**BILLS ON THIRD  
CONSIDERATION CONTINUED**

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 2508, PN 3515**, entitled:

An Act to provide from the General Fund for the expenses of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth, the public debt and for the public schools for the fiscal year July 1, 1986, to June 30, 1987, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1986; to provide appropriations from the Pennsylvania Economic Revitalization Fund to the Executive Department; to provide for the appropriation of Federal funds to the Executive and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth and for the establishment of restricted receipt accounts for the fiscal year July 1, 1986, to June 30, 1987, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending July 30, 1986, and providing additional appropriations to the Executive Department of the Commonwealth for the fiscal year July 1, 1985, to June 30, 1986.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, could we have some attention for just a moment, please?

The SPEAKER. Present the argument, Mr. Cowell, quickly.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, I know that nobody is paying much attention to the amendments they are voting for yesterday and today. We just adopted an amendment that has some serious implications for distribution of school subsidy money. Now, we know that is not the final note on this issue. There was an important initiative in Mr. Fox's amendment, and that was a 90-percent minimum guarantee that is very important to probably some 80 school districts around this State, but the implications are that you will take money away from other districts.

The amendment that I have before the House at this point largely was adopted yesterday. It provides for another \$30 million. We call it textbook and library equipment; the Governor called it tax relief. The point is that it ought to be distributed on the basis of students rather than ESBE (equalized subsidy for basic education) formula.

This amendment also provides \$28 million for remediation. That would be distributed on the basis of test scores rather than ESBE. Those two sections of this amendment were adopted yesterday. The difference is that I would have provided for a portion of money—

Mr. HAYES. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the minority whip. Why do you interrupt?

Mr. HAYES. Excuse me, Mr. Speaker. The gentleman has a right to be heard, but evidently his microphone is not

working, and the gentleman is correct - he is offering a very important amendment.

The SPEAKER. Stop the clock.

Take another microphone, Mr. Cowell. You have another 40 seconds.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, is this mike on?

The SPEAKER. That mike is on, but in 40 seconds your time will be up.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, I was simply observing that we are dealing with some important amendments and some people ought to be careful how they vote. We just adopted the Fox amendment that would effectively take money away from many school districts and shift it to some 80 districts that in fact have legitimate need, minimum guarantee districts. He proposed a 90-percent minimum guarantee.

The Commonwealth shall also be required to fund the additional contributions incurred by school districts, intermediate units and area vocational-technical schools, resulting from the adjustments to the salary schedule or system

under 24 Pa.C.S. §§ 8326 (relating to contributions by the Commonwealth), 8327 (relating to payments by employers) and 8329 (relating to payments on account of social security deductions from appropriations).

The Commonwealth shall fund the additional salary expenses for substitute teachers resulting from this teacher salary subsidy and additional contributions incurred by school districts, intermediate units and area vocational-technical schools under 24 Pa.C.S. §§ 8326 (relating to contributions by the Commonwealth), 8327 (relating to payments by employers) and 8329 (relating to payments on account of social security deductions from appropriations). tive to childbirth. If any portion or condition of this appropriation is enjoined, in whole or in part, all payments made under the authority of this appropriation shall be suspended for the time that any such injunction remains in effect. If any portion or condition of this appropriation shall be invalidated, in whole or in part, no further payments shall be made under the authority of this appropriation.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Delaware, Mr. Freind.

Mr. FREIND. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment is cosponsored by more than 30 members. It is identical to HB 1965 and virtually identical to an amendment which we passed in last year's budget by a vote of 191 to 7, which unfortunately was taken out in conference committee. What this does is appropriate \$2 million to the Department of Public Welfare for the purchase of services from organizations to assist women with crisis pregnancies.

These organizations have to have three characteristics: Number one, they have to be nonprofit, 501(c)(3) under the IRS (Internal Revenue Service) Code; number two, they cannot predicate their services on a requirement that a woman give up her baby for adoption; and number three, the organizations can have no connection whatsoever with abortion, including the performance of abortions, the referring of abortions, or abortion counseling.

Now, Planned Parenthood, for whatever reason, is opposing this amendment, which just solidifies my opinion that it is a good amendment. But keep in mind this is new money. We are not taking any Family Planning money away. The Family Planning groups get over \$10 million as it is from title 20 and title 10 money. Because of the regs, these organizations get no money whatsoever.

We are trying to assist those women who need help - food, shelter, clothing, medical attention - but who will not go to any organization which is connected with abortion. In fact, it is prochoice in the very essence of the word. These women also deserve a choice. Why any group which purports to assist women would oppose this is way beyond me.

I sincerely hope, regardless of whether you support or oppose the right to an abortion, that you vote in favor of this amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment—run the clock on the debate—the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bucks, Mr. Greenwood.

Mr. GREENWOOD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The members may want to take their automatic pilot switches off for this vote. This is a controversial vote.

It may be way beyond Mr. Freind why any organization would oppose this language but it is not way beyond a lot of us. Let me tell you what I think a problem is.

This is an ostrich amendment. This is an amendment that says only those organizations that will close their minds and

close their eyes to alternatives are entitled to receive funding. It is not open to all organizations, and it is not open to an organization that says you have a choice and one of your choices is to carry the pregnancy to term, and if you do we will help you with that, and here is another choice, and adoption is a choice, and keeping the baby is a choice, and having an abortion is a choice, because in reality those are the alternatives.

I have no problem and I do not think anyone has a problem with funding that would go to organizations that clearly favor one or the other of those choices, including a prolife organization, but to set up a fund using taxpayers' money and then to say if you recognize one of the choices of reality then you are not eligible for that money and if you talk about that choice as a possibility you are not eligible for funding I think is wrong. What it sets up is what goes on across this Commonwealth right now, and that is phony organizations that advertise themselves as birth control information centers or as abortion referral centers and are really in the business of bringing women into their facilities strictly for the purpose of directing them in one specific direction. I think that is wrong. I think it is a mistake for us to pass this kind of amendment, and I would urge a "no" vote.

DAIRY PRINCESS PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the lady from Centre, Mrs. Rudy, to make a presentation.

Mrs. RUDY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Miss Heald, would you come up and stand behind me here?

This June we celebrate the 50th anniversary observance of Pennsylvania Dairy Month. Beth Heald, the Pennsylvania Dairy Princess, has been very busy reminding residents of this Commonwealth that milk is the official beverage in Pennsylvania. I know some of you might disagree, but she says that it is the official beverage in Pennsylvania.

Her promotion of dairy products throughout this great Commonwealth will benefit our State dairy farmers through increased consumption of dairy products in many categories.



Therefore, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to present this citation from the Pennsylvania House of Representatives to the 1985-86 Pennsylvania Dairy Princess, and, Beth, I would like to read the citation at this time.

WHEREAS, Elizabeth Amy Heald, the nineteen year old daughter of C. William and Judith Heald of Spring Mills, was crowned 1985-86 Pennsylvania Dairy Princess. A 1984 graduate of Penns Valley High School, Miss Heald is a Dairy Production major at the Pennsylvania State University where she is actively involved in the Dairy Science Club, Block and Bridle Club and Alpha Gamma Rho. She served as president and secretary of the 4-H Dairy Club and was Centre County Alternate Dairy Princess for 1983-84.

Now therefore, The House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania extends hearty congratulations to Elizabeth Amy Heald on being crowned 1985-86 Pennsylvania Dairy Princess; wishes her the best in her future endeavors;...

Congratulations, Beth, on your accomplishment.

Beth would like to say a few words to you at this time.

Miss HEALD. Thank you, Representative Rudy.

Dairy Princesses are somewhat like politicians. I am representing the Pennsylvania dairy farmers, whereas you are representing Pennsylvania constituents. I have found this role to be a very challenging role in that, as you may find in politics, not everyone has the same opinion about how things should be run, how things should be handled, and dairy farmers are the same way. They have different ideas about how they should be represented and how they should be promoted, and I have spent several months since my State crown learning about dairy farmers and how they would like to be represented and doing just that - representing them. I would like to thank you for this opportunity to come into our State's capitol and receive this citation from Mrs. Rudy.

Dairy farmers are very eager to help themselves. Frequently we have government policies that encourage dairy farmers to work together and are encouraging our financial status, but they are also eager to work for themselves in that we are using our money from milk checks to develop and establish an advertising program. And we are not advertising just for our own personal benefits, we are not advertising only for the financial benefits; we are also advertising for America's health, for Pennsylvania's health. The dairy industry and dairy products are very valuable to Pennsylvania citizens in their nutrients and their economical value, and so we are promoting for these reasons, not only because of the personal financial reasons.

One of the things that I have enjoyed saying this year is that there is not a surplus of milk—and you may all say, huh, there sure is. There is not a surplus of milk; there just are not enough people drinking milk. That will take care of our surplus.

The House has supported the dairy industry, and I am very appreciative of this support. As Representative Rudy said in presenting me with this citation, milk is Pennsylvania's number one beverage. And if you do not believe that, it was

stated in Congress on April 29, 1982, that milk is actually Pennsylvania's number one beverage. That is a real plus for the dairy industry, and I would like to thank you for your support in promoting that.

We also need to remember that June is Dairy Month. This is the 50th year that we have celebrated June as Dairy Month, and we need to take some time—and I will challenge you as I challenged the farmers—to support Pennsylvania, support Pennsylvania agriculture, use your dairy products, and show your pride in Pennsylvania's number one industry.

Mr. ACOSTA. Mr. Speaker, on HB 2508, amendment A2769, I am not recorded. I want to be recorded in the affirmative.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman's remarks will be spread upon the record.

