Mr. GANNON. Mr. Speaker, my standing here presents somewhat of a dilemma since this is the nonpreferred appropriation for Temple University. The reason I want to address this bill, I am going to vote against this appropriation, Mr. Speaker, and the reason I am going to do so is because several years ago Temple University awarded an honorary degree to Deng Xiaoping, who is principally responsible for the massacre of the Chinese students in Tiananmen Square. I have introduced a resolution asking Temple University to revoke that honorary degree. I am sure they would not have given an honorary degree to Adolf Hitler or Joseph Stalin or Piet Botha, but they have seen fit to bestow an honor and, in my view, really bring down the good name of Temple University by awarding an honorary degree to that gentleman, and for that reason I am going to vote against the appropriation.

Mr. Speaker, I feel a moral obligation to stand with the students of Tiananmen Square, and in particular, that young

student who stood in front of that tank when they began to march to break up that prodemocracy movement in China.

**REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD**

Mr. Speaker, my decision to vote against Temple University's State appropriation for the fiscal year 1989-90 was made with a great deal of prior thought.

As a graduate of Temple University and as a Pennsylvania State legislator, I am proud of Temple's accomplishments in the academic field and beyond. However, I feel compelled to vote "no" and express my reasons for doing so in the official record of the House of Representatives.

Over the past year, I have had several occasions to contact the government affairs person at Temple University, Mr. David Randall. On two of these occasions in particular, I found him to be uncooperative and distant at the very least. On one instance, Mr. Randall was arrogant and rude. It seems obvious to me that this is unacceptable behavior. For that reason, I wrote and called the office of the president, Mr. Peter Liacouras, to express my dismay and concern about Mr. Randall's attitude. To this day, I find it incredible that Mr. Liacouras never responded to my calls or letters. I think this attitude in both the president and his staff is simply wrong.

It is my hope that my remarks will be read by Mr. Liacouras. Perhaps, this will cause him to reflect and make a change for the better on how he responds to those of us in the State legislature who fund Temple University.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 1687 CONTINUED

DECISION OF CHAIR RESCINDED

The SPEAKER. Without objection, the Chair rescinds its decision that HB 1687 has been agreed to for the third time as amended.

On the question recurring,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration as amended?

Mr. MOWERY offered the following amendments No. A2406:

Amend Title, page 1, line 2, by removing the period after "Department" and inserting

and to the State Workmen's Insurance Board for distribution to current and former subscribers.

Amend Sec. 1, page 1, by inserting between lines 14 and 15

(4) The sum of \$100,000 is appropriated to the State Workmen's Insurance Board for an audit and actuarial study by a member of the American Academy of Actuaries to determine the exact amount of any surplus in the fund in excess of the amount which may be necessary for the payment of all claims and administrative expenses and for the maintenance of a reserve sufficient to insure the actuarial soundness of the fund; and to determine the percentage of premiums paid into the fund during the immediately preceding ten fiscal years which are attributable to payments made by each current and former subscriber exclusive of any premiums paid by the Commonwealth. Such audit and actuarial study shall be initiated within the first 30 days of fiscal year 1989-1990 and be completed within 60 days thereafter.

(5) The sum of \$135,000,000 is appropriated to the State Workmen's Insurance Board for distribution to current and former subscribers, exclusive of the Commonwealth, who have paid premiums into the fund during the immediately preceding ten fiscal years and for administrative costs associated with the notification of, and distribution to, such subscribers or former subscribers entitled to a portion of the distribution. All eligible subscribers and former subscribers shall be notified of their entitlement to a portion of this distribution within 30 days following the completion of the audit and actuarial study required by this act. Claims to receive a portion of the distribution shall be filed by eligible claimants no later than 120 days after notification. Claims shall be based upon the total amount of premiums paid by each subscriber and former subscriber during the immediately preceding ten fiscal years. Any subscriber or former subscriber who fails to submit a claim forfeits any further right to a share of the distribution hereunder. Payments shall be made upon valid claims filed within the time limit based upon the proportion that each claim bears to the total of all claims filed within the period. If the audit and actuarial study conclude that a lesser amount is available for distribution than is contained in this appropriation, the board shall reduce each claim in a proportionate amount. All claims shall be paid within 60 days of the deadline for filing claims.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendments?

