Mr. FLEAGLE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I thank my colleagues for allowing me to speak to this House bill, and I will be speaking in relation to a series of others.

I rise in opposition to this and other nonpreferred appropriations for each respective Pennsylvania medical school. Last

session this House passed a House resolution asking the House Health and Welfare Committee to investigate the shortage and problems that were incurred in the shortage of family practitioners. Many of you here today cosponsored that resolution, and several of you here today were on that Health and Welfare Committee that investigated that.

The hearings truthfully were very productive and pointed to several critical needs which needed to be addressed by the legislature, and indeed several of those bills have been introduced to solve some of those problems. What we did not expect to hear from these hearings was what resulted in the attitude that these schools had towards family practitioners and the fact that they actually discouraged those people from entering family medicine. Yes, those schools gave lip service to family practice and they said that they introduced their students to family practice, but, in my opinion, these schools expressed their concerns and then returned to their usual practice, and that is what I have perceived as a very cavalier attitude.

All those in rural areas and in inner urban areas I think should be concerned about the attitude that these schools are taking on this situation. These areas are being hurt by the shortage of family practitioners. And for those of you who wonder why a family practitioner is so important to inner cities and rural areas, those people can take care of 90 percent of the cases and maybe even more of those that are referred to. We need them and they are not being supplied there.

I am realistic. I do not stand here to ask all of you to vote against these, because I realize we are on a very tight schedule, and I thank you for allowing me to speak here today, but I do think it is time that we sent them a message, at least starting next budget time, if that ever comes around, that I think they should be held accountable for that.

I appreciate any support you can give us on this. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Evans.

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, if the gentleman is just basically making comments and he would like to send a message through comments, I have no problem with that. If the gentleman is attempting in any way, Mr. Speaker, to ask people to vote against this particular nonpreferred, I then do have a problem with that, Mr. Speaker. I do not disagree with the gentleman, Mr. Speaker, that certainly in rural as well as in urban areas in the health care area there needs to be some type of special attention. This may not address this issue, but I know Representative Leo Trich has a particular bill, and one of the items that we have addressed in the budget, as soon as we pass this budget, attempts to deal with that area in the health care.

So I would ask that all of my colleagues would support this particular nonpreferred like all of them so that we can move this process along and bring this to a closure by Saturday or Sunday. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. MARKOSEK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HR 176.

All four of my grandparents came from what is hopefully soon to be a nation called Slovenia. Slovenia, for those in the House who perhaps are not aware, is a republic of what is today Yugoslavia, and recently, as we have all seen in the newspapers, there has been a great deal of controversy over there and fighting as Slovenia has attempted to gain its independence from the country of Yugoslavia.

In 1985 my father and I had the great privilege and pleasure of traveling to Slovenia, where we stayed with four of my first cousins who were still living there as well as their families. It is a very beautiful country. It is a country of peace-loving people; it is a country where the folks there just really are very hard working and want to get on with their lives and do not want to really be bothered by any outside influences. It is a country in which they desire their independence a great deal, and hopefully, after this latest round of fighting, peace will reign in Slovenia and Slovenia will become an independent country, where the folks there can get on with their lives.

I respectfully ask for support of this resolution. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Lescovitz.

Mr. LESCOVITZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just one note. HR's 176 and 177, after the votes I would appreciate if they would be held for anyone who would like to be an additional sponsor.

The SPEAKER. At the conclusion of the votes, HR's 176 and 177 will be held at the desk for additional cosponsors.

The Chair recognizes Mr. Broujos.

Mr. BROUJOS. Mr. Speaker, would it be appropriate to speak to this resolution now?

Mr. Speaker, I would ask that the House very carefully consider HR's 176 and 177. In effect, we would be asking for the balkanization of the Balkans, and the balkanization of the Balkans in the past has led to instability and, some might say, to war.

I think that what we are looking at is a plea to the United States Government to oppose what is described as all hostile activity against Slovenia and Croatia by political, economic, military, and other means. It means that we are asking our United States Government to condemn persuasiveness, to condemn the political efforts to preserve a federation, and I would ask the sponsors what position they would take if Canada were to say Maine should be part of Canada or Maine should be a separate State and we should support the cessation of Maine from the United States; what position would they have taken in the event they were present at the Civil War and would have been called upon to support the nullification doctrine of the South and the cessation of the South.

This is an issue of federation versus confederation. The federation of the United States, the federation of Yugoslavia, other federations - there may be times when they disintegrate; there may be times when they should have separate States. Nothing that I say in any way would be opposed to the eloquent statement concerning the beauty and the peacefulness and the charm and the culture of the Slovenians and the Croatians, but to ask the United States Government to oppose political, economic, and persuasive means - a means of speech, a means of grievance, a means of petition - in the issue arising in the Balkans now would be to ask them to oppose the efforts to preserve a federation and to use democratic means to bring about their objective.

For purposes of recognizing the importance of the federation issue and of not asking our government to become involved in opposing these political, economic, and other means that may be used by Yugoslavia, I would ask that you carefully consider a "no" vote.

I understand that the lady of Philadelphia has a resolution to honor the deceased former mayor of Philadelphia, and I certainly believe that some sort of honor ought to be bestowed on the distinguished gentleman. However, it is not clear as to whether this is the most appropriate form of recognition that we should be recommending.

That being the case, I would suggest that this particular resolution follow the normal course and be referred to the Rules Committee. I am confident that the Rules Committee, composed of leadership of this House, will find the most appropriate form of recognizing and remembering the distinguished gentleman from Philadelphia. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Hayes.

Mr. HAYES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I respectfully suggest that the House of Representatives take action on HR 182, offered by the lady from Philadelphia, Mrs. McHugh.

The lady has circulated her resolution. Obviously, there is a great deal of support in this House for due recognition for the previous mayor of the city of Philadelphia, the distinguished Mr. Rizzo, and I believe that this House should take this reso-

lution up for immediate consideration, as the lady has asked us to do, and I urge a suspension of the rules so that she is able to do so. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. GALLEN. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. For the information of the gentleman and for the members, this is actually not a debatable motion, but as in most nondebateable motions, a courtesy is offered to the leadership on both sides to clarify the issue for the party membership.

Mr. GALLEN. Mr. Speaker, that is all I wanted to do, is clarify. This does not—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman's offer is appreciated, but the gentleman is out of order. The Chair would respectfully suggest the gentleman and the other members to refrain from further debate.