### RESOLUTIONS CONTINUED

Mr. DEAL called up **HR 306, PN 3583**, entitled:

Amending House Resolution No. 207, adopted December 11, 1985, entitled "A resolution establishing a special committee to investigate the Pennsylvania State Police," increasing the funding allocated for the special committee's investigation.

On the question,

Will the House adopt the resolution?

The SPEAKER. On the resolution, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Deal.

Mr. DEAL. Mr. Speaker, you recall that the House authorized a Pennsylvania select committee to investigate the State Police, at which time we were authorized \$50,000. The investigation has not concluded, and it is estimated now that it would cost a total of \$200,000 to conclude this investigation. Therefore, the select committee is asking that there be an increase of \$150,000 so that we may conclude this investigation.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I had asked Mr. Deal earlier for a proposed budget to show just what this additional \$150,000 was to be used for. The House select committee that he heads met about 6 minutes ago in the rear of the House, at which time a memorandum was given to the members of that committee from its chief counsel, Roy DeCaro, outlining his budget—not the committee's budget, but rather the committee's employees' budget—for the balance of this year.

Now, the budget director—and I guess that is what he is, because it is his budget; none of our members from either side having been made privy to the budget until several moments ago—Mr. DeCaro, the budget director/chief counsel, proposes that he be paid \$2,500 a week for the next 21 1/2 weeks, until October 19. That ain't bad.

He proposes that his investigator be paid about—and I have done this rather loosely—be paid approximately \$1,200 a week for the next 21 1/2 weeks to take him through the summer months and fall, so that a report can be made at the end of October that we in the legislature can act on while we

are home campaigning, because we will be out of session then, to come back, according to what I understand, for 2 weeks after the election. So the report will be made about the time that we adjourn for the fall recess with 2 legislative weeks left to go.

Now, let us quickly take a look at what has happened with this committee and with the money that it has had made available to it. Mr. DeCaro, the chief counsel and the author of this proposed budget—so I am guessing that Mr. DeCaro is really running this show—Mr. DeCaro or someone was given charge of our \$50,000 that we appropriated some months ago to this special committee. Being exacting people, being skilled in the art of budgeting, I guess, because he has prepared this \$150,000 additional budget, this budgeteer or some budgeteer has managed to incur debt for us, the members of the House of Representatives, in the amount of \$9,304.63 over the amount that we appropriated to the committee. So our \$50,000 which we appropriated—which, frankly, was more than enough, in my judgment—on their own, on their own—and I assume it was the employees and not the committee, because our committee members, at least, were not aware of this overspending until very recently—but on their own they took the \$50,000 and incurred 60,000 dollars' worth of debt.

Yesterday I spoke to Mr. Deal. Mr. Deal yesterday told me, as did some of our members, that we had spent \$53,000 of the \$50,000 we gave them. Sometime between yesterday when I spoke with Mr. Deal and 11 o'clock this morning, an additional \$6,300 in debt was incurred by the committee or discovered to have been incurred and not reported to the chairman of the committee, Mr. Deal, who yesterday told me, Mr. Ryan, we owe \$53,000 and we only have the \$50,000; that is one of the reasons we need more money.

Now, if these committee employees, these experts whom we have hired at \$95 an hour, cannot keep track of the \$50,000 and can instead incur without any okay, formal or informal, on their own, presumably—because Mr. Deal did not know about the additional money yesterday; he knew about \$3,000 of it but he did not know about the \$9,300—if they on their own can go out and lose track of \$50,000 and instead need \$60,000 to pay the \$50,000, I do not know what kind of investigators they are. They ought to investigate their check-books and see what is going on.

Now, over this period of time, this full-employment-opportunities act for lawyers and investigators has been running up bills. As I look quickly at a schedule that I had made up based on one of the bills that I saw, I see that during February, March, and April of this year and the first 3 weeks of May, up to the 16th, which is 3 1/2 months, our legal fee was \$30,590. That is an awful lot of money. In fact, that legal person hired by that committee is making more than any of the lawyers who work full time for this House, except the heads of our legal department and our most senior of lawyers who work for this House. There are very few of our lawyers who are making in excess of \$30,000 a year, let alone a 3-month period of time. And that is not full-time work, understand. There are days where we only worked—and I am looking quickly at the

month of February—we worked 6 1/2 hours—this is per day—1 1/2 hours, 7/10 of 1 hour, 4.5 hours, 2 hours, 6.3, 2 hours, 5.6, 4 hours, 5.5, 4 hours, 3.5, 3.7, 5.0, 2.4, 3.8, 7.0, 4.2, 3/10 of 1 hour, and 6/10 of 1 hour, and that is kind of typical of what we have—and that is not unusual, incidentally, for a lawyer to work in that fashion. They do not work, as a rule, on an 8-hour basis, but nor do they bill on an 8-hour basis, but rather for—you are right, Charles, they are overpaid—but rather they work and bill for the hours they actually have to spend on their given client on a given day. So I would not want to be misinterpreted as making fun of a lawyer who works three-tenths of an hour and bills only for that, but I am doing this rather for the reference of \$31,000 in fees for a period of a little over 3 months, 3 months and 2 weeks.

I do not know what we have received for our money to date. There has been no report that I am aware of made to any member of the legislature. I am not sure whether any report has been made to the members of the committee. I believe there have only been two public hearings that I am aware of, and we have spent \$60,000. We have reimbursed for meals, which is proper. We have reimbursed for travel time, which is proper. We even pay \$2 lunches here in Harrisburg when the investigator or the lawyer has to come up here and work in the capitol. We have to pay him for that \$2 or \$3 lunch. You would think he would give us a break on at least the lunch bill.

Mr. Speaker, I object to this House spending another \$150,000 on this investigation. If we do not have within the House staff people who can do this work over the summer months when we will not be in session, we probably should go out of business of having staff at all. I know, and I feel sure that the same is true on the other side of the aisle, that in the summertime there is a lag in the work that is required of our staff members because we are not in session. Our staff has additional time that it can devote to projects such as this. I see no reason why we should spend an additional \$51,000 for 21 weeks of a lawyer's time when I feel certain that between our two caucuses we have more than adequate legal staff that is paid far less than \$51,000 per year, let alone for 21 weeks for 25-hours-per-week work, which is what was estimated by the person who submitted this budget.

I know Mr. Gallen has comments on this, and I would at this time, Mr. Speaker, like to yield to the gentleman, Mr. Gallen.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Berks, Mr. Gallen.

Mr. GALLEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, first of all, I have to say that I agree with the gentleman, Mr. Ryan, with regard to the amount of money that we are spending and the problem with spending money which has not been authorized by this House.

But further than that, Mr. Speaker, I feel that this investigation should be ended. Indeed, Mr. Speaker, this is not an investigation; this is a rehashing. The people who have already testified and those who are expected to testify who have knowledge of or have been accused of committing crimi-

nal acts or indiscretions - these incidents have already been publicized over the past 6 years. What we are doing is now rehashing them. The young gentleman who testified before the committee who had a problem with cocaine and committed a number of armed robberies - these incidents had been publicized in the newspapers previously, but the committee brought this young man before them and asked him about these incidents, and really, the bottom line of his testimony was that he felt the State Police was a fine organization. He felt that the pressure of the job had nothing to do with his cocaine habit or the resultant crimes. He wishes that he had not committed these crimes and was still a member of the State Police. But the news story was, State policeman admits committing 11 armed robberies. Well, these are things that happened 2 years ago and had already been publicized both in the Norristown newspapers, in the Philadelphia papers, and, indeed, statewide. What we are doing as a result of these hearings is casting a bad light on the entire State Police.

We have now a new State Police Commissioner. Whether 58 crimes over the past 6 years committed by State policemen is a high number or not, I do not know. One crime committed by a State policeman is not something that we would like to see. Fifty-eight is really probably a very high number, but if we had said that there were only two crimes committed by State policemen in the last 6 years, we would say that the State Police are not doing their job; they are not really policing their own ranks properly. So new disciplinary actions are being taken by the new State Police Commissioner, and I think that we should allow him to do his job. I think furthering this investigation will have a very devastating effect not only on the morale of the State Police but on the image of the State Police, and I do not think that we are even attempting to uncover anything resembling a conspiracy or misuse of State Police funds or anything like that. What we are doing is rehashing things that have happened and have already been publicized.

I would like to see us defeat this resolution and indeed end this investigation. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Deal, for the second time.

Mr. DEAL. Mr. Speaker, if I had not heard some of the same arguments the day that we proposed this resolution, I would somewhat stand here in amazement, but I have heard this replay of that record. The previous speaker was the first one to call this a witch hunt.

There was an amendment put to the previous resolution to wipe out the investigation and attempt to cover this investigation up from its inset. That did not happen.

But let me just share with you that if the previous speakers thought for one moment that this was a rehashing of what is in the paper, they would not be here, because they would let this resolution go through and they would say, see, I told you. But that is not the issue here today. The issue here today is to help cover up the evils which exist in the State Police.

I do not plan to stand here, whether I go down in defeat or not, I do not plan to stand here today and have in our midst

numerous complaints from citizens in this Commonwealth complaining about the things that have happened to them in this Commonwealth. I do not plan to sit here having in my hand complaints from State Police officers who themselves are crying out for some kind of help and some kind of relief. No, I do not plan to back away.