The SPEAKER. On amendment A2406, Representative Mowery from Cumberland is recognized.

Mr. MOWERY. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

In light of the fact that this particular bill is a budget bill, the amendment basically does not disturb the amount of

money that is currently being proposed in the bill, HB 1687. What it does, however, is provide for \$100,000 in addition for a study to be made by an actuary to determine the amount of money in the fund and how it could be distributed among the some 14,000 small employers in Pennsylvania who, over the past 10 years, have been using the workers' comp fund as their only source of insuring against their employees' accidents and disabilities.

Mr. Speaker, as far as the workers' comp fund is concerned, it was founded in this State in 1915 when we became an industrial State to allow for businesses of high risk to have the opportunity to provide coverage to their employees. Over the years, this fund has been the highest costing fund compared to the commercial companies' offerings, and yet on the other hand, even though the employers have paid the higher premiums, they have not been the recipients of any of the devisable surplus that now is estimated by the fund's own actuary to be over some \$320 million. This provides that the State, having been one of the employers, will have already received last year \$110 million; under this bill, another \$75 million, or approximately 50 percent of that distribution, will already have been taken by the State of Pennsylvania. The balance in this bill would be by actuarial analysis returned to the employers who so much need this money in their small businesses and for that opportunity to be able to share in that surplus.

I ask for support on this particular amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is, will the House agree to amendment 2406? On that question, the majority leader, Representative O'Donnell, seeks recognition.

Mr. O'DONNELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment may or may not be worthy of debate on the merits. The content of this bill will ultimately be shaped by the budget process. This bill is a vehicle, and I would urge the members to vote "no" on the amendment.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Ryan seeks recognition.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, I agree with the majority leader, Mr. O'Donnell. There are times when I have to oppose amendments that otherwise I might be inclined to support.

Without going into the merits of this amendment, I join with Mr. O'Donnell in saying that this is part of the budget process, this particular bill. If we are going to get out of here on time, and right now I do not know that we will, but if we are going to get out of here on time, this bill must get over to the Senate so that it can go in and out of a committee today and get its 3 days' reading.

For that reason I am voting against the amendment reluctantly, asking my members to vote against the amendment so that this bill can proceed on and hopefully will reach a happy conclusion with the general appropriation bill in the immediate future.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Mowery seeks recognition.

Mr. MOWERY. Thank you very much.

With all due respect to our leadership on both sides, I really believe that this bill will have a great impact on all of the small business community throughout Pennsylvania who have participated in the program. I do not believe that it is going to hold up the political processes. I understand their concerns regarding the budget. I am wholeheartedly supportive of their concern that we do do it in a timely fashion, but I ask that you vote for this to show that you do have concern for what has happened in the past - money going out of the general fund in the SWIF (State Workmen's Insurance Fund) plan into the General Fund, which is really not accomplishing what the intent was initially of that fund.

Thank you. I ask for a positive vote.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Fargo from Mercer is recognized.

Mr. FARGO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think we have to take a look at this amendment and see just what it does in terms of the fairness to the people who have been paying into the State workmen's compensation fund and also fairness to our general budget and the people who have to pay taxes in Pennsylvania, and I think this amendment addresses both of those things.