The matter before the House is the suspension of the rules. A "yes" vote would suspend the rules; a "no" vote is against suspension of the rules.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Would the maker of the resolution agree to a brief period of interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The lady indicates she is willing to be interrogated. The gentleman may proceed.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the maker might explain the urgency of this resolution.

Mrs. McHUGH. I think it is a time-honored tradition here to recognize people, especially after such a sudden tragedy. The former mayor of Philadelphia gave 40 years of his life to law and order to make that a safe city, and I think the justice center is very appropriate. I think that we should honor him now, and I have been asked by constituents in my district to present this now.

Mr. ROEBUCK. But is there any immediate urgency that it be done today?

Mrs. McHUGH. Specific—

Mr. ROEBUCK. Is there any immediate urgency that it be done today?

Mrs. McHUGH. Yes; yes.

Mr. ROEBUCK. What is the immediate urgency that it be done today?

Mrs. McHUGH. He is fitting of this tribute, and I think that we should act on it now.

Mr. ROEBUCK. But that does not answer the question, Mr. Speaker. I am asking why the urgency should be today.

Mr. HAYES. Mr. Speaker?

Mrs. McHUGH. May I answer—

Mr. ROEBUCK. Mr. Speaker, I am trying to understand why—

The SPEAKER. For the purpose of the member's understanding—and the Chair appreciates everyone who is rushing to the floor to help in this debate—the gentleman, Mr. Roebuck, has propounded a question; the lady has framed her answer. The gentleman, Mr. Roebuck, has the floor.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, If I may speak on the resolution.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the resolution. Certainly, there is due consideration to be given to naming anything for anyone, and perhaps this is an appropriate resolution. I am, however, concerned whether or not there has been any real discussion or debate over this within the city or even within the delegation from the city that this is something that we could all agree upon. That is why I am asking why we need to do it at this point. I think if we could all agree upon it, that would be fine, and that is all I am asking, that we come to some sort of consensus, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Hayes.

Mr. HAYES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Before we rush to the conclusion at this very moment, as we consider this resolution, that we are naming the Philadelphia Criminal Justice Center after Frank L. Rizzo, let me suggest that that is not what we are doing at this moment, and I think that that is the inherent value of this particular resolution.

HR 182, as offered by the lady, memorializes city council to name that facility the Frank L. Rizzo Center. I believe that the city council would benefit from our expression of support for the previous mayor of the city of Philadelphia, but we at this moment are not naming the center. The lady has returned that duty and honor to the city council of Philadelphia. Yes, she is asking us to memorialize city council to consider the naming of this particular facility in honor of the past mayor of the great city of Philadelphia, and I do not believe that there is any great concern as to whether the lady is rushing in and doing something. She is asking this House to express itself to city council as a way of giving proper and due respect to Mr. Rizzo. We are not naming the center at this time, and no one should be possessed with that feeling. We are only memorializing the city council to consider naming this facility after Mr. Rizzo.

I urge support of HR 182.

### MOTION TO POSTPONE

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Kukovich.

Mr. KUKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Taking into account what Mr. Hayes said, that this resolution does not name the center at this time, and learning that the center is just an idea that has a way to go before it evolves into finality, I do not think anyone here wants to necessarily vote against the resolution of someone who has just passed away. However, to many members of this chamber, there is some offensive language, and for that reason I would think it would be reasonable to move over this bill temporarily so some amendments can be prepared, and we could pass this resolution within the next few days. That being the case, I would make that motion, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair construes the gentleman's remarks as a motion to postpone. The gentleman is in order.

The matter before the House is a motion to postpone consideration of HR 182.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Hayes.

Mr. HAYES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Without interrogating the gentleman, Mr. Kukovich, I have read and reread the language of the resolution, and for the life of me—without interrogating the gentleman and asking him why he believes the language to be offensive—for the life of me, as I read HR 182, I do not know what one word or set of words appears to be offensive to the gentleman, Mr. Kukovich. I believe that HR 182 states very squarely, with really rather neutral words, the great service that Mr. Rizzo provided the city of Philadelphia during his life as a public

servant. It does not appear to be offensive in any word or phrase whatsoever, and I would oppose any motion to postpone, delay, whatever the case may be.

I urge all members to vote "no."

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the lady, Ms. Josephs.

Ms. JOSEPHS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to HR 182. I do not mean to demean the memory of the late former mayor nor to cause his family or others who mourn him any additional pain, and I also want to give Mr. Rizzo credit for his willingness to engage himself in public life—a noble calling; all of us here would agree with that—and to note that his political activity inspired the participation of many people, and I am one of them. But I deplore now, as I did during his administration, the politics of division that he practiced.

I think there was never a time in recent memory in Philadelphia when people were so set against people and when the fear of the authorities was so pervasive, and I lay that at the feet of the late former mayor, Frank Rizzo. The damage that he has done to Philadelphia during his administration will not easily be repaired.

I urge a “no” vote on this resolution.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Williams.

Mr. WILLIAMS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am from the great city of Philadelphia and from that great county, as it has been described. It is a bit curious that we at the State level again choose to use this forum to discuss matters which are germane to us as a county.

I have no, I guess, mean-spirited words to speak of with regard to Mr. Rizzo. There are many different and varied opinions, and I believe that in due time his life will be testified in many variations.

So therefore, I do not have anything to say against Mr. Rizzo or for Mr. Rizzo. History will provide that. But I do believe that the resolution with all of its well-meaning— And I understand that members or persons from Representative McHugh’s district have encouraged her to do this, and I believe that Mr. Rizzo was a Republican and I guess a loyal Republican at his departure, so I understand their support along that side of the aisle.

But I would encourage members on this side of the aisle, Democrats, to understand that Philadelphia County has a city council. It will take upon it at some point in time, in due time, after the construction of that building, the deliberations as to whom the building should be named after, if it should be named after an individual.

I would encourage all of us who are Democrats to support us from Philadelphia County in that effort to leave our business to ourselves in this particular area and allow us to make that decision in terms of whom we would like to name the building after. So therefore, I would have to say vote against the resolution.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Cohen.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this resolution is not of earthshaking importance in and of itself, and there might be some interest as to why a lot of Philadelphia members seem very agitated about this resolution.

The reason people seem agitated has something to do with the reason why the Republican city committee voted 67 to 2 not to support Frank Rizzo when Frank Rizzo sought the Republican nomination in 1991. The reason might have something to do with why the Democratic city committee—

### POINT OF ORDER

Mr. GALLEN. Mr. Speaker, a point of order.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will state his point of order.

