The SPEAKER. The Chair points out that the minority whip is making an inquiry of the majority leader which is important to all those members who wish to offer amendments to the capital budget bill.

Mr. MANDERINO. There are three capital budget bills on the calendar. One has to do with bridges; one has to do with highways; one has to do with the General Fund. The General Fund is being recommitted. We have already received the Senate bill. The intention of the Appropriations Committee is to coordinate the two and run with the Senate bill. Mr. HAYES. Should the members prepare their amendments to the new Senate bill, or will the Appropriations Committee do that for us?

Mr. MANDERINO. If the amendments have been given to the Appropriations Committee, they will handle them as they have been given to the Senate bill. If they have not been prepared and the committee has not been informed, I suggest they be informed. We would like to avoid having the bill back on the calendar subject to a long amendment process again.

The SPEAKER. Has the minority whip concluded his interrogation?

Mr. HAYES. I would just like to echo what the majority leader said. If Representatives have prepared their amendments to HB 1629, PN 2179, they should make their intentions known to the Appropriations chairman so that they can incorporate those various projects into the Senate bill so when it comes back out on the calendar we are ready to roll the bill. So since the Senate has already passed a capital budget bill, the Appropriations Committee chairman is making an effort to not only have our projects considered but also those coming over from the Senate and have it go back to the Senate on concurrence so that it can then go to the Governor yet this month so that we enter the new construction season at full tilt. Otherwise, we may not get these budget bills done until late in the winter or early spring, and that would delay some of these projects as far as 1984 is concerned. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Freind.

Mr. FREIND. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment is for the 10 percent of the required 90-10 Federal-State match for the Route 30 interchange on the Lancaster Pike in Radnor for the Blue Route. Every plan for the Blue Route has included the Route 30 interchange, and virtually every business and labor group that has discussed this issue realizes that if the Blue Route is going to be constructed, it is absolutely essential that it contain the interchange on Route 30. I would ask for your affirmative approval of this amendment.

The SPEAKER. Does the gentleman from Chester, Mr. Flick, wish to be recognized on the Freind amendment?

Mr. FLICK. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is so recognized and may proceed.

Mr. FLICK. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, I ask for the attention of the members in the House. Earlier today I spoke with the president of the Radnor Board of Commissioners, which is the municipality in which this interchange is located. I also spoke with the Deputy Secretary for Planning in the Department of Transportation and asked that I be delivered on the House floor a letter which would outline the department's current policy and current feelings in this area. I have that letter, and I would like to read it to the members. I will paraphrase part of the letter— No, I will not; I guess I will read the whole thing:

Dear Mr. Flick:

This letter is provided as a follow up to our phone conversation this morning regarding the Blue Route (Interstate 476) and specifically regarding the proposed interchanges with U.S. Route 30 and Pennsylvania Route 3.

The Department is presently reviewing comments received in public hearings on the Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement. In reviewing comments and investigating options for responding to issues raised, we have found ways to further mitigate some of the adverse environmental impacts associated with the alignment recommended in the FHWA approved EIS. While a final decision has not been made yet, we are very encouraged by our initial findings.

With respect to the proposed interchanges at U.S. Route 30 and Pennsylvania Route 3, the Department's position is that the Blue Route would be of great benefit to the Commonwealth as well as the Country with or without the interchanges. We plan to develop and construct the Blue Route regardless. Our schedule for reviewing and investigating ways to respond to comments raised during the Public Hearing and Review Process calls for submission to the Federal Highway Administration by January 13, 1984. At that time we will announce the details of our decision as well as new initiatives being taken to make the Blue Route both an acceptable as well as high service element of the regional highway network.

Mr. Speaker, I think we have the cart before the horse here when we are proposing to add to the supplemental appropriations budget funding for an interchange which the department in its additional impact statement has not yet decided they wish to pursue. They have advised me that in the future if they wish to add this, it can so be done.

I would respectfully request that this body hold off adding to the supplemental appropriation funding for this interchange until such time as the final submission is made by the Department of Transportation to the Federal Highway Authority on January 14, 1984. I urge a "no" vote at this time. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the Freind amendment, the Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I find myself in a very peculiar position with Mr. Freind on one side of an amendment and Mr. Flick on the other side. However, I support Mr. Freind for a number of reasons. I think this amendment should go in.

This would not be the actual spending of the money. The fact that this amendment goes in, Mr. Speaker, does not mean that the interchange goes in but rather that it is available to be matched with Federal dollars should the final outcome of the hearings be favorable to the construction of that particular interchange.

Mr. Speaker, since 1962 when I first ran for office, I ran at that time with Governor Scranton, and the Blue Route was one of his main points of interest. Later on I watched both Mr. Broderick, then Lieutenant Governor, and Governor Shapp both say that the Blue Route was important. In every gubernatorial campaign since 1962, it was a prime target of all candidates to erect and construct the Blue Route, because the county and suburban Philadelphia need the Blue Route.

