Davies may proceed.

Mr. DAVIES. In the holding of HR 208 and HR 209, Mr. Speaker, it will be possible then for us to add amendments concerning some of the things that happened since TMI to those resolutions? Particularly I address myself relatively to not just the siting and the handling of hazardous waste but the transportation of the same.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, without making a close study of HR 208 and HR 209, I would say that they would be in a position to be amended if the amendments are germane. Standard rules.

Mr. DAVIES. All right, Mr. Speaker, just a brief statement then in view of what happened in Middletown Borough on the night of April 18. I think we have to seriously look at that issue as far as the matter of the handling of it, because I think that we can ill afford any recurrence of the potential that could have happened on the highways of this Commonwealth or any site, any area between here and Hanford, Washington, with the occurrence that happened in that particular borough, and I would have an amendment ready to address ourselves specifically to that question.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Hoeffel, for the third time.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Mr. Speaker, can I interrogate Mr. Wright?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Wright, indicates he will stand for interrogation. Mr. Hoeffel may proceed.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Mr. Speaker, do you intend to—let me take a step back. The majority leader has said that what makes these resolutions so good is the fact that we are requiring the various department heads and secretaries and the Governor himself to issue reports to us at the end of a 30-day period after we encourage them to investigate these various activities. Do you anticipate and will you give us a commitment now that the Three Mile Island committee will meet as a committee to review the results of these statements from the various agency heads?

Mr. J. L. WRIGHT. I will give you my personal promise that if those reports come to my hands, they will be circulated to you.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Well, that is not quite my question, Mr. Speaker. My question is, will there be a final meeting of the TMI committee to evaluate these reports that your majority leader is putting so much stock in?

Mr. J. L. WRIGHT. I am not sure how to handle your question, Mr. Speaker, because the committee does not exist.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Well, Mr. Speaker, we never met, as you know, finally to adopt a report or to approve these

resolutions or any other resolutions, and some of us felt that was a mistake. Now the majority leader is saying that the great advantage of your package of resolutions is that the Rules Committee is requiring a response from the executive branch within a 30-day period. That response is only going to be worth something if the members of the TMI committee are going to see it as a committee and be able to act on it.

Mr. J. L. WRIGHT. I gave you my assurance that you will receive copies of those replies. Is there any doubt in your mind that I would not?

Mr. HOFFFEL. No, Mr. Speaker, but there is doubt in my mind whether our Three Mile Island committee is going to meet again, and I would like to get a commitment from you whether it will.

Mr. J. L. WRIGHT. I will keep my assurances, Mr. Speaker. When I receive my reports, you will get a copy of them and, if necessary, we will call together an informal committee to decide what to suggest to the Rules Committee or the leadership to do.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Mr. Speaker, what will happen with these reports? Are we to evaluate them as individual legislators and then decide individually whether we are going to introduce follow-up bills as the majority leader mentioned could be a possibility? We are setting up this procedure and we are asking for information and responses from the executive branch, but we do not have any procedure to handle the response.

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Hoeffel, rise?

Mr. HOFFFEL. I am still waiting for an answer to my last question, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the majority leader rise?

Mr. RYAN. The gentleman got his answer. There is no committee right now. How can he call a meeting? Mr. Wright came over and asked me about it. I said if you have no committee in being, you can hardly call a committee meeting. That is your answer.

Mr. HOFFFEL. Well, that is a good answer, Mr. Speaker. I might add that there was a resolution introduced to continue the life of the Three Mile Island Committee to meet this very kind of problem so that we would be able to deal with future developments. And, again, that resolution, like the other Democratic resolutions and bills, has not come out of committee.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I said in passing when I made my comments, which were not political, that I felt that Mr. Hoeffel was up trying to politicize this issue. There are resolutions which he cosponsored before this House; he asked permission to make a general statement regarding all those resolutions. I would ask that we now get on to the adoption or the rejection of those resolutions, and if Mr. Hoeffel has other political problems, I would just as soon he wait until happy hour to discuss them. I do not think they are relevant to what is before the House.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Columbia, Mr. Stuban. For what purpose does the gentleman rise?

Mr. STUBAN. I would like to ask the majority leader a question or two.

The SPEAKER. The question before the House is the adoption of HR 199. Will the majority leader permit himself to be interrogated on HR 199?

Mr. RYAN. I will.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Stuban may proceed.