It does not take back the \$110 million that was taken from this fund during the last budget year. It does not reduce the \$75 million that we are talking about in this particular bill that we are looking at presently. Instead, it merely says, let us take a look at the surplus and see who that money belongs to. I do not think there is any question but that the majority of that money or a lot of that money does belong to the State of Pennsylvania, but what we are doing is ignoring the fact that there are hundreds of thousands of small businessmen out there that are also paying that premium to the State workmen's compensation fund, and they have to be a consideration also as to what is to be done with this surplus. And this is the time to do it, when we are passing a bill which has to do with removing some of the funds from that fund and putting it into the General Fund or at least using it for General Fund purposes.

So I think it is only a way that we are going to, as far as the State is concerned, stay out of a potential, legal, liable situation in which, if I were one of the employers who paid into this over the years and I saw my money being used for State purposes, I would ultimately bring up a lawsuit against the State of Pennsylvania. I think that by looking at this amendment and following the provisions of this amendment, we do forego that possibility. We become fair to the people that are providing the income for the SWIF fund, and I think it is extremely important that we be fair to those businessmen who depend on us here in the State Capitol to make sure that their money, which is being used here in this SWIF fund, is used for the purpose for which it was paid.

You know, it is kind of like looking around and finding out, where is the surplus? Where is there a little bit of money that we can take to use for the General Fund instead of going through the obligation of actually raising taxes, if necessary,

or reducing the amount of services that we provide in various places in Pennsylvania, and then taking that money and saying, all right, that is ours, because it has been sitting around. That is unfair, unfair to the people who actually pay it. It would be unfair if we did it to the lottery system, it would be unfair if we did it to the unemployment compensation system, and it certainly is unfair doing it to the State workmen's compensation fund. It is unfair to the businessmen in Pennsylvania.

I believe it is very important that we look at it from that point of view. Pass this amendment so that we can get back on the track that we should be as far as that money that was paid by our businesspeople into this particular fund. So I would really urge that we look at this amendment favorably and vote for it. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Bowley from Warren County is recognized.

Mr. BOWLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am going to try to give the members some good reasons why they should oppose this amendment other than the ones already articulated by our two, majority and minority, leaders.

For those members who do not know—and I looked into this recently—the SWIF fund had a net underwriting loss in 11 out of the last 13 years, which simply means that the premiums being paid in by the businesspeople of this Commonwealth are not enough to offset the losses being paid out by the SWIF. It is only through the prudent investment management of the funds that were paid into the SWIF fund years ago and the interest that has accumulated off those investments that the SWIF fund is allowing the premiums to remain at the level they are now. If it were not for those investments, the premiums paid by the businesspeople of this Commonwealth would actually have to increase. So it is through those investment processes and earnings that they are allowed to keep the premiums at the rate they are, and to refund them money would be a terrible mistake.

I would ask for a negative vote.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Vroon from Chester County is recognized.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, may I interrogate the gentleman who just got done talking?

The SPEAKER. I hope not.

Will the gentleman consent? He said he will.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, if what you say is right, how in the wide world can you justify the State putting the grab on that money that is not going to be available anymore as reserve? How can you justify that?

Mr. BOWLEY. Well, that was one of my questions. The argument to that is that the Commonwealth, before it became self-insured, paid millions of dollars into the SWIF fund. The SWIF fund has set aside a large reserve to pay off any potential loss that might occur to the businesspeople of this Commonwealth, and the Commonwealth is only taking back out and transferring money out of the SWIF fund that they themselves, the Commonwealth, have paid in.

Mr. VROON. Now, as I understand, is there a provision to permit that? Does the plan permit that money to be transferred back to the State and lost forever as far as that goes?

Mr. BOWLEY. Well, I do not know if there is a plan. We did it last year in the General Assembly and it was approved. We transferred, I think, \$75 million last year, and we are going to do it this year. The problem with giving money back to the businesspeople is that currently their premiums are not at the same rate to offset their losses now.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, if you think this is so good for the Commonwealth that they should get their money back, why would it not be equally good or better for the poor people, the poor businesses, who paid it in? We are talking about stimulating our economy and protecting the small businesspeople. All of the people who are insured under this plan are in the circumstances which make it necessary for them to look to that plan for coverage. Do you not think it is a lot more important for the economic vitality of our business community, the small business community, to leave these funds there, or better yet, to give it back to them as it is stipulated in the act?