I would ask at this time that Mr. Freind's amendment be accepted despite the fact that there are still some studies pending. It is not necessary that the money be spent if it is determined that this interchange should not be erected, but I would like the authority to do it and, accordingly, support Mr. Freind's amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Civera.

Mr. CIVERA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the Freind amendment. If this interchange is to be left out, it would be a great step backward for the Blue Route. It also would increase the traffic flow for the Upper Darby and Haverford Township area in the Delaware County region. We cannot go backward in this proposal, for as Mr. Ryan has said, we in Delaware County have waited for this route for many, many years, and to step a step backward would be a great mistake. So I urge my colleagues to support the Freind amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Mr. Flick, for the second time on the Freind amendment.

Mr. FLICK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I only wish to make one thing perfectly clear. Today we are not discussing the merits or lack thereof of the Blue Route; we are discussing an interchange within a community which is in my legislative district. The governing body, the Radnor Board of Commissioners, the president, whom I spoke with this morning, would wish and ask this austere body to hold off approving the supplemental appropriation for this interchange until such time as the environmental impact study has officially been submitted to the Federal Highway Administration, which will be in mid-January. This interchange can always go into a supplemental funding bill at some later date. Construction is years away. Thank you.

Mr. FREEMAN, Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What this amendment does is repeal an earlier authorization for the southern quarter of I-78 that was approved in 1970 and 1973. It replaces that with an authorization for I-78 to run concurrently with Route 22 in the Lehigh Valley.

PennDOT studies and a study done by the Lehigh University have shown that a southern quarter would only relieve roughly 20 percent of the congestion that is now experienced on Route 22, whereas if 1-78 were built on Route 22, we would in effect be solving the whole congestion problem.

The southern quarter of I-78 as planned will not solve the transportation needs of the Lehigh Valley. It will end up costing taxpayers over half a billion dollars to build, would have severe negative effects in terms of creating suburban sprawl, would probably severely affect the attempts to recover the downtown business districts to bring a renaissance in downtown Allentown, Bethlehem, and Easton, and would also rob that region of the State of some very prime farmland. By putting I-78 on Route 22, we solve that transportation problem. I urge a "yes" vote for this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

In my district is the historic and quaint village of Newtown Borough. For 16 years, the local people in the community have been attempting to get a bypass built around that borough to keep out an incredible amount of truck traffic and vehicular traffic due to the growing residential area in the community. Recently, just this September, PennDOT informed the community that after 16 years of waiting, the bypass would not be constructed in four lanes, but it would be constructed in two lanes now and two lanes sometime in the undetermined future.

This amendment would add \$7.9 million to insure that all four lanes of the bypass are built simultaneously. It is, in my view, awfully bad planning to build two lanes of a bypass now and not complete the total project when you have the equipment on the scene. We are afraid that if we have two lanes built now, no one will use the bypass because it will be so clogged with truck traffic that the motorists will still continue to go through the town, and I would ask the support of the House on this important amendment. Thank you.

BILL PASSED OVER TEMPORARILY

The SPEAKER. Without objection, the bill will go over temporarily. The Chair hears no objection.

WELCOME

The SPEAKER. The Chair is delighted to welcome to the hall of the House the mayor of the city of New Castle, Mayor Angelo Sands, who is here as the guest of Representatives Fee and Pratt.

BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION CONTINUED

The House proceeded to third consideration of HB 132, PN 956, entitled:

An Act amending Title 66 (Public Utilities) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, prohibiting natural gas utilities from utilizing a sliding scale of rates to recover natural gas costs; and further providing for procedures and standards for regulating the rates of natural gas utilities.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration? Bill was agreed to.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Itkin.

Mr. ITKIN. Mr. Speaker, every once in a while a bill comes to the floor of the House which has the appearance of being proconsumer, but on closer reflection one then sees that what may appear on the surface to be proconsumer in the final analysis will probably cost the consumer more money than if the law had stayed the same. This is the situation with HB 132.

HB 132 does, in the body of the legislation, make a number of good changes in the public utility law. On the other hand, its primary thrust, which is the elimination of the gas cost rate, will have a substantial financial effect on all of the consumers in Pennsylvania.

In order to put this into perspective, one should give the members of the House a knowledge of how the gas cost rate was created. I served in the House during the periods of rapidly rising utility costs in which we attempted in the Mines and Energy Management Committee to come to grips with the escalating rise in prices of electricity and in natural gas to a lesser extent. In dealing with that issue, the committee at that time felt that the commission had to change its procedures and adopt a new procedure known as the energy gas cost rate.

I personally believe that this particular procedure has worked reasonably well. What it does is, annually in the summertime the gas distribution companies estimate what their gas costs are going to be for the ensuing 12 months and then go before the commission with a request to change their reimbursement for the purchase of gas in tune with their estimates. If they overestimate what the cost will be to them, then they are required in the law to then return to the consumer, refund to the gas consumer, any overcollections that they may have, including interest. In so doing, we then put a natural protective cloak on what the utilities can charge, because if they overcharge, upon subsequent review by the PUC (Public Utility Commission), then they must refund this money plus interest.