Mr. GALLEN. Mr. Speaker, this is a memorialization. It has nothing to do with what Mr. Cohen is talking about. He certainly is not addressing the issue. The issue is, shall we memorialize or shall we not? It has nothing to do with his feelings about the person for whom this center is going to be named, and I think they are going far afield on this thing.

The SPEAKER. It appears to the Chair that the resolution recites in its “whereas” clauses findings concerning the gentleman in question, and those are the reasons for voting for or against the resolution. And it appears to the Chair that the gentleman is very much on point.

The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, although it is appropriate to praise the dead, it is not necessarily appropriate to give the dead eternal recognition when it is very, very controversial within the city of Philadelphia as to whether he is deserving of this kind of recognition.

As I said, just a few months ago the Republican city committee in Philadelphia voted 67 to 2 not to support Frank Rizzo. When Frank Rizzo was a Democratic candidate for mayor, he was an incumbent and he sought the support of the Democratic city committee, and the Democratic city committee of Philadelphia overwhelmingly voted not to support Frank Rizzo.

Frank Rizzo was a man of extraordinarily attractive personal qualities. Many people who knew him were very, very happy with his performance. He may be one of the most charismatic politicians in the history of the United States. That does not change the fact, however, that his administration was an administration of extreme controversy.

We are naming the Criminal Justice Center after Mr. Rizzo in this resolution. It happens that the administration of criminal justice was a signal failure of the Rizzo administration.

The U.S. Justice Department filed dozens of lawsuits against the city of Philadelphia attacking Mr. Rizzo’s administration of criminal justice, dozens and dozens of lawsuits, and the Rizzo administration steadily lost those lawsuits.

The city of Philadelphia, under Mayor Rizzo, was repeatedly investigated for political corruption, including vote fraud.

Mr. O'BRIEN. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman, Mr. Cohen, suspend?

### POINT OF ORDER

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman, Mr. O'Brien, rise?

Mr. O'BRIEN. Mr. Speaker, I object to the latitude that the Speaker is giving Mr. Cohen on this issue. The Speaker has just instructed this House that he has allowed that latitude based on language and conclusions that are based in this resolution. The only thing that I read in this resolution is that Frank Rizzo tirelessly sacrificed his time and energy, both inside and outside of government service, and that he was devoted to the proposition of making Philadelphia a better place to live and work.

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman suspend.

Mr. O'BRIEN. If anybody in this House objects to those conclusions—

The SPEAKER. Will the gentleman suspend.

The issue before the House is this resolution. This resolution contains recitations that deal directly with both the character of the gentleman in question and recites that we are about to extend to this gentleman the everlasting respect and gratitude of the citizens of this Commonwealth.

There is clearly a difference of opinion in this House about whether or not that gratitude ought to be extended. The gentleman, Mr. Cohen, despite the fact that his remarks have obviously found offense among some members, is on point with the issue. If you disagree with the gentleman's remarks, you will have an opportunity to address them.

The gentleman is relevant and may continue.

Mr. COHEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, naming the Criminal Justice Center after Frank Rizzo will honor the signal failure of the Rizzo administration in the areas of criminal justice. This is not an appropriate honor for Frank Rizzo. I think we ought to find some area of Mr. Rizzo's career which does not extend the great controversial nature of this resolution.

Many of us in the legislature were elected to the legislature at various times in no small measure because we opposed the policies of Frank Rizzo that large numbers of our constituents found offensive. Frank Rizzo received 40,000 votes in the last Republican primary out of roughly 110,000 votes cast. He was defeated for mayor in 1983 and 1987. When he was running for a third consecutive term and seeking to amend the charter, the largest turnout in the city of Philadelphia voted overwhelmingly against the charter change by a margin of 2 to 1.

Many of you tell me and tell others that you are against the Philadelphia statewide image, that Philadelphia has an image of corruption; Philadelphia has an image of waste; Philadelphia has an image of inefficiency; Philadelphia has an image of illegality.

I would rather not be talking about this just 2 weeks after the death of Frank Rizzo, but since the lady has forced this debate, much of the ill will towards Philadelphia is the ultimate legacy of Frank Rizzo.

This resolution is deeply offensive to me. This resolution is deeply offensive to hundreds of thousands of Philadelphians, and I would urge that this resolution be defeated.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the lady, Ms. Ritter.

Ms. RITTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am not a citizen of Philadelphia, although my opponent in the last campaign lied about that fact and tried to assert that I was. But as someone who does not live in the city of Philadelphia, my reason for looking at this resolution and opposing it deals more with the precedent that we are setting here in terms of interfering in local governments' prerogatives to name their buildings after whomever they would like to, to honor their citizens in any way that they would want to by saying, this is our opinion of what you should do.

I will not address the issues, the items in here that describe Mr. Rizzo's character. I feel that that may or may not be something that we should be addressing as well. But this is not an appropriate subject for this House.

If members feel that they want to offer suggestions to city council in Philadelphia as to what they should do to honor Mr. Rizzo, I think that is appropriate for them as individuals, but I do not think it is appropriate for this House.

If the lady, Mrs. McHugh, manages to get elected to city council in Philadelphia, she is then free to introduce a resolution such as this at that body, which is the appropriate place for this type of a discussion, and I would urge the members to vote against this resolution.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the lady, Mrs. Harper.

Mrs. HARPER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to oppose this resolution.

We all have read and we know that under the leadership of Mayor Rizzo, under his leadership as police commissioner, we had the most corrupt police district in the city of Philadelphia. Mayor Rizzo had the same type of policemen as they have in California. The same brutality that is going on in California went on under Mayor Rizzo in Philadelphia. Mayor Rizzo stood by and let his policemen strip, strip men of their dignity, strip men in the street, and he did not open his mouth. He had a corrupt police district and I would not vote for someone that did not believe in justice, from what I have seen, to have a building, a justice building, named after this man.

He was nothing short of a bigot. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Was the gentleman, Mr. O'Brien, seeking recognition on the substance?

Mr. O'BRIEN. Mr. Speaker, all the previous speakers just got up and said that this is an innocuous resolution. I will tell you right now, Frank Rizzo is upstairs, he is looking down, and he is enjoying this debate, because as was true when he was mayor of the city of Philadelphia, and yes, a candidate, he was bigger than life, and he was bigger than life and right now this House is demonstrating that his legend continues to grow by leaps and bounds because of what he did as mayor of the city of Philadelphia.

The testament to his good works in the city of Philadelphia was evidenced by the overwhelming number of people of all

racess, creeds, colors, and religions that paid tribute to him when he was laid out in the great city of Philadelphia.