Mr. BOWLEY. Yes. I agree with you that the fund should be given back to the people paying into it, but I think you have missed my main point. The premiums they are paying now are not adequate to cover the losses that the SWIF fund is experiencing. At any time that the premiums paid in are more than the premiums being paid out for the losses, the SWIF Board does have the opportunity to return a portion of those premiums to the people paying them in. But that has only occurred in 2 out of the last 13 years, and at that particular time, the SWIF Board decided to keep that extra money to build up the loss reserve fund.

Mr. VROON. How do you say you are keeping the money when you are grabbing it and putting it into the General Fund? I do not understand this at all. How do you keep that money as a reserve when you are transferring it out of the fund?

Mr. BOWLEY. It is my understanding—and I do not have all the notes in front of me because they are over in my office—but it is my understanding that there is more than enough set aside in the loss reserve fund to potentially pay any large loss that the SWIF fund would accumulate. This is money far and beyond what is in the reserve fund.

Mr. VROON. If that is true, then would it bother the integrity of the fund to refund that excess amount that is there to the people who put it in there in the first place? I do not understand.

Mr. BOWLEY. That is what we are doing. The Commonwealth put the vast majority of that money in there, sir. And I think most of the members in this chamber would support refunding money back to businesses when the premiums equal what the losses are on a year-to-year basis. At this current time, in 11 out of the last 13 years, they have not done that.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, I would like to just say a few words.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. VROON. Mr. Speaker, we have a situation here where, by its very terms, a fund has been earmarked for a given purpose; that is, for the purpose of paying for claims that have been generated by that sector in our economy who could not afford to buy workmen's compensation insurance elsewhere. I think that when we go contrary to the wording and the demands of the instrument by which it was established, I think we are in effect just almost stealing it from that fund. I for one think it is absolutely illegal to do that, and I think it is unethical for the State to grab this money and to make this slush fund out of the SWIF fund.

I urge an affirmative vote on this. Keep this from happening for the protection of our small businesspeople in the State.

As far as this amendment is concerned, it is probably one that we can all agree with, because what it does is it says that the State fund, the SWIF plan, would in effect pay the same taxes as if it were a private fund, meaning that it would pay State and Federal taxes, not the taxes themselves but the equivalent of those taxes into the State Treasury every year. Based on this past year's premium of approximately \$125 million, the State would receive approximately \$10 million a year to be used in the General Fund.

I ask for support of this amendment.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, the gentleman, Mr. Ryan, is recognized.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, under some circumstances I think this amendment would make a lot of sense. I do not know that it serves any useful purpose right now other than to clutter up the bill, which is the very thing that Mr. O'Donnell and I are trying to avoid. What we have in this amendment is Mr. Mowery taking \$10 million from this fund in future years, and that may very well be a good thing, but we have a year to do it. Right now we have 3 or 4 days to do a budget, and I would really ask that we put this one aside, study it a

little bit together with studying the whole SWIF situation, and address it in depth over the coming 12 months.

On that basis, I would respectfully ask for a "no" vote so that this bill can move out of here uncluttered. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this particular amendment is to give some clarity to the bill to assure people that this training is not mandatory of the providers but that it is supposed to be provided on an optional basis. This is as a result of the Youth and Aging Committee, particularly Representative Sam Smith. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is on the amendment. On that question, Representative Smith from Jefferson County is recognized.

Bill as amended was agreed to.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Indiana, Mr. Wass, on final passage.

Mr. WASS. Mr. Speaker, may I interrogate the maker of the legislation, Mr. Evans?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Evans, indicates he will stand for interrogation.