You passed the resolution that you wanted an investigation and we have begun that investigation, and I believe that investigation will continue. Some people say that nothing has been accomplished. Let me just share with you a couple of things and search your conscience whether some good has already come from this resolution. But before I even go to that point, for those attorneys who would sit here and cry out because an attorney ate at Wimpy's for food, I wonder where the attorneys from that firm eat their lunch, and I wonder if you could hire one of them for less than \$97 an hour. I just wonder. You are all attorneys. We are not talking about somebody on the staff; we are talking about going out and trying to find the best we can to do the best and the most thorough investigation that we can get. Yes, we tried to get the best we could, because we are concerned about the State Police, concerned about its image.

Let me just say that it is important that the House investigation committee continues, and we should not allow anybody because of petty politics or personalities try to stop this investigation. This investigation if continued will restore confidence in our State Police by the constituency of Pennsylvania. This investigation, when it is concluded, would help members of the State Police who need support, not continued coverups. We have received numerous complaints from civilians who need to know that we are concerned here in the House of Representatives. We must not let those people down. People have complained to us, and you now tell us, do not hear their complaints; sweep it under the rug where it has been all this time. No, no, no, no, no, we cannot do that, and we have already learned from that little meager hearing that one of the speakers would like to have you believe took place.

Let me share with you some things that came out of that hearing that you would not have known. The present policy of the State Police, which we would hope that legislatively we would change, presently the 4,000 members of the State Police do not have to take a psychiatric exam before they are given pistols. You take an exam; you are given a pistol and some ammunition. Even smaller police departments do not accept people into the force in that manner. In the State Police there is no mandatory in-service training. Once you become a police officer, you do not have to go back unless you are aspiring for something else. You do not have to go back for physicals; you do not have to go back for eye exams; you do not have to go back to shoot; you do not have to go back for anything else. Those of us who are in law enforcement know full well that to run a professional and effective State Police you must have in-service training, but I guarantee you, Mr. Speaker, that there will be something put in place for mandatory in-service training, all because you all had the courage some time ago to allow us to start this investigation.

You will find that there is no employee assistance program. All over the Commonwealth and this Nation, employers are learning that employees have problems from forms of stress. There is no more stress than that that is encountered by members of our State Police department, but there is no assistance program in place for members of the State Police. If a State policeman has a problem, whether it is alcohol, whether it is a family problem, there is nowhere to turn. Oh, sure, sure there are people saying, just leave us alone. We will now recognize that something ought to be done. I guarantee you they agree now that it ought to be done.

There was no and there is not a program in place that a State Police officer can report wrongdoing in the State Police. This is unconscionable, and until you, until we proposed that we investigate the State Police, there was no internal mechanism to have a look-see at the conduct of State Police officers. That is why, Mr. Speaker, and that is why, and that is why you have so much that has happened in the State Police that was pushed under the rug.

A previous speaker mentioned a person who testified before us and said that the fellow had made 11 holdups; yes, a member of our State Police, but that speaker did not tell you that the mother-in-law of that person called the State Police and said, my son-in-law is on drugs, do something about it. Ask your previous speaker what happened to that report. Was it exposed? Was that in the paper? No. Look under the rug where they would like to put the rest of the wrongdoings of the State Police. We cannot afford that luxury in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Speaker, I have talked to a lot of you, and I realize that today I am asking you to stand up and be counted against political repercussions I guess, partisan politics. Some of you may have relatives in the State Police, friends, constituency, and I have talked to some of you who know that you have to ride up and down that highway day in and day out knowing full well that you will be uneasy. But I say to you today that in this world all of us are tested, tested at one time or another to take one side or the other, take the right side or take the wrong side, either stand up or sit down. I ask you today, I ask you today, will you not stand up for right? If you want me to enumerate today some of the things that have been uncovered and they do not want that to come out, some of the thievery, some of the misuse of a power, and some of the misuse of power of the State Police against other members of the State Police, we will be able to show you that one person who would get arrested in the State Police for shoplifting may well get promoted and the other one get penalized. It is those kinds of things that have demoralized the State Police. We want to set the State Police on a proper course. People tell us, people tell us that if you just leave it alone, it will go away. It has not gone away.

You asked us to look at the number of arrests that have been made of State Police. We are looking at that. You asked us to look at the unevenness. That is what you asked us to do and we are doing that. I want to tell you, Mr. Speaker, the fear today of those who would oppose this resolution is not

the fear that when we get through there will be developed some accountability of the State Police. They are not afraid. The issue is not whether or not we will come up with some real integrity in the highest law enforcement agency of this Commonwealth. They are not concerned whether or not when we get through and recommend to you that there will be some real professionalism in the State Police and whether or not there will be fair play and whether or not all of those citizens who have filed complaints, not only directly to me, but some of them have filed complaints to you, the Representatives of this House, you cannot let those people down.

Now, let me tell you why I have asked for the additional \$150,000. Those of us who have done investigations—and the previous speakers know better—there is no way in the world you could have held this investigation with \$150,000. That was the beginning and probably all that we would have gotten through. You need more money than that, and the \$150,000 would do this for us: It would give us an opportunity to continue to interview complaints that we have. We have not interviewed all of the complaints yet that have come through the members of the House. Some of you are sitting out there now with complaints in our committee that came to you that we do not have the staff to interview. If you gave us the \$150,000, rather than have our chief investigator now run clear across this Commonwealth to interview complainants, we would hold the chief counsel and the chief investigator to do the interviews in and around Philadelphia. An investigator who would be paid less than the chief investigator would work out of Harrisburg to handle the complaints that we just cannot and interview all those people. We would then put an investigator in Pittsburgh, which would mean then that the investigator would not have to run back and forth clear across this Commonwealth to make sure that we interview these complaints.

Mr. Speaker, if we do not continue this investigation, I tend to believe that the many people who have filed complaints will look at us very suspiciously. I would believe that the newspapers, and you have read the editorials that have said to you, get on about the business of approving these funds so that we can continue that investigation.

That concludes my comments. Let me just leave this with you: We here in the legislature have a real responsibility to oversee agencies that come under our umbrella. The people who elected us did not elect us to put blinders on and run and hide from those tough issues. I do not know how you can go back to the people who elected you and say to them, I was in Harrisburg and it was brought to my attention that there was wrongdoing in an agency of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, but I stood on the floor and said, I do not want to know about it; let them keep hiding it; let them keep it under the rug, and yet you have told me about it. I do not think you want that image. I do not think you want that image.

So I beg you today, Mr. Speaker, join us on the right side; join us who want to see a State Police department run in the right fashion. And I say to you that it is not our intention to harm members of the State Police or harm the State Police

department. But we do have a problem and all of the other speakers know we have that problem. What do you do with a problem in your home? If the faucet is leaking, do you let it leak and put something over it so you cannot see the leak, or do you bring in a plumber and repair the leaking faucet? I tell you, there is a leak in the State Police; there is a breakdown in the State Police; there is a job to be done, and that job needs fixing.

This committee, under your leadership and with your support, can remedy that problem in the State Police. I beg you, join us and rectify a wrong that has gone on for so many years, so much so that I tend to believe some of the previous speakers really believe it is all right. I believe they believe it. I believe they believe it is all right to cover up and hide because the coverup has gone on for so long. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, it is interesting that the gentleman, Mr. Deal, told us to look to the editorials. I am looking at an editorial from the Patriot, April 1, 1986, and this is the third paragraph:

The tenor of Chairman Deal's approach to the investigation also leaves much to be desired. Instead of going into it with an open mind, he seems to have some preconceived notions about who's to blame for the problems before the evidence is amassed. The result is that the committee's efforts are beginning to look more like a political witch hunt than a credible attempt to determine what is wrong and recommend corrective action.

There is an editorial we ought to take a look at, and to substantiate the remarks of the editorial writer, we have only to look to Mr. Deal's House resolution, the very resolution that created this committee—and I do not know how I overlooked it at the time it was offered—but paragraph (3) on page 2 says, "Some members of the force have been guilty of misconduct, including the commission of crimes, and no criminal charges were ever filed...." Now, if that is not putting the bunny in the hat, nothing is. Listen to what I said, what the gentleman's resolution says: Some officers have been guilty of misconduct, including the commission of crimes. He says they are guilty of crimes and they have not even been charged. Now, is that not substantially what the editorial writer has said when he comments that Mr. Deal has reached conclusions prior to the introduction of evidence?

Mr. Deal says stand up and be counted. Stand up, and as you stand up to be counted, count \$51,000 for a lawyer over 21 weeks, which is \$2,377.20 per week over these fine summer months, and \$1,251 for an investigator, as many of our employees, our legal staff, sit idle in the summertime, not because they want to be idle but because we are in recess. Can we not provide good lawyers out of our own staff? I wonder about that.

The last comment I would like to make is going back to the original resolution. Now, I have been on this floor over the years complaining about these subcommittees. You have all

heard me lecture on it, and that is what it is. Very little of it has sunk in, frankly, but a subcommittee is created by us, and we limit the activities of that subcommittee. The subcommittee is created when a resolution is brought before us, and that resolution says what we, the subcommittee, are going to do.

Listen to what Representative Deal's resolution was all about when it was voted on. He charges, "...members of the force have been charged with serious crimes...Lawsuits have been filed,..." and citizens have complained about civil rights. "Some members of the force have been guilty of misconduct, including the commission of crimes...resulting in the perception, both within and without the force, of uneven imposition of discipline," which is one of the things that Mr. Deal always was interested in and which the majority of this House agreed with when the resolution passed. "Political interference in the operation of this force has also been alleged;..." and we need this subcommittee to look into it.