I am frankly offended. This is the first time that I have stood on the floor of this House and witnessed a condolence memorial resolution that has been debated in this fashion. I do not remember anybody that has been the subject of such vile debate and ridicule.

Mr. Speaker, I think that the justice center is a fitting tribute to a man who kept the streets of Philadelphia safe for many years. I come from the city of Philadelphia and I will tell you right now, there are very few citizens in that city that feel safe, and that is since Frank Rizzo left. And if you want to debate law and order and you want to debate safe streets, Mr. Cohen and the other members of the Philadelphia delegation, then let us go down there and I will walk down one side of the street and you can walk down the other side and you can ask the constituents in the city of Philadelphia, when did you feel safer - when Frank Rizzo was mayor or now when Wilson Goode is mayor?

### MOTION FOR PREVIOUS QUESTION

Mr. O'BRIEN. Mr. Speaker, I would like to make a motion that we move the previous question, end this partisan debate, and give Frank Rizzo the tribute that he is deserving of.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is in order.

The Chair urges all the members to take their seats so that we can avoid a clerical error in the counting of seconds.

### MOTION WITHDRAWN

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentleman, Mr. O'Brien, rise?

Mr. O'BRIEN. Mr. Speaker, for the benefit of those members that would like to say positive things about Frank Rizzo, I withdraw the motion to move the previous question.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes Mr. Freind.

Mr. FREIND. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to strongly support this resolution. Unlike some of my colleagues, however, I am not the slightest bit offended by the negative debate. As a matter of fact, I am certain that Frank Rizzo, God rest his soul, would love it, because it shows one of the reasons why I loved him so much. Even in death he can still drive the liberals crazy.

You know, Denny O'Brien made a point. Frank Rizzo was bigger than life. He was a giant. He was not perfect. He was a giant, warts and all. But I will say this for the man: He was one of those rare breeds of individuals where you always knew where he stood and where you either loved him or hated him but you never ignored him. And Denny, yes, is right - the streets were safer then; the streets were cleaner then; and Frank Rizzo never bombed any houses and never burned down an entire neighborhood in west Philadelphia.

Now, one other point. If some of my colleagues from Philadelphia on the other side of the aisle want to suggest that this State legislature should never have anything whatsoever to do with the affairs of Philadelphia, remember that the next time

you back up the money trucks up here to ask the taxpayers of Pennsylvania to bail out your failed city administration. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Petrone.

Mr. PETRONE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I have no great quarrel or interest beyond the fact that we should get on with more important business. We just voted on 2 billion dollars' worth of appropriations without a word. I do not think it makes sense to consider the debate on this for a man who is deceased and gone. Name whatever you wish after him. But I will tell you, as an Italian, we of the Italian caucus have a great interest in this resolution, and I want to ask the members of the Italian caucus on both sides of the aisle to vote affirmatively. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Kosinski.

Mr. KOSINSKI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to support the resolution, and I do not want to speak of the political perspective here. Many of my colleagues are upset. Many of my colleagues saw the man in a different way. One of the reasons I am here today and had the pleasure of sitting here for five terms as a Democratic Representative was Mayor Rizzo came out and endorsed me in a very tough primary. I won by a couple hundred votes. In the last two elections he was not with me, but that is beside the point.

Mayor Rizzo brought in a generation to politics, no matter what age. As a young committeeman, I had a problem once where I called the mayor's office. Within 1 hour I got a call not back from the mayor's staff but from the mayor himself saying, "Gerry, that problem will be solved." An 18-year-old committeeperson getting a call from the mayor of Philadelphia. That served as my role model in how I act toward my constituents. And whether you like the man or you do not, he has taught each and every one of us that to duck an issue is not the way to go. And he has told each and every one of us that maybe when we are done serving in elective life, we would like to have something named after us - a school, a playground, a bridge. We do that all the time, and I see no problem whatsoever in us memorializing our city council in Philadelphia to name that justice center after Mayor Rizzo.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Trello.

Mr. TRELLO. Mr. Speaker, I can remember when I was a member of the Appropriations Committee and everybody had to justify their spending plan, and the Crime Commission came to us year after year and named the same names, and they just happened to be all Italian names. After about the 10th year I said to them, if these guys are so bad, why are they not in jail, and they did not have an answer.

Today I heard some remarks about the Justice Department investigating Rizzo, indicating that he might have been some kind of a criminal or something. Of course, he is Italian; a lot of people might think that, and I resent that. If Rizzo was so bad, if he did a lot of things wrong, then he would have been put in jail. Well, he was not. So evidently he did not do anything wrong, and I say, let us pass this resolution.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Thomas.

Mr. THOMAS. Mr. Speaker, I am really not that concerned about how this House votes on this resolution. My only concern is that we vote one way or the other. The thing that I ask, I ask that we have the same excitement, the same intensity about the 55,000 or more workers that will not be paid tomorrow; that we have the same excitement, the same intensity about the mentally ill and the mentally retarded; that we have the same excitement, the same intensity about children and youth; that we have the same excitement, the same intensity about the homeless and about the more than 300,000 children that do not have health care. That is what I ask, that we vote on this resolution, whichever way you want to go, and let us get on with the business of insuring that the citizenry of this State will be protected.

We are now 32 days without a budget. That is the cry right now. Let us get this thing over with.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Williams.

Mr. WILLIAMS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think Mr. Thomas really did sum it up quite effectively, but I would like to add that the same tax votes that Mr. Frank Rizzo needed to increase taxes in Philadelphia County at a record proportion we would certainly appreciate from the other side of the aisle.

The other item I would like to add also is that even though I do respect all my Italian colleagues in the legislature on both sides of the aisle and I understand their pride with regard to ethnicity, it is a certain type of ethnicity, and as I said, I did not really want to speak on the character of Frank Rizzo because he has passed along and I do not think it is necessary for anybody to speak about anybody who is gone. But I do believe that Genghis Khan was of Asian descent. I do believe Hitler was also a German. But all those ethnicities, those nationalities, are not held in contempt in my mind simply because a few individuals of those nationalities and those descents did not bode well for that particular origin.

So therefore, because Mr. Rizzo just happens to be of Italian descent does not necessarily mean that he represents us in Philadelphia the same way as those of you who have read about him in your newspapers.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the lady, Mrs. McHugh.

Mrs. McHUGH. Mr. Speaker, thank you.

I would just like to say that I also agree with Representative Thomas. I would just like to say a few things.

In January of this year, I was sworn in here. It was one of the proudest days of my life. And I would just like to say, I thought I was here to add something to give my district good representation, and I was so proud to be a party to all of this on both sides of the aisle.