Mr. WASS. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, if you would, I am wondering how this would service a community in Indiana County, in rural Pennsylvania. Would the Department of Welfare also have provisions where it would also provide the services in those areas?

Mr. EVANS. Yes, Mr. Speaker. Presently the purpose of this would be that the Department of Public Welfare would basically have to make these courses available so that any child-care provider would have an opportunity to take advantage of this particular information. As you know, Mr. Speaker, we have a lot of child-care facilities throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and it is important that they have central information so rural, urban, and suburban Pennsylvania would be able to take advantage of this information.

Mr. WASS. So you would believe that possibly in every county there would be such a service provided?

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, I did not hear. What was that question again?

Mr. WASS. Would you believe that possibly every county could have such a schooling or an information center?

Mr. EVANS. It would not necessarily require that every county have an information center. That would be something that would be left up to the Department of Public Welfare. Again, keep in mind that this is something that is optional and that the onus is on the Department of Public Welfare to provide this particular information. It is not something, again, that is mandatory.

Mr. WASS. Mr. Speaker, I am trying to get you to read into the record that these services will also be available and convenient for our people in rural Pennsylvania to take advantage of this legislation, which I agree with.

Mr. EVANS. Are you finished?

Mr. WASS. Yes.

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, the answer would be yes. It would be provided to everyone throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Presently my understanding is that there is a list of information facilities that are available that if people want to take advantage of it, they can do that today.

Mr. WASS. Mr. Speaker, can you tell me, is such a facility available in Indiana County, in western Pennsylvania?

Mr. EVANS. In all honesty, Mr. Speaker—and I know that the gentleman is very sincere in his question—

Mr. WASS. Right.

Mr. EVANS. —I could not answer that question for you today.

Mr. WASS. Thank you very much. That concludes my interrogation.

Mr. Speaker, if I may, I just want to make a statement on the bill.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. WASS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it was my intent in my interrogation to make certain that rural Pennsylvania has access to this legislation. So often the services are provided in the larger community, larger cities, and we out there in rural Pennsylvania cannot take advantage of this far-reaching legislation. So that was my intent. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Saurman from Montgomery is recognized.

Mr. SAURMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, may I interrogate the maker of this legislation?

The SPEAKER. Representative Evans indicates he will stand for interrogation. You may proceed.

Mr. SAURMAN. I am concerned about the nature of education for these people and the necessity for it. We have people in our Commonwealth who are known as parents who have no training. We have now a group of three or four chil-

dren, four to six children who are going to be in the care of these people. What specific training does someone who is keeping watch over four to six children need?

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, if you look at HB 182, we outline a number of areas - first aid, child development, nutrition, health care, small business management skills, guidance of children, creative programming, learning environments. Today child care is a major industry not just in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania but throughout the entire United States. Those particular courses, not just in my view but of people who have participated in this particular industry, are things that child-care providers need to know as they run a child-care facility. It is not enough just to have a person open up a child-care center and not understand the importance of feeding proper food to individuals.

But what I would also like to say, Mr. Speaker, is I would like to, if the gentleman would not mind, provide some information of where some facilities are located in relation to the last question that was asked of me - Penn State, University of Pittsburgh, Beaver County, Community College of Luzerne County, East Stroudsburg, Edinboro University. These are just examples of where presently these particular services can be provided. If you would like to see this information, it is right here from the Department of Public Welfare, which tells you that all those services are throughout the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Mr. SAURMAN. Mr. Speaker, I did not hear well, but did I hear that this is where the training would be available from?

Mr. EVANS. This is just an example of some of the training that presently is being provided under the Department of Public Welfare. These are just some examples, and I can certainly provide this information to you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. SAURMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to speak to the bill.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Mr. Saurman, is asking to speak on the bill. He is in order.

Mr. SAURMAN. Mr. Speaker, on this Thursday the Health and Welfare Committee is going to be meeting on a Federal bill called OBRA (Omnibus Reconciliation Act), which is going to require training for nurses' aides. We are enveloped in a development or a program that seems to require that everyone who takes care of someone else is going to have to be a specialist. The figure that I have for this training is \$175 per person who is being trained.