What HB 132 does is completely eliminate the energy gas cost rate and require every time the utility experiences higher or projected fuel costs—and I should say no-longer-projected fuel costs, because now the utility will have to come in for a full-blown rate hearing. This means that the utility will have to experience the higher cost before they go in for that rate hearing. They must pay their suppliers with moneys that they do not have on hand, which necessarily requires them to go out into the financial marketplace and borrow the cash necessary to make those payments, which are all legitimate, and the interest to pay the interest on the money that the utilities have borrowed and then go to the PUC for a full-fledged rate hearing and request that they be paid back, through assessments of their customers, the increased cost.

What will happen, Mr. Speaker, is that the interest that the utilities have paid for, perhaps 15 or 16 percent in today's financial circumstances, will then have to be paid by the consumer. Now, most of the consumers do not have those kinds of financial resources to use their moneys in the same way as they recoup those types of interest charges. Generally what they will have is a few percent—if they do save their money, they may make a few percent on a passbook deposit account or in a money market fund, maybe 7 or 8 percent—but then the utilities will necessarily recover from them 15 or 16 percent 9 months or 12 months after a full rate proceeding has occurred. Consequently, in the final analysis we will see that the consumers of Pennsylvania using gas will ultimately be paying more than they would pay had HB 132 not been adopted into law.

MOTION TO RECOMMIT

Mr. ITKIN. There are parts in HB 132 which I think are good and which I think are meritorious, but I believe that not enough attention has been paid to the legislation to extract from it the good part and to leave the bad behind. Mr. Speaker, therefore, I will make a motion at this time that HB 132 be recommitted for further study to the Mines and Energy Management Committee. This committee was the original committee that considered changing the PUC law to include an energy gas cost rate. They have not had the opportunity to consider this measure. This bill came out of the Consumer Affairs Committee, and I would request, therefore, that the Mines and Energy Management Committee also have the opportunity, since it was a nemesis for the energy cost rate, to consider the merits of this bill. Mr. Speaker, I move, therefore, that HB 132 be recommitted to the Mines and Energy Management Committee.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

It has been moved by the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Itkin, that HB 132, PN 956, be recommitted to the Mines and Energy Management Committee.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. The question is on the motion. The Chair will recognize members to speak only on the motion, and you will be held strictly to that motion.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Mr. Vroon, on the motion.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, I support the motion to recommit. I think it is very important because of the severity of the problem here that the Mines and Energy Management Committee also examine all of the evidence, because it has been some time since we have discussed this. Several things have happened since this has been discussed, and I think the expertise of the people in the Mines and Energy Management Committee is very badly needed in this particular instance. I support the motion.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland, Mr. Kukovich, on the motion.

Mr. KUKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Could I pose a question to the Chair before I begin?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman has a parliamentary inquiry? The gentleman will state the parliamentary inquiry.

Mr. KUKOVICH. Mr. Speaker, I wish to speak against recommittal. I want to address the two points that Mr. Itkin raised in his debate for recommittal. Is that appropriate?

The SPEAKER. That is not appropriate. The gentleman, Mr. Itkin, spoke on final passage before he made his motion to recommit. Had he tried to make the same speech after he made the motion to recommit, he would have been closed down by the Chair. It is a device that people who know the rules of the House have used from time immemorial. The gentleman will be limited to speak only to whether he approves or disapproves of the motion to recommit.

For what purpose does the gentleman, Mr. Vroon, interrupt the discussion?

Mr. VROON. Only to request some order, Mr. Speaker. We have not had it yet in discussing this bill, and I think it is very important to have that order.

The SPEAKER. The Chair agrees with you.

On the motion, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Kukovich.

Mr. KUKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Since I cannot respond to the arguments originally made before the recommittal motion and since I will not ask for unanimous consent to do so, I would simply say that those arguments are not entirely necessarily valid. I think the members deserve to hear the entire debate on final passage. I do not mind recommittal motions whenever there is a real purpose to them. The point is that the recommittal motion has been used in the past, I think, erroneously, and I think its attempt to do so now would be a mistake.

I think it is important that this issue be debated on the floor of the House on its merits. We are going to be facing a very cold winter; we are going to be facing a time when consumers are going to be more concerned than ever before about their utility bills, in particular heating bills with natural gas. I think it is imperative that we hear on the floor of the House today the merits of this bill. It has been on the calendar for a long time. Every member has had many opportunities to review this bill to suggest changes or to come up with arguments for it or against it. I think now is the time to move on this bill and vote against recommittal.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the motion, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Crawford, Mr. Merry.