Listen to Mr. Deal's remarks of what the committee has discovered and the good they are doing: We have looked completely into psychiatric testing. We have looked into the need for a psychologist. We have looked into the problems of alcohol. We have looked into a program for reporting wrongdoing, which is as close as you get to the resolution. We are looking generally at the conduct of the State Police and turning them into real professionals.

I rather think that this subcommittee now is more interested in reforming the administration of the State Police than doing what the original resolution was intended to do, which was look into crimes alleged to have been committed or in fact committed by members of the State Police and the civil rights violations and the civil rights amendment that was introduced on the floor dealing with minority hiring. That has never been addressed, and that amendment went in overwhelmingly. That has never been addressed.

Mr. DeCaro has advised our counsel that if we want copies of anything that is in Philadelphia, we go to Philadelphia to get it. Fortunately, one of the members from the other side of the aisle did not like that and said he, too, would like to have copies of things here in Harrisburg, if it is okay, Mr. DeCaro, and apparently that material has since arrived in Harrisburg.

I agree with the Patriot; I agree with the gentleman, Mr. Gallen, and I did not agree with him originally; that is, that this has turned into a witch hunt, that it is something being done to reform the State Police in a manner or in a method that is satisfactory to this chairman, who himself is a former distinguished police officer. Perhaps the gentleman, Mr. Deal, wants to reform the State Police in the image that he thinks police departments should be formed in because he has experience, and a very qualified, I am told, and distinguished police officer he was. But that is not what this subcommittee was all about and that is not what this subcommittee has done.

What the subcommittee has done is it has wasted money. It has exceeded its authority, not only its financial authority by spending 20 percent more than we authorized; it has exceeded its authority because the scope of that authority was in the res-

olution. Now they are looking into psychiatric testing, psychology testing, and the like, which was never a part of this original resolution that we intended, and maybe that is why we are spending so much money. We are so far afield of where we should have been. Maybe instead of a \$2,500-a-week lawyer we need a \$2,500-a-week doctor or psychiatrist. I would be afraid to say whom he would look at.

The annual rate of payment of the chief counsel is \$120,000 a year. Take that one back to your district and justify it when you say the State Police need this type of investigation.

The State Police is the finest police enforcement agency, I believe, in this United States. I am not ashamed of them at all. And if this House has accomplished anything, if this House has accomplished anything, it has made a lot of us proud of our State Police, and it has also done one other thing: It has started to demoralize them. And I say to the members of the State Police, we are behind you; we do not believe this witch hunt should continue. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. MANDERINO. The gentleman, Mr. Ryan, certainly knows how to turn phrases, but you cannot turn this side of the aisle into people who do not have pride in our State Police. We continue to have pride in our State Police. We agree with you that it is a great organization; it has always been such an organization, but we have found in recent years, Mr. Speaker, that things have occurred in the State Police that neither you nor I should be proud of. A Federal court, a Federal judge from the bench, detailed how the State Police in this Commonwealth planted evidence in order to get a conviction; how State Police in this Commonwealth perjured themselves, denying the planting of evidence that was eventually uncovered.

This investigation has in its possession now upwards of 50 files of members of the State Police who, yes, have been investigated for wrongdoing internally, have been found to have engaged in conduct that at best we can describe as gross misconduct, and are still enforcing the laws of this Commonwealth as State Police. We want to continue to be proud, and that is one of the reasons for this investigation.

A recent editorial in the Pittsburgh paper—I am not sure whether it was the Post-Gazette or the Press; I think it was the Press—indicated that this investigation was moving along in such a manner that it really demanded additional funding and that the General Assembly should, specifically on the issue of additional funding, give it additional funding. We want to be continually proud of our State Police. We want that crack outfit, that outfit whose moral character was unquestioned in the past, we want it there again, and we think that 90, 95 percent, even more of the police on the force at the present time are worthy of the respect and admiration of every citizen in the Commonwealth. But there are some things that are going on within the State Police that demand that this General Assembly bring to the attention of the public and demand that the officials in charge and this administration do everything possible and necessary to have that part that needs cleaned up

and dressed up done, and that is what this investigation is all about.

I know it is hurting Mr. Ryan. I know politically there is some fallout, and I expect that entire side of the aisle to vote politically on this issue. And maybe there will not be additional funding by this General Assembly, but let me tell you, the investigation is going to continue, and it is going to continue if I have to fund it with majority caucus funds, because I believe that the investigation is not a political witch hunt. We made it clear from the beginning. We put in charge a law enforcement officer by previous occupation, one who certainly would not want to demean law enforcement, whether in the State Police or in any municipality. That is why Mr. Deal was chosen as chairman, and I think by and large he has kept the respect of fellow, brother policemen in the conducting of the investigation. There are members of the committee, unfortunately, from the other side of the aisle, who seem to have no interest at all in finding those areas that need redressed. That is unfortunate. It will be unfortunate if we are not willing to fund with additional funds the State Police investigation.

I have never heard, Mr. Speaker, such criticism of attorneys. I would like to know how much your hourly charge is and compare it. Mine compares unfavorably, but I will bet your does not. But that is the kind of attack you make on any proposition; that is the kind of attack you make on any proposition when you have no other meritorious attack to make.

That investigation should continue. We should fund it. It will go on whether this General Assembly or this House of Representatives through the Chief Clerk's Office continues the funding or not. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, with respect to attorneys' charges. What I charge and what I receive are two different things. A client such as this House of Representatives is a super client, because you know the bill you submit is the amount you are going to receive, and my charges are approximately the same as Mr. DeCaro's, who, incidentally, is a very, very capable lawyer. At no time would I try and discredit his legal ability. He is indeed a capable lawyer. He is formerly from Delaware County and, as I recall, was a member of the district attorney's office in Delaware County. You have not heard me charge anything about political hiring, have you? I have not talked about that at all. Chairman Deal has not done that. He has hired capable people. Maybe it is overkill. You know, maybe you do not need one of the best, and I think Mr. DeCaro is a very good lawyer. I do not know that we need a very good outside lawyer.

We have a lawyer from our staff assigned to this committee, and I think, Mr. Manderino, it is very generous of you to suggest that you can put one of the lawyers from your staff on this committee to continue it. That is what should be done. I do not think this House should spend another \$150,000 to continue this—and I quote from the Patriot—“political witch hunt.” Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Evans.

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, I rise to ask a couple of serious questions. Yesterday the minority leader stood up and took packet No. 1 and said to this House that we should accept packet No. 1 as a packet. Thanks to our majority leader, who rose up and said we should take each amendment individually and we should weigh it on its merits, we prevented that from occurring. Because yesterday the minority leader wanted to accept something that totals almost \$50 million, is it not ironic today that the minority leader is standing and raising a question about \$150,000 and his vote, probably consistently, was for all these various amendments? I did not hear the minority leader stand up one time and question amendment by amendment about these amendments that were accepted in the budget. Our majority leader—

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, will the gentleman yield?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Ryan.

Mr. RYAN. If the gentleman wishes to debate what took place yesterday, he should at least be accurate. If it is relevant to what is going on today, I would ask that the gentleman at least be accurate with his remarks, and I would ask an opportunity to correct the gentleman's remarks at their conclusion, if you deem it relevant that he continue.

The SPEAKER. Mr. Evans, you will limit your remarks to the question on the floor. You may continue.

Mr. EVANS. The question on the floor, Mr. Speaker, in my opinion, is the relevancy of this particular resolution and the aspect of providing \$150,000 for the purpose of this investigation. My question in relation to yesterday is there seems to be no consistency. Now, maybe something is wrong with that, Mr. Speaker. Maybe in the 6 years I have been here, maybe it is wrong for me to expect that there will be a little logic to this process. Maybe something is wrong with that, Mr. Speaker. I guess I am raising the question around the issue that I did not hear the same kind of concern about packet 1, packet 2, packet 3 relating to the budget. I did not hear that.

However, I also found something else rather interesting. I heard the minority leader, and probably the reporter would have to repeat this to me, about maybe we do not need the best. Now, I always thought that when you do a job, you do the best job that you are capable of doing, that there is no way in this Commonwealth or in this country that we would not want to do the best job. I believe that with \$150,000 as well as the \$50,000—that is \$200,000 that this committee has—we are doing the best that we think with the resources that we have available, and for the minority leader to stand up and say maybe we do not need the best chief counsel, maybe we do not need the best chief investigator, something is wrong with that. Something is wrong when the gentleman is the leader - the leader stands up and says maybe we do not need the best. Well, I can only say to the public that something is wrong when leaders do not stand up and say we need the best.

That is why I asked the question regarding yesterday. Why in the world was anything not really said amendment by amendment relating to the amount of money we spent yester-

day? Was that not serious? Was that a joke? Was that a joke we were going through yesterday? Is that a joke today that we are going through in terms of these amendments? Something is wrong with the process.

I can only say to the minority leader, if that was a joke, we should have taken this amendment and stuck this amendment in. We should have stuck this amendment in, voted this amendment 180 or 190 so it could be accepted, because I know in that particular case then maybe the minority leader would have accepted it.

I want to conclude with this, Mr. Speaker: I know the minority leader. I know that he is sincere about this process and I know that he has been around awhile with this process and I know that some of the statements that he made he certainly would not want to be on public record, because I will tell you something. It sends chills up my spine to hear that we are talking about not having the best; we are talking about not accepting \$150,000. We have spent almost \$100 million in less than a day and he is talking about \$150,000.