In terms of our nurses' aides, many people who are not able to pass tests, who are not able to learn these kinds of things, who in effect are illiterate but humane and very caring persons, are able to provide the kinds of care that are necessary in our nursing homes, in our day-care centers, and we will be depriving them of this opportunity. We will be decreasing the numbers of persons who are already in short supply to provide the kinds of care that are needed for children and for elderly people.

Mr. Speaker, I think this is a dangerous bill. I think we should vote against it and would certainly urge a "no" vote. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Stairs from Westmoreland County is recognized.

Mr. STAIRS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to encourage my colleagues to support this bill. I feel very strongly that it was strengthened by the previous amendment to make it voluntary and not mandatory, and of course, by the training provided in this legislation, we will not only improve the quality of the day care but also provide a more sound day care for the children of our Commonwealth.

I appreciate your support.

The SPEAKER. On amendment A1956, the Chair recognizes, from Philadelphia County, Representative Carn.

Mr. CARN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This is a reconsideration vote on the amendment that would establish the Pennsylvania Fair Automobile Insurance Authority. This authority would have the power to provide auto insurance coverage for those who cannot find auto insurance coverage in the private market.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

The Chair recognizes Representative Olasz from Allegheny on final passage.

Mr. OLASZ. Mr. Speaker, I have to apologize to my colleagues. I was under the impression that this bill was not going to run until later in the week.

I have some reservations about the bill, and would the maker please stand for brief interrogation, please?

Mr. BROUJOS. I will.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will. You may proceed with the interrogation.

Mr. OLASZ. Mr. Speaker, I am concerned about the background checks. In all due respect to the Guard, who performs very nobly on many occasions, this drug war is comparable to something none of us have ever witnessed in the past in our own country.

I am curious about the background checks that are conducted on these volunteers. Who does the background checks or who will do the background checks?

Mr. BROUJOS. I am sure that part of the program of the use of the National Guard for antidrug operations will include appropriate checks to insure that there is no compromise between those performing the duties and any family or other relationship. I am satisfied to accept the representations of the executive branch, particularly from the National Guard Bureau in Washington, that appropriate precautions will be taken. As to who does it, I do not know, and again, I think it is sufficient that we trust the administrative branch to accomplish that.

Mr. OLASZ. While the word "appropriate" might satisfy some people, I am concerned, because to be honest— Let me play devil's advocate. I am a drug dealer.

Mr. BROUJOS. Is there any other interrogation?

Mr. OLASZ. This is a statement.

I am a bigtime drug dealer. I tell a guy, go volunteer for surveillance, and let me know what area you are going to put under surveillance. That is the reason I have asked what appropriate organization is going to conduct a background check, because certainly, if I have a friend, a relative, or a family member as part of the State Police, part of the Federal nars, I do not want them being exposed to someone because someone tipped somebody off for a little payoff.

Mr. BROUJOS. Mr. Speaker, that is a valid concern, a very serious consideration, and I will certainly communicate to the

executive branch again your concerns and be sure that they answer that, and I will have an answer to you before, I am sure, the Governor would sign the bill.

Mr. OLASZ. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is on the amendment. The gentleman, Mr. Hayes, is recognized.

Mr. HAYES. Mr. Speaker, I am not sure that what the gentleman, Mr. Olasz, meant by "background checks" fits with what the military's definition of a background check is. But if they are in fact the same, if what Mr. Olasz meant is the same as what the military means by that vernacular, "background check," I can tell you that persons on active duty are charged with the responsibility of conducting background investigations on those persons in both the active and reserve components with regard to security clearances. If that is the gentleman's question, you will have those persons currently serving on active duty with the military who are primarily assigned to the military intelligence branch of the United States Army conducting background investigations.