Mr. MERRY. Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the motion to recommit this to committee. At the time this bill was originally proposed, it served a good purpose and it was well drafted, because we looked at a situation of accelerating rate costs. At the present time, if this bill were to pass, our people in northwestern Pennsylvania would be deprived of a cost decrease of \$55 a year, and for that reason it would be improper to consider this at this time. Perhaps the committee can readdress the language so it could better reflect the actual situation as it exists in the month of December 1983.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Beaver, Mr. Laughlin.

Mr. LAUGHLIN. Mr. Speaker, very briefly, the legislation we have before us is supported across this State by every major consumer group in the State, and it is supported, Mr. Speaker, because the gas costs have escalated across the State in every circumstance. The gentleman from the northwest, who just made the statement relative to an increase or a decrease in costs, Mr. Speaker—

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. VROON. A point of order, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair is listening.

Mr. VROON. Are we discussing the bill or are we discussing the merits of the motion?

The SPEAKER. We are discussing the reasons for either recommitting or not recommitting, and the Chair will listen very carefully.

Mr. LAUGHLIN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, as I said, I, like the gentleman who spoke previously, believed that the gas industries across the State would make an effort when this bill was introduced to give us some relief in the State of Pennsylvania on the gas cost passthroughs. Mr. Speaker, this has not happened. Seventeen out of 21 of the majors in this State have gone forThe SPEAKER. Will the gentleman yield.

Will the gentleman state his reasons for being for or against recommittal.

Mr. LAUGHLIN. Yes, Mr. Speaker. I am doing that.

That is that if we do not consider this bill today and we do not have a vote on it today, next September those same gas costs that were passed on in the last 3 years, that have escalated price, that our utilities say they have no control over but in fact this legislation gives them an opportunity to control, we will have lost the opportunity to help the people of this State meet their utility bills. Mr. Speaker, I believe that is a very excellent reason for voting "no" on the motion offered by Representative Itkin.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the motion, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Somerset, Mr. Lloyd.

Mr. LLOYD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to oppose the motion to recommit. First, to address the argument made by the gentleman, Mr. Merry, he makes a valid point. However, if the members would look at the last page of the bill, they would notice that the effective date is 60 days after passage of the bill. Secondly, they would notice that this bill would become effective with the next general rate increase filed by Mr. Merry's gas company. So the particular concern which the gentleman raised as a reason for recommittal really is not a valid reason, because this bill will not affect that transaction at all.

With regard to the arguments made by the gentleman, Mr. Itkin, and the gentleman, Mr. Vroon, most of those arguments, if not all of them, were fully debated in the House Consumer Affairs Committee. The members were aware of those arguments; the members on the floor of the House deserve to become aware of those arguments today, and that is not a valid reason to recommit.

Finally, Mr. Speaker, the argument has been made that somehow sending this bill to the Mines and Energy Management Committee is going to bring about a deliberation which has not taken place and which could not take place if this bill were sent back to Consumer Affairs where it originated and where the members of the committee who were involved in drafting the bill are members. To me, Mr. Speaker, when we have seen that in the past, what we have seen is an effort to kill the bill, not an effort to send it to another committee where it gets due consideration.

So, Mr. Speaker, because I perceive this motion to recommit really as an effort to kill this bill and not an effort to take consideration of new issues and to refine the bill, I urge the members to vote against recommittal, and if the gentlemen who have said that there are so many fine things in this bill but some which are not so fine, I assume they have their amendments ready and we can consider those today. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northampton, Mr. Freeman.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to add my voice in opposition to this motion of recommittal. This bill has been through the committee process where it was extensively studied and examined. It has been on the calendar for some 6 months now where members have had ample time to study and examine this issue. As Mr. Kukovich raised in his remarks, the winter is soon upon us. This bill will provide relief for consumers in terms of gas bills.

I urge a "no" vote on the motion for recommittal.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question of recommittal, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from York, Mr. Lehr.

Mr. LEHR. Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose the move to recommit.

Back in my district I had between 700 and 800 senior citizens contact me to support this legislation. I hope you will not vote to recommit. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Fattah, on the motion.

Mr. FATTAH. Mr. Speaker, I rise also to speak against the motion to recommit. It is a very important bill. Pennsylvanians throughout the Commonwealth are struggling in the areas of being able to pay their utility bills, and I think that the move to recommit would be the wrong signal for this body to send at this time. We need to move the legislation. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes, for the second time on the motion, the gentleman from Chester, Mr. Vroon.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, just very briefly I want to say this, that I am genuinely sincere when I think it ought to go back to the Mines and Energy Committee. For many years the Mines and Energy Committee has done extensive study on this question. I remember very well when Bernie O'Brien was the committee chairman of the House Mines and Energy Management Committee. He came out after extensive study and questioned the advisability of proceeding in this manner. They have an extensive file, and the Consumer Advocate of prior years, Mark Widoff, also looked into this thing extensively. All of this information is available to that committee, and I think we ought to have the benefit of their findings. So I do advocate a "yes" vote on this particular motion.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the motion for the second time, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Beaver, Mr. Laughlin.