I have heard the words that they used - bigotry. This is where I have seen bigotry. Mr. Speaker, this is where I have seen bigotry today. I heard the word "corruption" used by Representative Cohen. Look to city council for corruption, not to Frank Rizzo. That man gave 40 years of his life to the city of Philadelphia in law and order.

I think what happened today was a disgrace on this floor and I am ashamed of it, and I urge all the decent people on this floor to vote "yes." Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Richardson.

Mr. RICHARDSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I did not have any plans to rise to speak on this issue because I felt that, number one, it was ill timed. The citizens of the city of Philadelphia in their concern over what the justice department should be named have not had an opportunity to meet. The Philadelphia delegation has not met on this issue. And as I raised the question with the leadership, I indicated that I felt that we would probably get into a debate that would not be the most healthy situation for us in a period of time when we are probably being laughed at all across this Commonwealth without a budget within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. But it is still the wisdom of this House to say that they did not really care about that and wanted to push this issue to some type of vote today and not have an opportunity for this matter to be sent to the Rules Committee to at least have some discussion and debate on whether or not there were other names that may have surfaced as persons possible to have been named for the justice center in the city of Philadelphia.

Number one, for those of you who are so anxious to vote on this issue, the justice center has not even been built yet in the city of Philadelphia.

Secondly, why it is being built, there is much controversy around whether or not it is ever going to be built with the amounts of moneys and the cost overruns that they have talked about in terms of the cost effectiveness of this particular building.

But notwithstanding all of that, certainly Cecil B. Moore comes to mind in the city of Philadelphia as someone who could have been named as an individual to be considered for the justice department in the city of Philadelphia, and if I had had an opportunity knowing that this resolution was coming today, I certainly would have added his name as one of those persons who should appear on any building for justice in the city of Philadelphia, because it was he who defended those Panthers that were stripped naked in the streets of the city of Philadelphia during 1968. It was also Cecil B. Moore that defended us when we got beat up at the Board of Education under the tutelage then and operation of the police commissioner, Frank Rizzo, of the city of Philadelphia, and received over 13 stitches in the head and people were beaten in the streets of the city of Philadelphia. It was also Cecil B. Moore that rose to many occasions on civil rights issues that dealt with the breaking of the tradition of the kinds of problems that existed, not only at the post office but also at Girard College wall. Many of us who participated in the integration of that institution known as Girard College now were very proud of the justice that was brought to light by Cecil B. Moore.

So yes, there is much debate from many of us from Philadelphia, because many of you who do not live in the city of Philadelphia do not even have an inkling of what is taking

place within the city. This is a controversial piece of legislation. While in fact, Mr. Speaker, we are not talking about memorializing this individual, we are talking about naming a particular building after him. There is a difference. If you were talking about memorializing him, then I think that you would have a different situation in front of you. I think that when you start talking about a problem that centers itself only in the city of Philadelphia and that while we can memorialize any particular body of government that we want, we need to be a little bit more astute in our understanding of what really is at hand here.

There was no fast quick fix or rush to do this today. It was because there were some folks who felt that we had to do something to show the public back home that we are doing something. Tomorrow morning's *Inquirer* and *Daily News* headlines are going to be about this debate and not on the nonpreferreds that we passed. It is not going to deal with any of those budgetary issues that need to be finally developed and dealt with as a result of overall problems that people are faced with here in this city and in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, particularly those senior citizens and those individuals who are not getting their paychecks and those individual nursing homes and other persons who fall into the realm of being disadvantaged. It seems to me that we always do things that are ill timed, not that it is not appropriate to raise it at this particular time, Mr. Speaker, and be dealt with, but the ill timing of it. Certainly we can debate this at any particular time. I just thought that today was not the day to do that and cause the confusion that you see on the floor of the House of Representatives.

Finally, Mr. Speaker, if we are to be astute as legislators and want to recognize problems, there is certainly no way in the world, no matter what one paints as an individual's character of one person, there is always a different point of view. Everybody is not monolithic in their thinking. Fortunately, that is why there is a House of Representatives for us to be able to debate various issues, because we are not monolithic.

And the thing is that no one even brought race into this question until someone raised the question about Mr. Rizzo being an Italian. No one has attacked the Italian race. No one has attacked the Crime Commission reports on others who have been attacked in this same report over and over again, but we raise the question today as to the timeliness of an issue that really requires some real serious thinking on behalf of the citizens in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, but more particularly to those citizens in Philadelphia.

This center may not even be named after Mr. Rizzo, as we stand here and talk today, because there are many different buildings, streets, and other institutions that have been surfaced as those possible names that could be named after him, but for some reason we chose the justice center. And I think that many of you do not remember when then Councilman Lucien Blackwell and myself and others from this delegation here in Philadelphia went down to see Justice Bell because of the police brutality in the city of Philadelphia and the problems that existed with respect to many people who had been

shot while handcuffed, with their hands handcuffed behind their back in the city of Philadelphia, that there was a major problem dealing with that kind of brutality within the city of Philadelphia, and many of us then took it to Washington to have it dealt with. Mr. Speaker, it was not asking that anything be brought against him as an individual criminal. It was because of the kind of conduct that was being witnessed by the police department in the city of Philadelphia at that time, and therefore, we raised those particular questions, not against an individual being brought to justice through the criminal justice system and some Crime Commission report; no, because of what we actually physically witnessed as individual human beings.

So while one side of the coin addresses itself today and will pass this resolution today as I oppose it, you will see that there are varying, different points of view. If you do not live in the city of Philadelphia, then you do not know. You can only go by those reports that you may have heard and you may go by what you may have listened to or had other people pass on to you. But if you do not know, it is like anything else: you should not get in our business if you do not know anything about our business. The problem is that this is a problem that needs to be resolved by the citizens of the city of Philadelphia, and they will ultimately make the final decision in their wisdom and determination as to how this justice center should be named.

But you should also remember that there are many people who have suffered and there are probably many people who on the other side of the coin will say that they have gained. I would say we are one of those individuals who have suffered under the rule and also under that particular administration within the city of Philadelphia, and I can only say that if we did not have this resolution before us, many of these issues that have been brought to the forefront today would not even have been addressed or raised as any points on the floor of this House at all. But because it has been raised, we need to set the record straight and give the chronological order of history so that people can understand what has taken place.