Now, that is for security clearance purposes. If the gentleman has some other definition which he assigns to "background checks," why, then what I have just said may not come into play. But with regard to security clearances—and it may very well be necessary for persons volunteering for this particular type of service to have a security clearance - confidential, secret, or top secret—those persons would be subjected to a background investigation performed by professionally trained investigators in military intelligence.

The SPEAKER. The question is on the amendment. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Washington, Mr. Daley, on the amendment.

Mr. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the sponsor stand for brief interrogation?

Mr. BROUJOS. Yes, sir.

Mr. DALEY. My questions are primarily regarding explaining to the Assembly here exactly what we are talking about in terms of utilizing the National Guard in terms of drug interdiction. What do you expect them to be doing, Mr. Speaker?

Mr. BROUJOS. First, they will be in a support role. They will not be in an active role of arrest, search, or seizure. That support role will be in support of existing law enforcement activities on the Federal, State, and local levels as provided in the Federal act.

Specifically, it is contemplated that they will initially engage in the search of commercial cargo at airports, such as Philadelphia International Airport. They will also be considered for roles of support in aerial surveillance; use of photography; use of helicopters to transport planes that may be, like a Cessna that is on an airfield in a county and is transported by a 54 helicopter; by movement of troops by helicopter; by a number of other support missions, and providing equipment and weapons if necessary.

Mr. DALEY. What do you mean by "weapons if necessary"?

Mr. BROUJOS. Well, I think the important thing is whatever capability that the Pennsylvania Guard has to support drug operations, they will make those assets available. It could be laboratories. It could be training functions. It perhaps could be some weapons system. It could be photography equipment, bulletproof vests. I think that is a matter within the capability of our Guard.

Mr. DALEY. For the record, let us make this point completely and specifically known to all the members: These National Guard troops will be in support only, provided with no weapons, and they will be transporting and doing cargo searches in a, quote, "nonhostile environment." Am I correct in that assumption?

Mr. BROUJOS. Everything you said is correct except with respect to the question of no weapons. That will be a matter for the Guard to decide.

During our hearings we made it very clear that we wanted to be sure that no guardsman at any time says, "I wish I had a weapon," and he did not have one. We made it clear that, as a committee, we wanted to be sure that the Adjutant General took all steps necessary to take precautions to protect the troops involved. That is going to be accomplished in a couple of ways. First, National Guard regulation 500 provides that the Guard shall not be used in a hostile environment. Secondly, if there is a need for security of any kind, I am satisfied that our Guard, which is well led, well trained, and well equipped, will respond as necessary for each situation.

Mr. DALEY. No other questions.

Mr. Speaker, may I make a brief comment on the bill?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may comment on the bill.

Mr. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want the members to understand that the public has a perception that we are going to utilize the National Guard on drug interdiction in terms of involvement, and it may not be exactly what you may think is going to be happening or the public may think is going to be happening. I think Mr. Broujos has stated very succinctly that the Guard is going to be used in a support role and they will not be basically placed in a hostile situation.

I cannot ask you not to vote for this. I am asking you to support this legislation; however, with reservation, knowing that being involved in this type of war—and believe me, Representative Broujos and I have talked about this at great extent; this is a war—these National Guard troops will be exposed to a hostile situation. We know that there was a Guard helicopter that was shot down in Texas for drug interdiction by a surface-to-air missile by drugpushers that were trying to stop their activity. My concern is for those soldiers.

If we are going to be involved meaningfully, we ought to be involved in more than just cargo searches. They will be directly involved. However, I do ask for support of the bill with reservation. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The question is on final passage of the bill. On that question, Representative Broujos from Cumberland is recognized.

Mr. BROUJOS. Mr. Speaker, there are a number of matters that I want to bring to the House's attention.