Mr. LAUGHLIN. Mr. Speaker, could I possibly question Mr. Vroon just for a second?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Vroon, will stand for interrogation. He indicates he will so stand. The gentleman, Mr. Laughlin, is in order—the interrogation must be on the motion—and may proceed.

Mr. LAUGHLIN. Mr. Speaker, based on that criteria, I will pass up the interrogation.

The SPEAKER. Does the gentleman wish to speak for the second time on the motion?

Mr. LAUGHLIN. Mr. Speaker, the only thing I can offer to the former Representative who spoke about the expertise of the committee is that he sits on the Consumer Affairs Committee, Mr. Speaker, from whence this bill came with a very sound majority voting in favor of it, and I ask the members to vote "no" on the motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The question recurs, will the House adopt the motion offered by the gentleman from Allegheny County, Mr. Itkin? Those in favor of recommittal to the Mines and Energy Committee will vote "aye"; those opposed will vote "no."

On the question recurring, Will the House agree to the motion?

The question was determined in the negative, and the motion was not agreed to.

On the question recurring, Shall the bill pass finally?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland, Mr. Kukovich.

Mr. KUKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to address a couple of the points that were raised prior to the motion to recommit regarding the possibility of costs accruing to the consumer. I would like to rebut a couple of those points, Mr. Speaker.

First of all, the argument was made that without the automatic pass-ons the utilities will be forced to come before the PUC every year for a rate-case filing. Currently, most of the major utilities already come before the PUC for rate hikes. The current PUC law provides a procedure whereby most cases are handled within a 9-month period. So there will be no significant change in rate-case filings if the gas cost rate is abolished.

Secondly, there was a question about whether there would be an improper amount of money charged, and if that problem did exist, then the gas company would be forced to borrow money, and eventually that would be passed on to the consumer. Currently, most utilities are borrowing money for their gas purchases anyway. It is also not clear that the utilities would have to significantly increase any of their borrowing at all to cover those costs, and even if they did borrow larger amounts of money, it is also not necessarily true that the PUC would allow those interest charges to be automatically passed on pursuant to a rate filing. Even if they were, the impact would be rather insignificant, taking it into the proper context with everything involved in a rate case.

Mr. Speaker, there is very little that we can do at the State level in terms of affecting natural gas utilities. It is generally a Federal issue. Probably the only thing we can do is pass legislation such as HB 132.

Basically, when we vote for this legislation, we are doing three things: We are abolishing an automatic pass-on; we are forcing natural gas companies to provide more disclosure to the PUC; and generally the third thing is to try to set up a system in rate filings where we are going to put pressure on our 43 gas utilities in this State to buy the least costly gas. We are going to force them through HB 132 to put pressure on down the line to get the cheapest gas possible. That is the single most important thing we can do as legislators in the State of Pennsylvania to bring some reasonable fiscal practices to the purchase of natural gas and the cost of gas utility bills in this State. I think it is imperative that we vote for this legislation and do one of the most important things we can for the utility consumer in this State in this session of the General Assembly. I again urge a "yes" vote on HB 132, Mr. Speaker. The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Mr.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, I want to make it very abundantly clear that what we are interested in doing is saving money for the consumer. This bill does not save money for the consumer, not one rotten cent, and I challenge anybody to rebut that. If you do not pay it as you go, you are going to pay it later on when they come to the PUC for an additional increase. Let us not fool ourselves. Then you are going to pay more because of the interest carrying costs. There is no question about that. The PUC itself has said it, said, do not touch this; it is going to cost the consumer a lot more. The PUC is violently opposed to this. Just today we got a letter from the PUC, a letter dated December 9, 1983, and the PUC is saying this is the wrong time to fool around with this subject, because gas prices are going down now; they are not going up, they are going down, and if you want to get the immediate benefit of those reductions, you want to vote against this bill, because your consumer is going to get the benefit of that reduction right now, not 12 months later.

This is an absolutely foolish gesture to try to make the people think we are going to save them some money. Everything I have seen over the last 12 months indicates that gas prices are going to go down, very emphatically so. This is not the right time to fool around with automatic adjustments going up, because we want the benefit of adjustments going down, and we want them just as soon as we can get them.

Now, the PUC further said to us, very emphatically, leave it alone because it is working well the way it is. The increases that have been levied are passed on in your monthly bills, and they are audited currently by the PUC. On top of that, there is an annual audit performed to make sure that what you are getting charged is proper and it is not out of order. No gas company is making 1 cent on this passthrough. These are just actual costs incurred and passed along. There is no profit involved at all.

Then we have in here the proposal to require the companies to apply for rate adjustments, which will definitely not save the consumers anything, as pointed out by Representative Itkin and with which I agree.

