### BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

ments of the Commonwealth and for the establishment of restricted receipts accounts for the fiscal year July 1, 1984 to June 30, 1985 and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1984.

Mr. SHOWERS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I move this amendment to fund at a level equal to prior years' funding for Pennsylvania's nine energy centers. Funding in prior years has been in part from Federal moneys and also from oil overcharge moneys. These funds are now gone, but I believe the track record of the energy centers across the State deserves an additional commitment from Pennsylvania's General Fund. These centers primarily aid small business in terms of energy surveys, which in turn result in substantial energy savings for Pennsylvania's business.

I urge members' support of this amendment for Pennsylvania's energy centers.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. McClatchy, on the amendment.

Mr. McCLATCHY. Mr. Speaker, I have some questions of Mr. Showers.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Showers, indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman, Mr. McClatchy, is in order and he may proceed.

Mr. McCLATCHY. Mr. Speaker, does this amendment deal with the food bank amendment that we had directing this money toward the counties, and is this a change, or a slight change, from the past amendment?

Mr. SHOWERS. Toward the food bank amendment, sir?

Mr. McCLATCHY. That is right.

Mr. SHOWERS. Not to the best of my knowledge, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. McCLATCHY. All right. Thank you.

Will the House agree to the amendments?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bradford, Mr. Madigan.

Mr. MADIGAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would urge, once again, adoption of this amendment. As we had pointed out last week when this amendment was considered, it has been working. In the testimony which was provided to the special committee, there was no testimony that this program was not working for the counties involved and for the entire State. As I pointed out on that date, the food bank in Williamsport in the north-central portion of the State did purchase for those counties in that district; the money was channeled through the counties; it went to the food bank, and the process worked very well. I firmly believe that this is the best way that we have to assure that our counties do get their fair share.

Mr. Speaker, as we pointed out, one of my main concerns is that the needy and hungry people in each and every county have the same opportunity for a fair share. This has been provided under the current program, in which each county's allocation, based on the formula of unemployment and poverty, guarantees that these funds will come to that county. The counties in many of the areas have chosen to work through the food bank to multiply those dollars and get the maximum dollars for these counties.

The real concern that I have is the original proposal of the food banks, which provided that "It should not be the responsibility"—and I am quoting this—"of the federal or state government to bail out the food needs of needy families, where there is no local involvement." Through the county process, it provides this local involvement and does guarantee that each of our counties and each of our communities can get their fair share of this allotment for our hungry and needy families. I urge adoption of the amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Indiana, Mr. Wass, on the Madigan amendment.

Mr. WASS. Mr. Speaker, thank you.

I rise in support of the Madigan amendment. I voted for the reconsideration motion, and that is as it should be. I think we should speak about this as long as somebody has something to say about it.

But, Mr. Speaker, if I may, in Indiana County the food distribution program has been a success. We do it with volunteers. We let the local people make the distribution, and I again ask you to please support the Madigan amendment. The authority of the distribution belongs with the local officials in our local counties, and again I am being repetitious, but I want you to know in Indiana County we have had a successful food distribution program under the volunteer system, and I ask you to continue that program.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Erie, Mr. Cappabianca.

Mr. CAPPABIANCA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think once again that Mr. Madigan and Mr. Wass, Mr. Speaker, are confusing the \$8 million with the government surplus commodities that the Commonwealth has experienced, and we should take that in this light. We are addressing the \$8 million that the Commonwealth has put into this present budget, in the new fiscal year budget.

Mr. Speaker, the special bipartisan committee which was appointed has been monitoring the \$8-million appropriation from last year to ascertain if in fact the unemployed and hungry are being fed. I am convinced, Mr. Speaker, that the only logical and sensible method of feeding the hungry and unemployed Pennsylvanians through this \$8-million appropriation is through the system of regional food banks in Pennsylvania.

"Harvests for the Hungry" was an article published last year in Reader's Digest which compliments the system of food banks and the tremendous job they are doing in feeding the hungry, Mr. Speaker. The system of food banks is turning out tons of surplus food into a bounty for the poor on a daily basis. The article in part, if I may go on, Mr. Speaker, states: "With his next paycheck days away and no other resort left to him, Michael Conlon went to Holy Trinity Church where food is distributed to the destitute. There, volunteer workers sent Conlon home laden with packages of juice, cereal, dry milk, bread, peanut butter, canned foods, pasta, potatoes and carrots. Nearly half the food given to the Conlons and 20 other poor families that day came from the community food bank of Newark, New Jersey, one of about 100 such banks starting up across the country," Mr. Speaker.

Pennsylvania is fortunate to have 10 of these so-called community food banks capable of taking care of the hungry in every county through a system, Mr. Speaker, of pantries, soup kitchens, and emergency food boxes and like entities. From many sources, these nonprofit food banks gather a rich variety of surplus and unsalable food and distribute it to soup kitchens, day-care centers, homes for the elderly, halfway houses, and emergency food box programs.

Mr. Speaker, neither county commissioners nor county government have the capability of feeding hungry individuals on a daily basis. When you are hungry, Mr. Speaker, you are hungry on a daily basis. The most sensible method would be to give the \$8-million appropriation directly to the food banks as line-itemed in the original bill, HB 2051.

And more importantly, food banks have the food on a daily basis, as mentioned in the article. Community food banks could give food immediately to a hungry or unemployed Pennsylvanian. Food banks do not create another bureaucracy, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I might add, this amendment is in direct contradiction to President Reagan's philosophy when he calls for less government intervention. Food banks are small, nonprofit businesses capable of taking care of feeding the hungry with no political bureaucracy involved.

Furthermore, if the regional food banks bought in bulk purchase the food at substantial discount prices, the buying power would almost triple. Instead of \$8 million, Mr. Speaker, we would have \$24 million. In reality, food banks, in bulk purchasing through this \$8 million, as I pointed out, would realize \$24 million in food.

The present \$8-million appropriation for fiscal 1983-84 is almost a horror story in feeding the hungry in Pennsylvania. The appropriation was given to the Department of Agriculture in July of 1983, and as late as Tuesday of this week, Mr. Speaker, May 1, 1984, some county commissioners still have not given the checks to agencies to purchase food for the hungry.

If I can give you an example, in Northumberland County, as of May 1, 1984, food had not been purchased to feed the hungry. The county commissioners just cut a check for one agency. Northumberland County has hired a food coordinator instead, thus adding another bureaucracy at the county level. In Allegheny County, although the county commissioners opted to go through the food bank with the Hungry Action Coalition, because county government was involved, the first check was cut on April 1 of 1984, and we still do not know if food has actually been purchased.

No food was actually purchased through giving the money to county government for approximately 3 months after the checks were cut at the State level, Mr. Speaker. Some of this money is still in county government checking accounts, and the Department of Agriculture took as long as 9 months to cut some checks. They were playing games with some counties, I might add, Mr. Speaker.

We just do not have a handle at this time to know how much food, if any, has been bought to feed the truly hungry. The Department of Agriculture has, in my opinion, a rather shoddy record in this regard. They still tell us the money has gone out to the counties. My question to the Department of Agriculture, Mr. Speaker, is, has the \$8 million been used to purchase food to feed the hungry? They cannot give us this answer. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I ask for a negative vote on this amendment.



The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland, Mr. Kukovich.

Mr. KUKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The issue at hand is, what is the best way to feed the most people in the most efficient way? The purpose of the original language in the budget bill was to maximize that efficiency. Mr. Speaker, it just does not make sense to assume that a small county that receives their allocation has the ability to make the bulk purchases that will maximize the appropriation that we are making. Last week I made some examples of food banks that have the ability to purchase an emergency box of food worth roughly \$60 at the cost of \$15 of the money we provided in last year's budget of \$8 million. We were getting four times the amount of appropriation that we gave to the food banks. Any economist or simple mathematician will tell you that by the way we changed this language last time, we cannot do that. There is simply no way to do that.

Secondly, most of the counties do not even want to be burdened with this problem, but as long as the money is going out, they have an obligation to try to get what they can and feed their hungry people. The proponents of this amendment try to pose this issue as being procounty. That is absurd. It has nothing to do with county politics. And the worst thing we do with this amendment is begin to include political involvement into the process of feeding the hungry. That is inappropriate, Mr. Speaker.

I would suggest that a "no" vote on this amendment is a vote that would reflect our desire to get politics out of the needy programs to feed the hungry and would also make sure that we get the best purchasing power for our tax dollar. I think it is imperative that we vote "no" on the Madigan amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Preston.