Can you see the press headlines, Mr. Speaker and Mr. Deal? Can you see the press headlines that the House of Representatives passes a budget over \$300 million over - over - and we knock down \$150,000 for an organization that should be investigated, that should be scrutinized, and should be examined? There is nothing wrong with scrutinizing and examining organizations. Has that been a perfect committee? No. Has that committee done everything it should do? No. But the bottom line is, it is something that should take place. That is why we are here, to have accountability of agencies and organizations that are responsible to this body. If the committee system works as it should work, you do not need special investigative committees. If the 21 standing committees, Mr. Minority Leader, do what they are supposed to do and if, then, some of your members do not stand in the way of preventing that examination, we would not have to go through this, Mr. Speaker.

So I have a problem when you stand up, Mr. Speaker, and the leader says that he did not agree with Mr. Gallen in the beginning, because in my view he has probably never been for this investigation, and although he voted for it, he knows full well that politically it is something that is going to happen one way or the other. Either this body is going to do it, either somebody is going to come from outside of Pennsylvania and do it, either the newspapers are going to do it, but there is going to be an investigation of that organization.

I think that we should support HR 306. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the point, the Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, there are a couple of things I must point out as a result of the gentleman's conversation. First, Mr. Speaker, I did not suggest that we adopt the packet in its entirety, but rather suggested that the packet of amendments could be divided and then flipped through one by one to be voted upon or objected to as the case may be, whatever we would decide would be best.

But that is not important. The number, as long as we are using the number from yesterday, was \$553,320,000 versus \$150,000, but the real difference is the \$150,000 is real money. The \$553 million is not real money because that does not become law; that does not pass; that does not become obligated until the Governor signs it, until a conference committee has met, probably. The \$150,000 we are talking about today, we are the law; we are the authority that authorizes the expenditure of that money. Now, if you or anyone in this Commonwealth believes for one minute that that \$553 million has a chance of being spent, I want to talk to you about selling you some other things.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Mr. Saurman.

Mr. SAURMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, there is a saying that when bull elephants fight, the grass gets trodden and suffers most. I kind of feel as though today the members of this House and certainly our constituency have been stepped on, and I am a little concerned about it.

I voted for the resolution which originally authorized this study because I understood there were certain specific allegations that had been made and those allegations ought to be cleared up. I thought that the committee, therefore, was going to take those allegations, list them, and check them out. Looking, however, at the agenda, I am amazed, and I am very much disappointed that the \$50,000-plus has already been expended and these allegations have indeed not been checked out.

The reason that I say that is I have before me a motion that was made to the committee which established an agenda. That agenda, while it included investigation of allegations of serious crimes, civil rights violations, uneven imposition of discipline on State Police officers, political interference in the operation of the State Police, and so on, seemed to be right on target. However, then we begin with "Prepare a statistical summary of the number and the nature of serious crimes by State Police officers for which charges have been filed and the disposition of those charges, by year, age, and rank." Then the preparation of "a statistical comparison of the incidence of serious crimes by State Police officers for which charges have been filed to the incidence of serious crimes in other similar police departments during the same time period." Then the preparation of "a summary of civil rights litigation begun by or against State Police officers." Then the preparation of "a memorandum of law regarding the duties and options of the State Police under the affirmative action court orders." Then "a summary of the disciplinary procedure utilized by the State Police and a comparison of that procedure to the procedure used by other similar police departments." Finally, Mr. Lloyd's recommendations included "a summary of the system for investigating allegations of misconduct within the State Police and a comparison of that system to the system used by other similar police departments."



All of these summaries, all of these statistics, all of these lists that are being prepared really have nothing to do with the specific allegations which were incidental and instrumental in getting this resolution passed in the first place.

Finally, there were two additional amendments which were omitted by Mr. Lloyd but added on the agenda - to "Prepare a statistical record of all classes that have been accepted into the Academy since the time the consent decree was entered. The record should include the score on the civil service exam, as well as the fact that the candidate was or was not a Minority, accepted pursuant to the terms of the consent decree," and further, "a record of all promotions that have been given since the consent decree was entered, as well as the fact that the candidate was or was not a minority, promoted pursuant to the terms of the consent decree." Those last two items met the requirements of the resolution which were amended into the resolution before it was passed by this House.

Back in May—and now we are getting into what happened with the special counsel—we have a proposed agenda for hearings. This is what the agenda includes:

Captain Robert Einsel: Will describe the State Police organization both geographically and structurally;

Deputy Commissioner Richard Weatherbee: Will describe the arrests of troopers in the last five years; nature of charges; status; Department's response;

State Police Witness to be determined: Will describe the nature and status of civil rights cases brought by or against State Police personnel in the last five years;....

Mr. Speaker, without taking any more of the House's time, what I am trying to say is that the objective for which we authorized \$50,000, which was to determine whether in fact there was truth to the allegations which were bringing discredit to the State Police, seems not even to have been addressed at this time. We have overextended and overspent the budget; now we are asking for additional money and we are not sure yet what it is that is going to happen.

Mr. Speaker, I urge the defeat of this resolution so that we do not continue what has been a fruitless waste of time, in my opinion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Wogan.

Mr. WOGAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the consideration of this resolution is unusual in that we are not considering this with blank slates, so to speak. We already have a track record, or I should say the special committee, of which I am a member, already has a track record. It has already incurred expenditures of somewhere from \$53,000 to \$60,000. It has conducted 2 full days of hearings.

During those 2 days of hearings—and I think it is instructive to our members who are not members of the special committee to know what transpired succinctly during those 2 days of hearings—there were two principal non-State Police witnesses appearing. One individual was a former trooper who admitted to prior narcotics usage. He was stationed at the

Plymouth Barracks of the Pennsylvania State Police. He very clearly and unequivocally told the special committee that his narcotics problems had nothing whatsoever to do with the Pennsylvania State Police. They arose from his personal depression over a personal business venture that failed. That was the first principal non-State Police witness.

The second non-State Police witness is presently a female police officer somewhere in Bucks County. And let us talk about the evils that have been uncovered during the investigation by the special committee. Do you want to know what the nexus of the examination of that trooper was? She could not do the push-ups after three attempts.

Mr. Speaker, we have a track record with this special committee. The agenda set by the chief counsel of the special committee has expended close to \$60,000. I am embarrassed at what we have produced after the incurring of expenditures close to \$60,000, and I am not going to vote for a further \$150,000 to keep this charade going.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from York, Mr. Bortner.

Mr. BORTNER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would also like to speak as a member of this committee and recall back to the time in December when HR 207 was first adopted. I might say at the outset that when Mr. Deal was first circulating that resolution, I was not particularly supportive. In fact, I had some hesitation about it and expressed that to him. I did, however, vote for the amended resolution which included Mr. Stevens' amendment, as did 197 other members of the House of Representatives. When I did that, I had not the slightest idea that I would end up as a member of the committee, and I did not ask to be a member of the committee.

Sometime after that, several months, I guess, when I was asked to be a member of the committee, I paused before I agreed to accept, because I realized that the subject was going to be controversial, I realized that it was going to be sensitive, and I was not sure that I personally, at this stage of my legislative career, wanted to be involved with that. I agreed to do it because I felt that the subject was so important and was so sensitive that the only way that I could assure that the investigation was conducted in a manner in which I felt it should be was to be a member, and I indicated when I accepted the appointment that I did it on a totally nonpartisan basis, that I had no presumptions, that I was not attempting to reach any predetermined conclusions, and that I felt our job was to obtain some facts pursuant to the House resolution and let the chips fall where they may.

I had worked as an assistant district attorney for a number of years. I worked with a number of State troopers. They are among some of my best friends. They are some of the best investigators I have ever worked with, and I would agree that I think the State Police, our State Police, is perhaps the finest State Police organization in the country, although I have nothing to really compare that with.

I still think that there is some important work for this committee to do. Much as the Rogers commission, I suppose, is

looking at NASA (National Aeronautics and Space Administration), which is probably also one of the finest agencies of its type in the country, I think that they have found that there may be some areas where there could be some improvement.

I do, though, take serious offense to the statement that the committee has been conducting a witch hunt. The committee includes not just Representative Deal but myself, Mr. McHale, Mr. Lloyd, as well as the Republican members of the committee. And I would like to move away from the demagoguery, if we could, and try to find out what the real objection to this resolution is. If the problem is with the budget, then I would like to suggest that we deal with that. And if it is necessary to take it back to the full committee and look at the budget again, I would certainly be willing to do that. If, in fact, the point of the investigation is being questioned and the necessity for it, I guess I would like to then focus the debate on that, so we really understand what we are talking about at this stage.

There have been a number of statements, though, that are not totally accurate that I would like to correct. There has been a lot of time spent up to this point outside of the hearings. Frankly, a lot of that was background work, and it was work that I felt all the members of the committee agreed with. The agenda that Mr. Saurman referred to was voted on unanimously by the committee. All the expenses that were paid, to my recollection, were passed unanimously by the committee. They were all documented.

I think Mr. Deal has attempted to run a very fair and evenhanded investigation to date and has tried to accommodate the minority members of the committee as best as he can. I do find it somewhat humorous to find the minority committee members complaining about the progress of the investigation when to date they have been totally noncooperative and have made it very clear what their purpose in this investigation was.

I am willing to continue as a committee member if that is the desire of the House of Representatives. If that is not the desire of this House of Representatives, I know I have other things to do this summer. I do not need to spend it in hearings here in Harrisburg. But I would like to ask, and perhaps ask Mr. Ryan, if I could, whether the real objection from him personally is the budgeting aspect of this resolution or the content of the resolution or the original content of the investigation itself.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Ryan, is recognized under interrogation.