Representative Kukovich talked about the many rateincrease cases that are already being heard. Mr. Speaker, I want to tell you that the PUC themselves came to us and they said, this will add at least 61 rate cases a year, and how in the name of heaven are we going to handle 61 additional rate cases? It is emphatically wrong. We do not need that kind of additional expense. That, too, raises the cost to your consumer.

Then on August 19, 1983, the PUC came up with their findings. After Administrative Law Judge William Shane, who is a former member of this House, came up with an extensive report after studying the question, he recommended very emphatically, do not change it, but there are some improvements to be made. Hence, on August 19, 1983, the PUC issued an order which put all of the good things of this bill into effect by administrative order. This bill does not need it at all to administer those things. The PUC already has that authority and they have already done it. I do not see any point at all in harking about that.

Then we have also the question of compelling the utility companies to buy cheap at the lowest available price. This is one of the leading subjects of the PUC order of August 19, 1983. You must buy gas at the lowest possible available price, and they intend to monitor that.

HB 132 deals with the price of gas. Eighty percent of the price of gas consists of the price they have to pay for gas to a pipeline company and cannot be controlled by the company buying the gas. The cost is regulated at the wellhead, at the place where it comes out of the ground. That is where the cost is being regulated, and this is being regulated by a Federal agency known as FERC, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. We cannot do anything about that. The people in FERC, the people in the Federal Government, are the only ones who are going to have an impact on natural gas prices. We are not. Why should we be silly enough just to say by eliminating this pass-on clause that we are going to lower the price of gas? It is absolutely absurd. It cannot be done.

In conclusion I just want to say this again: HB 132 cannot do a thing for us. If anything, it will increase your consumers' costs, and that is why I am disturbed about it. I do not want to incur any more costs for my consumers than we have to. Now our gas is going down. We want the consumer to get the benefit of that now. Leave it alone. Reject this bill.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

WELCOME

The SPEAKER. The Chair is delighted to welcome to the hall of the House 21 TRW managers from their Pennsylvania facilities. The group is participating in a Government Roundtable Forum Day sponsored by TRW. Mr. Ralph Tyler, government affairs manager from TRW corporate headquarters in Cleveland, Ohio, is here with them. They are the guests of Representatives Wambach, Stuban, Belfanti, Rappaport, and Greenwood.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 132 CONTINUED

The SPEAKER. On final passage, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Somerset, Mr. Lloyd.

Mr. LLOYD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am a little puzzled in this debate. The gentleman, Mr. Itkin, says we have to be against this bill because somehow it is going to require the utility companies to borrow a lot of money because they are not going to be collecting enough. Mr. Vroon says we have to be against this bill because somehow the utility companies are going to be collecting something they are not entitled to. I suggest both gentlemen cannot be right. I think it is important that the members remember that this bill becomes effective only with the next general rate case filed by the utilities. So any case which is in the process of being settled right now is going to be over and done with, and any benefits that Mr. Vroon is worried about having passed on in the short term will have been passed on long before this bill ever goes into effect.

Secondly, Mr. Speaker, the gentleman, Mr. Vroon, says there is nothing we can do about what happens in Washington. The fact of the matter is that about 20 to 25 percent of the costs that our constituents pay for natural gas are transmission line costs, and the gentleman is correct that those transmission line costs are set by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. However, every gas utility in Pennsylvania would have the right to go down to Washington and present the same kind of information against those increases that the Consumer Advocate and consumer groups present against the gas increases in Pennsylvania. At the time that we had the hearings on this bill, there was not one Pennsylvania gas company which had ever intervened to present testimony against a transmission price increase. If this bill passes, Mr. Speaker, I predict they will be down there doing that, and that has the potential to save money.

In addition, we are all familiar with the "take or pay" contract problem. The only way you get the utility companies to sit up and take notice and do something about that problem is by hitting them over the head, and that is what HB 132 is going to do. It is going to create incentives for them. It is going to say, you can recover your legitimate costs, but you are going to have a lag and you are going to have an incentive to go out there and to try to be more efficient to get a better price.

On the question of shut-in gas, I know there are a lot of members in this chamber who have constituents who would like to be selling gas to the utility companies and the utility companies will not buy it. If this bill passes, the utility companies are going to be under greater pressure to buy that Pennsylvania shut-in gas, which is going to be a good deal for Pennsylvania consumers as well as a good deal for the Pennsylvania oil and gas fields.