Mr. PRESTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the gentleman, Mr. Wass, stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Wass, indicates he will so stand. The gentleman, Mr. Preston, is in order and may proceed.

Mr. PRESTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, you mentioned and made several comments concerning Indiana County handling a distribution. Can you tell me if that distribution was part of the \$8-million food surplus?

Mr. WASS. No, I cannot, sir.

Mr. PRESTON. Can you tell me if Indiana County has ever handled any form of distribution and purchasing of commodities on a mass scale?

Mr. WASS. Please repeat the question.

Mr. PRESTON. Can you tell me if Indiana County, to your knowledge, has ever handled any mass purchases and arranged for warehousing and bulk purchases as far as mass delivery of food surpluses?

Mr. WASS. Mr. Speaker, it is not my intent to evade your question, but their experience has been with the surplus food, where they have stored mass amounts of it in refrigeration and have distributed it properly throughout the many townships and boroughs of Indiana County. In the testimony before the committee, Indiana County testified to the fact that they did have a good experience in the distribution of this surplus food. That is the cheese and the butter, and I cannot speak with any direct comments about the \$8-million distribution of funds in my county.

Mr. PRESTON. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, may I make a brief statement?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and he may proceed.

Mr. PRESTON. The questions I have just asked just only point out and reiterate what my other members are saying on why we should vote against the Madigan amendment. What we talked about were roughly 3 or 4 products versus 30 to 40 products that would have to be purchased by the county, that would have to be stored by the county, and then, plus, would also have to be distributed by the county. These counties have not had this form of responsibility before, not in the history as far as my knowledge as far as distribution is concerned on a large scale, and I do not think that they are capable at this time nor have they demonstrated the capabilities of being able to handle something of this nature. So therefore, I would ask for a negative vote on the Madigan amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Cappabianca, for the second time.

Mr. CAPPABIANCA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to remind the House, Mr. Speaker, that in the 1983-84 budget the Department of Agriculture or the administration did not ask for the \$8 million. And I might add also that for this fiscal year, 1984-85, once again they saw no need to ask for the \$8 million. But yet it strikes me kind of odd, sir, that here is a department that never asked for the \$8 million and now is trying to tell us how to spend the money or how to allot it. It tells me that they have an insensitivity, Mr. Speaker, that they still do not have a handle on what the devil is going on out there in the Commonwealth. They do not understand that there are hungry people and that the best way to get the food to the hungry people is through agencies that deal on a day-to-day basis with those people. County commissioners, government entities, do not deal with hungry people on a day-to-day basis. We have no reason to set up another layer of bureaucracy in order to get that funding of money down to that level that needs the money to buy the food to feed the hungry people, and that is the mistake that we are making here.

The Madigan amendment, Mr. Speaker, in my opinion, lacks that sensitivity, once again, that demonstrates to the people of Pennsylvania, those who are truly hungry, those who are truly in need, that we are definitely trying to get that food to them. The \$8 million has nothing to do with the government surplus food that is coming from the Federal level. It is our intention to give it to those who are most hungry in the

quickest way possible. Who are we to tell the Salvation Army, who has been dealing for over 100 years in feeding hungry people, how to feed hungry people? That money, that check should be cut immediately to the Salvation Army or to the food banks that they are doing business with. We should not be sending it through a county commissioner's office who only lets the check sit there for 8 or 9 months before he decides to distribute it. No, Mr. Speaker, the best way to help the hungry of Pennsylvania is to defeat the Madigan amendment and defeat it now.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Erie, Mr. Bowser.

Mr. BOWSER. Mr. Speaker, I would just like to speak again on this subject, as we did last week.

First of all, those county governments, whether it be commissioners or a county executive form of government, have indeed the right to give their allotment to food banks, and this has been done in some cases around the State. Personally, I have all the faith in the world in local government. Our county commissioners or our county executives deal with millions of dollars every year, and I can see no reason why they cannot handle the money in this project and handle it better at each county level.

Once again, I want to use the Ninth District's food bank setup as an example. I do have a few reservations about food banks - they are new, they are growing, but they do make mistakes, and in our own food bank out of Erie County, there was 9 tons of butter left to spoil. Now, they do a job up there; I am not standing here and telling you they are not feeding the hungry in Erie County, but I am telling you that they do not have all this expertise that I am hearing here today.

And I still question the fact of setting up a food bank in Erie County which serves under their own setup 12 counties of northwestern Pennsylvania and, again, down and including the farthest county of Clearfield, which is 150 to 175 miles away. There is no doubt in my mind, under the present system, that those far-reaching counties are not being served well, because we do have, indeed, problems right in rural Erie County.

It has worked well in the past years with the county commissioners doing the job, and I ask everybody here to continue that process. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the minority whip.

Mr. HAYES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I have listened to the opponents of the Madigan amendment. They would have us believe that their purpose is writing a well-balanced menu for the hungry, and I suggest that Mr. Madigan is not against that. What Mr. Madigan is for is an equitable distribution of the \$8 million across the 67 counties of Pennsylvania.

I listened the other day and I have listened again today. The opponents of the Madigan amendment cannot guarantee by the language in HB 2051 or anything that they have said the 2 days that we have debated this amendment that each of the 67 counties will receive their fair share on behalf of the residents

of those 67 counties, a part of the \$8 million. Not one person has come to a microphone standing in opposition to the Madigan amendment being able to say forthrightly that each and every one of those 67 counties out there will receive their fair share of the \$8 million. They want to talk about menu; they want to talk about the hungry and the poor, and I respectfully suggest, Mr. Speaker, that no one wants to speak against the hungry and the poor. That is not the purpose of the debate and it is not the purpose of the Madigan amendment. But there are hungry and poor in each of the 67 counties, and those persons have a rightful request in sharing equitably the \$8 million. There is no way that you can do that for sure by guarantee with HB 2051 as it is currently written and without the Madigan amendment. If we have the administration of this program take place in each of the 67 counties, there is a chance that the hungry and poor in those 67 counties will receive their fair share.

There have been problems with food banks. Read the reports that have been issued by various persons studying it. Ask Mr. Madigan, who served on one of those panels. Ask Mr. Bowser. They can come forward and give you specific examples of where food bank agencies proved themselves less than competent in the distribution of foodstuffs. That is not a condemnation across the board. But to stand here on the floor of this House and act as though everything is all right in each and every one of the food banks would be misrepresenting the facts as they are.

The 67 counties can equitably distribute the money. There is no way that an opponent of the Madigan amendment can stand here and say their language would do as well as Mr. Madigan's. They can talk about menu, they can talk about fiber, protein, carbohydrates, until this day comes to an end. But after all of that, they cannot look at each one of the Representatives in here and say, your county is going to receive an equitable share. They have a personal preference to send it out to the food banks. I suggest that our personal preference ought to be sending it out to the people of Pennsylvania across all 67 counties, and the counties should not have to call long distance to some faraway food bank to see whether it is possible to get some of this menu that Mr. Cappabianca and Mr. Kukovich talk about. If they had their fair share right in their individual county, there would not be any necessity for long-distance phone calls.

I suggest we support the Madigan amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Venango, Mr. Peterson.

Mr. PETERSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to support the Madigan amendment. The plan that is in this bill, without the Madigan amendment, is distribution without representation.

In the northwest, which is my major concern, because that is what I represent, 12 counties will receive their distribution from a food bank in Erie. The food bank in Erie is run by people from Erie, and we all know how we all take care of our

own, and we all represent the area we come from. That means counties like Jefferson and Clarion and Clearfield and Cameron and Elk and McKean and Warren and Forest and Venango, that are as far as 100 to 150 miles away, are going to be dependent upon a board from Erie to make sure that their poor get their fair share.

I think we all know from history that each and every poor person in this Commonwealth needs someone in their own county making sure that they get their fair share of this pot. I urge support of the Madigan amendment because that is what the Madigan amendment does, puts a little bit of representation into the system of distribution to make sure that our constituents in those rural counties will get their fair share of the food dollars. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland, Mr. Kukovich, for the second time.

Mr. KUKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Based on the tradition of what the food banks have done over the years as opposed to some of the other programs, I can say forthrightly that with the language originally in HB 2051, there will be a more equitable distribution in all the counties based on the assumption of the ability of increased purchasing power. The counties cannot get Federal tax credits for purchasing power; the food banks can. The counties, particularly the small counties, cannot turn the money we give them into three or four times its value; the food banks can.

