STATEMENT BY MR. VROON

TERCENTENARY COMMITTEE ON THIS DAY IN HISTORY

The SPEAKER. The Chair at this time recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Mr. Vroon, for the purpose of giving us "This Day in History."

Mr. VROON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

On this day in history in 1777 the British Army attacked Continental troops in an ambush which became known as the Paoli Massacre. The story began 9 days earlier, when Gen. George Washington failed in his attempts to stop a British advance at Brandywine.

After Brandywine the British nearly clashed with the Americans north of West Chester in what became known as the Battle of the Clouds because it was actually rained out.

As the British advanced to Tredyffrin, American Gen. "Mad" Anthony Wayne was ordered to place his troops behind the British line. It was in Malvern—actually 2 miles from Paoli—that General Wayne hid his troops.

The secret of Wayne's position was not well kept, and on September 20, 1777, General Howe dispatched Maj. Gen. Charles Grey to dispose of Wayne's forces to allow a British attack on Philadelphia.

General Grey's troops planned a secret attack, and the general ordered his troops to remove the flints from their guns and use only bayonets. The Continental troops were greatly outnumbered and caught by surprise.

Some 150 Americans were killed in the slaughter that ensued. Those who fought for independence used the Paoli Massacre as proof of British barbarity for the remainder of the revolution.

Cries of "Remember Paoli" were heard for years after the skirmish, which occurred 205 years ago on this day in history. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION CONTINUED

The House proceeded to third consideration of **SB 1185, PN 1424**, entitled:

An Act amending Title 40 (Insurance) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for ancillary health services.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Mr. Vroon.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, I am very much opposed to this bill, because I do not believe it is necessary in the first place. The clinical operators are being taken care of very well as it is. There is really no big improvement except that they might get their money a little bit faster. But on the other hand there is a disadvantage here, and that is it imposes discrimination against smaller insurers of health. In other words, the large insurers like Blue Cross and Blue Shield are given a special advantage in this situation because they can bargain directly with the clinical laboratories for a special fee, whereas the smaller insurers cannot do that and they will be driven against the wall. Consequently, this does give an advantage, a competitive advantage, to the third-party insurers who are large, and I do not think that is fair. In behalf of the many insurance companies who do sell this insurance, I think that we ought to oppose this bill and let it continue the way it has been going.

Now, the way it has been going, they have been getting their money mainly through doctors who order the clinical supplies from these clinical laboratories. There has not been anything wrong with that approach and nobody has demonstrated, to my satisfaction at least, that we need to make it much easier for them and then in the process discriminate against smaller insurers of these services, so I would appreciate very much a negative vote on this bill.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Mifflin, Mr. DeVerter.

Mr. DeVERTER. Mr. Speaker, rather than protract the debate, I do disagree with my colleague, Mr. Vroon. I am going to yield the floor to Mr. Dorr from York County.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from York, Mr. Dorr.

Mr. DORR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak on this bill, because I think it represents an opportunity for small business people in Pennsylvania who operate laboratories on a private basis to compete adequately with others who have distinct advantages in that they are associated with doctors' offices or, in many cases, hospitals and other central points of dispensing health care. The small laboratory operator in the Commonwealth, in my judgment, deserves as much as those people do to be paid directly by the third-party health care insurers, and that really is the central point of this bill. It simply allows those people who are operating the laboratories to be paid directly by the third-party carriers, and I would urge a favorable vote on the bill.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Mifflin, Mr. DeVerter.

Mr. DeVERTER. Mr. Speaker, one follow-up point to that for the members.

The problem that now exists without that direct pay is that many times the individuals are being sent the reimbursement and it is not in fact getting to that clinical laboratory for the services that were rendered, so I would ask for an affirmative vote on SB 1185. Thank you.