Mr. STUBAN. Mr. Speaker, since these resolutions are on the calendar—and I think the resolutions are all worthwhile resolutions, and I am one of the cosponsors—what purpose are we going to serve with these resolutions if we adopt them all here today? There are reports that are sent out; there is no meeting that has been called; there is no committee. What are we going to gain by adopting these resolutions?

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I do not know. You cosponsored it. Why did you do that?

Mr. STUBAN. Well, I cosponsored it because I thought there would be some good legislation come out of this, but since we are all just going to be sent a report, the chairman of the committee is not going to do anything about it, we are not going to call a meeting and discuss it, I really think it is a waste of paper, and I heard somebody here sometime ago say we are going to send it down there and that big shredder is going to shred it up and that is about all we are going to get out of it.

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman yield? The question before the House is HR 199. The Chair has been very lenient in permitting the debate to go far beyond this piece of legislation. The Chair would suggest that we take up each resolution as it comes before us on the calendar.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, may I respond to the interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The Chair would hope that the gentleman would sit down at this point so that we could stop this.

Mr. RYAN. Are you going to let him get the last word in? All right, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. STUBAN. If the majority leader is going to sit down, and this is the request of the Speaker, I will sit down. And after we adopt the resolutions and get the report, I am sure that I will be back up on the floor, because I am going to have one of these plants in my back yard, and I think there are a lot of questions that this House should be answering.

SB 1200, PN 1608

An Act amending the act of May 17, 1956 (1955 P. L. 1609, No. 537), entitled "Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority Act," providing for the designation of critical economic areas annually or for periods of less than one year; changing the definition of industrial enterprise to include office buildings utilized as National or regional headquarters or computer or clerical operations centers; correcting the definition of industrial development fund; adding the definition of small business; extending the life of the Authority; repealing clauses (c) and (d) of section 6; providing for increased percentages of loans to be made to industrial development agencies based upon varying and increased rates of unemployment in critical economic areas and providing for larger loans for small businesses and removing the industrial development agency project percentage in certain instances.

HOUSE SCHEDULE

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority whip.

Mr. S. E. HAYES. As was announced last week, it is our intention to begin our consideration of HB 1671, the proposed school code. The legislation which is on our calendar right now is the same printer's number which the bill carried prior to our breaking for Christmas 1979.

I respectfully request cooperation on the part of all members if you feel compelled to offer amendments to HB 1671. Please, please, get your amendments drafted immediately and have them circulated. This bill has been on the calendar the better part of 6 months now, on the active calendar, more than enough time to have our amendments drafted and circulated.

It is my understanding, in talking with Legislative Reference Bureau, that approximately 100 amendments have been requested and drafted. Those amendments have not been circulated. Please have your amendments circulated so the two caucuses can review your amendment and have it considered properly on the floor of this House.

It is not my intention to handle this bill like some bills are handled from time to time, in a helter-skelter way. Let us consider this bill in a systematic and deliberative way. We will start with chapter 1 and go through the bill. Now it will require the cooperation of everyone - leadership and committee chairmen and those who have an interest in this legislation. Get your amendments drafted, please.

It is the intention of our caucus and, I believe, the other one as well to begin reviewing what the Education Committee has sent to us so that we can develop a level of understanding with regard to the present printer's number. After that we are going to consider amendments. Probably the first amendment to be considered or one of the earliest to be considered is the one dealing with the state Board of Education, chapter 5. But I implore you to please get your amendments drafted so that we have time to see where there is duplication, to see where there is conflict in the writing of those amendments, and so there is time to collate these amendments in a systematic way so they can be properly considered. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. IRVIS. Mr. Speaker, I concur 100 percent with the gentleman, Mr. Hayes. HB 1671 is going to be a long and probably arduous bill to consider, and the only way for us to do it is systematically.

I would urge all the Democratic members who have amendments to make sure those amendments are prepared. Make certain those amendments are circulated. Be sure those amendments are in the hands of Mr. Hayes, in the hands of Mr. Gallagher, so that they have them for the

respective caucuses. And I would urge the Democrats, on the declaration of the caucus, which will be coming momentarily, to attend this caucus so that we may get started on the consideration of the bill itself and the amendments to be offered thereto. That will be the most important business we have to take care of this week and possibly next week, and we will not be able to do it unless we are informed. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