Mr. Hayes talks about an equitable distribution of money. I suppose based on per capita, based on the amount of people on unemployment, welfare, we could come up with some formula that might distribute the money equally, but it will not distribute the food to the people who really need it as well as we could under the original language. I think it is disingenuous at best to talk about their concern for feeding hungry people when they are more worried about saving face for the Department of Agriculture.

The facts are plain, Mr. Speaker. Whether it is in terms of tax credits, whether it is in terms of massive purchasing power, if you care about hungry people in this Commonwealth, you have got to vote against this amendment. I would urge everybody on both sides of the aisle to remember that there are Republicans, Democrats, and mostly people who are not registered to vote who are hungry, and they do not care how we are registered. We just want to get the food to them, and the best way to do it and to get the most food available is to vote "no" on this amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Indiana, Mr. Wass, for the second time.

Mr. WASS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I only want to take this opportunity to supplement my testimony that I had given earlier.

It has been brought to my attention, in answer to Representative Preston, that Indiana County did share in \$71,000 of the funds allocated, and it has been distributed through the Indiana County Community Action Program. As I exposed those figures of \$71,000 that the Indiana County commis-

sioners received and designated the Indiana County Community Action Program as the distributors of the food, we have had nothing but a true success in this program. I ask for support for the Madigan amendment, based on our successes.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bradford, Mr. Madigan, for the second time.

Mr. MADIGAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As we have pointed out as a great concern about how we get the food to the needy people, through my proposal the money would go through the Department of Agriculture, be passed through the counties, the counties would then have the option—each county, whether it be commissioners or county executives—of how this money will be dispensed. As I pointed out, in the north-central district most of the counties chose to turn this money over to the food banks, who then in turn purchased the food and sent it back to the counties through food pantries, which in the case of my own Bradford County, our commissioners had to go out and develop individuals who would operate a food pantry so that our hungry and needy could be serviced. How many of your counties have these facilities in place now? What better way than for some local oversight that these funds do come to our counties and efforts can be made to make sure we do have the food pantries to distribute this food?

As we heard in testimony before the special committee, food banks do not distribute food to individuals. I repeat that: Food banks do not distribute food to individuals. They distribute it to food pantries, the Salvation Army, soup kitchens, whatever groups care to work out an agreement with them to purchase food from them at 10 cents a pound. Ten cents a pound is charged any organization, any food pantry, for food that is provided to them for distribution to the hungry and needy.

What are the criteria and eligibility for this? There are no standard criteria and no eligibility, and there are variations between food pantries. I firmly believe that we should have the option and should pass it through our counties to guarantee that each and every one of our counties does get a fair share. I personally feel that my county has just as many hungry and needy as any other county in this Commonwealth, and I am fighting to make sure that those hungry and needy people do indeed get their fair share. I urge adoption of this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Whether the money I am proposing here remains in the budget as signed into law by the Governor, I do not know. However, I think this might be a signal for us and for the Senate to look at the problem facing Pennsylvania and perhaps take steps to amend the financing which we give to our local communities.

Mr. FREEMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What my amendment does is raise the appropriation for the resource recovery grants from the \$3 million that was put into the budget by Representative Reber to a level of \$6 million. Initially, I, too, felt that \$3 million would be an adequate level. However, upon further reflection and further research, I found that this fund, this grant program, has not been funded since the 1970's. We have a lot of catching up to do in Pennsylvania.

In 1982 only 10 percent of the projects planned by local governments were able to be funded under this program. Requests for over \$13 million were received by DER in the recent application period, and yet only \$300,000 was available due to the fact that the program is being funded from the interest on the original appropriation.

As Mr. Reber most aptly put it, landfills are in trouble. We have reached critical capacity levels. We have reached a crisis in solid waste in Pennsylvania. The health hazards also associated with landfills make it even more desirable that we find alternative methods of dealing with solid waste and profitable methods through resource recovery. I therefore urge a positive vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the Freeman amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Reber.

Mr. REBER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As Representative Freeman expressed, this will take the \$3-million amendment that I put in last week as amendment A1552 and increase it to \$6 million. Based upon the specifics that Representative Freeman has just referenced, I certainly would support this particular amendment increasing the amount.

I would, though, for the record want to point out that the Department of Environmental Resources, during their presentation to the Appropriations Committee, expressed that this past fiscal year there were requests of \$3 million for this particular type of grant program; hence, the initial recommendation and appropriation in the Governor's budget for the \$3-million amount and also occasioning my amendment, which was entered into this bill last week.

I would also hope to emphasize that in the event there would be, in the divine wisdom of the conference committee that I am sure this bill is ultimately headed towards, a cutting of particular moneys involved, I certainly would hope that they would continue to fund at least to the \$3-million limit that has earlier been put in. Notwithstanding that, I certainly would support this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. PITTS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment would authorize \$500,000 for the repair of the Capitol dome to stop the water leakage or penetration problem we have there. As you may remember, last year the General Assembly appropriated over \$1 million for the restoration of the Abbey murals up in the lunettes in the top of the dome. That project was begun, and the first phase was observation. You see the scaffolding out there which was erected. The conservators and professional consultants came and went on top of the scaffolding, observed the murals, and found out that what had been thought to be damage from humidity was damage not only due to humidity but to leakage of water from the outside of the dome penetrating through the joints of the granite into the wall, and there is an awful lot of deterioration occurring on those murals.

At the last meeting of the Capitol Preservation Committee, the department requested money to immediately study the dome problem. They authorized \$65,000 for that, but we do not have any money for the actual repair work of the dome, so this \$500,000 is inserted into the budget for that purpose. If we do not get the appropriation for the repair of the dome, we cannot proceed with the work of the actual restoration of the murals. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the Pitts amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Dauphin, Mr. Wambach.

Mr. WAMBACH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I join Representative Pitts in urging all of my colleagues to support amendment A1692. What we are doing currently, as Representative Pitts expounded on, was to take a look at the mural damage that is currently proceeding within the Capitol dome structure, and obviously we do not want to throw bad money after bad without repairing the source of the problem, which is the condensation and the leakage through approximately 6 feet of outside exterior wall that comes through the joints of the structure of the dome. So in order to facilitate the corrective work occurring within the structure on the murals, we would like to create a situation where we are repairing the source of the damage itself. So I urge all my colleagues to support the Pitts amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Now, as I recall, last week one of my amendments was to restore the Department of Health General Fund appropriation back to the Governor's request for some \$680,000, as I recall, and now have we in fact amended that back down?

You know, this is something I think not many members are paying much heed to, and if that be the case— And I understand the bill has not been reprinted; we are using the bill

from last week and we are jockeying numbers back and forth none of us are going to know. If that be the case, then I am going to have to go back and draft another amendment to raise it back up to what I thought it was initially.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. DeVerter, is obviously correct, and the Chair would not even attempt to say what mischief has been caused by the torrent of amendments which have been offered, but in general, an amendment offered on Tuesday would take precedence over an amendment offered on Monday, if they are both addressed to the same section of the bill and the same line. But the Chair is not going to attempt at this point in this debate to find out exactly what we have done. The fact of the matter is the Chair would confess almost total ignorance of what we have done and thus would join the rest of the members in a unanimous decision.

Mr. DeVERTER. Well, Mr. Speaker, it would appear then that as many of us have suggested, including my conversation with the Speaker earlier in the day, that this whole process is an exercise in futility. Now, I feel as strongly as other members perhaps feel about their amendments in reinserting that appropriation. What we are faced with is then a document leaving this House that does not really adequately or accurately address, you know, what those concerns are as we as individual members have proposed the amendments, and I think at some point we have to make a decision, really, as to what is fair. Now, I do not know how we can resolve it, but it is turning into a real nightmare.

If the majority leader is listening, I hope now he sees the rationale behind them going ahead and developing the budget in a conference committee and putting it up, and if it flies, it flies, and if it does not, it does not, because, brother, this has really turned into a turmoil. I know this has happened in other areas of this budget document, and some of you, when you see the final print of this bill as it leaves the House, are going to be much surprised at what has happened to the numbers that you as a member have proposed in the way of an amendment. I wish there were some easy, equitable way to straighten this out, but unless the Chair in his wisdom and the Parliamentarian and the majority leader can come up with a way, I probably like other members am going to have to go back and ask for additional amendments to be drafted to do what we thought we did one time, and if we continue to do that, we are going to be here forever and a day. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. For the gentleman's information on his question, the clerk has informed us that the House started out on that line with an appropriation of \$11,164,000; changed it to \$11,064,000; changed that to \$11,845,000; and now has changed it to \$11,116,000.