Mr. RYAN. I think the budgeting aspect of it is just one part of the problem. I originally raised the budgeting question for the simple reason that the committee overspent. I thought it was outrageous, frankly, that this House appropriates \$50,000 for a committee to do some work and then they hand us bills—their employees hand us bills—for \$60,000 and the chairman did not even know it, because he spoke to me yesterday and said that they were over budget \$3,000. Today they are over budget almost \$10,000. I think that is outrageous and it is a reflection on some one or more people that there is no

control over the expenditure of the money by the investigator and the lawyers. I think that, for one thing, is outrageous.

I believe we have adequate staff—we have provided counsel to the committee—that we do not have to go out and spend an additional \$2,500 a week for the next 21 weeks to have a lawyer on the staff. If we can provide one, I see no reason why the majority cannot provide one. The investigators, that is something else; I do not know enough about that.

I agree with what Mr. Saurman said, and it offended me, frankly, Mr. Bortner, when I took the time to reread that resolution and see that Mr. Deal's resolution said these people are guilty of crimes - not charged with; not alleged. The word "alleged" does not appear. They are guilty of crimes. I do not know how I missed that back in December, but I did. I think that is wrong.

It is pointed out by the Patriot editorial saying that one of the problems of the chairman is that he seems to put the bunny in the hat, if you will. He has reached a conclusion and then goes out to try and get the evidence to back it up, which is supported by that very resolution that says they are guilty of crimes without any evidence of it. They are guilty of crimes, says the resolution, and dopes like me, I voted for that. I am a lawyer. I voted for that without picking it up and spotting it, and I am ashamed of myself for that. I am ashamed of us if we continue with that type mentality that you are guilty and now we will go get some evidence to prove it, which is what that resolution says. You are a lawyer, assistant district attorney. I invite you to read it. The other paragraphs use the terminology "alleged." That one does not.

So I think all in all, when we have now spent \$60,000, we have two public hearings; we have no written reports; we have nothing to show for it, except discussions, and I am only going on what the chairman said of the need for psychiatric help, the need for psychologists, the need for some kind of testing before we hand them, the police officer, a gun. I agree with all of that, but that is not what the resolution said. The resolution did not say, House members, special committee, tell us what should be done to improve the State Police. Tell us what should be done administratively to make it work better to help morale. The resolution said there was criminal conduct alleged—my word, "alleged"—look into it. There are civil rights violations; look into it. And apparently, from what I gather from some of our own members and from what I gather from Chairman Deal, that does not seem to be the direction that they are going.

The other thing that also passed overwhelmingly, if you recall, is the Stevens amendment, which has not even been addressed. We have spent \$60,000, and those who voted for that amendment have not gotten a nickel's worth out of it yet.

So I think the financing of the committee should be abandoned and we have plenty of time this summer to look into it on our own, rather than blow another \$150,000. I guess we have to pay these guys their \$9,000. I do not know whether the Comptroller's Office has approved it. I would hope not.

Mr. BORTNER. Mr. Speaker, may I follow up on that?

The SPEAKER. Mr. Bortner, you may continue.

Mr. BORTNER. Just a couple comments.

On the question of the expenditures, the committee approved expenses up to \$50,000. I think everybody would agree that that probably was not the best way to proceed, that we should have come back to this House of Representatives before we reached that figure, as we were approaching it. I think everybody agrees to that.

Mr. DeCaro, however, has agreed to not stop, my understanding is, agreed to continue the investigation, as we discussed at one of the meetings, and understands full well that in the event that the House decides not to continue with the investigation, he understands that funding was only approved up to a limit. He has agreed to do that on his own.

The second point you make about the language of the resolution I also agree with. I think Mr. Deal agrees that that was an unfortunate choice of words in the resolution. I do not think it was intended, and you are absolutely correct - 197 people in this House of Representatives voted. And if it is the language of that part of the resolution that ought to be changed, I would certainly be willing to correct that through an amendment to make it perfectly clear that the presumption of innocence continues in this committee just as it does in any courtroom in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Within the parameters that you have outlined, however, I think that it is important for the committee to continue if for no other reason than to pursue some of those areas that we have not touched on, specifically the areas that Mr. Stevens is so interested in. His amendment required that the committee look into the consent decree, the whole affirmative action quota system, to determine whether the Commonwealth could or should do anything to change that, and to study the morale that it has had on police officers. Those are all areas that we have not referred to. They are areas that we have placed on the agenda for later hearings. I would say that we have received an outline in a memorandum from counsel on the background of the Bolden litigation. His suggestion was that rather than spend a lot of time researching that, that we ask counsel who has represented the State Police through this matter to appear before the committee and offer testimony; also, to have Attorney Goodman, I believe, appear before the committee, who has represented the plaintiffs in the case, and offer his testimony and explanation of the evidence that they have compiled in support of their case.

I think that those are all still important things that need to be considered. Whether this budget is sufficient or excessive, I am not sure. I know I would be perfectly willing, if there was some agreement, to proceed with a smaller appropriation. I think that that is a lot less important or a lot less significant than that the investigation or the study continue, if that is the desire of the House of Representatives. I would hate to see it fail merely because we have some disagreement as to whether that particular part of the budget is excessive. And within the parameters you have outlined, if there would be agreement to continue under those limitations, then I would like to suggest that we consider that and move on and change the resolution, if that is necessary.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Luzerne, Mr. Stevens.

Mr. STEVENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I will be brief. I know it is the lunch hour.

I agree with what Representative Bortner was trying to bring out, and that is, let our votes not be misconstrued as to how we are voting on this today, because the narrow issue is, do we believe that this committee should have another \$150,000 for outside counsel or not? We are not voting on whether or not we think the committee is doing this or that or a good job or a bad job or whether or not the State Police is doing a good job. We are voting on whether or not we think we should have outside counsel for \$150,000.

I think what Representative Ryan was trying to bring out is that we have very competent staff and staff lawyers in this House who are being paid and that over the summer perhaps, although they are very busy, perhaps they will have some time, and I know that they could competently handle some of the duties here. I think that that is what our vote is. I do not want my vote to be misconstrued as anything other than that. I am voting on my belief that I do not think we should have an outside counsel receive that much more money, because what is going to happen in September? Then we will have \$200,000 invested in this committee. Will there be a request for another \$100,000? How do we know? We did not anticipate this request, so maybe we are not anticipating another request. And at that time the argument will be, well, we already spent \$200,000; what is another \$100,000? In the meantime, how can we justify to the people in our legislative districts that we are hiring outside counsel at \$2,500 a week when we have people who can do the job?

The other part of that is, our committee counsel is a very fine lawyer. I want to make that clear. He is a prosecutor. I would feel more comfortable if our committee lawyer was more tied into and understood the legislative process. I have had numerous discussions with Attorney DeCaro because I felt, in my opinion, at times he was approaching our committee as being a grand jury. He wanted some executive sessions when I believe that executive sessions are not warranted. This is a public body; we are not a grand jury. And I would feel more comfortable if we had a House counsel who understood the legislative process. And again, our committee lawyer is a fine lawyer, I am not saying that, but he basically is a prosecutor.

So our question today is not Republican or Democrat; it is not whether or not the committee is doing this or that. It is really, should we hire an outside counsel for that amount of money? I am concerned that in the fall there may be further unanticipated expenses. I would like to see— A lot of the questions that this committee addressed are important questions, and the affirmative action issue has not even been touched. Attorney DeCaro, I asked him what he has done on that issue. In February he wrote back to me that in February he wrote a letter asking for statistics from the State Police. He did not do a followup, and it was not until 2 weeks ago when I wrote to him and said, what is going on, that he wrote back

and said he requested some information. Our House staff would have gotten that information. We have very competent staff on all our committees, and I know committee chairmen would love to have outside counsel for \$2,500 a week. They could do tremendous things with that. But the point is, I do not think we can justify that expense.

So my vote is going to be "no" not for all the debate that I have heard, but because I do not believe this is a function of outside staff counsel when we have staff that can do it, and also the fact that this is a House committee; it is not a grand jury; it is not an inquisition, and I would feel more comfortable if we had House lawyers and House staff working on this. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. MANDERINO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I have heard a number of interesting speeches here today. I thought it was an interesting speech by at least a young member of the House, Mr. Bortner, who really thought Matt Ryan wanted to talk about anything but politics. You know, he explored whether Matt Ryan really was serious about thinking maybe it is too much money or was Matt Ryan serious that we ought to change the resolution and take that word "guilty" out of there before they had even been accused of a crime. And what he found out in questioning Mr. Ryan, if he is beginning to develop that sixth sense which many of us have already developed, what he found out is that Matt Ryan does not like this resolution or the results that it is producing, no way, and is not interested in additional funding, continuing funding, more hearings, additional work, or anything by this committee.

And that sixth sense that I am talking about is the same sixth sense that I am sure Corry Stevens has when he tries to convince me that the issue in his vote today is just going to be on that narrow issue of whether or not we should have outside counsel. I just do not believe you, Corry, honestly.

Now, I may be wrong. You know, maybe it is my shortcoming, you see, but somehow the members on that side of the aisle develop that sixth sense a lot faster than we do on this side of the aisle. All the lights on that side are green or red on so many issues that sometimes I think they have all developed that sixth sense to know when an issue really has political implications. On this side of the aisle, my youngsters like Mr. Bortner, Mr. McHale, and maybe Mr. Lloyd, they still think that we decide things always on merit, and right still prevails sometimes. Oh, it does sometimes. That is when that sixth-sense antenna does not go up. But when that sixth-sense antenna is up, forget it. Forget it, because that is what we are seeing here today, and I expect to see on that side of the aisle a solid color.

