COMMUNICATION FROM GOVERNOR

REORGANIZATION PLAN NO. 9 PRESENTED

The Secretary to the Governor presented the following communication from His Excellency, the Governor:

REORGANIZATION PLAN No. 9.

Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Governor's Office Harrisburg

December 7, 1981

TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA:

By the authority vested in me by the Act of April 7, 1955 (P.L. 23, NO. 8), known as the "Reorganization Act of 1955", I transmit herewith Reorganization Plan No. 9 of 1981. The purpose of this proposed plan is to transfer the State Plan Coordinate System from the Department of Community Affairs to the Department of Transportation.

The State Plan Coordinate System serves to coordinate the activities of Federal, State and private interests engaged in geodetic activities. As such, the responsibilities of the unit include the following: to define and state the positions and location of points on the surface of the earth; to establish or fix triangulation and traverse stations; to collect, check, coordinate and preserve survey data; to advise with parties using the system of coordinates; to supervise the marking of surveys which are to become a part of the system; to keep official records of all surveys and maps; and to administer the law establishing the Pennsylvania Coordinate System.

This Reorganization Plan will place geodetic functions in the Bureau of Design which is supervised by the Chief Highway Engineer for the Department of Transportation. The Department of

Transportation is currently staffed and equipped to provide the framework for a comprehensive program to efficiently perform all necessary functions to establish an accurate and computerized data base for survey control. The Department is likewise well versed in procedures to maximize the use of Federal grants and other funds which will minimize costs to the Commonwealth.

I, therefore, transmit to you and urge your approval of Reorganization Plan No. 9 of 1981.

REORGANIZATION PLAN NO. 9 OF 1981

Section 1. State Plane Coordinate System.

The functions, powers and duties of the Department of Community Affairs with regard to the State Plane Coordinate System as established in section 1210, act of April 9, 1929 (P.L. 177, No. 175), known as "The Administrative Code of 1929," assigning the responsibility for it to the Department of Community Affairs, are hereby transferred to the Department of Transportation.

Section 2. Personnel, records and appropriations.

There are hereby transferred to the Department of Transportation, to be used, employed and expended in connection with the functions, powers and duties transferred by section 1 of this Reorganization Plan, the State Plane Coordinate System, contract obligations, if any, records, files, property, supplies and equipment now being used or held in connection with such functions, powers and duties, and the unexpended balance of appropriations, allocations, Federal grants and other funds available or to be made available for use in connection with such functions, powers and duties.

Mr. MOWERY presented the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

PBM CALLS FOR DAY OF PRAYER

On a quiet Sunday morning, December 7, 1941, peace and tranquility lay over the beautiful harbor in Honolulu, Hawaii. No one would have guessed at that moment that within a few hours that tranquility would explode into flame, fury, and destruction that would leave the United States fleet devastated and 3,700 people dead in the wake of one of the most infamous surprise attacks in history. The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Nahill.

Mr. NAHILL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment has to be discussed in conjunction with the actual package of bills itself. The basic intent of this whole package of bills is to expand the investment opportunities for local governments - counties, townships, boroughs, et cetera. What we are saying in this bill is that we are eliminating the requirement for a bank to post col-

lateral against a certificate of deposit which has been purchased by a township or a county. Current law states that every single certificate of deposit that is not insured Federally must be secured by 120 percent collateral. This requirement holds down the investment opportunities of local municipalities. The banks are not willing to tie up \$120,000 for each \$100,000 invested with them at a low rate of interest in Federal paper.

We are asking that under the aegis of the supervisors or commissioners or councilmen, that they be allowed to invest in certificates of deposit, and we are eliminating this provision for 120 percent collateral. We are saying that the municipalities can invest as much as they want with a bank, commercial savings institution, et cetera, up to 20 percent of their deposits. This will allow a municipality to increase the interest earned and to reduce the taxes on the local level.

In addition, a problem has arisen recently with a series of bills which we passed last year which by omission took away some of the powers that municipal pension funds had to invest funds. The Auditor General's office has issued a ruling that pension funds can no longer invest in stocks and bonds, but only those things under which they can invest in the General Fund. By passing this series of bills last year, we did not mean to eliminate this right, and I am reinstating the right.

They have in addition asked that all stocks and bonds purchased since the passage of those bills be sold. We do not want to do that. We want them to continue exactly as they have in the past. So I am asking that we please look at this feature, talk to our municipalities, and find out exactly what this has done.

Now I will get to the amendment. The amendment simply cleans up some of the language and says that we will ensure that the money is invested in institutions which are located within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. We want to keep our money here. We do not want it flowing out of State. So, basically, it is those three items that we are dealing with in this whole series of bills, and I should not have to discuss them more than once, I would not think. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