There are many people in the city of Philadelphia who have suffered as a result of what has taken place with respect to the man whom you want to memorialize in the justice center. And I think that if it was not pointed out properly and correctly to you today, regardless of how you vote, at least the record for us will be straight for many people and parents and other loved ones who have suffered because of those concerns that have been raised honestly here on the floor of this House about naming the justice center after an individual whom we do not believe brought the justice that everyone swears happened while he was mayor of the city of Philadelphia.

One person does not bring dope into the city of Philadelphia or to the State of Pennsylvania or to this United States. One person certainly could not clean it up all overnight. What existed during the sixties and the early seventies when Rizzo was the mayor and then he was also police commissioner of the city of Philadelphia has nothing at all to do with the dilemma that exists across this Nation with drugs and the out-



break of drugs and violence that exists in every community across this Nation. And for anybody to think that it cannot happen to you, go to the 1200 block of Spruce Street downtown in Philadelphia where they found a crack house where they never thought would exist ever in the city of Philadelphia before. Go to the northeast, go out into the suburbs, and go to any other metropolitan or suburban city in this country and you will find that drugs exist everywhere. They try to make you think that one person would have cleaned it up if he had become mayor of the city of Philadelphia.

I ask you to take another thought pattern in your thinking on this resolution that is before us today and ask that you use a little more wisdom instead of your emotionalism to make decisions that are more accurate in this thinking. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the lady, Mrs. Harper.

Mrs. HARPER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

To me it is most disgusting to hear anyone on this floor of the House of Representatives mention race. I never, I have never mentioned a person's race, creed, or color, and I never will, because I have been discriminated against simply because of my race. And to let the truth be told, look at me. I am part Irish; I am part African-American; my ancestors are part Italian, but I am a black woman. I will never, never deny that, and I will never mention anyone's race. As Dr. King said, we should look at people, at the contents of their character and not their race. I firmly believe that. And I believe what Thurgood Marshall said: a snake is a snake. I do not care if he is a black snake or a white snake. Understand that. A snake is a snake, white or black. They all bite.

I am against this resolution. I think the city council should have the say about this resolution. I know the resolution is going to pass. I am not concerned about that. But I want to go on record that I am against this resolution because I know that the people in Philadelphia voted against Mayor Rizzo twice. They made it impossible for him to change the charter. These things that I am saying are all true. They are on the record.

And as Curtis Thomas said, I think it is most disgraceful that people are suffering across this State and we are here arguing about a resolution. I would like to see— And back to the taxes. Yes, Mayor Rizzo gave us the highest tax package in the city of Philadelphia. Now I would like to see those same people who have so much to say go ahead and pass the tax package and help the people in the State of Pennsylvania. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. O'Brien.

Mr. O'BRIEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Sometimes the debate of this House goes around in circles. I remember back in 1977 and 1978 we had a similar debate on the floor of this House, and it involved the Philadelphia Police Department. I would like to bring to the attention of the members of this House that then Representative Joe Rhodes and now Judge Anthony Scirica had the Judiciary Committee with subpoena power investigate all the allegations against the Philadelphia Police Department. A report

was issued at the end of that legislative session that said the overwhelming majority of the police officers in the city of Philadelphia are doing an outstanding job.

Mr. Speaker, I believe that the allegations that were made back at that time were found not to be warranted. I believe that the report that was issued by the Judiciary Committee during 1977 and 1978 speaks for itself.

Mr. Speaker, I also agree with Representative Thomas. And it is fitting that we are debating a resolution to honor Mayor Frank L. Rizzo, because as Representative Thomas was talking about the workers, the mentally ill, the poor, the indigent, they were the people that Frank Rizzo cared about.

That is the reason, Mr. Speaker, that I ask you to consider voting favorably for this resolution and pay Frank Rizzo, our dear friend, the tribute that he is deserving of. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. James.

Mr. JAMES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I had the distinction of being a Philadelphia police officer both under Mayor Rizzo as police commissioner and also as the mayor, and I would oppose this resolution based on these facts. But just before that, I think that we ought to name the center after Alphonso Deal, who happened to be a member of this House. That is justice.

But anyway, the fact is that in 1967 when Police Commissioner Rizzo became police commissioner, African-Americans were coming into the police department being hired at a rate of 27 percent. After he became police commissioner at that rate, he changed the policies of the hiring of police officers that caused that rate to drop year after year until 1971, when African-Americans were coming into the police department from 27 percent in 1967 down to 7 percent in 1971 when he became mayor. And then in 1971, because of that travesty of justice in that African-Americans were not being able to come into the police department for the test being discriminatory and the other practices and policies, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, along with other African-American individuals who had tried to get into the police department, then took out a lawsuit charging the Philadelphia Police Department with discrimination in hiring, promotion, and discipline practices.

For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I would urge that we oppose this resolution.

On the question recurring,

Will the House adopt the resolution?

BILLS ON THIRD  
CONSIDERATION CONTINUED

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1551, PN 2364**, entitled:

A Supplement to the act of April 1, 1863 (P. L. 213, No. 227), entitled "An act to accept the grant of Public Lands, by the United States, to the several States, for the endowment of Agricultural Colleges," making appropriations for carrying the same into effect; providing for a basis for payments of such appropriations; and providing a method of accounting for the funds appropriated.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

Mr. COWELL offered the following amendments No. A2318:

Amend Sec. 1, page 1, line 10, by inserting after "1."

(a)

Amend Sec. 1, page 2, by inserting between lines 29 and 30

(b) The appropriations provided in subsection (a) shall be contingent upon the university complying with all provisions of the act of June 21, 1957 (P.L.390, No.212), referred to as the Right-to-Know Law, as they are applied to agencies covered by that law.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendments?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes Mr. Cowell.

Mr. COWELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am proposing to offer amendments to HB 1551 and then subsequently to HB's 1552, 1553, and 1554 because the Senate has failed to act on HB 1075, which this chamber approved by a vote of 200 to 1 a couple of months ago. That was legislation that would for the first time apply the State's Right-to-Know Law to the four State-related universities - Pitt, Penn State, Temple, and Lincoln. We are now about to appropriate another \$549 million to those four institutions, and under the current law, the public has no legal right to know how those dollars are being spent.

This is not the best way of doing this effort. This is not the best approach to this problem. The best approach was through the enactment of HB 1075. But before we appropriate an additional half a billion dollars to those four institutions, I think it is proper and it is necessary that we take action

through these appropriation bills to insure that the principles of the Right-to-Know Law in fact are applied.

This particular bill deals with Penn State, and the amendment is rather straightforward. It simply says that this appropriation is contingent upon that university abiding by the provisions of the Right-to-Know Law as they are applied to any other State agencies or any other agencies which are covered by the Right-to-Know Law.