Mr. Speaker, the gentleman suggests that this bill is bad because the Public Utility Commission says it is bad. I think every member of this body has had ample experience with the Public Utility Commission to know that it is not doing a very good job, to know that when the Public Utility Commission says, well, we really have the power to do this anyway; do not force us to, and is making changes only because of this legislation, I think that is proof of the pudding. If we pass this bill, we are going to make the Public Utility Commission sit up and take notice, change its procedures, and we are going to see some incentives built in to lower the price of gas. If we allow the pettifogging of the Public Utility Commission to mar our judgment on this issue, many of the things which the PUC has said are either absolutely wrong or misleading. That unfortunately is their track record on many bills which come before this Assembly. I recommend that we reject the feeble arguments of the Public Utility Commission and the public utilities and we vote for this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

On final passage, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Northampton, Mr. Freeman.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HB 132. Eighty percent of the gas bill that consumers receive is the result of the GCR (gas cost rate). Furthermore, the gas cost rate system only permits a 30-day review period by the PUC with no public hearings. This leads the PUC to making decisions that are nothing more than a rubber stamp in favor of the gas companies and the rate requests. HB 132 does away with this rubberstamping process.

It also requires that gas companies buy the cheapest possible gas, which will no doubt be a savings to the consumer. The 1982 winter increase of gas prices was 25 percent. A Federal estimate says that the winter of 1983 will result in a 32-percent increase of gas prices. Since 1978, after the passage of the National Gas Policy Act, prices have risen over 80 percent in northeastern Pennsylvania and 215 percent in the United States. Something has to be done to arrest this unnecessary increase in the cost of natural gas. This bill is aimed at making that end possible. I urge a "yes" vote for HB 132. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On final passage, the Chair recognizes, for the second time, the gentleman from Chester, Mr. Vroon.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, this is in rebuttal to Mr. Lloyd. What happens to those increases or decreases which are requested or which take place after the effective date of the bill - that is a very poor argument, to say the least. That will go on and on and on, and if we keep it the way it is, then our reductions will be realized immediately, but if we do not, there is nothing to compel the gas company under the proposed system to pass this on to its consumers, nothing. That is the important difference.

All the rest of Mr. Lloyd's arguments are met by the PUC order dated August 19, 1983. I would just like to read a few paragraphs from that order: "It is ordered: 1. That the Gas Cost Rate be continued, with the changes directed in the Report and Recommended Decision, as a mechanism for the distributors prompt recovery of purchased gas costs." Number 2: "That distributors are to buy natural gas from the cheapest, available, reliable sources, consistent with daily and seasonal demand as an indispensable prerequisite for just and reasonable rates." Item number 9: "That Pennsylvania distributors are directed to economically dispatch cheaper, available, reliable local gas and, not shut-in gas that is an indispensable prerequisite to just and reasonable rates." Number 10: "That in future base rate cases, the Class A Pennsylvania gas distributors are directed to file the information as specified above concerning sources and costs of present and projected gas supply, including an explanation as to any quantities of gas shut in." This and other contents of this order of August 19, 1983, operate together with the system as it now is to give us the best of both worlds, and I do not think we ought to lose the best of both worlds. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On final passage, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Beaver, Mr. Laughlin.

Mr. LAUGHLIN. Mr. Speaker, HB 132, in my opinion and in the opinion of the Consumer Affairs Committee by a very wide majority, is an answer to a problem that has existed in Pennsylvania for a number of years. The problem has existed because of the ability of the gas companies to pass through their charges for gas automatically without a review until such time as the PUC has time to audit. Mr. Speaker, that time has cost the people of Pennsylvania hundreds of millions of dollars in costs for natural gas.

Mr. Speaker, we all remember 1978, and prior to that back in 1974, when the gas companies went to Washington and they said, deregulate gas; give us an opportunity for more drilling; give us an opportunity to produce more gas so that we can supply the people, because there is a shortage coming, and by 1985 we will be in a situation of a short supply of gas. That is what they said. Mr. Speaker, I applaud those gas companies that went out and initiated drilling programs to bring new gas on line. I think the People's Gas Company of Pennsylvania is an outstanding example of drilling for gas in the State of Pennsylvania, where approximately 30 percent of their supply is delivered from wells here in Pennsylvania, not supplied by long-distance pipeline, not supplied on "take or pay" contracts at accelerated prices. That is the problem with a GCR that has no restriction upon it, Mr. Speaker, and for that reason this legislation was introduced.

But let us not just look at the effect of the savings immediately for the ratepayers of this State. Let us look also at the possibility that this bill creates and the incentive it creates for those companies to drill in the State of Pennsylvania.

Right now, Mr. Speaker, the people of Pennsylvania are told that we have a limited supply of gas underground in the form of reserves, and they are right; there is a limited supply. That supply is limited by the amount of drilling that is done. to a large degree. Every time they go in and drill in a new area and come up with a new source of gas, those known reserves are escalated. Mr. Speaker, I believe that Pennsylvania, as well as a lot of companies such as People's that have drilled here, has a considerable amount of gas underground that can be found, and it can be found at a much lower price than what they are talking about in the Gulf of Mexico and the transportation costs that are added to it, and, Mr. Speaker, this legislation reaches out to those pipelines. It reaches out to the transmission companies. It says to them that your distribution companies in the State of Pennsylvania are going to be responsible and that you had better look to what you are doing in shipping that gas into the State of Pennsylvania.