Mr. DeVERTER. Mr. Speaker, that is exactly my point, and my point is that we were trying to get it back to the level that had been requested initially by the administration and the Department of Health, and if the appropriation is not there, we suffer the impact of all those areas that are sensitive to a lot of members, including giardiasis, rabies, and a whole host of other things.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Union, Mr. Showers.

Mr. SHOWERS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I offer today an amendment adding an additional \$16 million to the medical assistance outpatient line item, which I believe is consistent with the goal of implementing health care cost-containment programs by encouraging the treatment of medical assistance patients in the less expensive outpatient setting.

Implementation of the inpatient prospective pricing system for medicaid on July 1, 1984, will introduce new cost-containment incentives for hospitals rendering services to medicaid beneficiaries. Under prospective pricing, the incentive will be to decrease average length of stay, reassess the utilization of services for particular diagnoses, and increase the scope of outpatient services as an alternative to costly inpatient service. Consistent with incentives inherent in prospective pricing for inpatient services, the outpatient fee schedule must complement system implementation to allow such incentives to operate effectively.

Over the past several years, the outpatient fee schedule has paid providers substantially less than the cost of rendering services to medicaid beneficiaries. Continuation of this fee schedule, using outdated fees, is contrary to the incentives to be introduced on July 1 for inpatient hospitalization services. Instead, the fee schedule should be updated to reflect existing practice and levels of reimbursement and to create incentives for the use of outpatient hospital services.

Accordingly, this amendment would adjust the medical assistance fee schedule for outpatient services and physician services so that rates are 70 percent of the physician's average usual customary charges submitted to the department and the hospital's average usual outpatient charges submitted to the department. The medical assistance fee schedule shall include all acceptable medical-surgical procedures recognized and paid by medicare and Pennsylvania Blue Shield.

Mr. Speaker, I urge my colleagues' support of this amendment. Thank you.

The clerk read the following amendment No. A1438:

Amend Sec. 222, page 135, line 25, by striking out all of said line and inserting

State appropriation..... 58,534,000

On the question recurring,  
Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Cessar.

Mr. CESSAR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Naturally, I favor this amendment for several reasons. This amendment restores \$2,631,000 to the appropriation for the State Police. I think it is important that you all know that if

we do not pass this amendment or keep the amendment as I proposed it originally, there will be 160 police cadets who will not be taken into the Pennsylvania State Police. Mr. Speaker, I think it is extremely important that the complement of the State Police be maintained.

Another problem the State Police have, if we do not pass this amendment, Mr. Speaker, is that there are 40 civilian positions which are needed for the State Police to function all over the State.

Another one of the problems we have, Mr. Speaker, if we do not pass this amendment, we will not be able to upgrade the crime lab equipment. I think that is extremely important.

Also, Mr. Speaker, as you well know, the computer system in the Pennsylvania State Police is extremely important to disseminate the information to all the local police departments all over the Commonwealth, and if we do not pass this amendment, that will be deleted.

Lastly, Mr. Speaker, if we do not pass this amendment, the repair facilities to provide for handicapped access will not be taken care of.

For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I request that the members vote for my amendment.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Richardson.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, I would like to interrogate the prime sponsor of the amendment.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Cessar indicates he will stand for interrogation. Mr. Richardson, you are in order and you may proceed.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, could you tell us at this point how many cadets are in fact enlisted to go into the next class?

Mr. CESSAR. How many cadets? My understanding, Mr. Speaker, is that there will be 40 cadets for each class. The next class would be in the very near future.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Under the consent decree, do you know how many of those would be black and minority?

Mr. CESSAR. I cannot answer that, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, do you know the number of minority cadets who are supposed to be taken in within the year for the program under the State Police?

Mr. CESSAR. Mr. Speaker, I cannot answer that.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, could you tell us at this point whether or not there has been any attempt in your research that you have made concerning this amendment and the moneys that we have taken out as to whether or not the State Police have complied with the consent decree order that in fact has been so designated by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's courts?

Mr. CESSAR. Mr. Speaker, my amendment has nothing to do with the consent decree. I am just concerned in making sure that there are enough State Police to take care of the public.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Right. That was our concern also, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I would like to know if I can speak on the amendment.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may speak.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I know what this amendment tries to address, Mr. Speaker, and one of the reasons why the suggestion was made, and also the amendment by Representative Deal, to delete a certain amount of money from that section was to speak directly to the problems as they relate overall to the State Police. We have attempted on several occasions to meet with them concerning the very vital issue concerning the number of cadets who would in fact be minority, who would in fact be black, who were going into this new academy program, but we were unable to receive the information that has been so directed. We in no way want to see this Commonwealth not operate with its State Police, but there have been several inquiries made by the members of this House of Representatives concerning this issue and they have met deaf ears.

The only way that we can make any attempts on some of the problems that we are in fact facing is by at least letting them know the only place where it really counts is in their pocket, and if there is a stressful expression made by the members of this House of Representatives that there are in fact some problems, then perhaps maybe we can get them to sit down and iron out those problems that we find to be very serious, particularly when you begin to look at the number of captains, the number of sergeants, the number of lieutenants, and the number of other rank-and-file members of the State Police and recognize that very few of them are in fact minority, when in fact they were supposed to have made very serious attempts to clean up this issue. I do not think that is responsible government, and if we want to continue to appropriate money to an agency that is in fact violating the law, then fine; so let it be. But it will not be because we did not make attempts on this floor to bring the issue of our problems to the members of this House of Representatives and because we did not at least make the attempt to share those problems. Now, while it may not be a concern of the gentleman, Mr. Cessar, about this consent decree, it is a concern of ours, and we would hope that he also would want to make sure the government which we are operating is in fact doing its job and doing what it is supposed to.

In conclusion, I would say this: We are not going to be in the business any longer of just appropriating money where you are going to have continuous disregard to the public and to those individuals who are in fact responsible for going out and seeing that law enforcement is in fact taken care of within this Commonwealth, but then at the same time you do not see the same amount of promotions being made at the same level as the others are being made; you do not see the same amount of faces being involved in it, even though there is a court order to do so. I think it is irresponsible, and that expression has come through in this amendment.

For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that the members respectfully vote not in favor of amendment A1438.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Does the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Deal, wish to be recognized on the passage of the amendment?

Mr. DEAL. Mr. Speaker, may I yield to Representative Cessar?

The SPEAKER. Mr. Cessar has already spoken and, as the maker of the amendment, he will conclude the argument.

Does the gentleman, Mr. Deal, wish to speak on the amendment?

Mr. DEAL. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman.

Mr. DEAL. Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose the Cessar amendment. Mr. Speaker, I do so for several reasons. One is that I believe those of us here in the House of Representatives have a real responsibility and should accept some accountability for our actions. Mr. Speaker, there have been many allegations made about and against the conduct of many of the members of the Pennsylvania State Police. Mr. Speaker, there have been serious allegations made about the people who are in charge of the State Police.

Mr. Speaker, I had the pleasure of sitting with the Appropriations Committee when a high-ranking officer from the State Police appeared before the Appropriations Committee. Mr. Speaker, when I asked him questions, a question in particular, I asked him if an investigation had been started relative to the allegations that were made in the Federal court which involved members of the police department. Mr. Speaker, our committee was told that no investigation had begun, because the State Police had not received any of the court records where those allegations were made. Mr. Speaker, immediately after questioning that officer several times to make sure he was clear on his answers, I then went to our own legal department and found that the State Police had delivered part of the document to our department.

Mr. Speaker, there are still allegations that officers in the State Police have even sent out a memorandum demanding that police officers raise their quotas of tickets, which I believe is a violation.

Mr. Speaker, I am opposing this amendment, not that I want to hurt law enforcement—and opposing this amendment does not hurt law enforcement. Mr. Speaker, we have raised that budget over \$9 million, and all we are saying to this House is do not, do not ignore the callous disregard that the State Police has for the population of Pennsylvania and this House of Representatives, which has a responsibility to help monitor those departments that we make appropriations to.

Mr. Speaker, the \$2.4 million that we are talking about would not hurt the State Police. One of those areas that that \$2.4 million would take care of is something that we ought to be concerned about. It would cut out one of the classes, only one of those classes, and it would appear to us that we ought to be looking at the State Police to make sure that some of those uniformed officers would be out patrolling where police officers ought to be. And some of those jobs should be given to civilian personnel, which would then even help us in our budgetary process.