There are going to be those people who have not developed that sixth sense over here. They are going to vary from that solid color, but there will be a continuation of the State Police investigation and there will be a report to this House, and hopefully, we will make some ameliorating changes or suggestions to the State Police; maybe even legislation may come out of the committee. But to suggest, to suggest that this committee is not doing its job I think is not proper.

I would like to quote from maybe the first and last paragraph of the editorial that I described in the Pittsburgh Press, which was just recently, Sunday, June 1, timely:

An investigation of the state police by a special House committee has gotten barely under way, yet has run into funding troubles.

It has used up its initial \$50,000 appropriation and now plans to ask for an additional \$150,000. This is one spending request that deserves prompt approval by the full House.

Yes, the second paragraph in the editorial indicates that the problems plaguing the State Police are considerable and were detailed in a series of articles that the Pittsburgh Press, the editorial writer, detailed last summer and that the problems remain resistant to quick fixes.

The last paragraph said:

What's clear is that there is a lot more ground to cover in this investigation and that it will take increased funding to do that. Considering the many signs of deep-rooted troubles in the state police, the House should provide the money that's needed to fully examine them.

Sometimes the editorial writers think that we always decide things on merit, too. But, as I say, I do not really expect us to approve this funding. I hope we do. I hope that I have maybe prompted some of the members on this side to push the antenna up if it does not go up by itself. But if it does not, the investigation, as I say, will continue. We will make, I think, recommendations to the full House that should be made to the full House, and maybe we will make some ameliorating changes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Mr. Fattah.

Mr. FATTAH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the resolution. I think that the comments we have heard today from the other side of the aisle not supporting an increased appropriation is somewhat disappointing but, as the majority leader has stated, somewhat expected, I guess.

To suggest that we have the best State Police organization in the country, but yet we are unwilling to spend \$150,000 to look at how we can improve it, is a contradiction. It is worth the investment if we have the best, and we have the best and yet the best found itself in Federal Court because they would not allow over 50 percent of the citizens in this Commonwealth, women, to come in and have a fair opportunity to work in that organization. They found themselves in Federal Court because they discriminated against other minorities - blacks, Hispanics, and others - and therefore had to, under the direction of the Federal Court, open up the employment opportunities to find out that they conspired against one of their own and planted evidence and perjured themselves in court to try to force one of their own into a difficult situation because of some problems in the department.

Along with the other problems that have been mentioned, the best can be better, obviously, and that is what this committee is trying to do. They are trying to look at how we can

go about improving the State Police. We have a responsibility, and our responsibility is to understand that there is no such thing in government, in government bureaucracies, as a self-correcting organization. That is why we are here. That is why we set up committees like this - to exercise our legislative responsibilities in terms of oversight.

I think we should support this resolution, and I think we can afford and we should support a \$150,000 additional appropriation to this committee. And I think that we need to understand what price we pay if we do not continue to look at this organization - the State Police - and try to continue to be in a position to say that it is the best, but we also need to understand that no matter how good something may be, improvement is always a possibility. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Somerset, Mr. Lloyd.

Mr. LLOYD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, there were a number of things said this morning in debate by members on the other side of the aisle which I think are not factually correct and I think ought to be corrected on the record.

Mr. Saurman got up and made a lot of noise about a motion which was adopted unanimously, including the votes of all the Republican members of the committee, setting some initial guidelines for what Mr. DeCaro, the committee counsel, was supposed to do.

One of the things that we asked for that Mr. Saurman finds so offensive was a comparison, some effort to determine whether in fact the number of incidents of alleged crimes and other problems in our police department of our State are any worse than the situation in other places in the country. I went at that with a very honest effort to find out. Maybe they are not. In fact, the Commissioner's testimony would tend to back up Mr. Ryan's point where he came up with some figures comparing it to the State of Virginia. But just to satisfy Mr. Saurman, I suggest he might want to look on page 2 of the resolution, line 7, where it talks about an unacceptable number of members of the force who have been charged with serious crimes.

Now, it seems to me that one way to find out what is acceptable and what is unacceptable is by comparing, and I think that is perfectly within the purview of this resolution and I think that we have to put this thing into perspective, and I think if you ask the Commissioner, he would agree with me. If you went back and looked at the questions that I asked the first day of the hearings, you would see that I do not want to get this thing blown out of proportion. I have asked questions about, well, is this drug problem as widespread as we might get the impression from one witness, because I think it is necessary to put this in perspective, and I think Mr. Saurman in his effort to concoct a political attack on this resolution has simply not read very carefully.

Now, Mr. Stevens makes the point about affirmative action, and it is correct that we have not yet had hearings on the question of affirmative action, but it is also correct to say that we have received an extensive history of the Bolden litiga-

tion. And while I think there are many questions that can be brought out in the public hearings on that point, the fact of the matter is we do have a memorandum from counsel which does talk about that issue and how the court case came about and all of the intervening appeals that have gone on over the years. I think it is wrong to stand on the floor of this House and say that that has not been done.

I know that Mr. Ryan and Mr. Stevens and Mr. Wogan, because of their experience with the law, recognize that before you go into a hearing, you do a lot of work, and that is what has happened here. There have been cartons and cartons of documents, hours and hours of pouring through those documents. Yes, I have problems with what the lawyer is being paid; I think it is too much, but those things are fixable. I think—and everybody has said what a great lawyer this man is, and I think that is true; I think he is a good lawyer—but I think to suggest that somehow he has not been doing anything or has not been doing anything productive is simply wrong, and I do not think that ought to stand unchallenged on the record.

Finally, I cannot—you know, I guess, having raised that sixth sense that Mr. Manderino was talking about—I cannot forget that back in December some of the same people today who are saying we do not want to appropriate additional money were offering amendments to gut this investigation. I cannot forget that Mr. Ryan had one of those amendments, and it was defeated, I think, by two votes, and almost everybody on his side of the aisle was solid. Then Mr. Stevens had one of those amendments, and I think it was also defeated by two votes, and practically everybody on his side of the aisle was with him. I cannot forget that.

The fact of the matter is that if you looked at the transcripts of the first 2 days of hearings, nobody who approached that with any kind of objectivity could conclude that there was a witch hunt. And if you looked and if you spent some time talking to Mr. DeCaro, I think that you would know that this investigation has uncovered some things that are being corrected in the State Police, and one can only wonder why it took Commissioner Cochran— And I think Commissioner Cochran's testimony has been very helpful. I think he is doing a lot of things which should have been done long, long ago. But why it was necessary to bring somebody in from out of State in order to get an internal affairs division established in our State Police is beyond me, and I think that some of those things are happening because of this investigation. And to the extent that this investigation is undermined by Mr. Ryan's efforts here today, what we are going to do is to take the heat off Commissioner Cochran, and what we need to be doing is keeping that heat on and then passing legislation to make sure that those kinds of changes are carried over to the next Commissioner, whoever it happens to be.

Finally, the last time I remember Mr. Ryan getting up on the floor of the House and raising a big hullabaloo about lawyers and so forth and he said nothing would ever happen, we were investigating the Limerick nuclear powerplant. And do you know what happened? That investigation produced

legislation and that legislation is now the law of this State. I think this investigation can produce legislation. I think it can produce something that will be the law of this State and will result in a much fairer State Police system and one which will put to rest all of these suspicions that have been going on for years and allow us to get on with our business. I think that the State Police will be beneficially helped by this resolution, by this investigation, and I think that to shut it off today, as Mr. Ryan wants to do, instead of coming with amendments to fix it up, I think, will be a serious mistake, and I do not think you can hide behind, well, I did not get to the Reference Bureau in time, because everybody seems to have no problem getting there for budget amendments. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lehigh, Mr. McHale.

Mr. McHALE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I fully concur in the comments that were made earlier by my colleague, Mr. Bortner. It may well be that I came to this investigation with lower expectations than perhaps some of the other members of the committee. I did not expect to find widespread corruption within the State Police, and at this point I have seen no evidence to indicate widespread corruption within the State Police. What I fully expected and what I have in fact seen is that there would be evidence presented during the various hearings establishing that a very good agency could be made considerably better.

The following facts that I will relate very briefly may not be quite as attractive in terms of media coverage, but I think these facts are extremely important to the efficient and effective operation of the Pennsylvania State Police.

Until we began our hearings a few weeks ago, I was not aware that within the State Police there is no periodic physical fitness testing. Once you become a State Police officer, once you graduate from the academy, never again must you pass a physical fitness test. I find that extraordinary. Even more significantly, once you leave the State Police Academy, you are never again given the opportunity at State expense to take a physical examination. We do not have periodic physical examinations for our State Police officers. Once they leave the academy, should their health deteriorate over 10 or 15 or 20 years, we do not, unfortunately, find out, as a matter of routine physical examinations, that an officer may have a cardiac condition. I happen to think it is extremely important, because of the stress under which our officers operate, that at State expense they be given periodic examinations, and I would suggest on an annual basis.

Most importantly, I discovered to my surprise, as a result of testimony that was presented, we do not have a unified code of conduct for our State Police. Our State Police officers in their activities are guided by a whole host of authorities ranging from the State Administrative Code, the Governor's Code of Conduct, the Criminal Code, and their own FR (field regulation) manual. I happen to believe, and I would suggest that this may well be the major legislative byproduct of our hearings, that we ought to have a code of conduct written specifically for guidance to assist our State Police officers in their

day-to-day routines. We ought to have legislatively adopted a State Police code of conduct. I do not believe that the Governor's Code of Conduct, designed to meet the needs and the epochal requirements of all the members of the executive branch, has been specifically tailored in a manner that it is helpful to our State Police officers.