Mr. Speaker, this does not appropriate any additional dollars. It should not in any way disrupt a budget agreement that may have been arrived at by the legislative leaders. But the members of this chamber spoke very clearly on this issue already, and I think it is appropriate and, as I suggested, it is necessary that we speak clearly on the issue before us today, and that is if this institution and the other three schools want to receive another half a billion dollars, then they have an obligation to abide by the Right-to-Know Law, and we can guarantee that through this amendment.

Mr. Speaker, I urge the approval of the amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Davies.

Mr. DAVIES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to oppose the amendment on the same grounds that I opposed the original bill.

I agree with the concerns expressed by Mr. Cowell in certain of the areas that he is interested in addressing, and I think that it is appropriate that our interest in it should be in exact ratio to the amount of money that we appropriate to those institutions. I see that there can be some very dangerous aspects of the right to know and expand when we do it generally overall to the entire budgets of these institutions. I think that, of course, we could do it another way, but that is beside the point.

His interest, whether it be in the retirement benefits of certain individuals, whether it be the food services or the housing contracts or other of those things, I agree that those should come under the aspects of wherever we supply the moneys to that end. However, I do not think that all the business—These entities were created by law. They were created by a law of this body and supported, and I think that if we are going to appropriately look at these things, I think we ought to take the time to study this thing and really look at what we should be looking at as far as these institutions. I do not think there are some aspects of their research, some of their contracts, and things like that that are a matter for this body, and I have not changed my stand on that. I understand his concern about certain areas, and I think that certain areas can be looked at, but I do not think this is the proper device or manner in which to do it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Evans.

Mr. EVANS. I, too, Mr. Speaker, rise and oppose this particular amendment, and the reason that I rise and oppose this particular amendment, Mr. Speaker, is because there is a bill in the Senate, and I believe, Mr. Speaker, that that bill would be the best way to deal with this particular issue.

Mr. Speaker, in addition, in the nonpreferreds for the first time we have some language in those bills. For example, Mr.

Speaker, I would like to just read the language to the members of the House. In this particular case, Mr. Speaker, it would be Lincoln University or University of Pitt or Penn State "...shall provide full, complete and accurate information as may be required by the Department of Education or the Majority Chairman or the Minority Chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the Senate or the Majority Chairman or the Minority Chairman of the Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives." I believe, Mr. Speaker, that those entities will be more than sufficient to get the necessary information.

I do not believe, Mr. Speaker, in the time frame that we are working, that it would be in the best interest for this particular amendment to be accepted. I do agree with the gentleman, Mr. Speaker, that this issue needs to be addressed, and I was one of the supporters of that particular bill that has passed this House, but I do not believe, Mr. Speaker, that it would be in our interest on Thursday, 2 or 3 days before we are attempting to wrap this situation up, to have this amendment be adopted today. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Noye.

Mr. NOYE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, would the proposer of the amendment submit to a brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates that he will. The gentleman may proceed.

Mr. NOYE. Mr. Speaker, under the Right-to-Know Law, these universities that we are attempting to bring under this umbrella do a great deal of research. Many of them also have contracts with the Federal Government, including the Defense Department. Would these records of research and development in any field, including defense, be required to be made public under the Right-to-Know Law as it stands in Pennsylvania today?

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, the language of the Right-to-Know Law would be broadly applied as it currently is applied to the 14 community colleges and the 14 State-owned universities. I would look to the track record that we have had for some 25 years with those institutions to determine if there are or are likely to be any problems with the application of the law to the 4 State-related universities, and there have been no problems to the best of my knowledge.

Secondly, we gave to the representatives of each of the four institutions a full opportunity to propose amendments to the legislation when it was considered by the Education Committee and this chamber, and we specifically raised the question of research dollars or contract dollars as something that they may believe needed to be treated separately and differently. They chose not to suggest any amendments to us. And so my understanding is that the current language in the bill would not provide any special problems for the 4 State-related universities as they have not provided any special problems for 28 other higher education institutions in this State.

Mr. NOYE. Mr. Speaker, if I may. I appreciate the gentleman's response. This is an area of great concern to me, because I do not know that the other 28 institutions that we

are talking about are involved at the same kind of levels in research, and particularly with defense questions, as these institutions that are State related.

I hope the gentleman is correct. You know, that is my wish. I hope it is correct, because I feel certain that these records in some form or another are going to be open to the public, but I have very serious concerns about certain areas, particularly in the area of defense and also in the area of health research and the problems that are developing throughout this Nation and particularly in some of our State-related institutions with the problem of health research and animal rights activists. I have serious concerns that making these records public will create serious problems for the institutions and put research at great risk in this Commonwealth.

I probably will vote against the amendment on that basis until I get a clearer picture as to just how far the application of the present law will go. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Broujos.

Mr. BROUJOS. Mr. Speaker, how refreshing it is to have an amendment to a bill to discuss during this time.

Mr. Speaker, I think that the important thing is to get this amendment passed. If there are technical problems, if there are research problems later, let us address it later. We certainly do not want to compromise research. But the important thing is, there is one major question, and that is to get that information out of the University of Pittsburgh and to let them know and to send them a message and send them another message, and the way to do it is with this amendment.

All the technical problems with this amendment can be overcome - the question of compliance and how to comply and if they do not comply. Sure there may be litigation. Sure there may be interpretations. Sure there may be obstacles. The important thing is that we will send to the University of Pittsburgh a message of accountability that they do not understand and have not understood and will understand with this amendment.

I ask support of this amendment, because it is a good amendment. It is about time some of these bills are amended, and this is an amendment that should be voted for. I ask for support.

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes Mr. Cowell.

Mr. COWELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just two points, Mr. Speaker. The language in the current Right-to-Know Law describes a public record to be an account, a voucher, or a contract. So we are talking about how these institutions spend their money, and I think the public, as well as the legislature, has a right to know that.

Representative Evans is very correct. There is language in the proposed legislation that speaks to the legislature's right to have access to information and puts a burden on the schools to report back to us, but it does not address the fundamental issue of the public's right to know what is happening with their tax dollars. This amendment would in fact do that.

And secondly, in terms of the timing, this is not the last minute of the last hour of the budget process. The Senate has 3 or 4 days to deal with this issue. If the Senate does not like

it, then let them take it out. Let them stand up in the Senate and say they are opposed to right to know. Let them quit hiding behind a committee process over there, and let them not have us do their dirty work for them.