Mr. Speaker, I think the budget, without this amendment, has given support to the State Police. And as I close my remarks, Mr. Speaker, I would just hope that this body would recognize that all of the departments in this Commonwealth, where we have the responsibility to appropriate the taxpayers' dollars, should respect this body when we try to seek information so that we can intelligently do our job. For us to compound this insult by giving them more money, \$2.4 million extra, would be saying to the taxpayers, we do not care what happens; all we do is sit here and dole it out. Again, Mr. Speaker, as much as I would like, as much as I would like to see that a complete investigation be made, which has not come, the least we ought to do is send some kind of clear message that we were elected to represent the almost 11 million people in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and when our constituents ask us questions, we ought to be able to give them some decent answers.

Mr. Speaker, some of the serious allegations that are involved are that which came out in the court that members of the State Police removed evidence from one location and took it to another location, and we would sit here and ignore that fact and give them more money to continue to do wrong. Mr. Speaker, in those allegations, State officials who testified in the court, doing what they were morally obligated to do, and apparently because their answers went on behalf of a patrolman who was a defendant, those officers, ranking officers, were transferred. A direct coverup. We have not gotten an answer.

Mr. Speaker, there are other allegations of misappropriations. There are allegations, Mr. Speaker, of some members of the State Police having been involved in theft, and the Commissioner has not seen fit to make sure that these allegations are cleared up. I do not rise here today to condemn the entire State Police, but I believe we have a moral obligation to protect those law enforcement officers who have sworn to protect life and property in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and who daily go out and risk their lives to protect all of us. They have a right to have their names protected.

Mr. Speaker, I believe that the image of the State Police, the highest law enforcement agency in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, ought to be protected. Mr. Speaker, if we in the House, because the Commissioner has failed to do his job, if we in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives do not make the State Police Commissioner and that department accountable for their actions and their conduct, then tell me who, tell me who must accept some responsibility. Are we going to sit idly by and wait until we have the kind of display that would project a worse image of our highest law enforcement agency to the general public? Are we now, are we now, while we have an opportunity, not to crush the State Police; that is not what I am asking. All I am asking for is not to give them \$2 million. I ask you, just do not give them this \$2.4 million. Believe me when I tell you, they will understand.

Mr. Speaker, since we had a resolution on the floor and did not have the courage to stand up and be counted, since we had a resolution and buried it in a committee, buried our responsibility

like an ostrich hiding its head in the sand, since we cannot get that resolution to do what ought to be done, we have another chance today. We have a chance to say to the maker of the amendment, and I would hope he would join with us when we vote against this amendment because, Mr. Speaker, I believe when the member made that amendment, I do not think that good member of the House was aware of the seriousness of our concern to take care of our responsibility. I am confident, one of the few times that I have been confident on this floor, I am confident that the members of this House will not shirk their responsibility. I am convinced this day that the members of this House will not turn their backs on the 11 million people in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. I am confident that you will today send a message to the State Police that we love you, we are concerned about that department, but we are concerned about the poor image that is coming from our law enforcement agency.

Mr. Speaker, I beg you; Mr. Speaker, I implore you, to join us, join us on the right side and make sure that we say to the State Police now, you can no longer ignore this House and ignore our responsibility. We must, in our vote today, say to the State Police, no one, no Governor, no member of the House, no State Police, no department can rise above the law and ignore the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. I beg you, Mr. Speaker, let us join together and show the people here in Pennsylvania that we will settle for nothing but the best from those who are sworn to uphold the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Cessar.

Mr. CESSAR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the remarks of the distinguished gentleman from Philadelphia, but I would just reaffirm to the members of this General Assembly for the members' consideration the facts that I articulated previously, that I would certainly ask their support for the Pennsylvania State Police and to vote in the affirmative on my amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. SALVATORE offered the following amendment No. A1817:

Amend Sec. 206, page 28, by inserting between lines 27 and 28

For distribution by the State Treasurer in the same ratio as used to distribute the foreign fire insurance tax for tax year 1983 pursuant to section 2 of the act of June 28, 1895 (P.L.408, No.289), referred to as the Foreign Fire Tax Allocation Law. In those municipalities which have paid firefighters, these funds shall be used for purposes of granting cost-of-living increases to retired firefighters.

State appropriation..... 13,200,000

For distribution solely for purposes of granting cost-of-living increases to retired police officers by the State Treasurer pursuant to the act of May 12, 1943 (P.L.259, No.120), referred to as the Foreign Casualty Insurance Premium Tax Allocation Law.

State appropriation..... 20,000,000

On the question,  
Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Salvatore.

Mr. SALVATORE. Mr. Speaker, I hope the amendment is right this time.

Mr. Speaker, I think some of the members are confused in what this amendment does. I just want to explain it.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman has the right to explain his amendment. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Salvatore, on the amendment.

Mr. SALVATORE. Mr. Speaker, what this amendment does is it does not hurt any of the volunteer fire companies. All we are trying to do is provide a cost-of-living increase for the retired firefighters and the retired policemen. Now, there has to be enabling legislation to do this. Mr. Speaker, all we are doing is saying that this money should be set aside for that purpose. There still has to be legislation passed to do this. All we are trying to do is take this money and set it aside. The volunteer firemen will not be hurt by this piece of legislation. All we are saying is that the retired firefighters and retired policemen put together a cost-of-living increase once enabling legislation is passed.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the Salvatore amendment, the Chair recognizes the majority whip.

Mr. O'DONNELL. Mr. Speaker, I would like to interrogate the sponsor.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Salvatore indicates he will stand for interrogation. Mr. O'Donnell is in order and he may proceed.

Mr. O'DONNELL. Mr. Speaker, are either of these funds presently in the bill in any amount?

Mr. SALVATORE. In the bill? No, they are not in the bill now. In the budget? No. This is an amendment to the budget.

Mr. O'DONNELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The majority whip is in order and he may speak on the amendment.

Mr. O'DONNELL. Mr. Speaker, a cost-of-living increase or some kind of increase is certainly in order for the firemen and policemen of this State, but I think there is a significant financial question that is raised here.

To come to the point, Mr. Speaker, I would urge a "no" vote because this money is an attempt to reapportion to paid firefighters and paid policemen money that is allocated by virtue of a foreign fire and casualty premium tax, and I do not think that that kind of reallocation should take place in this document.

The other way of looking at this is that it would add \$33.2 million to the General Fund. I do not think that is the gentleman's intention, but I do not think we should redivide this money based on a budget amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Salvatore, for the second time.

Mr. SALVATORE. Mr. Speaker, this is money that will come from the General Fund because currently we have this money being paid into the General Fund by the domestic fire and casualty companies. This money would then be redirected into this fund.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Westmoreland, Mr. Hutchinson.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. Mr. Speaker, if it does not come out of the General Fund—not the foreign fire insurance fund, the General Fund—it will hurt volunteer firemen by the tune of \$20 million for the police and \$18 million for the firemen. It will hurt us.

If he lets his bill run that it is going to run, there is no harm in that, but when he is appropriating foreign fire insurance money, he is hurting volunteer firemen. Vote “no.”

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Gannon.

Mr. GANNON. Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask the prime sponsor a question.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Salvatore indicates he will stand for interrogation. Mr. Gannon may proceed.

Mr. GANNON. A statement was made, Mr. Speaker, that this amendment appropriates money from the foreign fire insurance tax. Is that true?

Mr. SALVATORE. Not from the foreign; no.

Mr. GANNON. Now, is any money that goes to volunteer fire companies from the domestic insurance tax?

Mr. SALVATORE. Presently, none of it goes from the domestic; no. We are not touching the volunteer firemen because they get this from the foreign fire and the policemen get it from the foreign casualty.

Mr. GANNON. Well, then is it true if a statement is made that this appropriates money from the foreign fire insurance tax?

Mr. SALVATORE. No, it does not.

Mr. GANNON. So that is not true. It does not appropriate any money from the foreign fire insurance tax.

Mr. SALVATORE. No, it does not.

Mr. GANNON. Does it appropriate any money from the domestic?

Mr. SALVATORE. No, it does not, because legislation has to be provided to do that. All we are saying is when the money is provided, that it would go for cost of living. Otherwise, municipalities could use the money for other things.