Number one, the participants will be volunteers. That is written into the act. Secondly, drugs are ripping apart the moral, social, and governmental fabric of our society. They are commanding an increasing, larger proportion of our State resources and tax dollars. The amount of money, weapons, and personnel available to drug operators exceeds that available to law enforcement officials, and this war requires the application of every single asset that our society has, particularly our governmental resources. The National Guard is capable of providing the men and equipment to support these operations.

Some precautions that have been taken are that there is a requirement in National Guard regulations that the men be trained for the specific mission that they are to accomplish. Much of the work they do will be within their existing training capabilities. Secondly, we have insured in this act and the Federal Government has insured that the role in antidrug operations will not impede the basic military preparedness mission. Third, there is a National Guard regulation that they shall not be committed to a hostile environment. The only caveat there is that a situation which may appear to be non-hostile could be hostile, and we know that we cannot ask the Guard not to go in harm's way. We cannot make a commitment that they will not go in harm's way, but we will certainly minimize the risks.

There are funds available now. There are troops available now. There is a will available now. I ask for support of this bill.

The SPEAKER. The question is on final passage of the bill. On that question, Representative Olasz is recognized.

Mr. OLASZ. Mr. Speaker, I would hope that the House would give very careful attention to the next question.

Would Mr. Hayes please stand and explain the difference between a security check for top-secret clearance and just a normal background check? The noise level was such that I could not clearly understand the explanation.

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman consent to interrogation? The gentleman indicates that he will.

Mr. HAYES. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

As I said before, the business of background investigation is one which is normally pursued when a person is being designated as holding a sensitive position requiring a confidential, secret, or top-secret security clearance. If the gentleman meant by his statement a background check as something less than a situation which requires a security clearance, then you would not be bringing to bear the professional arm of the military, military intelligence, to indicate whether a person satisfies the requirements of a confidential, secret, or top-secret security check. If the gentleman's vernacular therefore meant knowing whether a person had problems with regard to substance abuse, that sort of thing, you are not talking about the normal search to see whether a person is properly qualified to hold a confidential, secret, or top-secret clearance. That is where you would get into a gray area, and I know the gentle-

man's concern. And I share the comments and thoughts of Mr. Broujos when he said obviously the National Guard, both at the State level and also at the Federal bureau level, is going to have to establish very stringent screening procedures to make sure that those persons who are volunteering—and that is the key word, "volunteering"—are not prone to be cooperators with those who are perpetrating those crimes dealing with drugs - use of drugs, pushing of drugs, selling of drugs, transportation of illegal substances, what have you.

The key word in this legislation—and it became a matter of conversation to some extent in our caucus—is "volunteer." There had been some concern over the last couple weeks whether or not this was going to be mandatory, where persons serving in the Pennsylvania National Guard would have to involuntarily participate in drug interdiction operations, and the language, as indicated by Mr. Broujos, is clearly voluntary. Even though at one point in the last couple weeks he may have had an intent to make it involuntary, the language remains voluntary, and therefore, we are not talking about bringing to active duty for these purposes whole troop units or even one individual for that matter. It is clearly voluntary.

And if I may say, the original purpose of the bill is to make sure that the enlisted personnel of our Pennsylvania National Guard are able to be paid in the same fashion as the officer personnel of our National Guard are paid when they are performing special State service. So we should not be losing sight of the bill's original intent. It is an important piece of legislation for the enlisted men and women serving in our Pennsylvania National Guard.

Mr. BLACK. Mr. Speaker, I just want to put into the record two things: The screening that goes on when an individual enlists in the Guard will, I think, do some of the things that Representative Olasz is concerned about; and secondly, each Guard member takes an oath to serve and to protect the Constitution.

I think those two things are as important as any kind of background investigation to insure that the people who are working in the interdiction will do what we would expect them to do. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The question is on final passage.

Mr. OLASZ. Mr. Speaker, just a response to Representative Hayes—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman has spoken twice on the subject.

Mr. OLASZ. I just want to respond—