Let me close with this, Mr. Speaker: Several references have been made to an editorial that appeared in the Patriot. In that editorial, apparently, there was a reference to a witch hunt. I find those references offensive and in a sense ironic. That editorial appeared the day after a vote was taken within our committee to provide minority members of the committee with copies of all correspondence. I voted with the minority members of the committee to provide such access. That editorial was written the day after, in my opinion, the committee by majority vote did the right thing. There was absolutely no partisanship, from my perspective, in that vote, and in fact, I voted with the three minority members to provide full access. I do not think that that kind of activity reflects a witch hunt.

I have some concerns, as does the gentleman, Mr. Bortner, with regard to the amount of money that is to be appropriated here. And like Mr. Bortner, I am more than willing to discuss that \$150,000. I, frankly, would be more pleased with a lower appropriation, but just so we do not miss what is at stake here, yesterday I sat there in the Rules Committee when the majority leader offered to cut that amount in half, and that offer was rejected outright by the minority leader.

We have heard two versions here today, two inconsistent appeals. The gentleman, Mr. Gallen, stood up and said, this committee is going nowhere; it is a travesty where it has gone already, and the committee on its merit should be abolished, or its lack of merit. The gentleman, Mr. Stevens, stood up and said, oh, no, that is not the issue; the issue is whether or not we are going to spend this amount of money - \$150,000 - for the purposes outlined, specifically counsel fees.

I happen to think, in terms of what is at issue here on the floor of the House today with regard to that point, the gentleman, Mr. Gallen, is a bit more candid. The issue is not \$150,000; the issue is not whether or not one side of the aisle or the other has more respect for the State Police; the question is whether we are going to invest \$150,000 in an extremely important State agency, an agency charged with the public health and safety of the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

I would not have joined this committee if I thought that it would be a witch hunt. I would have gotten off the committee if I thought that the proceedings so far had in fact been a witch hunt, and on a number of key occasions when I thought that fairness dictated it, I did not vote with the members of my party who saw things perhaps in a different light. I believe this has been a very important investigation, and I, for one, have no difficulty whatever justifying to my constituents that I want to invest \$150,000 in the finest State Police force in the United States. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. KENNEDY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The amendments are self-explanatory. If anybody has any questions, I stand to be interrogated. I would appreciate your support. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Mr. Cowell, on the amendment.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, unfortunately, the amendments are not self-explanatory. There is a listing of line items and numbers, but they do not tell what they are for. Could we have clarification as to what each line item is and specifically whether it is an increase or a reduction in the amount?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Kennedy.

Mr. KENNEDY. Each and every item, Mr. Speaker, is a matter of mathematical deduction. It is the difference between what was spent last year or appropriated versus what is asked for in this year's budget. So if you can subtract, basic mathematics, then it is self-explanatory.

As far as each and every item, it would take a couple hours to go through each and every one of them, but it is right there before you. It amounts to about \$4 million in increased moneys to run the House and Senate. It is my understanding there is approximately \$18 million, \$19 million, \$20 million in excess funds that we have in the bank that was appropriated in prior years.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, the Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, I do not know where the gentleman, Mr. Kennedy, gets his understanding. His understanding is completely different from my understanding. The numbers represented in the budget document are those needed to fund the various House accounts, employees, benefits - Blue Cross/Blue Shield, et cetera - and, Mr. Speaker, I ask all members who are on automatic pilot to push the switch to the way the leader has been voting all day - negative.

Mr. KENNEDY. Mr. Speaker, we made two votes greater than last year on this same amendment, and I have nothing to offer on this one here.

The SPEAKER. Is it the suggestion of the leaders that the vote be in the negative on this amendment? This is a different amendment. This is A2636, which Mr. Kennedy has not explained.

Mr. Speaker, could I have some attention?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman has a right to the floor. He has been asked a question and he is attempting to answer it. You may proceed.

Mr. KENNEDY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

For the last 6 hours we have been inserting amendments—most of which are on automatic pilot, including myself—on increases of moneys. It seems to me that as we have researched different legislatures, in fact in seven States, we find that Pennsylvania's legislature is now costing the taxpayers \$391,000 per year per member, and it is my understanding that we have a lot of money in excess funds appropriated in prior budgets. Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, it is my understanding that there are still several amendments to HB 2508 that have not yet come down from the Reference Bureau, and I would ask that we go over that temporarily just for a moment, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair will pass over temporarily HB 2508.

STATEMENT BY MAJORITY LEADER

Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent to make a few brief remarks.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, those of the members of the House who are keener of mind and sight than maybe some others will have noticed that we passed in the last 10 or 15 minutes HB's 2551, 2552, 2554, 2556, 2557, 2558, and SB's 1415 and 1416. Those of you, as I say, who are keener of mind and sight will have noticed that one of those bills is probably the budget bill for this year.

We have worked the last 2 days on a number of amendments. We are now only some \$800 million over the budget



that came out of the Appropriations Committee. The conferees who will be appointed on one of the bills that we have just sent to the Senate will again, as they have in the last several years, be charged with the task of formulating a budget for the Commonwealth for the next fiscal year.

The exercise that we have gone through in the last couple of days gives your leaders very little direction, and the purpose, if it were ever served, of giving leaders direction by the amendment process seems to have gotten lost with the automatic affirmative votes on all of the amendments. I am sure if each amendment were considered on its merits fairly by each member with the view of whether or not we are going to be able to afford it, some of the votes would certainly have been different. As it stands now, Roy Afflerbach, Max Pievsky, and myself are the only ones who are entitled to vote for the tax cut. We want you to remember that when the tax-cut bill is up. We just want to see three green lights on it.

I think what all the members were voting for, except for the ones who put their red lights up, was the fact that we certainly would like to see those kinds of increases in the expenditures that we make, and I certainly would like to see them. I am sure Mr. Pievsky and Mr. Afflerbach would like to see those, too. Unfortunately, they are just not possible within the confines of the money that is available, considering that we would also like to do the fair thing so far as the personal income tax and the corporate net income tax and maybe some other changes in the Tax Code.

In any event, Mr. Speaker, since the budget bill, I am convinced, has already passed this House and will come back for concurrence at a later date prior to the end of the fiscal year, I would ask that HB 2508 be placed upon the final passage postponed calendar.

### PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY

The SPEAKER. Mr. Cawley, you want to correct the record?

Mr. CAWLEY. No, Mr. Speaker. I would like to ask a question about HB 2508.

The SPEAKER. What is your question?

Mr. CAWLEY. Are we going to accept any more amendments? I know we have some, and we do not know, I mean it is not positive, as was stated, that that is exactly what is going to happen.

The SPEAKER. If the House decides to place the bill on final passage postponed, then amendments are not acceptable on that stage. But with no objection, the Chair may also rescind that at any given moment and place the bill back on third consideration when amendments would be accepted.

Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, I thought we had taken all the amendments that were available.

The SPEAKER. Apparently there are some amendments—

Mr. MANDERINO. If there are amendments that are available, I have no objection, but I think it is stupid to sit here and wait for amendments from the Legislative Reference Bureau.

The SPEAKER. Are there amendments on the floor, Mr. Cawley? Have you sent those amendments to duplication?

Mr. CAWLEY. Yes. No, we did not. We just received them and just had them signed.

The SPEAKER. On the question of placing the bill on final passage postponed, the Chair recognizes the minority leader.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I have no objection to going along with the recommendation of the majority leader and placing the bill on the table, or recommitting it, as far as it goes. I would now, though, just like to put on the record that maybe my idea yesterday that I was criticized for by my friend back there a little earlier today was not all that bad, because now after spending 2 days in this "bastardized process," we are not even going to vote the bill, and it is generally admitted—and it is something that we have all known, at least the leadership has known—that this bill is not going to be the bill that becomes law anyway. We have taken care of that, as Mr. Manderino has very rightfully pointed out.

As to wasting more time today introducing amendments to a bill that is destined to go on the table, I think those who have amendments to offer should just give some thought to it, because up until a minute ago, there was a chance that it would pass. Now I think you all understand that this one is going to just stick around. The real bill just went over to the Senate.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the majority leader.

Mr. MANDERINO. Mr. Speaker, the desire of the members of this House, as demonstrated by those who have just jumped up objecting that they did not get a chance to offer their amendment when they know the budget bill is already passed, would indicate to me that some people do not think it is a waste of time to offer the amendments. And we only spent 4 hours total, Mr. Speaker, in the last 2 days on budget amendments. We did some other things. We handled a resolution for additional funding. We did banking. We did some other things. There were only 4 hours that we took to run through, for whatever value—and I question whether there is value—for whatever value it had, to go through the amendment process. I still think taking the amendments individually so members could know what they were voting on in each specific case is much better than taking them by packets.

If there is no objection to going back to those amendments that are available, I would ask that we go back to those amendments that are available and then place the bill on final passage postponed.

Mr. Speaker, my able assistant here reminds me that unless we put the bill somewhere and hide it from members, they will just keep drafting amendments to it. I would be happy to place the bill—

The SPEAKER. Your able assistant has been here long enough to know the floor of the House.

Mr. MANDERINO. I would be happy to place the bill on the table once we have handled the amendments that are here.

The SPEAKER. All right.

The majority leader has withdrawn his motion to place the bill on final passage postponed. That means the bill remains

as the Speaker has called it, on third consideration, with the question being, will the House agree to the bill? That being so, it is available for whatever amendments are still to be offered. If you have such amendments, the Chair would urge you to send them down immediately for duplication so that we do not spend any more time than is necessary on this period.