Mr. GANNON. Does this amendment add money to the foreign fire insurance tax fund?

Mr. SALVATORE. It does, yes, but it has to be set aside specifically for cost of living, once the legislation is passed to implement what I want to do. In other words, what I am saying is it adds to it, but it cannot be used. It has to be set aside for cost of living for firemen and policemen once legislation is passed.

Mr. GANNON. So this would add money. It does not take any money away from the foreign.

Mr. SALVATORE. It adds money; yes.

Mr. GANNON. It would add money to the foreign fire insurance tax.

Mr. SALVATORE. Yes, it does.

Mr. GANNON. That money would be used for a cost-of-living adjustment for policemen.

Mr. SALVATORE. Policemen and firemen; yes.

Mr. GANNON. Do you know when the last time was the police received a cost-of-living adjustment?

Mr. SALVATORE. They never have.

Mr. GANNON. So they have never received a cost-of-living increase.

Mr. SALVATORE. No. We have provided cost of living for teachers but never the firemen or the policemen.

Mr. GANNON. So it is true if I say that what you are simply doing here is providing a vehicle for a cost-of-living increase for policemen?

Mr. SALVATORE. That is right, sir.

Mr. GANNON. Is this the way it has to be done?

Mr. SALVATORE. Yes, it has to be done. That is the way I am told it has to be done; yes.

Mr. GANNON. But it does not take any money away from those who already receive money from the foreign fire insurance tax.

Mr. SALVATORE. It does not take any money away from any volunteer firemen.

Mr. GANNON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Hutchinson, for the second time on the amendment.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. First I want to make a point of privilege. Two people who are on the bill are asking each other questions, and they know what it is already.

Will Mr. Salvatore answer a couple of my questions?

The SPEAKER. Mr. Salvatore indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. Where are we going to get this money? You said four different ways and you have jitterbugged pretty nicely, but where are we going to get the money?

Mr. SALVATORE. Well, I have seen you dance and you do not dance as well as I.

Mr. Speaker, I will tell you where we are going to get the money. We are going to take the money out of the General Fund, because there are moneys that have been allocated from the domestic moneys which are going into the General Fund.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. That bill has not passed yet.

Mr. SALVATORE. I said that we have to have legislation to pass before we can do anything.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks Mr. Salvatore.

Mr. Hutchinson is in order and speaks for the second time on the amendment.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. Mr. Speaker, the other day you said that Mr. Salvatore was out of order because he was sitting on a bill coming up. We do not bet on the outcome. This is not Atlantic City. We do not know anything about that domestic bill, and it is not going to pass anyhow because those insurance companies will be in here en masse for a new tax.



The SPEAKER. For the gentleman's information, Mr. Salvatore's current amendment does not refer to any other bill.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. But he has not told me where the money is coming from. He says it is coming out of the General Fund and a domestic tax which is not on the books.

The SPEAKER. The Chair assumes that the gentleman, Mr. Hutchinson, is against the amendment.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. Well, I want to know— He is telling people here that it is coming out of the regular fund and it is going to come later on to be paid back by a domestic tax which will not pass.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. HUTCHINSON. Okay. You want to know my answer: Everybody vote "no." If you want to vote more money— The reason why we are in here for these taxes is because the local administrations did not put enough money in their budgets to keep up with the taxes to pay the retirement. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lehigh, Mr. Snyder.

Mr. D. W. SNYDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Since I was adamantly opposed to Mr. Salvatore's initial amendment, he has asked me to at least make some explanation of what changes were made from the original amendment.

The foreign fire insurance premium right now does not appear in the budget at all. It is a 2-percent tax paid by out-of-State insurance companies for both casualty and for fire insurance premiums. It is a pass-through; therefore, the appropriations to our volunteer and to the municipal fire companies and police departments do not appear in the budget as it is.

What this amendment would do is take the money from the General Fund, which are revenues that come from the domestic insurance companies. They also pay the 2 percent, but rather than that money being allocated to the municipalities, that money goes into the General Fund, theoretically to the Insurance Department for general operations. This would be an appropriation from General Fund revenues specifically allocated for the foreign fire insurance allocations. It will be an increase in the amount of money all the municipalities currently receive. The distribution will be both to volunteer and paid companies. Except for the paid fire companies and paid police departments, the appropriation restricts the additional funds that would go to those municipalities to only be used for cost-of-living increases. For the volunteer companies, the money could be used as the foreign fire insurance law currently permits.

I am not saying to vote "yes" or "no" on this particular amendment. I just thought an explanation was necessary. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the question recurring,

Will the House agree to the amendments?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes, on amendment A1419, the gentleman from Venango, Mr. Peterson.

Mr. PETERSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I will be brief. This is the amendment that we have considered twice now. It passed the first time and was defeated the second time by a very close margin. It is the amendment that removes the line item of \$9.5 million for 19 nursing homes and will appropriate that money to all of the nursing homes across the Commonwealth.

I believe this is an unfair distribution. We have a lot of nursing homes across the Commonwealth which are having their difficulties. I believe the language is very, very vague

that is in this bill. I myself believe the Department of Welfare will have a very difficult time even getting this money to the homes that it is earmarked for, and I urge the members to support this amendment. It will increase the line item for nursing homes, for all our nursing homes, by \$9.5 million. I ask for positive support of this amendment.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Richardson.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, I would like to interrogate the sponsor of the amendment.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Peterson, indicates he will stand for interrogation. Mr. Richardson may proceed.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, could you explain to the members of this House what you are trying to do with this amendment? Mr. Speaker, we went through this last week, and for the sake of a lot of members who may not remember, could you cite for us the 19 area nursing homes that you are referring to specifically, please?

Mr. PETERSON. I believe that is a part of the record, and I believe I gave that—

Mr. RICHARDSON. No. I think the amendment, Mr. Speaker, is under now a second reconsideration, which means that that information now would be invalid, and now we are asking that specific information for the members of this House of Representatives. I would like to know, what are those 19 nursing homes?

Mr. PETERSON. Does the Speaker suggest that I read this list to the whole House?

The SPEAKER. If the gentleman will, so we may get on with the business of the House. It may not affect the vote, but please read it so we may proceed.

Mr. PETERSON. Downtown Jewish Home-Aged, Philadelphia; Holy Family Home, Philadelphia; Mercy Douglas Human Services, Philadelphia; St. Ignatius N.H., Philadelphia; Lutheran Home at Germantown, Philadelphia; Uptown Home, Philadelphia; Home for Jewish Aged, Philadelphia; Stephen Smith Home, Philadelphia; Pleasant Valley Manor, Lancaster; Allied Services, Lackawanna; Odd Fellows Home, Dauphin; Masonic Homes, Lancaster; Pennsylvania Memorial Home, Jefferson; St. Barnabas, Inc., Allegheny; Little Sisters of Poor, Allegheny; Jewish Home and Hospital, Allegheny; Lemington Home, Allegheny; Pennknoll Village, Bradford. That is it.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, it is also my understanding that your attempt is to spread money across the entire Commonwealth for the purpose of all nursing homes throughout the entire Commonwealth. How many nursing homes are there throughout the entire Commonwealth?

Mr. PETERSON. 533.

Mr. RICHARDSON. 500 and what?

Mr. PETERSON. Thirty-three.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Out of those 533, how many are in fact taking on what you raised as a question last week, those patients who fall in the category of receiving any kind of medical assistance?

Mr. PETERSON. The majority of the nursing homes in the Commonwealth have above the 70-percent figure which is in the bill, the criteria listed for nursing homes that would qualify with 70 percent medical assistance. Most of our nursing homes do have above 70 percent medical assistance. In fact, I checked with my nursing homes. Many of them were in the figure of 80 and 85 percent.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Of those 19, do those 19 qualify?

Mr. PETERSON. Pardon?

Mr. RICHARDSON. Of those 19 that you suggested be deleted from this particular amendment, do they qualify?

Mr. PETERSON. Yes; they were all in the 70-percent bracket.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Right. And of the remaining 484, could you express to us in numbers how many of the rest of them would qualify?

Mr. PETERSON. I have no idea.

Mr. RICHARDSON. That is what I thought.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to know if I am in order and can proceed?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may speak on the amendment.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, we rose last week to oppose this amendment, and I do so also again this week, and that is A1419.