This chamber spoke very clearly on this issue by a vote of 200 to 1. I would urge that we again speak very clearly on this issue on behalf of the public. Let us make sure that this \$549 million is expended and student tuition dollars are expended with those institutions responsible for living under the provisions of the Right-to-Know Law during the next fiscal year. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

### THE SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE (THOMAS C. CORRIGAN, SR.) PRESIDING

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes Representative Hayes.

Mr. HAYES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

When the gentleman from Cumberland County, Mr. Broujos, was speaking, he made specific note of problems associated with the University of Pittsburgh. This happens to be HB 1551, the appropriation for Penn State. The University of Pittsburgh's appropriation is HB 1552, which will come later in today's session. But this particular bill deals with Penn State and not Pitt. Thank you.

Mr. COWELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the language in this amendment is similar to the language in the amendment we just approved for HB 1551, except in this case it would be applied to the appropriations for the University of Pittsburgh. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Evans.

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, I guess I can count, and obviously from what I saw up there on the board, members feel very strongly about this particular issue. But I will say to you again that I think it is a mistake. I think it is a mistake on the fact that we are attempting to work something out with the Senate. It would be something different if this body was the only body that we had to deal with.

I have spoken to the chairman of the Education Committee, and this particular university is why this entire issue came up, and members on both sides of the aisle will know that I took a very active role in assuring that Pitt was held accountable, but I do not think, Mr. Speaker, that this is the way to go.

I would ask my colleagues to reconsider the vote that they just made. I understand that it seems like a very popular vote to make, but I am asking you to reconsider the vote on this particular nonpreferred. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Cowell.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, just so the record is very clear on the issue, HB 1075 was introduced before the incidents at the University of Pittsburgh became a matter of public debate. The language of HB 1075 and this amendment does not attempt to deal specifically with issues at the University of Pittsburgh or the problems of the former president there. They really address a much broader issue - the issue of the public's right to know about how all its dollars are being spent. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes Mr. Davies.

Mr. DAVIES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

For the same reasons that I opposed the prior one—and this applies to either Pitt, Penn State, or the other two—if we are going to supply 20 percent of the money to those institutions, then we have a right to know how those dollars are spent and

only how those dollars are spent. It is that simple. It is not a matter— This is not a positively 100-percent State institution supported by the State; it is not a State agency or is not a State department or anything else, and it is that simple; no other differences. If we have a right to know, it is very easy to set up an arbitrator. What we have the right to know is the dollars that we spend, and that is why I oppose the amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Cowell.

Mr. COWELL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This is similar to the previous three amendments. In this case, it applies the right-to-know language to the fourth State-related university, Lincoln University.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Evans.

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, I again ask members on both sides of the aisle not to amend this particular nonpreferred. I want to say it until you begin to understand that this is August 2, and it is not June 2, and as soon as you begin to understand that if you want to get this situation resolved, I do not think it is in the best interest to amend this particular nonpreferred. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Mr. Davies.

Mr. DAVIES. Mr. Speaker, whether it is July, August, or September, for the same reasons I oppose the amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the lady, Mrs. Taylor.

Mrs. TAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

May I interrogate the maker of the amendment, please?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman indicates that he will be interrogated.

Mrs. TAYLOR. Mr. Speaker, it is my understanding that those universities that are in the SSHE (State System of Higher Education) system are already subject to the right-to-know language, and now that we have addressed the four State relateds, they also will be subject to the right-to-know. I wonder, Mr. Speaker, if you could advise the members of the House why we did not address this situation when we voted on the University of Penn, Drexel, and the rest of the State-aided colleges.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, I will be glad to answer a question on this particular amendment. The lady is asking me a question, I believe, on an amendment which has not been offered and asking why an amendment was not offered. Is that in order?

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman does not have to answer that question if he does not want to.

Mr. COWELL. Well, I will be glad to as long as we are not out of order too much.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman is in order.

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, the 14 community colleges, the 14 State-owned universities, and the 4 State-related universities all have a special legal relationship with the Commonwealth. In addition to receiving large sums of taxpayer dollars, they have that special legal relationship, and that is why I have focused on the four institutions with that special legal relationship that remain yet uncovered by the Right-to-Know Law. There are other institutions, there are numerous other institutions, including some universities, that do receive public dollars; for instance, institutions like the University of Pennsylvania and Drexel. I have no problem if somebody offers an amendment to those bills, but again, those bills have already been approved by the House. My focus, as was the focus originally with the language in HB 1075, has been on the four State-related universities, receiving lots of State tax dollars and which have a special legal relationship with the Commonwealth.

Mrs. TAYLOR. Mr. Speaker, I thank the gentleman for his response. I just hope that while I cannot give you the exact amount of the percentages of the budgets that are public and private in the State relateds, I am sure that the membership of this House realizes that a large percentage of the moneys supporting these four State-related universities comes from private funds, and that is very different from those universities that are in the State System or the community college relationship. So I think, to back up what Mr. Noye said, not only are we tampering with research in these great universities but we are also trying to run their business for them, and I do not think that is the purpose of the members of this House. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the lady.

The Chair recognizes Representative Davies for the second time.

Mr. DAVIES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Just to interrogate Mr. Cowell on the same subject, expanded not on the other nonpreferreds but on the State related.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Does the gentleman, Mr. Cowell, wish to be interrogated? He indicates that he will. The gentleman may proceed.

Mr. DAVIES. Mr. Speaker, you are not inferring that there is not a legal arrangement that by law recognizes State related. Is that correct?

Mr. COWELL. Mr. Speaker, I am saying that there is a law on the books of this Commonwealth that created State-related status for Lincoln University, the subject of the amendment before us at this moment.

Mr. DAVIES. So there is a legal arrangement, and this was done by law, and it was created by law.

What does the law say about the matter of the finances of those institutions now? In other words, not only that but why were they not included in the right to know?

Mr. COWELL. Again, Mr. Speaker, the law which created State-related status for Lincoln is silent on the question of right to know, and it has been a judgment of the courts, as the law has been applied particularly to Penn State and Pitt, that the State-related institutions are not covered by the law. I think the answer to your question, however, is that this legislature passed the Right-to-Know Law, I believe, in 1957, and at that point, Pitt, Temple, and Lincoln were not State-related institutions. So we created the State-related status for those institutions after the Right-to-Know Law was established, and it probably just has not occurred to many members of this legislature to go back and make the Right-to-Know Law more comprehensive and appropriately applicable to those four institutions.

Mr. DAVIES. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would take a different tack. I would say that when it was created, it was purposely ignored and was not included and included for many of the reasons that I have concerns about. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair thanks the gentleman.