How many glass industries have closed down or gone to alternate sources of energy? How many steel companies have done likewise? Mr. Speaker, this legislation is not only for the benefit of the consumers, although that is the most important benefit; it benefits industry in this State as well as our commercial and business entities, and, Mr. Speaker, I can think of nothing that we need in this State more than a reasonable

price of energy to help our industries provide jobs for the people in this State.

It is not a bill that deals harshly with the utilities. This legislation does not go into effect until next year. We held off on this bill until after September to give them an opportunity to make their move on the GCR, and the end result was higher prices, Mr. Speaker, higher prices across the State. And when the PUC shuts off the gas of your constituents, at least you will be able to say you are trying to do something. You are trying to reach those long-distance lines, that out-of-State transmission, in an attempt to help the people of this State. For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I ask for an affirmative vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

MOTION TO PLACE BILL ON FINAL PASSAGE POSTPONED CALENDAR

The SPEAKER. On final passage, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Itkin.

Mr. ITKIN. Mr. Speaker, this is the first day that HB 132 was called up for a vote. I know it has been on the calendar for quite some time, but there was not an anticipation that the bill was going to be moved today. In fact, the conversation I had with the prime sponsor of the bill and the chairman of the Consumer Affairs Committee was that to his best knowledge, this bill was not going to be voted today. Consequently, Mr. Speaker, I would like to make a motion to hold the bill over for today so that I can draft an amendment to the bill, particularly to what I consider the most onerous provision in the bill; that is, the abolishment of the energy gas cost rate.

I must admit, with great respect to the prime sponsor and to the Consumer Affairs Committee, that there are major portions of this legislation which are of great benefit to the consumers of Pennsylvania, and I would like to see that those provisions do become enacted into law. I do have opposition to the elimination of the energy cost rate, because in my personal belief, I feel that it is a good, sound method of recovering higher fuel charges. Consequently, Mr. Speaker, I would like to have an opportunity to consider an amendment to that section of the bill at some future date. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

It has been moved by the gentleman, Mr. Itkin, that HB 132, PN 956, be placed on final passage postponed.

On the question,

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, I rise briefly to ask the members to vote in the negative. It is going to move. I would hope that it moves today, Mr. Speaker.

I would ask that we vote in the negative on the motion and get on with final passage.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Dauphin, Mr. Wambach.

Mr. WAMBACH. Mr. Speaker, every September the rate which we are charged for natural gas that we use changes. Over the past 5 years, this charge has steadily increased. This charge is the gas cost rate. It applies to approximately 75 percent of your gas bill. The PUC takes 30 days or less to review each of the 43 gas utility requests for a new gas cost rate. There are no public hearings as well. The PUC procedure does not allow for a thorough review of the utility's management and gas purchase decisions to insure that the utility company is trying to keep our costs as low as possible. This means that the utilities count on an automatic rate hike, and it means that the consumers are paying more than they should for natural gas.

Mr. Speaker, I urge all my colleagues to support HB 132. It will abolish the gas cost rate, or what I deem as the automatic rate hike. It will require the utilities to buy the least costly gas. It will mandate public hearings, and it will require the PUC to review gas purchases and sales. I urge support on final passage of HB 132. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

REMARKS ON VOTE

I would like to bring to the attention of the House a situation that, although it is somewhat localized, has far-reaching impact, particularly into our poultry industry, and that is the avian influenza among our chicken flocks in a six-county area in southcentral Pennsylvania.

I would certainly like to thank Mr. Morris and Mr. Cole, respective chairmen of the Agriculture Committee and the Federal-State Relations Committee, for the interest that they have shown in this problem and bringing in the task force and the producers of this poultry to hear their concerns.

I would also like to add that I feel that the Department of Agriculture was fast in getting into this situation through the help of the administration. There was quick action by the Federal Government, and the United States Department of Agriculture has been on board and in place in alleviating this problem and attempting to find a long-range solution to it, but more importantly, in aiding these farmers in ridding the chickens that are affected by this very devastating disease.

The administration, under Secretary Hallowell, has had several meetings with different groups, and just on Friday he brought together Economic Task Force people and Department of Commerce people involved in what they can do to help this industry get back on its feet. Just as the hour passes by, there is a meeting in Lancaster right now talking with individual farmers on how they can receive the help that there is to alleviate their individual problems concerning this.

Secretary Hallowell has also released moneys under the indemnity program to flow to these farmers and the owners of these flocks for that money that is available to them right now. However, that is where we come in, and that is, there is not enough money in the indemnity program to take care of this full problem. I am asking other members of the House to sponsor with me a bill that would increase the indemnity moneys to help alleviate the problem that these chicken producers have - the owners and the farmers who raise these flocks - and as soon as I have that language drafted, I will be circulating a memo to all members of the House and would urge you to join with me in seeing that our poultry industry continues to become a viable part of our economic picture in Pennsylvania. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