It seems to me that many of us are not aware of the fact that when you are talking about nursing homes within this Commonwealth, the gentleman failed to recognize that there are many that are very affluent nursing homes within this Commonwealth which do very well. It would seem to me that those persons who fall in the category of being disadvantaged and are not able, unfortunately, to take care of themselves where medical assistance cards are required, it seems that we are moving in a direct relationship to get rid of those nursing homes which in fact need the most aid and most assistance because they do have the most number of persons in them who require medical assistance.

Unfortunately, because there seems to be some direct attack on old people in this Commonwealth, and particularly because they happen to fall in the category, we have cited only these particular 19 nursing homes. I think it is an affront to those individual persons. I do not see it as a comprehensive, collective way of trying to spread money all across the board, but I see it as an attempt to hurt those who are less fortunate. I would ask the members of this House to be very cognizant of what their vote was last week in respect to this and remember that it is only because of the fact that there are people who cannot fend for themselves who have been receiving this assistance, and now that assistance will be taken away from them. I ask the members to vote in the negative on this amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Preston.

Mr. PRESTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the gentleman, Mr. Peterson, stand for interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Peterson, indicates he will so stand. The gentleman, Mr. Preston, is in order and may proceed.

Mr. PRESTON. Again, could you repeat how many nursing homes are registered in the State of Pennsylvania?

Mr. PETERSON. I believe the figure is 533.

Mr. PRESTON. Of those 533, how many of them are non-profit?

Mr. PETERSON. Just a moment, please.

I do not have that figure.

Mr. PRESTON. In other words, you do not know how many are nonprofit, but yet in a sense the 19 that we are talking about are nonprofit. Am I correct?

Mr. PETERSON. Yes. But there are a lot of nonprofits besides those. I mean, that is just a small minority of the nonprofits.

Mr. PRESTON. Could you give me a percentage, out of those 19, of the population within those 19 homes that are also possibly from outside the county?

Mr. PETERSON. Let me answer your first question. I have just been told that over 200 of the homes in the Commonwealth are nonprofit. So 10 percent of them are receiving this benefit, where 90 percent are not.

Mr. PRESTON. Of the 200 that are nonprofit, and excluding the 19, what are the average bed capacities of the other, say, 180?

Mr. PETERSON. I do not have that figure. I can tell you the list of 19 goes from barely 100 up to 500. It varies. The 19 that are being affected by the appropriation that is in the bill vary from 100 beds up to close to 500 beds.

Mr. PRESTON. Can you tell me, though, minus the 19 that are nonprofit, if the average bed is 50? Is it 75? Is it 25, or is it equal to the other 19?

Mr. PETERSON. I can list them here - 115, 130, 180, 176, 169, 240, 468, 226, 114, 180, 102, 482, 100, 107, 100, 392, 180, and 133. I would say that is about 175 average.

Mr. PRESTON. Mr. Speaker, that is not the question I asked. My question is, minus the 19, what is the average bed capacity of the other nonprofit hospitals?

Mr. PETERSON. I do not know. All I can say from checking in my own area, most of my nursing homes approach 100 beds or that is usually a goal.

Mr. PRESTON. A hundred or less, probably, in the smaller areas?

Mr. PETERSON. Yes; it depends.

Mr. PRESTON. Would you say that most of the smaller ones in the counties take care of people who are originally from that county?

Mr. PETERSON. Not in nonprofit, no.

Mr. PRESTON. Would you say that they are from all over the other counties then? The nonprofit ones?

Mr. PETERSON. In thinking of my own district, I do not think they worry about county lines in nonprofit. We are not speaking about county homes here; we are speaking about nonprofit private.

Mr. PRESTON. What I am trying to get at— May I make a comment, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is through with the interrogation. He may make a comment on the amendment.

Mr. PRESTON. This amendment will affect my own district, because I have one of the oldest nursing homes in the State, and as a matter of fact, almost in the country. It was founded in the 1800's. It handles an awful lot of disadvantages and it does not denote as far as wherever anyone is from. An awful lot of the larger nursing homes also take care of an awful lot of people because they want to be able to put them in an urban access. I do not think it would be fair, when we have an awful lot of nursing homes in urban areas who have higher operating costs, who perform more of a charitable service, and I think that we need to stop. We need to stop giving money to those people who already have it. Like it says on the Coke bottle, "no deposit, no return." And I do not think that we should continue to feed those people who already have more than is needed and can pay their own way.

I think that what these hospitals are trying to do is perform a service, a service for those people who have the problem of meeting their needs. Basically what you are saying is, even though this hospital may be 50 or 100 and it is in this county, first being in Philadelphia, or east or west, therefore, it should be equally spread all around where there are people here, where, for an example, in my hospital it takes over 300 volunteers to even offset some of the costs, and even then it is still losing money. But yet we have fought to keep it in existence, and it takes an awful lot of people to contribute money on a personal basis every year, year in and year out. What you are saying is that the hundreds of thousands of people within an area who support, hundreds of thousands of people within an area who actually support and who pay taxes, and if you look at the ratio and if you wanted to go proportionately, you would find that most of the money, even more than that, would go into those areas. I cannot imagine that you would discriminate in that type of way for senior citizens, for people, and, I say again, nonprofit agencies, and to supplement those people who are making a profit. I do not think we can continue to do that. I would ask for a negative vote on the Peterson amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lackawanna, Mr. Cawley, on the Peterson amendment.

Mr. CAWLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

May I interrogate the speaker, please?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Peterson, indicates he will stand for interrogation. The gentleman, Mr. Cawley, is in order and may proceed.

Mr. CAWLEY. Mr. Speaker, would you please check County and let me know if your amendment is taking money from Allied Services in Lackawanna County?

Mr. PETERSON. The bill as presently drafted, without my amendment, lists Allied Services LTC (long-term care) of Lackawanna County with 180 beds as a home that would receive some portion thereof of the \$9.5 million. It does not say how much.

Mr. CAWLEY. Are you eliminating Allied Services, Mr. Speaker?

Mr. PETERSON. I would not eliminate them; I would appropriate the money so that everybody would have a portion of it, not just 19.

Mr. CAWLEY. Are you reducing Allied Services, Mr. Speaker?

Mr. PETERSON. I guess that would be so, yes.

Mr. CAWLEY. One more question, Mr. Speaker. Outside of Philadelphia County and Allegheny County, can you please repeat the other numbers slowly so that the other Representatives can hear it before they vote "no"?

Mr. PETERSON. Dauphin, Lancaster, Jefferson, and Bedford.

Mr. CAWLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Mercer, Mr. Fargo.

Mr. FARGO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I really want to just stand up to apologize to my colleagues for my standing up at the time of the last vote. Regardless, I think we really ought to look at this plan which I feel, if you look at the way it is presently written before the amendment, is a poorly conceived plan to provide a few nursing homes in urban areas with what appears to be, really, to me, a license to steal.

Let me read the way it is as far as the bill itself is concerned before the amendment: "This appropriation"—and we are talking about the \$9.5 million—"shall be allocated to those free-standing nonprofit, nongovernmental nursing facilities with current operating budget deficits." Now, you tell me what a current operating budget deficit is. I think for the last 3 days we have been developing a current operating budget deficit here for the State of Pennsylvania, and you see how easy it is to do it, which really means that under this plan, these 19 illy conceived nursing homes that we have set aside a very complicated-type plan to make sure that they qualify, what they have to do first is show that they have a budget deficit. Then when they have determined that they have a budget deficit— And, as I say, I think we have proven that we can create a budget deficit, and they can also anytime they want to. A budget is just that. It is a budget, and when you want a budget deficit, you show more expenditures than what you have as far as revenue is concerned.

Further, the allocation of this \$9.5 million is somehow based on a current spending cash deficiency. Now, a current cash deficiency, and I would take umbrage to the prior speaker's terms that other nursing homes are really receiving a lot of extra money and are operating at a profit. I think if you look at any of the nursing homes, and especially the nonprofit, nongovernmental nursing homes, you will find that with a new procedure in skilled care as opposed to intermediate care and the procedures that have been foisted upon them by the regulations of the Welfare Department, there are very few of these nursing homes that do not have a current cash deficiency as far as operating is concerned. So we are not

taking in this amendment money that is not going to be used in places where it should be used.

I think it is extremely important that we make sure that we spread this money among all the nursing homes, and believe me, all of these nursing homes are needy nursing homes. Do not use a contrived formula that limits it to just 19 of those nursing homes in Pennsylvania. And I do not believe that we are being unfair to those nursing homes either. I just feel that we should have some measurable way of making sure that all of the nursing homes share in this money and that we are not setting aside \$9.5 million for just 19 nursing homes, wherever they may be, in Pennsylvania. I would sincerely hope that you would vote for this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Cowell.

Mr. COWELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the maker of this amendment has a legitimate cause but an inappropriate solution. I think we need to keep in mind why this language is in this bill to begin with. It is an attempt to help these 19 institutions that face closing, help them keep their doors open, help insure that there is a place for their particular clients or patients to continue to live and be served. Taking this small amount of money that is in this bill currently and spreading it among 500 institutions will not solve the problem that this original language tried to address. Spreading the money among 500 institutions will probably insure that the 19 institutions for whom this language was intended will still have to close their doors in some cases. There is a larger problem, but we are only going to solve that with a larger amount of money. We ought not to take a step backward from what we tried to do with the language currently in the bill. I would urge that we defeat this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Barber.

Mr. BARBER. Mr. Speaker, it amazes me when we sit here today and vote it again and again, and I am positive that many of us voted for amendments we did not know anything about. Now we have an amendment that is going to knock out 19 nursing homes. This is not a Republican amendment; this is not a Democratic amendment; this is for poor people. I know that in my district I have three nursing homes. I believe Mr. Peterson stated St. Ignatius, Stephen Smith, and a Jewish one by the name of Brody's home. I cannot believe that Mr. Peterson, a colleague of mine and a personal friend of mine, would be against senior citizens, and a majority of the people in nursing homes are senior citizens. I would beg that both sides of the aisle vote "no" on Mr. Peterson's amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

### PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lehigh, Mr. Snyder.

Mr. D. W. SNYDER. Mr. Speaker, a question of parliamentary procedure on this vote.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will state the question.

Mr. D. W. SNYDER. The budget reads, "...free-standing nonprofit, nongovernmental nursing facilities...." Now, that is already in the proposed budget, and I am not sure how rule 34 applies to that with reference to the amendment, because rule 34 deals with nonpreferred appropriations which these definitely appear to be due to the fact they are not under State control and would require two-thirds vote in the positive. How does that apply to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. The appropriation does not go to the corporations; it goes to the Department of Welfare, and we still, in this Commonwealth, do appropriate money to the Department of Welfare.

Does the gentleman have any other statement?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Preston, for the second time.

Mr. PRESTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I ask my colleagues to vote "no," and the reasons why, again, I want someone to give me an answer how I can go back to my district and say that my colleagues voted, for the average age of people in one nursing home of 71, that they no longer have a place to go. I want to know, which one of you is going to take them in? Which one of you is going to be held responsible and is willing to come in and explain it? Because that is exactly what we will be doing if we vote "yes" on this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes, for the second time, the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Richardson.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Mr. Speaker, in all deference to the time on this matter, I would like to know whether or not we may have a copy of the list of 19. There was never a formal list made of them, and although it was asked the other day—

The SPEAKER. Mr. Richardson, the gentleman, Mr. Peterson, has read that list twice now.

Mr. RICHARDSON. But, Mr. Speaker, I am not asking for it to be read; I am just asking to have a copy of it.

The SPEAKER. Do you have a printed copy? Would you give it to the clerk and ask for it to be duplicated, please.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Specifically, Mr. Speaker, as I speak, I would like to relate to it if I possibly can, if the vote is not going to be taken before I finish my second time in speaking on the amendment, and that is that out of those nursing homes, some of them are listed in the Germantown community, which is part of my legislative district. Also, many of the members who are sitting in and around this area have asked specifically whether or not it impacts on their area and their community and, even though they may have heard it called off, are confused about whether or not that in fact would be in fact a good gesture.

I just wanted to point out that many of the nursing homes that are being listed are nursing homes that are in fact struggling, trying to make it, and in fact any reduction of any moneys in their particular community would in fact mean a loss of maybe beds, a loss of those persons who are now considered senior citizens falling in that nursing care area to be in fact reduced. I do not think that is what we want to do. I think that too many senior citizens have already paid their price in this Commonwealth, and it is unfair for them to be placed in a position of jeopardy or placed in a position of being threatened by anybody who would in fact say that there has to be a reduction in order for there to be an answer.

In those specifically within the Germantown area—I am talking about the Lutheran Home of Germantown; I am talking about the Mercy Douglas Human Services Home; St. Ignatius—specifically indicating those areas and indicating that with these beds in our particular community, those that would be lost as a result of any reduction would in fact mean severe waiting lists of individual persons who in fact would be able to go into these nursing homes, and we do not feel that a reduction in their moneys and a reduction in the number of beds to these institutions should in fact be the overall reason for why there should be a combination of trying to say that 533 nursing homes would in fact resolve the particular problem Mr. Peterson wants to do. I believe that it is in violation, and, again, I would ask support of the members to vote "no" on the Peterson amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes, for the second time, the gentleman, Mr. Peterson, on his amendment.

Mr. PETERSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I will be very brief.

It has been suggested here that I am opposed or against the poor and elderly, and that is not true. I think if we are going to have a program in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to help private, nonprofit nursing homes that are in trouble, let us design one. Let us come up with some tight criteria that they have to come into so that all of our nursing homes that are in the same cash position can have the same kind of help. Let us not let somebody pick 19 nursing homes at their discretion, write some vague language, list them, and say we are going to give those 19 nursing homes \$9.5 million. I do not think that is fair. I think we all have nursing homes. In the criteria they locked out nursing homes with less than 100 beds. Small nursing homes have greater financial problems than big ones. We all know how the economics of scale work. And what does that do? That hurts rural areas.

I believe that if we are going to have a bail-out program to help nursing homes, private ones that are in trouble, let us do it in a fair way. In the meantime, let us take the \$9.5 million here and distribute it evenly. If someone wants to come up with a formula to help nursing homes in some other way, I would be glad to work with them, but I think this is very unfair. It helps 19 and leaves all of the others—it could be dozens or hundreds out there—in the very same situation with no help at all. I do not think that is fair, and I ask for positive support of this amendment.

### REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Richardson.

Mr. RICHARDSON. I wish to submit the following remarks for the record.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will send the remarks to the clerk.

Mr. RICHARDSON submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

The OMBE (Office of Minority Business Enterprise) amendment, A1820, accomplishes three things. First, it reduces the general government appropriation to Commerce by \$150,000. Second, it allocates by a separate line item that same \$150,000 to the Office of Minority Business Enterprise to perform those functions already done by that office; i.e., to monitor and support minority business enterprise participation in the private and public segment of the Commonwealth's economy. The purpose of this aspect of the amendment is to provide line-item status to an essential function which at present depends for its existence on the goodwill and whim of the Secretary and Governor.

Thirdly, this amendment centralizes in the Office of Minority Business Enterprise the authority to certify business as minority owned, controlled, and operated. The purpose of the centralization is to make it easier for minority businesses and Commonwealth agencies to realize compliance with contracting goals and obligations.

At present there are four employees in OMBE. Last June there were five persons with a \$150,000 cost. This amendment would preserve the fifth position as well as permit additional personnel to perform the certification function.

In 1982, \$18 million in contracts went to minority and disadvantaged contractors; in 1983, only \$9 million went to them. The concern this amendment reflects is, with certification centralization and the preservation of a five-person core staff complement, a vital initiative supportive of minority business enterprises will be advanced. In other words, unless we pass this amendment, the 1984 minority business enterprise contracts may shrink as low as \$1 or \$2 million.

The OIC (Opportunities Industrialization Centers) amendment, A1812, proposes to add \$1.5 million to the planning and implementation of the statewide manpower employment and training program. The total would be \$4.236 million.

This amendment will assist the Department of Community Affairs to develop a statewide program of grants-in-aid to local programs which provide job training to unemployed, underemployed, and economically disadvantaged persons.

During calendar year 1983, the Commonwealth's unemployment rate averaged 11.8 percent and 10.9 percent the previous year, double digits, and exceeded the national average. Significant pockets of severe unemployment and underemployment have persisted throughout the Commonwealth since the recession of 1979, producing whole regions of severe double-digit unemployment at times approaching 20 percent. Although the dislocated workers, victimized by plant shutdowns and obsolete manufacturing techniques, have garnered the lion's share of public and media attention, the basic employability preparation needs of tens of thousands of Pennsylvania's workers are not being addressed. For 20 years, Opportunities Industrialization Centers (OIC's) have been meeting that basic need for job readiness training and basic skill development among those citizens who historically benefit most from vocational education and self-employment programs.
